## **Departmental Requirements**

<u>Major in Art</u> (with emphasis in studio art) - the university offers two undergraduate art programs. The <u>general program</u> is a 36 credit major that requires 27 credits in studio courses and 9 credits in art history. The <u>departmental major</u> is a 60 credit program which includes a 30 credit core (drawing, two- and threedimension design, painting, materials and methods), 6 credits in art history, 9 credits in studio art electives and a 15 credit concentration in either painting, sculpture, lithography, intaglio, photography or cinema. Transfer applicants will be considered for the <u>general program</u> only. Once enrolled, students interested in the <u>departmental major</u> may apply through the Art Department after completing one full semester at the university. A portfolio must be submitted to and accepted by the Art Department before a student may be officially admitted and recognized as a 60 credit <u>departmental major</u> in Art.

<u>Communication & Rhetoric</u> - students may not formally declare a major in Communication & Rhetoric or be assigned to the Department of Communication for advisement until they have completed 24 graduation credits, including ACOM 100 (Human Communication: Language and Social Action) or its equivalent and either a statistics course (AMAT 108, ASOC 221, APSY 210) or a course in formal logic (APHI 210) with a grade of 'C' or better or 'S' in each. Students can be considered for admission as an "intended" major.

<u>Mathematics</u> - students may not be admitted to, formally declare a major in, or be advised by the Department of Mathematics unless they have successfully completed one full year of calculus (AMAT 112 and AMAT 113 or their equivalent) with a grade of 'C' or better or 'S' in each course. Students can be considered for admission as an "intended" major.

<u>Psychology</u> - students may not formally declare a major in Psychology until they have completed at least 24 graduation credits and have completed APSY 101 (Intro to Psychology), APSY 210 (Statistical Methods) and APSY 211 (Experimental Psychology) with a grade of 'C' or better or 'S'. If students do not meet the above requirements, their offer of admission will be as an "intended" major.

<u>Sociology</u> - students may not be admitted to or formally declare a major in Sociology unless they have successfully completed ASOC 115 (Introduction to Sociology), ASOC 220 (Introduction to Social Research) and ASOC 235 (Sociological Theory) with grades of 'C' or better or 'S' in each. If a student does not meet the above requirements, their offer of admission will be as an "intended" major.
