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

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Say It Isn't So, Mark

Summer EE Interns from Near and Far

The feedback regarding the quality of Hartley's camps this summer has been excellent, but with 72 (that's right, 72!) 3 to 5-day camps over the course of the summer, there is clearly more teaching load than Joy, Mark, Pete, Lacey and even Hartley's pool of contract educators can possibly handle. As in the past, the approach has been to bring in a number of Environmental Education (EE) Interns with educational emphases in the life sciences and substantial experience working with kids. That said, the pool of applicants for our EE internship program this year was the largest and arguably the strongest ever, as is reflected by the fine team that we have on-site this summer.

After two weeks of intensive training and a month of teaching more than 3000 students coming for school field trips, the interns' duties have shifted primarily toward training for and teaching our ever-popular summer camps. However, it should also be noted these same interns have enabled us to do a number of things this summer that have been on our radar for quite some time. An early camp drop-off option to accommodate working parents, exhibit development, Saturday programming and canoe rental opportunities for area families are just a few of the examples of how these fine folks have strengthened our program this summer.



The exceptional crew joining us this summer includes Nicole Feralin, a sophomore Biology major at the University of Northern Michigan, who by the way is our only native Duluthian. Katie Green, a senior Integrative Biology major at the University of Illinois Champaign-Urbana, is a Schaumburg, Illinois native. Matt Johnson, a double major in Biology and Education at UMD, is a native of St. Anthony, Minnesota. Mary Mallinger, a junior Wildlife Biology major at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, is a St. Paul native. Paul McDivitt, a senior Marketing major at St. Johns University focused primarily on web development and giving Hartley a presence on social networking sites like Facebook, is also teaching or helping with a number of camps this summer as well.

HNC Has a New Addition!

Come and see our new OUTDOOR CLASSROOM located in the deer enclosure. Thanks to the great work of the six environmental stewardship interns: Danielle Sorenson, Per-Gustav Swenson, Sam Levang, Mengyuan Jia, Terese Mayerle, and Ryan Murphy, with direction and encouragement by Denny Hovde, a long time dream of HNC director, Pete Gravett, has been realized.

The six week project consisted of building benches on a hillside and a stage with backboard creating a natural amphitheater which seats 150+ for teaching or meetings. The materials were cut from harvested logs which were peeled and stacked to dry when the red pines in the enclosure area were thinned. The walkways are mulched with bark from the peeled trees. The site and trail leading to it are all ADA accessible.



On your next visit check out the amphitheater; sit and watch birds, daydream or just enjoy the whisper of the pines. Come learn with us! Our outdoor classroom is always ready for the big adventures and unexpected discoveries that teach us to appreciate and understand the world around us.

Canoe Rentals Now Available



Hartley Nature Center now rents canoes on Hartley Pond every Saturday from 10:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. The cost is \$15 for non-members and \$7 for members, and in-

cludes canoe, paddles, and lifejackets for the full time.

Bring your rod and tackle and go fishing, search for Painted Turtles sunning themselves on logs along the shore, count the Red-winged Blackbirds you can see and hear bouncing around on cattails, and explore the far end of the pond by the Beaver lodge and dam.

If you are interested in renting a canoe, you must pay and sign a waiver at the front desk in Hartley Nature Center before heading down to the pond. There will be a certified lifeguard at the pond while you are paddling. Mark your calendar for next Saturday and enjoy this unbelievable opportunity to see a new part of Hartley Park.



Critter Corner

Earlier this summer, Hartley's own Snappy the Snapping Turtle appeared on David Hoole's "Nature Matters." The topic of the section was to educate viewers on turtles wandering about in search of safe nesting spots. You can view the footage on our website at hartleynature.org.

Just a few weeks earlier, Hartley employees were greeted by another Snapping Turtle while walking into work. This mossy backed female, much larger than Snappy, was laying her eggs at the edge of the HNC parking lot. We were a bit awestruck watching the turtle lay its eggs in a hole it had dug at the edge of the parking lot. We approximated this snapper's nest to be holding near 20 eggs, which will hope will hatch and emerge safely in a couple of months.

If a turtle lays its eggs in your backyard, you can cover the nest with wire mesh caging or screen to protect it from predators. It is important to either use wire that baby turtles can fit through when they emerge from the nest or make sure to remove the enclosure by late summer. Remember to be on the lookout early in the summer for moving turtles that may be in search of a safe nesting site, and to watch for the nests beginning to hatch in the fall.


Notes From Summer Camp....

Exploring the Wilderness... In Our Own Backyard!

Urban Wilderness Camp, in its third summer, is up and running – or out and about, if you will. A week-long, environmental education based day camp, UWC introduces 9-12 year olds to the idea that wilderness isn't a place one needs to travel far to find. This being my first summer with UWC, I'm excited to be a part of something that is so strongly supported by area foundations and businesses. The Lake Superior Coastal Program, the Duluth Superior Area Community Foundation, and the Whole Foods Co-op offer generous support because they believe in the mission of the camp, they like the lessons we teach, and they share in the vision of urban wilderness.

In Duluth we are fortunate enough to have a plethora of places and resources to explore; places that make it hard to believe you are even still in the city limits, places that make adults fall in love with Duluth all over again, and kids grateful to grow up somewhere so special. In the coming weeks there is much to look forward to as we will be exploring Canal Park/Park Point, Lester Park and Chester Park.

There is plenty of summer weather left to get out and explore some Urban Wilderness, and let yourself fall in love with Duluth all over again.

It's almost that time...time to start thinking about getting geared up for Fall.




