I am the light of the world

Putting our faith in the Lord involves seeing without our eyes. How can this be? Jesus shows us in the story of the Man Born Blind (John 9:1-41). Not only would he see with his eyes, but he would also come to a clear spiritual view of Christ.

As Jesus passed by a man that was born blind, his disciples asked him why this man was blind. They assumed that this man's blindness was a direct result of sin by him or his parents. Jesus responded "*Neither he nor his parents sinned: it is so that the works of God might be made visible through him*". John 9:3

Jesus does not explain how the man became blind, but responds that there is a purpose to the man's blindness. Through his blindness the works of God would be made visible.

"While I am in the world, I am the light of the world" John 9:5



Jesus spits on the ground to create a clay mixture which he smears on the blind man's eyes. He then asks the blind man to go to a pool of water and wash it off. The man does as he was asked and then he is able to see. Through this act Jesus shows us the healing effect of obedience and reminds us that He is the light of the world.

Here is a brief update on what has been happening in your children's Physical Education classes during the months of February, March, and April.

<u>Kindergarten</u>

During the last couple of months the kindergartners have been busy learning many new skills and activities. In February they were introduced to floor hockey skills, such as shooting on goal and playing goalie. We spent a day or two with the gym scooters learning how to manipulate them in a variety of ways individually and with partners. We continue to practice a variety of ball skills with the emphasis now being on some of the skills used in the game of basketball. The students been working on dribbling skills and will practice their set shots in the near future. During the month of March, long jump ropes have been introduced. The emphasis has been on working together as they turn the rope rhythmically for their classmates and learning to jump at the proper time. Since we began this unit the students have really improved their jumping and timing skills – most can now do at least 10 jumps in a row.

First Grade

We completed our bowling unit in January and spent a few class periods playing floor hockey – always a favorite activity for the students. We also worked on team building skills through the use of the gym scooters as the students worked together to move the scooters with partners and small groups in a variety of ways. First grade students have also been working with the long jump ropes. They began reviewing basic jumps and turning the rope for their classmates. They then progressed to learning how to run through the rope as it is being turned and will be now begin practicing running in, jumping at least ten times, and then running out of the rope while it continues to be turned. The second grade students are working on a self-paced list of jump rope challenges. Beginning with basic jump rope skills, moving on to front door skills and then progressing to backdoors.

Second and Third Grade

After completing the bowling and floor hockey units the second and third grade students have also been working on long jump rope skills. The students are working on a self-paced list of jump rope challenges, beginning with basic jump rope skills, moving on to front door skills and then progressing to backdoors, partner jumping activities, and possibly double-dutch skills. We are also focusing on the health benefits of exercising regularly. The third grade class also continues to monitor their physical activity levels through checking their pulse occasionally during class.

Fourth and Fifth Grade

We were able to take advantage of the snow we received in February to introduce the 4th & 5th students to the sport of cross-country skiing. The students were bused to Smith Park for the experience. Mrs. Heather Higgins instructed the students on how to glide, work the poles, and get themselves up from falls. The students were able to realize the health benefits from this sport as they practiced their skills around the park. 4th & 5th grade students also spent a few classes playing floor hockey and are currently focusing on volleyball skills. The main focus has been on the underhand pass (bump) and the underhand serve; the students were briefly introduced to spiking and setting skills as well. We are now ready to learn the rules & etiquette for the game of volleyball as we begin game play. The students also continue to monitoring their activity level by periodically checking their pulse during class and will also use the pedometers during the 4th quarter.



















