

#### From the Pastor's Study

Dear Friends,

Lent is a time for intensive focus on some of the darker parts of the spiritual journey. The traditional center of this reflection is the suffering of Jesus on the cross. We can find the accounts of the last day or so of Jesus' life in Matthew 26-27, Mark 14-15, Luke 22-23 and John 18-19. It is not light reading. In fact, it is dark reading. That is the point. During this time of year and really throughout life, Christianity calls us to embrace the darkness of suffering. Not because we are masochists, but because we know there is ultimately no way around it. We cannot avoid suffering in life. We can, however, find our way through it. With faith in God, inspired by the story of the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus, we can embrace suffering, knowing that there is always healing on the other side. To try to avoid the suffering or pretend it is not there or that it does not hurt, will only prolong it and perhaps lessen the healing and joy. Lent is a time of reflection on these truths: suffering, faith, healing. New Life. This is our existence.

#### **Book Reviews**

February is African American history month. There are many excellent books that tell the story of African Americans in our country and I have picked just a few to show the variety of texts that are available.

Uptown, written and illustrated by Bryan Collier, is an award winning picture book that shows a view of New York City through the eyes of a young, African American boy. Collages made from cut paper cleverly illustrate the art and music scenes of Harlem. A second text also set in New York is Lookin' for Bird in the Big City by Robert Burleigh and illustrated by Marek Los. Miles Davis, portrayed as a young boy, is searching through the streets of New York for his musician idol, Charlie "Bird" Parker. The words and the appearance of the text evokes the riffs played by Miles and Parker in the world of jazz.

Aunt Flossie's Hats (and Crab Cakes Later) by Elizabeth Fitzgerald Howard and illustrated by James Ransome, gives us an intimate look at the history of Baltimore through the eyes of two young African American girls. Sarah and Susan go to visit their Aunt Flossie on a Sunday afternoon. After tea, they explore Aunt Flossie's trunk full of old hats; each hat has a story. Family picnics, the return of soldiers from World War II, and the big Baltimore fire are all depicted. Ransome's illustrations are realistic oil paintings drawn with a sense of love and deep commitment to the African American people.

A particularly beautiful biography is *When Marian Sang* by Pam Munoz Ryan, illustrated by Brian Selznick. The text and illustrations combine to give a wonderful portrayal of Marian Anderson, the great African American singer from the first part of the twentieth century. Anderson was revered as a singer all across Europe, but could not sing in venues in her own nation's capital. Ryan tells her story from childhood, ending with her triumphal concert on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial. The end notes from the author and illustrator give more information about Anderson and the life she led.

# The Govanstown Cemetery of the Govans Presbyterian Church

Once again we come back to Mr. Archibald Brackenridge, whose marriage to my great aunt Beatrice Fraser and his early death occasioned the need for my grandmother to come to this country and subsequently meet my grandfather. My first cousin just sent me two accounts of Archibald's death (in 1886) which are interesting, not only to me but should be to other members of Govans Presbyterian Church. I don't know from what newspapers they came. The first reads: "Mr. Archibald Breckenridge (sic) died yesterday morning at his residence near Govanstown, Baltimore county, in the thirty-fifth year of his age, of typhoid fever. He was the son of Mr. Wm.D.Breckenridge (sic), the well known nurseryman. Mr. Breckenridge (sic) was engaged for a number of years in the florists' business, and had reached a prominent place among the trade, more especially on account of his collection of orchids, which was probably the largest in the country....He was associated with all public movements in the vicinity of Govanstown, and was among the most active of its citizens. Mr. Breckenridge (sic) was an elder in the Govanstown Presbyterian



Church, and was prominently identified with its Sunday School....He was highly esteemed and respected by all who knew him, and his death is greatly regretted. He leaves a wife and three children." The second: "The remains of Mr. Archibald Brackenridge, who died on Friday last at his residence at Govanstown, were buried vesterday afternoon in the Govanstown Presbyterian Cemetery [in lot 147], attached to the church. At three o'clock in the afternoon about three hundred friends assembled. and a long funeral procession was formed in front of the house. First came thirty members of the Mount Moriah Lodge of Masons, of Towson, of which Mr. Brackenridge was a member....After the Masons came the cloth-covered casket, trimmed with silver, borne by the pall-bearers. Next came about 50 little Sunday school children of the Presbyterian Sunday school, of which Mr. Brackenridge was superintendent. About three hundred friends and relatives followed. The procession moved up York Road to the church, about five hundred yards distant, and entered, the pall-bearers laying their burden in front of the pulpit. The services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. Henry G. Martin, after which the remains were borne to the cemetery attached to the church, where they were buried....The active pall-bearers were John T. Ensor, Herman Everding [see TALES III], Wm.McRoberts [see TALES VI. He was working in the nursery at the time and went on to become the young widow's second husbandl. Chester Turnbull. T. Ballmer, and Wm. S. Norris [buried in lot 122]. Among those present [here are listed 22 men]...and others." It is interesting to a p.c. 2007 person that there is absolutely no mention of any ladies present, not even the grieving widow, unless you count her among the "friends and relatives." My cousin wrote that Archibald's "marriage to Beatrice Fraser was a real love match and the family was devastated by his death." Requiescat in pacem.

#### Robin Chandlee, Member of Govans

In an effort to get to know more about fellow members that we see and share an occasional smile, "hello" or ex-

change of "peace be with you" with on Sunday, we will be asking members a series of questions. The responses will be presented in the Bellringer, hopefully monthly, during the coming year. Robin Chandlee graciously agreed to be the first person interviewed and here are her responses:

I was born and raised in Baltimore and have lived here all my life, with the exception of four years in Providence, Rhode Island where I attended Brown University.

I am married to Chris Helmers, and Jake (15) and Catharine (12) Helmers are our children. I have one older sister, Linda, who lives in Washington, DC. My mother, Frances Chandlee is a resident of Roland Park Place and attended Bible study and church at Govans for several years until health issues made it too difficult.

The most unusual place I ever visited was India. I was fortunate enough to take a month-long singing tour of India with the Brown University Chorus. We went all over the country and into Nepal, and met and sang for Indira Gandhi and Mother Theresa as part of our travels.

Right now, my greatest pleasures center around my children's

sports and musical activities, walks with Chris, and visiting with my mom. When I do have time to myself I enjoy working out at a gym, reading, and walking and hiking. I also love to sing.

Our family has two dogs we adopted through the Mid-Atlantic German Shepherd Rescue. Daisy is a pure shepherd, and Holly is a mutt - - part Basenji, part shepherd, part pit bull. We also have a rabbit named Nibbles.

I have wide tastes in food - two of my favorite restaurants are the Persian restaurant Orchard Market Cafe and the Ambassador (Indian cuisine), but I also love a good steak.

I work from my home writing grant proposals for a variety of nonprofit organizations in Baltimore. One of my clients has been GEDCO. As a matter of fact, GEDCO is a major reason I came to Govans Presbyterian. The then-Executive Director, Julia Pierson, who is Jewish and a long-time friend of mine, said that if she were Christian she would go to Govans. So I visited one Sunday, received a delivery of bread from Carol Hamilton, and was hooked.

I love my work and hope to keep doing it for a long time. I would also like to travel more often in the future. I really can't think of anything about me that would surprise people. Pretty much what you see is what you get.

Other than my marriage and the birth of my children, the most memorable event in my life was singing at Mother Theresa's Home for the Destitute and Dying in Calcutta. Our audience was rows of frail women lying on mats on the floor. For those who know choral music, we closed with Randall Thompson's "Alleluia," a piece which can still move me to tears. When we were finished and were filing out, we held our hands up to our foreheads in the Indian greeting "Namaste" to each woman we passed. Though it's a common greeting, "Namaste" also means "I bow to the divinity within you." Two of the women clasped our hands in theirs as we went by and held them to their own foreheads. It was an unforgettable blessing.

Regarding what person I would most like to be like, I would borrow bits and pieces from lots of people - - my husband's generosity, my father's graciousness, my mother's courage, my mother-in-law's cheerfulness and my aunts' unshakeable faith.

Among my plans, brainstorms, fantasies and fugues regarding the Lenten season, is another musical service, possibly on Palm Sunday, in which we would explore diverse musical depictions of "Hosannah!" We shall need extra singers for this production, and I would welcome the opportunity to make glorious music with and for you. ### One Straw Farm Returns to Govans

Our first year of involvement with One Straw Farm, a local, organic farm invested in community supported agriculture was a big success. We had more than 70 people involved in purchasing 45 shares in the farm. The wonderful thing about this initiative is that not only do the shareholders enjoy 8 items of fresh, organic produce every week for 24 weeks, but the farm donates one share of produce for every 10 purchased shares. What this means is that our commitment to supporting this particular local farm allows us the chance to help others with no access to fresh, organic produce. For 24 weeks last year, Govans donated all of the extras [more than 40 items of produce each week] to CARES. Not only did we support CARES with our non-perishable goods, but we supplemented these donations with lots and lots of fresh produce for which CARES clients were most appreciative.

Plans are in the works to continue to be a drop site for the 2008 season. We hope to increase our shareholder base in this farm, so please pass the word! You do not have to be a church member to participate. While the farm requires full shares to be purchased, it is easy to privately split a share with a friend.
