

THE ONAS COMMUNITY

Creating a friendly community starts in the sleeping tents and pavilions where 8-9 campers, placed by birth date*, live with their counselors under the stars. Boys and girls live on separate "sides"; each with a modern shower house. Together they participate in all aspects of camp life. The whole camp community sits down for family style meals in the Dining Hall. Our entire camp program stresses sharing, cooperation, understanding, simple living and most essential of all – fun.

*Please note our bunking policy: Sleeping assignments are made according to the camper's date of birth. Requests for "bunking together" or not bunking with a particular camper cannot be honored. Activities are not scheduled by sleeping units; your child will choose activities on a daily basis and will have free time to be with old and new friends. This policy has proven to be the best way for our campers and staff to build a community built on equality and appreciation for each individual.


STAFF

The Camp Director Sue Neiger Gould (B.S. Ed. and M.S. Nonprofit Management) has directed Camp Onas for 15 years. An experienced Senior Staff consisting of an Assistant Director, Program Director and Heads of the Boys and Girls Sides assist her.

The staff of counselors is composed of young people, most of whom are former Onas campers, chosen for their maturity, interest in children, skills and ability to create a great camp experience for campers.



All counselors are trained to maximize fun and learning, and to safely minimize problems. Counselors are trained in first aid and CPR, behavior management, conflict resolution and team building. Specialized trainings include: archery, canoeing, lifeguarding, high ropes, and rock climbing.

The Barn - Campers can play basketball, volleyball, swing on the swing or rings and climb the climbing wall. The bottom section of the barn contains the Arts and Crafts and Woodworking areas.

Deliview - Located in the middle of camp, it contains the camp office, health center, a large multipurpose room, and a big front porch for hanging out with friends.
