TEXAS SUCCESS INITATIVE (TSI)

What Is the TSI Assessment?

The TSI Assessment is a program designed to help your institution determine if you are ready for college-level course work in the general areas of reading, writing and mathematics. This program also will help determine what type of course or intervention will best meet your needs to help you become better prepared for college-level course work if you are not ready. If you are an incoming college student in Texas, you are required to take the TSI Assessment — unless you are already exempt (read below) — to determine your readiness for college-level work. Based on how you perform, you may either be enrolled in a college-level course that matches your skill level or be placed in the appropriate developmental course or intervention to improve your skills and prepare you for success in college-level courses.

Do I Have to Take the TSI Assessment?

Not all incoming students need to take the TSI Assessment. There are many ways you can be exempt. Qualifying for a TSI Assessment exemption means that you can enroll in any entry-level college course without restrictions. In other words, there are no prerequisites for enrollment in college-level courses. You may be exempt if you:

- Have met the minimum college readiness standard on SAT, ACT or a statewide high school test:
- Have successfully completed college-level English and math courses;
- Have enrolled in a Level-One certificate program (fewer than 43 semester credit hours);
- Are not seeking a degree; or
- Have been, or currently are, in the military.

Essay A:


Describe a setting in which you have collaborated or interacted with people whose experiences and/or beliefs differ from yours. Address your initial feelings, and how those feelings were or were not changed by this experience.

Essay B:

Describe a circumstance, obstacle or conflict in your life, and the skills and resources you used to resolve it. Did it change you? If so, how?

Essay C:

Considering your lifetime goals, discuss how your current and future academic and extra-curricular activities might help you achieve your goals.





Applying Out-Of-State? Try the Common Application for your private, lvy League, and out-of-state universities.



ESSAYS

Some students have a background or story that is so central to their identity that they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like you, then please share your story.

Recount an incident or time when you experienced failure. How did it affect you, and what lessons did you learn?

Reflect on a time when you challenged a belief or idea. What prompted you to act? Would you make the same decision again?

Describe a place or environment where you are perfectly content. What do you do or experience there and why is it meaningful to you?

Discuss an accomplishment or event formal or informal that marked your transition from childhood to adulthood within your culture, community, or family

When do I begin to send my transcript to colleges?

You will send transcripts to college(s) right after you receive Your6th semester rank from our Registrar's Office which is usually at the beginning of September. Colleges & universities want to see your freshmen, sophomore and junior grades.

REQUESTING A TRANSCRIPT?

Visit the Registrar's Office (front office), pay \$1 (each), pick up your transcript two days after request was submitted.

FINAL TRANSCRIPT???

What is a "Final Transcript" and when do I send it?

A "Final Transcript" shows all your grades including your senior year grades. *In May, you will request this transcript be sent to the college you will be attending.* Our Registrar's Office will begin to mail them to colleges in June. You must graduate from high school before they can send them out.



Remember, you can file your FAFSA beginning January 1st of your senior year. Just ask your parents to file their taxes as soon as possible.

Priority deadline: March 15th!

(check your college/university deadline!)

FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)


What Is It and Why Do I Need It?

Begin as early as January 1st, just do it before March 1st!

What is FAFSA?

FAFSA is your Free Application for Federal Student Aid. Federal Student Aid, an office of the U.S. Department of Education, Ensures that all eligible individuals can benefit from federally funded financial assistance for education beyond high school. Basically,

you are applying for money from the government to go to college based on your family's income.



FAFSA calculates an Expected Family Contribution (EFC) number for every family and student. It is a number, used by your college, to calculate the amount of federal student aid you are eligible to receive. The lower the number, the less you are expected to be able to pay.

Get help paying for colle

Colleges and Universities use this number to decide how much financial aid (grants, work-study, federal loans, scholarships) to award you. Each college/university will have different amounts of financial aid they can give to students. Your FAFSA could mean the difference between going to college and not going to college.

What do I need before completing my FAFSA?

Before you file your FAFSA, you will need to apply for a PIN. This is a four-digit number you use as an electronic signature. **Both parents and students need a PIN** to sign their FAFSA after completing it online. Students are required to have a Social Security Number to file for a PIN and to apply for FAFSA, parents do NOT need to be citizens.

You will also need your parents' most recent income taxes. Parents should take care to file their taxes as early as possible so that you can submit a completed FAFSA as early as possible. Funds are on a first come first serve.

If you are unable to supply your parents' information, you may qualify to file as "independent"; double check with your counselor to see if you qualify. You must contact the financial office at your college and provide them with documentation to verify your situation.

How do I file my FAFSA?

Go to <u>www.fafsa.ed.gov</u> Begin your online application; submit your parents' and your information; Select the schools you want your FAFSA sent to (if they don't get your FAFSA, they can't give you financial aid); Have FAFSA get your tax information directly from the IRS; sign your FAFSA with your PIN. Wait for your Student Aid Report (SAR) which gives you your EFC number.

ALL SENIORS SHOULD COMPLETE THEIR FAFSA/TASFA APPLICATION REGARDLESS OF INCOME.

The TASFA: For Students Who Are NOT U.S. Citizens

<u>Undocumented students</u> (aka students who are NOT U.S. citizens) in Texas may still have an opportunity to receive financial aid. If you have lived in Texas for the three previous years leading up to college and graduated from a Texas high school, chances are you are eligible for Texas state financial aid. You will file what is called the TASFA, or the Texas Application for State Financial Aid.

The TASFA is completed on paper and mailed to institutions. Check with financial aid advisors at each college/university as they may require both the TASFA and the paper FAFSA.

Note, undocumented families may still file taxes without a Social Security Number. You are eligible for an Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) used to file your taxes. Your report on the TASFA will be most accurate if you and your family file your income taxes. If you are paid "under the table," you may have to submit a notarized account of your income to financial aid offices.

Tips

- Remember you are filing your most recent taxes for the upcoming school year. For financial aid for the 2015- 2016, use your taxes from the year 2014.
- IF, your parents won't be filing until after March 1st, use your parents completed income taxes from a year ago. However, remember to make corrections after they have completed their most current income taxes.
- Always say "Yes" to being considered for work-study. This is an on-campus job funded by the government to help you pay for your college costs.
- If you input your own tax information, instead of allowing FAFSA to gather that information from the IRS, you may receive "verification forms," which are used to verify the income information you supplied on your FAFSA. Turn these in as soon as possible, as your account will be put on hold until they are submitted.
- You will need to file your FAFSA <u>every year</u> to see if you are eligible for financial aid to help you pay for college. Keep track of your PIN!
