

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

What is it? What should I do when I see it?

The issue of domestic violence has been on the news frequently in recent months, as we hear stories of random shootings on our streets, in our schools, and in homes: in addition to the recent tragic headline news of athletes and their families involved in domestic violence issues.

Fr. Chuck Dahm, O.P. will be speaking at all of the Masses next weekend (November 8 and 9) on the issue of domestic violence. According to national statistics, approximately 25% of American households witness some form of domestic violence. What is the appropriate way of dealing with these issues?

In last Sunday's gospel, the scribe attempts to trip up Jesus by asking the question, "Which commandment of the law is the greatest?" Jesus responds by saying love of God and love of neighbor. In the first reading God says that he hears the cries of the poor and oppressed. This means all those exploited by others. God expects us all to respond to acts of violence - on all levels.

ADULT ENRICHMENT: REMEMBRANCE, RESURRECTION

From The ARCHDIOCESE OF CHICAGO - THE ORDER OF CHRISTIAN FUNERALS

The Order of Christian Funerals describes the Church's ministry to the deceased and their family in these words:

At the death of a Christian, whose life of faith was begun in the waters of baptism and strengthened at the Eucharistic table, the Church intercedes on behalf of the deceased because of its confident belief that death is not the end nor does it break the bonds forged in life. The Church also ministers to the sorrowing and consoles them in the funeral rites with the comforting word of God and the sacrament of the Eucharist. (Order of Christian Funerals, #4)

Christians celebrate the funeral rites to offer worship, praise, and thanksgiving to God for the gift of a life which has now been returned to God, the author of life and the hope of the just. The Mass, the memorial of Christ's death and resurrection, is the principal celebration of the Christian funeral.

The celebration of the Christian funeral brings hope and consolation to the living. While proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ and witnessing to Christian hope in the resurrection, the funeral rites also recall to all who take part in them God's mercy and judgment and meet the human need to turn always to God in times of crisis. (Order of Christian Funerals, #4, 5, & 7; Catechism of the Catholic Church, #1680-1684)

Ordinarily, Catholics bring the remains of the dead to the church. This is where their Christian journey began. In the waters of Baptism they were joined to Christ who stands victorious over death. This is where they were formed by the Word of God and fed at the Lord's table. The parish church is a symbol of the ecclesial community to which they belong.

The funeral liturgy is not merely a celebration of the bereaved family. It is a celebration of the whole church joined in prayer over the death of one of its members. This is especially important to remember in those times when the members of the bereaved family have not been active members of the Church.

Praying for the dead is an expression of communion with them, our love for them, and our desire for their final glory. Comforting those who mourn is a truly Christian response to the unique suffering of those affected by death.

We will, with Jesus prompting us, say those great words he spoke from the cross, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit."

FOCUS ON BETTER SLEEP When Turning Clocks back By Nate Llewellyn

Time will fall back to standard time again on Sunday, November 2, 2014, when daylight saving time ends. For many, this may be an opportunity to catch up on an extra hour of sleep.

Some credit Benjamin Franklin for coming up with the idea of daylight saving time in 1784. Franklin, whose famous saying, "Early to bed, early to rise," may have been attempting to educate people on the importance of sleep.

Today, many people dealing with work and family responsibilities may make sleep a luxury and not a priority. And that, according to sleep experts, might have significant negative effects on health and wellness.

Dr. Robert M. Aronson, medical director of the Sleep Program at Advocate South Suburban Hospital in Hazel Crest, Ill., says that sleep deprivation has many harmful effects on our mental and physical health. He says that lack of sleep decreases our ability to perform daily tasks, impacts our mood, reaction time and attention levels. Sleep deprivation can also lead to decreased productivity and injuries in the workplace.

"People tend to ignore the need for sleep in order to get other things done, but sleep is as important as any healthy lifestyle choice," Dr. Aronson says. "It's important to acknowledge the roles that sleep plays in our daily lives, and recognize that how we feel, behave, think and perform is all related to the amount of sleep we get."

The American Academy of Sleep Medicine (AASM) offers these guidelines for better sleep:

- Avoid "sleeping in" on the weekends, which makes it harder to wake up on Monday.
- Avoid caffeine, alcohol, nicotine, meals and exercising four to six hours before bedtime.
- Eat a small snack before bedtime to avoid going to sleep hungry.
- Signal to your body that it's bedtime by avoiding bright lights at night.
- Follow a consistent bedtime routine.
- Make your bedroom quiet, dark and cool.

Dr. Aronson recommends that children in preschool sleep between 11 to 13 hours a night, school-age children between 10 to 11 hours per night, and teens at least nine hours per night. For most adults, seven to eight hours a night is recommended to achieve good health and optimum performance.

The AASM encourages people to discuss sleep-related problems with a primary care doctor or a sleep specialist.

ALL SAINTS DAY A Parishioner Reflects

All Saints Day: a Holy Day of Obligation. Many think of our saints in this way. When I was younger we prayed for the intercession of a particular saint for many different things. I remember my mother saying prayers to St. Anthony when something was lost ("Tony, Tony, look around, something's lost and can't be found"), and suddenly it was in the spot you knew you had already checked three times. We prayed to St. Christopher for safe travels or to St. Joseph to sell a house. There was a saint for almost every need, and these prayers were always followed by a decade of the rosary when something was found, was sold, or we arrived at our destination safely.

As I got older the Saints took on a more powerful role. As my first child arrived I took out the book of Saints that sat getting dusty on a shelf and began to read about the many saints. They began to take a significant role in the name I was choosing for my unborn child. and as I named each of my three boys after a particular saint I wanted them to know why we had chosen that saint to name them after. With this in mind, we began celebrating their Feast Days. On that particular day they chose their own meal, were not required to do chores, etc. We would remind them of why we chose their saint to name them after, and when they were little we would go back to that "Book of Saints" and re-read the powerful message and about the sacrifices that their namesake had endured to remain a Christian. My children are grown now and we still celebrate their feast days on a smaller scale, but they often remind me of what a wonderful tradition we have

Take time during this week to look up your child's namesake and remind them why you thought that saint was special enough to give them that name. You may start a wonderful tradition of your own.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 2, 2014

FEAST OF THE COMMEMORATION OF ALL THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED (ALL SOULS' DAY)
We pray for those who have died

They leave us, but they never really leave us. We remember "those who have gone before us" whenever we touch places, objects, or occasions that reverberate with their life. In the 11th century, Abbot Odilo of Cluny established November 2 as the day his monks would pray for the dead, in part because his century saw so many dying in famines. The whole church quickly adopted All Souls' Day. Prayer for the dead affirms our faith in the Resurrection, and in God's desire to heal us even on the far side of history.

TODAY'S READINGS: Wisdom 3:1-9; Romans 5:5-11 or Romans 6:3-9; John 6:37-40 (668). "But the souls of the righteous are in the hand of God, and no torment will ever touch them."



FEAST OF MARTIN DE PORRES, RELIGIOUS Servant and saint

Martin de Porres was an interracial child in a time and place—colonial-era Peru—when mixed-race background meant second-class status. Barred from becoming a full member of a religious order, the only route open to Martin was to ask the Dominicans to accept him as a donado, basically a servant. Fortunately the Spirit is not bound by human limitation or prejudice. Martin's holy life and solidarity with the marginal and the outcast make him a hero and role model to all who seek social and racial justice. Martin is a saint for our own divided society; honor him by honoring people of all backgrounds.

TODAY'S READINGS: Philippians 2:1-4; Luke 14:12-14 (485). "Rather, when you hold a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind."

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 4 FEAST OF CHARLES BORROMEO, BISHOP Simple signs

Medieval monks often shaved the top of their heads and left a ring of hair around the edge their scalps—a practice called tonsure—as a sign of their humility. To keep the bald part of their heads warm, they wore skullcaps, called zucehettos—which are still worn by clergy today. Saint Charles Borromeo, the cardinal archbishop of Milan from 1564 to 1584, was tonsured at the age of 12. He grew up to become a major figure of the counter-Reformation and pushed for austerity in appearance and practice. How can you cut back on excesses in your own life?

TODAY'S READINGS: Philippians 2:5-11; Luke 14:15-24 (486). "... he humbled himself, becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross."

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 5

Don't be a "morning-after" disciple

This morning after Election Day, the victors are celebrating with followers, some of them newfound, who just want to be with a winner. Jesus, on the other hand, was suspicious of popularity and of those who latched onto him for shallow reasons. He alerted folks that if they wanted to walk with him they needed to share



his mission and, ultimately, his cross. There's no room for those who "glory in the name" only but do not show mercy and compassion. No room for a wishy-washy disciple. It's gut check time.

TODAY'S READINGS: Philippians 2:12-18; Luke 14:25-33 (487). "Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple."

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 6

Your mission awaits

Through the sacrament of Baptism, we're called and empowered by God to continue the mission of Jesus. Each of us has received unique gifts of the Spirit for this mission. After all, such an expansive mission requires diverse gifts—different skills, personalities, perspectives, abilities! But there can also be challenges. It can be tempting to compare the gifts of one person or group with those of another. Do they measure up? Do we measure up? Are some people holier? The good news of Baptism is that we're all called to holiness.

We all measure up! We're all needed to bring about love, peace, and justice. How will you embrace your baptismal call today?

Darkest before the dawn of a new age

In the gathering darkness of the year, the church directs us toward the "end" times, not in the sense of the destruction of the world, but the "end" in the sense of the purpose of our existence and our call to follow Christ. Jesuit Pierre Teilhard de Chardin spoke of a cosmic Christ drawing all things toward what he called the Omega Point—the "end" point, the universe evolving and inexorably toward Christ becoming all in all. Why not think cosmically? What is the purpose of it all, what Saint Paul simply calls "the things that really matter"? What really matters for you? How do you show it?

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 8

Take stock of money

The word mammon is derived from Latin, Greek, and Aramaic words that mean "wealth" or "riches"—although its Hebrew origin may have also meant "that in which one trusts." But trusting in mammon is a slippery slope indeed—personified as it is in the New Testament as a false god. Works from Edmund Spenser's The Faerie Queen, in which Mammon oversees a cave of worldly wealth, to Thomas Carlyle's Past and Present, in which he coins the phrase "Gospel of Mammonism" to describe 19th-century materialism, warn against greed. Be careful about trusting wealth.

Today's readings: Philippians 4:10-19; Luke 16:9-15 (490). "My God will fully supply whatever you need in accord with his glorious riches in Christ Jesus."
