REPORT OF THE PUBLIC AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

The current status of NSF budget for the Directorate for Biological, Behavioral and Social Sciences for FY 82 is still unsettled. The House-Senate Conference on the FY 82 appropriation bill for NSF indicated a total of \$172 million for BBS plus \$20 million for NSF to divide among all research directorates. Just how NSF will be affected by the 12% additional reduction proposed by the President on 24 Sept. 1981 is unclear. We can anticipate difficult times ahead for the BBS directorate, which incorporates programs of most interest to animal behavior researchers. (12/8/81)

HOUSING AND REGISTRATION INFORMATION 1982 ABS MEETING, THE UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA, DULUTH August 15-20, 1982

LOCATION: The host institution is The University of Minnesota, Duluth.

PRE-REGISTRATION: You are urged to pre-register by completing the form in this Newsletter. Fees are \$32.00 for regular members, \$18.00 for student members, and \$40.00 for non-members. These fees include use of student health services and campus recreational facilities including basketball, tennis, and track, gym, etc.: indoor pool available at nominal fee.

TRANSPORTATION: Bus transportation will be provided from the Duluth Airport to the UMD campus for all incoming flights on Sunday, August 15 and the first two flights on Monday, August 16. The cost will be \$1.00. Please gather at the ABS sign in the baggage area at the airport. For those arriving at other times, taxi service is available; current one-way fare is \$8.00 to UMD. The cost can be divided among the passengers. The cabs will take up to 4 persons at a time hence the cost could be as low as \$2 per person. Major rental car agencies are located at the airport. If you wish to rent an auto, please make your reservations in advance. There are numerous places of interest to visit in the area so a car might be useful if you are in the sight-seeing mood.

All incoming flights to Duluth are routed through Minneapolis. Republic Airlines is the only carrier serving Duluth. There are only 4 incoming flights a day into Duluth so make your reservations early.

At present there is AmTrak service into Duluth from St. Paul. There is only one train a day. However, due to financial instability, it is not certain if the train service will be operating in August. If you are a train enthusiast, the run from St. Paul to Duluth is spectacularly beautiful. It might be worth considering if the service is still existent.

Greyhound bus service is also available.

REGISTRATION: The registration desk will be located in the lobby of Lake Superior Hall from noon until 10:00 P.M. on Sunday, August 15; from 9:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M. on Monday, August 16; and from 9:00 A.M. until 2:00 P.M. on Tuesday and Wednesday. Indicate on the registration form if you will arrive after registration closes and provision will be made for access to the dormitory.

PARKING: Free parking will be available adjacent to the campus accommodations.

HOUSING: Three types of housing are available. There are single and double rooms in Lake Superior Hall as well as 50 apartments. These apartments will house up to 4 people. They include a kitchen. If you want to use the kitchen, you must supply your own utensils. In all three settings, linen and towels and drinking utensils are provided. There are no phones in the rooms. No pets are allowed. Daily rates: single \$12.00; double - \$7.50; and apartments - \$40.00. There is also a 10% state tax on room and meals. We have set apart 50 apartments. They will be assigned as registrations are returned. If you want one, please send your registration back promptly.

OFF-CAMPUS HOUSING: A list of Duluth motels and campgrounds will be sent with registration confirmation. Reservations at off-campus locations are the responsibility of the participant. Campgrounds are available nearby.

<u>MEALS</u>: A meal plan is being provided. The food service at UMD is excellent (I ought to know as my father is a food service director). Meals will include breakfast, lunch and dinner on August 16-19, (excluding the evening of August 15) and breakfast and lunch on August 20. The cost is \$55. Meals will also be available on an ala carte basis.

It should be noted that most of Duluth's restaurants are concentrated downtown. That is about 3 miles from campus. There is one restaurant within a 10 minute walk from campus.

BARBECUE: To be held on Sunday evening, August 15. The location will be announced at registration check-in. The cost of the chicken barbecue will be \$8.00/person. The cost includes beer. Please indicate on the registration form the number of tickets you desire. Availability of tickets for the barbecue can only be guaranteed if paid in advance. The barbecue will be held at 6:30 P.M.

After the barbecue, there will be a slide show and speakers covering Duluth's heritage in Bohannon 90 at 8:30 P.M. This information should aid you in enjoying your stay in the Arrowhead Region of Lake Superior.

BANQUET: A banquet will be held on Wednesday evening, August 18. The banquet will be a Scandanavian Smorgasbord featuring local specialties such as a variety of fish from Lake Superior and wild rice. Prior to the banquet there will be a cocktail hour. The cocktail hour is open to all and cost is included in your registration. Following the banquet, there will be a Polka Dance. Tickets for both the banquet and the dance will be sold separately. The cost of the dance also includes beverages.

<u>HARBOR CRUISE</u>: On Thursday, August 19 a harbor cruise is available. The cruise time will be announced. The cruise will be on the Vista cruise ship and on board will be a dance band and a cash bar. Transportation to and from the harbor will be provided. Unfortunately, only 200 people can be accommodated so if you would like to go, please indicate so on the registration form.

<u>SESSIONS</u>: All sessions will be held on campus. All the campus buildings are interconnected and maps will be provided upon registration.

- 1) Friday, August 20, 1982 Trip to Isle Royale from Grand Portage. Transportation cost varies from \$20-\$30 per person to and from Isle Royale. Twenty or forty mile hikes through the area. Overnight stay own camping equipment and food necessary.
- 2) Friday, August 20, 1982. Trip to Boundary Waters Canoe Area Sawbill Trail area. Outfitting with canoes and all other necessary equipment and food \$22.50 per person per day. The length of your trip is open to meet your desires.

IMPORTANT NOTES: Weather: Duluth is referred to as the air-conditioned city of the north. The weather in August is usually pleasantly warm - 70's and the nights cool - 50's. So please bring warm clothes for the evenings.

<u>CLEAN INDOOR AIR ACT</u>: Minnesota has a strictly enforced clean air act. This means that smoking is absolutely forbidden except in clearly designated places. You may smoke in your rooms. Unless you see a sign saying, "Smoking Permitted", you may not smoke. If you do smoke, be sure to request the smoking section in local restaurants.

<u>DAY CARE</u>: We will be happy to provide licensed day care for your children. However, we need to know in advance how many of you plan to use the service. We will provide day care only for those who request it on the registration form.
