Four ACC Games Feature Nationally Ranked Teams

8th-Ranked Clemson Hosts Boston College, 13th-ranked Georgia Tech Hosts Maryland; Miami Travels to No. 21 Virginia Tech and No. 23 Florida State heads to Wake Forest

Four ACC teams are ranked among the nation's Top 23 this week with Atlantic Division co-leader Clemson leading the way with a No. 8 ranking, the highest for the Tigers since Oct. 22, 2000, when they were ranked 5th nationally...Clemson, coached by **Dabo Swinney**, will host Atlantic Division rival Boston College (3 p.m., RSN)...Clemson features a potent offense led by **QB Tajh Boyd** and a stingy defense led by **DE Andre Branch**...The Tigers became the first ACC team in history to defeat three consecutive ranked opponents when they downed then 11th-ranked Virginia Tech, 23-3, last Saturday in Blacksburg...The Eagles of Coach **Frank Spaziani** are looking for their first ACC win of the year...The Eagles are led by **LB Luke Kuechly**, who leads the nation in tackles, and sophomore **QB Chase Rettig**...A second important Atlantic Division battle will take place in Winston-Salem, N.C. where Wake Forest, coached by **Jim Grobe** and tied for the lead in the Atlantic with a 2-0 ACC mark, hosts 23rd-ranked Florida State (12:30, ACC Network) this Saturday at BB&T Field...The Deacons are led by the potent passing combination of **QB Tanner Price** and **WR Chris Givens**...The Seminoles, coached by Jimbo Fisher, counter with a defense ranked 6th nation-

ally in total defense, and an offense led by either junior **QB EJ Manuel** who missed a game with a shoulder injury suffered against Oklahoma, or his backup, freshman **QB Clint Trickett**, who ranks 3rd nationally in pass efficiency...In Atlanta, 13th ranked and unbeaten Georgia Tech, the Coastal Division leader, returns home to host Maryland at Bobby Dodd Stadium (Noon, ESPNU)...Coach **Paul Johnson's** Yellow Jackets have scored 258 points (51.6/gm) in posting a 5-0 record, the most of any ACC team in its first five games, save Florida State's 1995 team which scored 279... The Jackets are led by **WR Stephen Hill**, who leads the nation in yards per catch (33.47) and **AB Orwin Smith**, who leads in yards per carry (15.11) among the nation's top 100 runners...Maryland is coached by **Randy Edsall**, who served as the defensive coordinator on Tech's 1998 ACC co-championship team...Sophomore **QB Danny O'Brien** leads the Terrapins (1-0 in the ACC) who are a half-game behind Clemson and Wake Forest in the Atlantic Division... In Blacksburg, 21st-ranked Virginia Tech and its head coach, **Frank Beamer**, welcome back an old rival when the Hokies host Miami, coached by **Al Golden**, at Lane Stadium

(3:30 pm) in a game with important Coastal Division implications... The game will be televised regionally by ABC and to other parts of the nation by ESPN... The game features the two leading rushers in the ACC in Tech's **David Wilson** (127.8), who ranks 7th nationally, and UM's **Lamar Miller** (127.75), who ranks 2nd in the ACC and 8th in the nation ...Two ACC teams conclude the non-conference portions of their schedules this weekend... North Carolina, coached by **Everett Withers**, hosts Louisville of the Big East Conference at Kenan Stadium in Chapel Hill, N.C. (Noon, ESPN2)...The Tar Heels are led by **QB Bryn Renner**, who ranks 5th nationally in pass efficiency...The Cardinals are coached by **Charlie Strong** and are ranked 13th nationally in rushing defense and lead the nation in tackles for loss...In Raleigh, NC State, coached by **Tom O'Brien**, hosts Central Michigan of the Mid-American Conference at Carter-Finley Stadium (3:30 pm, ESPN3)...The Wolfpack is led by **QB Mike Glennon**, who has completed 66 percent of his passes for 12 TDs, and **WR T. J. Graham**, who ranks 2nd nationally in all-purpose yardage (214.8/gm)...The Chippewas are coached by **Dan Enos**.

2011 ACC Football By The Numbers

1 - Georgia Tech is ranked No. 1 nationally in passing efficiency (260.48) and in rushing offense (378.20) and is now 2nd nationally in total (587.00) and scoring (51.6) offense.

2 - NC State senior **WR T.J. Graham** moved into second place on the ACC's career kickoff return yardage list last Saturday against Georgia Tech. Graham, who also ranks 2nd nationally this week in all-purpose yardage (214.8), currently has 2,712 kickoff return yards and needs 272 in State's final seven games to break the current ACC record set by former Maryland standout Torrey Smith last year.

2.25 - Wake Forest **PK Jimmy Newman** has made nine of his 10 field goal attempts this season, a 90 percent conversion ratio, and currently ranks 3rd nationally in field goals per game, averaging 2.25 a contest.

3 - Clemson became the first team in ACC history and to defeat three consecutive nationally-ranked teams when they downed 11th-ranked Virginia Tech, 23-3, last Saturday. Previously, the Tigers had upset 19th-ranked Auburn and 11th-ranked Florida State on consecutive weekends. The Tigers are also one of three current teams in the NCAA's FBS who have wins over three ranked teams this year, the others, though they were not accomplished consecutively, were LSU and Alabama.

4 - Miami **RB Lamar Miller** has opened the 2011 campaign by rushing for over 100 yards in each of his first four games. Miller had 102 yards rushing on just 14 carries last Saturday against Bethune-Cookman and currently ranks 8th nationally in rushing yards per game (127.7).

5 - Florida State true freshman **WR Rashad Greene** has caught five touchdown passes in the first four games of his collegiate career, all longer than 28 yards. FSU redshirt freshman **QB Clint Trickett** has been on the throwing end of all five touchdown plays, including a 56-yard TD strike against No 1-ranked Oklahoma.

6 - The national ranking of Florida State's defensive unit this week. The Seminoles have allowed just 257 total yards a game this year and are ranked 6th nationally.

7 - Wake Forest junior **WR Chris Givens** recorded his fourth 100-yard receiving day in five games this year when he carried 7 catches for 132 yards and a TD against Boston College. Givens ranks 7th nationally in receiving yards per game, averaging 124.5 a contest.

12 - The number of career pass interceptions by Virginia Tech All-America **CB Jayron Hosley**. Hosley, who led the nation in interceptions per game last year, leads all active ACC players in pickoffs and is tied for first among all active FBS players in career interceptions per game.

13 - The number of tackles for Virginia **LB Steve Greer** in the Cavaliers 21-20 overtime win over Idaho. Greer, who also ranks 13th in the ACC in

tackling this week, had a half tackle for loss and two pass breakups.

14 - Florida State junior **PK Dustin Hopkins** has successfully converted his last 14 field goal attempts, including all seven this season. Hopkins has also recorded 14 touchbacks on kickoffs this year, including five against 22nd-ranked Clemson last Saturday.

15.11 - Georgia Tech junior **AB Orwin Smith** leads the nation among the Top 100 rushers in the FBS in yards per carry. The Phenix City, Ala., native has averaged 15.1 yards on each of his 28 carries from scrimmage this year.

22 - When Boston College **TB Montel Harris** ran for 108 yards on 22 carries against Wake Forest last Saturday, it marked the 22nd 100-yard rushing day of his career. Harris has more 100-yard rushing days than anyone in ACC history save former NC State great Ted Brown (27) and former North Carolina standout Amos Lawrence (23).

23.75 - The combined number of total tackles that Maryland **S Matt Robinson** and **LB Demetrius Hartsfield** are averaging this season. Both players rank among the nation's Top 10 tacklers with Robinson (12.0) tied for 5th nationally and Hartsfield (11.75) in 9th place.

27 - The number of consecutive games in which Boston College All-America **LB Luke Kuechly** has recorded 10 or more tackles. Kuechly made 14 hits last Saturday against Wake Forest to extend a streak that began in the 5th game of his freshman season. It is the longest current streak in the NCAA's FBS this year.

37 - The number of career tackles for loss for Miami **OLB Sean Spence**. Spence is the ACC's active career leader and ranks 3rd nationally among all active players in the NCAA's FBS trailing only Cordarro Law of Southern Miss (40.5) and Mychal Sisson of Colorado State (40).

47 - After just five weeks of the season, the number of touchdowns scored by freshmen--either redshirt or true--in the ACC. North Carolina redshirt freshman **RB Giovani Bernard** leads the way with 7 scores followed by UVA redshirt freshman **RB Kevin Parks**, and Clemson true freshman **WR Sammy Watkins** with six TDs each. Florida State true freshman **WR Rashad Greene** has five scores to his credit and Georgia Tech redshirt freshman **QB Synjyn Days** has four.

56 - Miami senior **QB Jacory Harris** currently has thrown 56 career TD passes, far and away the most of any active ACC signal caller. Harris is currently tied with former ACC standouts Matt Schaub of Virginia (2000-03) and Matt Ryan of Boston College (2005-07) for 13th place on the ACC's career list.

104.3 - In his last 13 games, including the final eight contests of 2010, North Carolina senior **WR Dwight Jones** has averaged 104.3 receiving yards per game. Jones, who had back-to-back 100-yard receiving games against JMU and Rutgers earlier this year, has topped the 100-yard mark six times over his last 13 games and has 83 receptions for 1,356 yards and 10 TDs.

109.6 - North Carolina freshman **TB Giovani Bernard** is the leading freshman rusher in the nation. Bernard, who became the first North Carolina player to record three consecutive 100-yard rushing games since Natrone Means did it in 1992, is ranked 3rd in the ACC and 19th in the NCAA's FBS among all rushers.

123 - Virginia senior **WR Kris Burd** recorded the 5th 100-yard receiving day of his career against Idaho when he carried 8 catches for a career-high 123 yards against the Vandals.

141 - When Clemson **QB Tajh Boyd** had a pass intercepted by Virginia Tech All-America **CB Jayron Hosley**, it marked the end of a streak of 141 consecutive passes without an interception for the Hampton, Va., sophomore. It was also only Boyd's second interception of the year. The streak also tied former Virginia QB Jamal Sewell for the 12th longest such skein in ACC history.

208 - Virginia Tech currently has the longest active scoring streak in the Atlantic Coast Conference. The Hokies have scored in 208 straight games, the sixth-longest current skein in the nation.

300 - The number of games Virginia Tech head coach **Frank Beamer** has coached for his alma mater. One of just many milestones of an eminently successful career, Beamer, now in his 25th year as head coach at the Blacksburg, Va., school has posted a 202-96-2 record for the Hokies, including a current nation's-best streak of seven straight seasons with 10 or more victories.

335 - The number of yards Duke **QB Sean Renfree** passed for in the Blue Devils' 31-27 win over FIU. Renfree has topped the 300-yard passing mark seven times over the past two seasons, the most of any current ACC quarterback.

337 - The combined total of pass receptions for Duke's "V" boys, junior **WR Donovan Varner** (175) and sophomore **WR Conner Vernon** (162). The most of any current duo in the ACC and the fourth-best mark by any pair in ACC history. The duo combined for 15 pass receptions against FIU with Varner moving into 17th place on the ACC career pass receiving list with 175 career receptions, and Vernon moving into 29th place with 162 career catches.

1948 - The last time that Clemson and Georgia Tech both started the season 5-0. The Tigers, coached by Frank Howard, and the Jackets, coached by Bobby Dodd, did not play each other in 1948 as Clemson finished 11-0 and ranked 11th by AP, while Tech ended the year 7-3.

3,735 - The number of career rushing yards for Boston College **TB Montel Harris**. Harris, who had 108 yards rushing on 22 carries against Wake Forest, needs 868 yards in his final seven games of the year to break the 37-year-old ACC career record held by former NC State great Ted Brown (4,602). He would need to average 124 yards a game over the final seven games to set a new standard. Harris also ranks 2nd among all active players in the NCAA's FBS in career rushing yards.

Magnus had been on a 134-day stint at the International Space Station. Arnold was a crew member of STS-119, a two-week mission to deliver solar batteries and other equipment to the station.

Louisville at North Carolina (Noon, ESPN2)

UNC coach Everett Withers was an assistant at Louisville from 1995-97. Current Louisville assistant Ron Dugans was a Florida State wide receiver who caught six passes for 65 yards in FSU's win over the Tar Heels in 1999.

Florida State at Wake Forest (12:30 p.m., ACC Network)

Former Florida Gov. Charlie Crist (R) was a member of Wake's 1975 football team and earned his undergraduate degree from FSU.

Boston College at Clemson (3 p.m., RSN)

David Wilkins, a 1966 ACC doubles champion in tennis and a 1968 graduate of Clemson, succeeded Paul Cellucci (BC 1970, '73) as U.S. Ambassador to Canada in 2005. Cellucci served from 2001-05 and Wilkins from 2005-09. Both were appointed by President George W. Bush.

Miami at Virginia Tech (3:30 p.m., ABC/ ESPN)

Former Hokie WR Ernest Wilford went on to a successful NFL career during which he was represented by agent Drew Rosenhaus, who received an undergraduate degree at Miami.

Central Michigan at NC State (3:30 p.m., ESPN3)

Current Chippewa assistant Kort Shankweiler played fullback for East Carolina against the Wolfpack in 2004 and 2006.

2011 ACC FB Game Summaries--Week 4

Wake Forest 27, Boston College 19

QB Tanner Price hit WR Chris Givens with an inside screen pass that Givens took down the left sideline for a 47-yard TD, and Wake Forest held off Boston College to improve to 2-0 in the ACC and in the Atlantic Division. The Demon Deacons (3-1) have won three straight games overall for the first time since 2008, and they held off an Eagle offense that had a fully healthy RB Montel Harris for the first time. Harris, who ran for 108 yards on 22 carries, had the 22nd 100-yard rushing game of his career. Givens' score gave his team a 24-9 lead, and Wake claimed the win with the help of two long pass plays on a 75-yard drive that added a field goal for an eight-point lead in the final minutes.

#21/21 Georgia Tech 45, NC State 35

AB Orwin Smith ran for three touchdowns, the last of which initiated a stretch of three Yellow Jacket scores in two and a half minutes early in the fourth quarter, as Tech improved to 5-0 by repelling the Wolfpack. The Jackets led 21-0 after their 23rd offensive play, but the Wolfpack fought back and made it 21-14 on James Washington's 46-yard scoring dash in the second minute of the second half. The Jackets responded with a 67-yard TD drive that was immediately followed by Isaiah Johnson's interception and 34-yard scoring return. The Jackets moved from 21st in the AP poll to 13th this week.

Maryland 28, Towson 3

The Terrapins (2-2, 1-0 ACC) capitalized on four second-half turnovers to distance themselves from the Tigers after a 7-3 game at halftime. QB Danny O'Brien threw two short TD passes for scores after halftime and RB Davin Meggett ran for a game-high 102 yards and the Terps defeated Towson, one of the nation's best FCS programs. Two true freshmen scored for Maryland: Justus Pickett and Tyler Cierski.

Virginia 21, Idaho 20 (OT)

The Cavaliers outgained the Vandals by 200 yards of total offense and held on for the overtime win when several defenders forced an incomplete pass from QB Brian Reader on a two-point conversion try in the first overtime. The Cavaliers (3-2, 0-1 ACC) never trailed in the game and led until allowing a TD on a blocked punt in the fourth quarter. Starting the overtime period on offense, they faced a third-and-goal from the 27 but found success with a screen pass to freshman Dominique Terrell, who followed blocking into the end zone. The Vandals made it 21-20 when Armauni Johnson made a leaping catch of a Reader pass. Idaho coach Robb Akey eschewed the extra point and went for the win immediately, but Reader's hurried pass failed.

Miami 45, Bethune-Cookman 14

RB Lamar Miller became the first Hurricane in at least 30 years to begin a season with four consecutive 100-yard rushing games when he went for 102 on the ground as Miami dispatched the Wildcats of the FCS. Miami (2-2, 0-1 ACC) was held scoreless for the first quarter and a half but drew even when QB Jacory Harris threw a 56-yard strike to WR Tommy Streeter. The former high school teammates later hooked up on a 27-yard score to build the lead.

#13/15 Clemson 23, #11/10 Virginia Tech 3

QB Tajh Boyd, chased out of the pocket, threw a perfect leading pass to TE Dwayne Allen early in the third quarter to give the Tigers a two-touchdown lead, and Clemson (5-0) became the first team in ACC history to defeat AP-ranked opponents in three straight games in the same season. In the first game between two ACC teams that entered at 4-0 or better since 2000, the visitors ended the Hokies' regular-season winning streak at 14 games. Clemson moved to No. 8 in this week's AP poll, earning its highest standing since the middle of the 2000 season.

Duke 31, Florida International 27

Down 10 points at the start of the fourth quarter, Duke put together consecutive scoring drives and claimed the win with Juwan Thompson's nine-yard run with 6:52 left and a subsequent defensive stop. The Blue Devils (3-2, 1-0 ACC) have won three straight games for the first time since the middle of the 2009 season and have won three straight immediately after an 0-2 start to a campaign for the first time since 1981. Duke first got back into the game with the help of a 54-yard strike from QB Sean Renfree, who completed 28 of 43 passes for 335 yards and 2 TDs on the night, to WR Donovan Varner that set up a Thompson score. The night's biggest play followed when Duke's Anthony Young-Wiseman sacked Wesley Carroll and recovered the resulting fumble. Thompson dashed in on the first play thereafter and the Devils prevailed.

North Carolina 35, East Carolina 20

The reliable combination of the deep passing game and RB Giovani Bernard's pounding rushing attack built UNC an early 28-3 lead in the Tar Heels' victory at ECU. QB Bryn Renner, who completed 13 of 20 passes for 230 yards and a career-high 4 touchdowns, hooked up with WR Erik Highsmith for a 75-yard TD and with Dwight Jones from the 47. Bernard, the nation's leading rusher among freshmen, ran for 146 yards on 24 carries for the Tar Heels (4-1), who were seldom threatened after building a 28-3 lead in front of a hostile crowd.

Boston College

Senior **RB Montel Harris** played his first full game since last November against Wake Forest on Saturday, carrying 22 times for 108 yards to set BC's career rushing record. His 26-yard run in the third quarter allowed him to surpass Derrick Knight's mark of 3,725, attained from 2000-03. Harris now has 3,735 yards, good for 11th in ACC history. James McDougald of Wake (1976-79) is 10th at 3,811. ... **PK Nate Freese's** 52-yard field goal was the Eagles' longest in 22 years and the third-longest in BC history. ... **LB Luke Kuechly** has now made 10 or more tackles in 27 straight games after a 14-stop performance against the Demon Deacons. His career average of 13.77 a contest is the highest in NCAA history. ... Freshman **WR Spiffy Evans**, making his first appearance on special teams, had a 32-yard kickoff return. ... **DE Kasim Edebali** broke up two passes. ... The Eagles are 5-for-8 on fourth down this season.

The Terrapins got TDs from two true freshman RBs, **Justus Pickett** and **Tyler Cierski**, in Saturday's 28-3 win over FCS member Towson... Coach **Randy Edsall** has now played eight members of his first recruiting class, which he signed only a month after taking over the job. ... The Terps have won 16 straight games against current members of the Colonial Athletic Association since falling to Villanova in 1971 -- seven years before the NCAA subdivided Division I football. ... The Terps made 11 tackles for loss against the Tigers. ... Maryland was plus-3 in turnover margin (four and one) and now ranks 7th nationally in turnover margin... Since the start of the 2010 season, the Terps have converted 41 takeaways into 140 points while allowing their 19 committed turnovers to become only 34 opponent points... In other words, they have had more takeaways than points allowed on turnovers. ... **S Matt Robinson** (12.0) is tied for 5th nationally in tackles per game while **LB Demetrius Hartsfield** (11.75) ranks 9th nationally...**RB Davin Meggett** ranks 6th in the ACC in rushing, averaging 81.8 yards a game and 5.0 yads per carry.



Clemson

Clemson is 5-0 for the fourth time in the ACC era, joining the teams of 1981, 1987 and 2000. Those groups went 31-5, including the 1981 national championship. ... Saturday's 23-3 win at No. 11 Virginia Tech was the Tigers' most lopsided road victory against a ranked opponent. The previous standard came from a pair of 11-point victories (28-17 at No. 19 North Carolina on Nov. 5, 1994 and a 34-23 verdict at No. 16 Florida State on Sept. 9, 1989)... The triumph over the Hokies is Clemson's most lopsided against a team rated 11th or higher since a 52-27 win vs. No. 11 Maryland on Nov. 12, 1983. ... Clemson, LSU and Alabama are the only FBS teams that have beaten three AP-ranked opponents (as determined at game time) this season. ... The Tigers continue to get production from true freshmen. **RB Mike Bellamy** got his second TD of the year in the victory at Virginia Tech. ... **WR Sammy Watkins**, although held out of the end zone for the first time in his career by the Hokies, is still averaging 94 yards a game.



NC State

WR T.J. Graham is second nationally in all-purpose yardage at 214.8 per game. He trails LaMichael James of Oregon (226.75). ... Graham moved into 2nd place on the ACC's career kickoff return yardage list and now has 2,712 yards...The record of 2,983 yards was set last year by Maryland's Torrey Smith...The Wolfpack's **Tom O'Brien** is the only coach in ACC history to have victories over all 12 conference members... His Boston College team defeated NC State in 2005, and his Pack beat the Eagles in 2010. ... State has now two fumble returns for TDs in this season: **S Brandon Bishop** had a 33-yarder against Georgia Tech on Saturday to go with **DT Brian Slay's** score from 52 yards out against Liberty on Sept. 4. ... The Wolfpack managed something that few Georgia Tech opponents achieve: It won time of possession against the spread-option offense of the Jackets. One second-quarter drive did consume nearly 10 minutes of time. The possession required 19 plays, the most by any State drive since a 19-play drive against Maryland on Nov. 14, 2000.



Florida State

The 23rd-ranked Seminoles are in the AP poll for the sixth straight week. That's their longest run since the first six weeks of the 2006 season. ... **WR Rashad Greene** has five receiving TDs in four games; the ACC's freshman record is nine for a season... Greene has a TD catch in each of his first four games. The record for consecutive games with a TD reception by an ACC freshman is six by Virginia tight end Heath Miller in 2002....FSU has made three interceptions in its first four games. **P Shaun Powell** has the ACC's longest punt of the year, a 69-yard effort against Oklahoma, and is first in the conference with 44.9 yards per punt. ... Special-teams excellence continues with **PK Dustin Hopkins**, who is 7-for-7 in field goals on the season... FSU is ranked 6th nationally in total defense, allowing just 257 yards a game...The Seminoles are allowing just 82.5 yards a game on the ground and rank 12th nationally in rushing defense....Freshman **QB Clint Trickett**, who backs up **EJ Manuel**, is ranked 3rd nationally this week in pass efficiency (182.56).



Wake Forest

The Demon Deacons snapped a four-game losing streak to Boston College with Saturday's 27-19 road victory. ... They have trailed for nine of 14,400 seconds of timed play in 2011. ... **WR Chris Givens** had another big day (seven catches for 132 yards) and has taken his season's total to 498 yards. He's seventh in the FBS in yards per game through the air (124.5).... In 2010, Givens led Wake with 514 receiving yards for the season. ... Wake has already equaled its victory total from a 3-9 campaign in 2010, and it is 2-0 in Atlantic Division play. ... In a 75-yard drive that resulted in a field goal, Wake completed passes of 44 and 36 yards... (Rushing losses on other snaps caused the total on those two pass plays to exceed the total yardage between starting and finishing points on the possession.)... **WR Michael Campanaro** threw the 36-yarder to Givens, who caught it while drawing a penalty flag for interference...Campanaro is 2-for-2 for 76 yards on the year as a passer and has averaged 12.7 yards per reception.



COASTAL DIVISION TEAM NOTES



Duke



The Blue Devils, who came back to beat FIU 31-27 on Saturday, have won three in a row for the second time in the past three seasons. They had no such streaks from 1995 through 2008. ... The Devils have won twice when trailing after three quarters this season. ... **WRs Conner Vernon** (117 yards) and **Donovan Varner** (111) had 100 or more receiving yards in the same game for the fourth time in their three seasons as Duke teammates... The two have 316 receptions in that time; that's the fifth-highest total by ACC teammates in seasons common to both. The record by a duo is 364. ... **QB Sean Renfree** is completing 71 percent of his passes on the year. ... The Devils are second in the ACC in rushing TDs with (12); that's more than they amassed in four of the five previous full seasons. ... Vernon leads the ACC with 6.8 receptions per game and is third in yardage (101.0). ... This is the first time since 1981 that a Duke team has responded to an 0-2 start to its season by immediately winning its next three games. That team had another three-game winning streak later on and finished with a 6-5 record.

Georgia Tech



With Saturday's 45-35 win at NC State, Georgia Tech became the fourth ACC team to score 35 or more points in each of a season's first five games and the first to do so since the 1999 Florida State club. ... Of the Yellow Jackets' 35 completions this season, 15 have been for 30 or more yards and 10 have been for TDs. ... **AB Roddy Jones** has scored on three of his four catches in 2011. ... **AB Orwin Smith** has scored on seven of his 28 rushing attempts. ... The Jackets lead the nation in rushing and are averaging 378.2 rushing yards per game with no individual getting more than 13 carries an outing. ... **S Isaiah Johnson's** 34-yard interception return provided Tech with its first non-offensive TD of the season. ... The Jackets jumped from 21st in the AP poll to 13th this week....That's a tie for the second-largest gain Tech has enjoyed from week to the next in its ACC era....The record is a nine-place leap in 1990 (from 16th to 7th) that immediately followed a win at No. 1 Virginia.

Miami



RB Lamar Miller is the first Hurricane to begin a season with four straight games of 100 or more rushing yards in at least the past 30 years; he had 102 against Bethune-Cookman and is eighth in the FBS in rushing yards per game this season (127.75); that's nine inches per game behind Virginia Tech's David Wilson. ... In the first half of Saturday's win over Bethune-Cookman, the Hurricanes recorded TD drives of nine and 10 seconds. Collectively, the Canes' four TD marches on the day amounted to 10 plays, 174 yards and less than four minutes of possession time... With 56 career TD passes, Miami **QB Jacory Harris** is tied for 13th in ACC history with Matt Schaub of Virginia and Matt Ryan of Boston College. The 10th-place total is 58. ... **WR Travis Benjamin** racked up 171 all-purpose yards against the Wildcats: 66 on six receptions; a 44-yard punt return; and two kickoff returns amounting to 61 yards... **LB Sean Spence** was credited with 2.5 tackles for loss, one of which was a 12-yard sack, against the Wildcats.

North Carolina



RB Giovani Bernard is the national leader in touchdowns by freshmen with seven... Bernard is 19th among all players in rushing yards per game and first among freshmen (109.6). ... **WR Dwight Jones** has 85 or more receiving yards in all five games for the 2011 Tar Heels. ... UNC has only one of the nation's top 200 individual tacklers but has allowed fewer than 21 points a game on the year. ... UNC will continue its rivalry with East Carolina in each of the next two years. In 2013, the teams will meet for the fifth consecutive season; that will be the longest continuous stretch in a series that began in 1972. ... **QB Bryn Renner** has completed 65 percent or more of his passes and has thrown at least one TD pass in all five of the Tar Heels' games so far... He ranks 5th nationally in pass efficiency (179.10)... UNC, as a result, is second in the ACC in passing efficiency, trailing only Georgia Tech, which has thrown nearly twice as many passes as the Tar Heels. ... **WR Erik Highsmith's** total of 93 receiving yards was his highest since September of 2009.

Virginia



Freshman **RB Kevin Parks** didn't score in Saturday's win over Idaho but is one rushing TD short of the school's freshman record of seven... Parks is one of the three rookies to find the end zone for the Cavaliers... Fellow **RB Clinton Richardson** and **WR Dominique Terrell** are the others. ... Terrell delivered the game-winning TD on a third-and-goal from the Idaho 27 in overtime as the Cavaliers held on for a 21-20 verdict in which they amassed 496 yards of total offense to the Vandals' 296. ... **WR Kris Burd** recorded the sixth 100-yard game of his career when he caught eight passes for 123 yards against Idaho.... He now stands fifth in UVa history in receptions (126) and eighth in yards (1,650).... **CB Chase Minnifield** snagged the 11th interception of his career on Saturday and is now tied for fourth among active FBS players in that department.... Minnifield is second among ACC players, trailing only **Jayron Hosley** of Virginia Tech (12).

Virginia Tech



Hokies **RB David Wilson** is the fourth Tech back of the ACC era to post four or more games with 100 or more rushing yards in a season, and he has several chances to add to his total... Ryan Williams (10 in 2009), Darren Evans (four in 2008) and Branden Ore (4 in 2006) are the other players on the list. ... A season of milestones for **Frank Beamer** continues.... He earned his 200th victory as Virginia Tech's coach with a verdict at East Carolina on Sept. 10; coached his 300th total game at his alma mater two weeks later; and will direct the 100th game of Tech's ACC era against Miami this week. ... The Virginia Tech-Clemson game was the first since Oct. 7, 2000 that involved two ACC teams with records of 4-0 or better. ... The Hokies are in the top eight nationally in all four major categories of team defense. ... Saturday's loss to Clemson ended Tech's run of 14 straight regular-season wins.... Wilson stands seventh nationally in rushing yards per game (127.80) and has gotten nearly half of the Hokies' carries (107 of 216). ... **RB Josh Oglesby** has five TDs in his 42 rushing attempts.

ACC Players of the Week

Clemson's Andre Branch and Tig Willard Headline Eight Honorees

GREENSBORO, N.C. – Clemson senior defensive end Andre Branch and junior linebacker Tig Willard headline a list of eight players named as the ACC Football Players of the Week by the Atlantic Coast Conference on Monday. Branch compiled 11 tackles, five tackles for loss and three sacks, all career highs, in the 23-3 win at 11th-ranked Virginia Tech and was named the Defensive Lineman of the Week for his performance. Willard added nine tackles to pick up Linebacker of the Week honors, and both players were key in limiting Virginia Tech to just three points and 258 yards of total offense. Duke and North Carolina both had two players recognized for their play in nonconference wins. Duke quarterback Sean Renfree threw for 335 yards and two touchdowns in a 31-27 win over FIU and was named the Offensive Back of the Week. His teammate Laken Tomlinson grabbed Offensive Lineman of the Week. North Carolina's Tim Scott (Defensive Back of the Week) and Giovani Bernard (Rookie of the Week) helped the Tar Heels to a 35-20 win at East Carolina. Wake Forest's Chris Givens earned Receiver of the Week honors for his 132-yard performance in a win at Boston College, and Georgia Tech's Justin Moore was named Specialist of the Week for his efforts in a victory at NC State.

OFFENSIVE BACK – Sean Renfree, Duke, QB, Jr., 6-5, 225, Scottsdale, Az.

Renfree completed 28-of-43 passes for 335 yards and two touchdowns and led Duke to a 31-27 come-from-behind road win over FIU. He directed two fourth-quarter touchdown drives to help erase a 10-point deficit in the final 12 minutes – the 12th largest second half rally in school history and largest since 1989. His 43 pass attempts without an interception marks the ninth-highest single-game total in school history, and he engineered a Duke offense that did not turn the ball over.

RECEIVER – Chris Givens, Wake Forest, WR, Jr., 6-0, 195, Wylie, Tx.

Givens caught seven passes for 132 yards and one touchdown in Wake Forest's 27-19 win over Boston College on Saturday. Givens caught a 47-yard scoring pass from Tanner Price early in the third quarter. Givens also caught a 36-yard pass from flanker Michael Campanaro that set up Wake Forest's final field goal. Givens made the catch despite triple coverage and a defensive pass interference call against BC. Givens' 498 yards receiving through four games is the most-ever by a Wake Forest receiver through four games.

OFFENSIVE LINEMAN – Laken Tomlinson, Duke, G, Fr.-R, 6-3, 310, Chicago, Ill.

Tomlinson was a key member of Duke's offensive line that yielded zero sacks against an FIU defense that entered the game ranked fourth nationally in sacks per game (3.75). The offensive line successfully protected Renfree and opened holes for Juwan Thompson's two touchdowns in the fourth quarter.

DEFENSIVE LINEMAN – Andre Branch, Clemson, DE, Sr., 6-5, 260, Richmond, Va.

Branch had 11 tackles, three sacks and five total tackles for loss in Clemson's victory over Virginia Tech last week. He led the team in all three areas and also had three quarterback pressures. His tackle total, sack total and tackles for loss total were all career highs. His five tackles for loss tied a Clemson record for tackles for loss in a game by a defensive lineman and was tied for second most by any player in Clemson history. Branch was a big reason Virginia Tech scored just three points. It was the first time since 1995 that Virginia Tech did not score a touchdown at home and tied for the largest margin of defeat for the Hokies at home in 20 years.

LINEBACKER – Tig Willard, Clemson, LB, Jr., 6-2, 220, Loris, S.C.

Willard had nine tackles, including seven first hits and a tackle for loss to key Clemson's second line of defense in the Tigers 23-3 win at Virginia Tech. Willard was a big reason Clemson held Virginia Tech to just three points and just 258 yards of total offense. Clemson held Virginia Tech without a touchdown at home for the first time since 1995.

DEFENSIVE BACK – Tim Scott, North Carolina, CB, Fr., 5-11, 180, Fredericksburg, Va.

Cornerback Tim Scott tied for the team lead with nine tackles and intercepted a pass in the East Carolina red zone and broke up another pass in North Carolina's 35-20 win at East Carolina. After the interception, the Tar Heels scored two plays later to take an early 7-0 lead.

ROOKIE – Giovani Bernard, North Carolina, TB, Fr., 5-10, 205, Davie, Fla.

Redshirt freshman tailback Giovani Bernard rushed for 146 yards on a career-high 24 carries and scored a touchdown in Carolina's 35-20 win over ECU. He became the first UNC player to rush for 100 yards in three straight games since Natrone Means in 1992. Bernard had 102 vs. Virginia (Sept. 17) and 155 at Georgia Tech (Sept. 24). Bernard, the leading freshman rusher in the nation, is averaging 109.6 rushing yards and has 548 yards on 78 carries. Bernard had 113 of his 146 yards in the first half as Carolina built a 28-3 halftime lead. Bernard now has seven rushing touchdowns, which equals the total of last year's leading rusher Johnny White.

SPECIALIST – Justin Moore, Georgia Tech, PK, So., 5-10, 171, Atlanta, Ga.

Moore made all six PATs, but it was his 40-yard field goal with 5:38 remaining that helped seal Georgia Tech's 45-35 win over NC State Saturday.

Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer Ranks Second Among NCAA Coaching Leaders

Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer ranks second among all active NCAA FBS Coaches with 244 triumphs in his 31-year coaching career. Beamer trails only Penn State's Joe Paterno, who has 404 career wins. Paterno is the NCAA's all-time leader, as well as its active leader. Florida State's Bobby Bowden, who retired after the 2009 season, finished his career in 2nd place on the all-time list with 389 victories,



though the NCAA recognizes only 377 triumphs. During the 2010 season alone, Beamer passed such legends of the game as Michigan's Bo Schembechler and Ohio State's Woody Hayes on the all-time NCAA FBS coaching wins list. Immediately ahead of him, is 8th place Lou Holtz with 249 victories at several schools including NC State, Minnesota, Notre Dame and South Carolina, and 7th-place Tom Osborne, who won 255 games at Nebraska.

Five Current ACC Head Football Coaches Have UVa Ties

The selection by Miami of former Temple head coach **Al Golden** to succeed Randy Shannon as its head football coach, makes him the fifth former UVa assistant or graduate assistant coach to be a current head football coach in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Golden joins Boston College's **Frank Spaziani**, NC State's **Tom O'Brien**, Virginia's **Mike London** and Wake Forest's **Jim Grobe** as current ACC head coaches who have spent time as assistants or graduate assistants for the Cavaliers. Golden spent four seasons (2001-04) at Virginia as defensive coordinator under Al Groh. The Eagles' Spaziani served as an assistant coach at Virginia under then head coach George Welsh for nine seasons (1982-90), the last five as defensive coordinator. O'Brien also served under Welsh at UVa, spending 15 seasons (1982-96) there including the last six as offensive coordinator. London served two terms at UVa under Groh, serving as defensive line coach in 2001-04 and again in 2006-07 as defensive coordinator and defensive line coach. Wake Forest head coach Jim Grobe, a 1975 Virginia graduate, who just starting his 11th season with the Deacons, lettered two seasons at UVa as a middle guard and linebacker and also spent one year as a graduate assistant coach (1975) under then Virginia head coach Sonny Randle.

NC State's O'Brien Latest To Join 100-Win Club

When NC State defeated 22nd-ranked West Virginia in the 2010 Champs Sports Bowl, it marked the 100th career victory for Wolfpack head coach **Tom O'Brien**. O'Brien, who now has 102 career victories, is the third current ACC head coach with 100 or more career triumphs joining Virginia Tech's **Frank Beamer** (244), who ranks 2nd among all active coaches in victories, and Georgia Tech's **Paul Johnson** (137), who ranks 13th nationally among current FBS head coaches. O'Brien, who accumulated 75 wins in a 10-year stay at Boston College, won his 25th game as head coach of the Wolfpack with the win over the Mountaineers. Wake Forest head coach **Jim Grobe** now needs just two wins to reach 100 for his career.

Florida State's Fisher Joins Exclusive ACC Club

In his first season as Florida State's head coach in 2011, **Jimbo Fisher** joined select company by posting a 10-4-0 record as a first-year head coach in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Only three coaches have won 10 or more games in their first year in the ACC. Fisher is joined by Ralph Friedgen at Maryland and former head coach **Jeff Jagodzinski** at Boston College, who won 10 or more games in their rookie years as a head coach.

NC State's Tom O'Brien Latest To Coach at Multiple ACC Schools

NC State's Tom O'Brien is the fifth coach in Atlantic Coast Conference history to have served as a head coach of two ACC schools. O'Brien coached at Boston College from 1997 through 2006, which included the school's first two seasons (2005-06) of ACC membership.  Jim Tatum was the first ACC coach at two schools; he first coached at North Carolina in 1942, then at Maryland from 1947-55 before returning to UNC beginning in 1956 until his death in 1958. Others who have coached at two ACC schools include Bobby Ross (Md, GT), Al Groh (WF, UVA) and Bill Dooley (UNC, WF).

Dooley actually coached at three current ACC schools as he spent nine seasons at Virginia Tech before the Hokies joined the ACC, in between stints at UNC and Wake Forest, winning 162 games in his career. Dooley and Ross are the only coaches in ACC history to be named ACC Coach of the Year at more than one school. Others who have coached at more than one current ACC school, though not necessarily when they were in the ACC, include John Heisman, who coached at both Georgia Tech and Clemson.

Virginia Tech's Beamer Becomes 10th FBS Head Coach To Win 200 Games At One School

With a 17-10 win over East Carolina on Sept. 10 Virginia Tech head football coach Frank Beamer



accomplished yet another milestone in a career which now spans 31 years as a head coach. The win was Beamer's 200th as a head coach at his alma mater making him only the 10th head coach in NCAA FBS history to have won 200 games at one school. He became only the second ACC

head coach to do so, joining former Florida State head coach Bobby Bowden, who actually won 316 games as a Seminole during the 1976-2009 seasons. Beamer's overall record in 24-plus seasons at Virginia Tech is 202-96-2 (.677). He is now only the third active FBS head coach with 200 wins at one school joining Joe Paterno of Penn State (404) and Chris Ault (220) of Nevada.

A new generation of talented running backs graces the ACC this year. Last week, no fewer than seven ACC backs topped the 100-yard mark in their games. **David Wilson** of Virginia Tech currently ranks 7th nationally with four 100-yard efforts in five game while Miami's **Lamar Miller**, who is 8th nationally, has rushed for 100 or more yards in four straight games including an 184-yard effort against 17th-ranked Ohio State on Sept. 17. North Carolina's **Giovanni Bernard**, a redshirt freshman who is ranked 19th, recorded his third straight 100-yard effort of the year with 146 yards against East Carolina. Duke's wide receiver tandem of junior **Conner Vernon** and senior **Donovan Varner** are within striking distance of becoming the most prolific pass-catching duo in ACC history. In their two-plus seasons as teammates, the pair has combined to make 337 career catches, just 27 shy of the all-time ACC leading duo, Clemson's Aaron Kelly (232) and Tyler Grisham (132), who played together during the 2005-2008 seasons. The total places them in 3rd place among ACC receiving duos. In the two-plus seasons Vernon and Varner have actually played together, their total number of receptions are 316, which would rank them 6th. Vernon ranks 5th among all ACC pass receivers this week with 34 catches and a 6.8 average per game, while Varner is in 7th with 29 receptions and a 5.8 per-game average. Varner moved into 17th place on the ACC career reception list with 175 career receptions, while Vernon, who has 162 career catches moved into 29th place on the ACC's career receiving list.

Wake Forest's **Chris Givens** ranks 7th nationally averaging 124.5 yards per game. Last season, Clemson defensive end Da'Quan Bowers won the coveted Bronko Nagurski Trophy during the 16th season the FWAA named a national defensive player of the year.



Clemson Named Tostitos Fiesta Bowl National Team of the Week by the FWAA

Beating a ranked opponent for a second consecutive week and gaining a key win over a conference rival enabled the Clemson Tigers (4-0) to earn the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl National Team of the Week for games of the weekend of Sept. 24. Clemson beat Florida State, 35-30, that weekend to notch its fifth consecutive win over the Seminoles at home. The Tigers defeated Auburn on Sept. 17. Boston College's Montel Harris Takes Aim At ACC Rushing Records

Making his first start of the 2011 season after missing the first three games of the season after arthroscopic knee surgery, Boston College RB Montel Harris rushed for 108 yards on just 22 carries in limited action against Wake Forest. Harris recorded the 22nd 100-yard day of his career putting him in 3rd place behind only NC State's Ted Brown (27) and North Carolina's Amos Lawrence (23). Harris is also within reach of one of the oldest standards in the ACC record book which is also held by State's Brown. Harris currently has 3,735 career rushing yards. Brown holds the Conference's career rushing record, having run for 4,602 yards during the 1975 through 1978 seasons. Harris needs 868 yards in his final 7 games of this year to break the 33-year-old mark, an average of 124.0 yards a game.

Virginia Tech Only Team Nationally With 10 Wins Each of Last Seven Years

With an 11-3 record last year, Virginia Tech became the only team in the NCAA's FBS to have won 10 or more games in each of the past seven seasons. From 2004, Tech's first season in the ACC, through 2010, the Hokies of coach Frank Beamer have posted a 73-21 record.

Virginia Tech is only the second ACC team to record seven or more consecutive years with 10 or more wins in ACC play. Florida State recorded nine straight seasons with 10 or more wins in their first decade in the ACC (1992-2000), part of a 14-year run (1987-2000) for the Seminoles with double-figure victories. Miami recorded eight straight years of 10 or more wins before joining the ACC (1965-92), while Clemson (4, 1987-90) and Maryland (3, 2001-03) also had impressive streaks.

National Football Hall of Fame Inducts FSU's Deion Sanders and Miami's Russell Maryland

Atlantic Coast Conference schools will have two inductees this year at the annual National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame annual banquet in New York City.



Former Florida State cornerback **Deion Sanders** and Miami defensive tackle **Russell Maryland** will be the honorees from ACC schools and their selection brings the total to 15 former players or

coaches who have been tabbed for induction into the College Hall of Fame from current Atlantic Coast Conference schools over the last seven years.

Sanders redefined the qualities of the position of cornerback during his four-year career for the Seminoles (1985-88) and was named the winner of the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's top defensive back in 1988. That year, he led the nation in punt returns and finished 8th in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy. A two-time unanimous All-America, he led FSU to four bowl victories and to the first two of 14 consecutive AP top five finishes.

Maryland, a dominating defensive tackle on Miami's 1987 and 1989 National Championship football teams becomes the seventh Hurricane coach or player to be selected to the College Hall of Fame. A unanimous All-America as a senior in 1990, he also was presented with the Outland Trophy that year as the nation's top interior lineman. A Lombardi Award finalist and the College Football Lineman of the Year by UPI, he helped Miami compile an impressive 44-4 record, including four bowl triumphs during his four seasons (1986-90) in Coral Gables.

Sanders and Maryland will be inducted at the annual National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Banquet held on Tuesday, Dec. 6, at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York City.

They join 13 other former players or coaches from current ACC schools who have been selected for the Hall of Fame since 2006 including:

Academics, Schools Are No. 1

ACC Schools Rank No. 1 In Average Starting and Mid-Career Salaries

In a study published by the website Payscale.com, graduates of Atlantic Coast Conference schools earned more money in their initial jobs after graduation from college than their counterparts at schools from the other Conferences that play in the NCAA's Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS). ACC schools also rank first among NCAA FBS Conferences in the salaries of its graduates at the mid-point of their careers. The study did not include the starting salaries of graduates of the military academies.

In all, six ACC schools--Georgia Tech (2), Duke (3), Virginia Tech (5), Virginia (16), Maryland (17) and Boston College (18) were ranked among the nation's Top 20 in starting salary. Seven league schools--Duke (1), Georgia Tech (4), Wake Forest (7), Boston College (10), Virginia Tech (14), Virginia (18) and Maryland (19)--were ranked among the Top 20 in mid-career salaries.

ACC Divisional Tiebreaker

If more than one team in the same division is tied for the best winning percentage in its Conference games, then, in order to determine the Divisional Champions, the procedures listed below will be followed:

Two-Team Tie:

1. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams.
2. Records of the tied teams within the division.
3. Head-to-head competition versus the team within the division with the best overall record. (Divisional) Conference record and preceding through the division. Multiple ties within the division broken from first-to-last.
4. Overall record versus all common non-divisional opponents.
5. Combined record vs. all non-divisional teams.
6. Record versus common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish (divisional and non-divisional) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division.
7. The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the end of regular season game shall be the divisional representative in the ACC Championship Game.
8. The representative shall be chosen by a draw.

Three-Team (or More) Team Tie

(Once tie has been reduced to two teams, the two-team tiebreaker format is used.)

1. Combined head-to-head record among teams.
2. Records of the tied teams within the division.
3. Head-to-head competition versus the team within the division with the best overall (divisional or conference) record, and proceeding through the division. Multiple ties within the division will be broken first to last.
4. Overall record for non-divisional teams.
5. Combined record versus all common non-divisional teams.
6. Record versus common non-divisional with the best overall Conference (divisional and non-divisional record) and proceeding through the other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within the division.
7. The tied team with the highest ranking in the BCS Standings following the conclusion of regular season games shall be the divisional representative in the ACC Championship Game, unless the second of the tied teams is ranked within five-or-fewer places of the highest ranked tied team. In this case, the head-to-head results of the top two ranked tied teams shall determine the representative in the ACC Championship Game.
8. The representative shall be chosen by a draw.

2011 ACC Bowl Selection

Bowl Championship Series

The winner of the Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game will be selected to play in the Bowl Championship Series. Unless the winner of the Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game is ranked No.1 or No. 2 in the final BCS Standings and plays in the BCS National Championship Game, then the ACC Champion will serve as the host team of the Discover Orange Bowl in Miami, Fla. This year's Allstate BCS National Championship Game will be hosted by the Allstate Sugar Bowl on Jan. 9 in New Orleans, La. The BCS may also select a second ACC team, if one is eligible for selection (Won at least nine regular season games and is ranked among the Top 14 in the final BCS Standings), and there is an At-Large berth available and the team is selected by one of the four BCS Bowl Games—Discover Orange (only if the ACC Champion is in the BCS National Championship Game), Allstate Sugar, Tostitos Fiesta and the Rose Bowl Game presented by Vizio.



After the BCS selections, then the selection order is:

1. Chick-fil-A Bowl, Atlanta
2. Champs Sports Bowl, Orlando
3. Hyundai Sun Bowl, El Paso, Tex.
4. Belk Bowl, Charlotte, N.C.

6. Advocate V100 Independence Bowl, Shreveport, La.
7. The Military Bowl Presented by Northrop Grumman, Washington, D.C.

8. Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl, San Francisco, Calif.

Conditions:

1. The runner-up of the ACC Championship Game, provided, is guaranteed not to fall further than the Hyundai Sun Bowl. The Sun Bowl will select the ACC Championship Game runner-up in any year that team is available to them.
2. Otherwise, if the bowl does not select the team available with the best Conference record, then it must choose a team that is within one conference win of the team (The "One-Win Rule") with the best conference record (ie. 5-3 to 6-2), The bowl may take a team that has more than a one game difference, only if the team is ranked more than five spaces above the team with the best Conference record in the final BCS Standings.
3. If, after all bowl selections have been made, and the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl has an opening due to the inability of either the Pac-12 Conference or Army to provide a team, and the ACC has an available, eligible team, then the ACC will send a team to the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl

Selection Time Frame

The Bowl Championship Series will announce its selections on the BCS ESPN Selection Show on Sunday, December 4. In conjunction with the BCS selections, each Atlantic Coast Conference affiliated bowl game will make their selections in the order specified above. The ACC, the Bowls and individual schools will announce the selections after all selections are completed on Sunday.

The Atlantic Coast Conference has been a member of the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) since its inception for the 1998 season. ACC Commissioner John Swofford, is the only Commissioner to twice serve as BCS Coordinator, having done so in the 2000 and 2001 seasons and again in the 2008 and 2009 campaigns, as the ACC successfully administered the BCS on two separate occasions. Swofford is also the last Commissioner to serve as BCS Coordinator. In 2009, the BCS group named longtime college administrator Bill Hancock to serve as the first Executive Director of the Bowl Championship Series. Hancock has since assumed most of the duties previously handled by the coordinator. Prior to being named Executive Director, Hancock served two years as the Administrator for the BCS.

Heading into its 14th year of determining the National Championship in college football, the **Bowl Championship Series (BCS)** is a five-game arrangement that is designed to match the two top-rated teams and to create competitive match ups among eight other highly regarded teams in four other games.

The bowl games participating are the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, the Discover Orange Bowl, the Rose Bowl Game presented by Vizio and the Allstate Sugar Bowl. In addition, the BCS National Championship Game is played at one of the bowl sites, this year in New Orleans, La., on January 9, 2012.

The term "BCS conference" frequently is used incorrectly. Actually, all 11 NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) conferences are "BCS conferences" because the BCS arrangement is managed by the commissioners of the 11 NCAA FBS conferences and the director of athletics at the University of Notre Dame. The conferences are the Atlantic Coast, the Big East, the Big Ten, the Big 12, Conference USA, the Mid-American, the Mountain West, the Sun Belt, the Pacific-12, the Southeastern and the Western Athletic.

The conference commissioners and the Notre Dame athletics director make decisions regarding all BCS issues, in consultation with an athletics directors advisory group and subject to the approval of a presidential oversight committee whose members represent all 120 NCAA FBS programs.

The BCS games are operated by community-based organizations in each of the host cities. In addition, there are 30 other post-season bowls, which are managed independently by entities in 27 cities around the nation. All bowl games provide meaningful season-ending opportunities for student-athletes.

The BCS is remarkably successful. It maintains and enhances the importance of the regular season and preserves the unique bowl tradition to the benefit of the student-athletes. And it matches the top two teams. Before the creation of the BCS and its pre-

BCS Standings

The BCS Standings are composed of three elements that are weighted equally: the USA Today Coaches poll, 2) the Harris poll, and 3) the average of six computer poll rankings. The highest and lowest computer ranking is discarded each week with the computer average based on the remaining four rankings. The BCS Standings are compiled and released by the National Football Foundation eight times during the season, beginning this year on Sunday, October 16 and ending on BCS Selection Sunday, December 4.

decessors, the Bowl Coalition and Bowl Alliance, the top two teams had met in a bowl game only eight times in the previous 56 seasons. They have met in each of the last 13 seasons by BCS standards, and 10 of the last 13 seasons according to the Associated Press poll. The 2011 regular season (2012 bowl games) is the second year of the current four-year television agreement with ESPN, which will televise all five BCS games.

Six conferences (ACC, Big East, Big 12, Big Ten, SEC and Pac-10) have earned annual automatic qualification for the 2010-13

seasons by virtue of contracts to host the bowl games, and by having met a four-year metric based on competitive results (The ACC champion plays in the Discover Orange Bowl, the Big Ten and Pac-12 champs in the Rose Bowl presented by Vizio, Big 12 in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and SEC in the Allstate Sugar Bowl). Additionally, the highest-ranked champion of Conference USA, Mid-American, Mountain West, Sun Belt or Western Athletic conferences will be guaranteed a slot in a BCS game if that team is ranked 12th or higher in the final BCS standings, 16th or higher if its ranking is higher than that of a champion from one of the six conferences with automatic qualification.

Other teams are eligible to be selected at large by a bowl game if they finish among the top 14.

The champions of the Big Ten and the Pac-12 will play in the Rose Bowl if they do not qualify for the National Championship Game. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl if those teams are not ranked No. 1 or No. 2 in the final BCS Standings.

Bill Hancock, Executive Director

Longtime athletics administrator Bill Hancock was named the first Executive Director of the Bowl Championship Series on November 17, 2009 and, in doing so, achieved a unique double-double at the upper echelon of intercollegiate athletics. He was the first full-time director of the NCAA Final Four and is now the first executive director of the BCS. Hancock served for 13 years as director of the NCAA's Division I Men's Basketball Championship--the three-week March Madness event that culminates at the Final Four. After a family tragedy, he retired in 2002 and for three years was the tournament's media coordinator on a consulting basis before being named BCS administrator in October of 2005. He is a 1972 journalism graduate of the University of Oklahoma and worked in sports information at his alma mater and also on the staff of the Big Eight Conference before being named director of the Final Four in 1989.

ACC 2011 Football Championship Game Legends Class

Pro Football Hall of Famers Jim Otto of Miami and Chris Hanburger of North Carolina, 1983 ACC Player of the Year Ben Bennett of Duke Headline 2011 Class

Two members of the Professional Football Hall of Fame in former North Carolina linebacker **Chris Hanburger (Fayetteville, N.C.)** and former Miami center **Jim Otto (Wausau, Wis.)** and two-time ACC Player of the Year **Ben Bennett (Sunnyvale, Calif.)** of Duke, headline the ACC's Class of 2011 Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game Legends.

The Legends will be honored at this year's Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game weekend. They will be honored at the ACC Night of Legends event on Friday, Dec. 2, and during ceremonies at Bank of America Stadium for the 7th Annual Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship, which has an 8 p.m. kickoff on Dec. 3 and will be nationally televised by ESPN in both HD and 3-D.

The group of 12 former gridiron standouts from current ACC schools includes two former ACC players of the Year, three consensus first-team All-Americans, five first-team All-Americans, and eight players who combined for 74 years in the National or American Football League and a total of 94 years of professional football experience in either the NFL, AFL, Canadian Football League, World League of American Football or the Arena Football League. Nine of the Legends were drafted into the NFL or AFL, including four first-round draft choices.

In all, the collection of players combined for a national championship, a Canadian Football League Grey Cup, nine ACC team titles and three NFL Super Bowl appearances.

Otto (1957-59) started three seasons at center and linebacker for the Miami Hurricanes under legendary coach Andy Gustafson. Drafted in the first round by the fledgling American Football League, he signed with the Oakland Raiders in 1960 and began an unprecedented 15-year professional career as the prototypic pivotman. Voted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility in 1980, Otto was a 10-time AFL All-Star, a 10-time All-AFL team member and a three-time NFL All-Pro performer. He helped lead Oakland to the 1967 AFL Championship and a berth in Super Bowl

II. He started 210 consecutive games at center for the Raiders, 308 games in all, and was named to the AFL's all-time team. He is one of only 20 men to play in the American Football League for all 10 years of its existence. Otto wore the famous 00 number throughout his career. A native of Wausau, Wis., he now lives in Auburn, Calif.

Hanburger (1962-64), was a standout linebacker and center for the North Carolina teams of coach Jim Hickey in the early-to-mid 1960s. Named a first-team All-ACC selection as a center in both 1963 and 1964, he helped lead the 1963 Tar Heel team to a 9-2 record, a share of the ACC championship and a 35-0 win over Air Force in the Gator Bowl. Drafted on the 18th round of the 1965 NFL Draft by the Washington Redskins, Hanburger went on to play 14 seasons in Washington, where he earned nine Pro Bowl selections and was regarded as one of the best outside linebackers of his era. Inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame last Saturday at Canton, Ohio, he played in 187 NFL games and was voted to the All-NFL team four times. A mainstay of the dominant Washington Redskin teams of the 1970s, he made 19 career interceptions, returning them for 347 yards and two touchdowns. He led Washington to the 1972 NFC Championship and Super Bowl VII. That year, he was named the NFC Defensive Player of the Year. Originally a native of Fort Bragg in Fayetteville, N.C., he now lives in Darlington, S.C.

Bennett (1980-83), a pinpoint passer who was named ACC Player of the Year by the Associated Press in 1982 and 1983 and was named ACC Player of the Year by ACSMA in 1983, played three seasons for coach Red Wilson and one for coach Steve Sloan at Duke. He completed his collegiate career as the NCAA Division I record-holder for passing yards (9,614), pass attempts (1,375) and pass completions (820). The 1980 ACC Rookie of the Year, he benefitted from having Steve Spurrier as his offensive coordinator and set three NCAA freshman records in 1980 against Wake For-

est completing 38 of 62 passes for 469 yards. In his career he set seven NCAA, 15 ACC and 42 school records. Even 28 years later, he still ranks 6th on the ACC career passing yardage list, 3rd in passes attempted and 4th in passes completed. Drafted in the 6th round of the NFL Draft by the Atlanta Falcons, Bennett played only briefly for two seasons in the NFL, as well as briefly in United States Football League and the World League of American Football. He played all or parts of 10 seasons in the Arena Football League and threw for over 14,000 yards, while making five appearances in the ArenaBowl. He was inducted into the Arena Bowl Hall of Fame in 2000 and will be inducted into the Duke Athletics Hall of Fame on Sept. 9. A native of Sunnyvale, Calif., Bennett now resides in Orlando, Fla.

Joining them as 2011 ACC Legends this year are Boston College's **Stephen Boyd (Valley Stream, N.Y.)**, a two-time All-Big East selection at linebacker who helped lead the Eagles to three straight bowl appearances during the 1992, 1993 and 1994 seasons; Clemson's **Perry Tuttle (Lexington, N.C.)**, a first-team All-America wide receiver who was one of the most dangerous deep threats in ACC history; Georgia Tech's **Lucius Sanford (Milledgeville, Ga.)**, a first-team All-America who was one of the hardest-hitting linebackers in Yellow Jacket history; Maryland's **Rich Novak (Laurel, Md.)**, a standout quarterback for the Tom Nugent-coached Terrapin teams of the late 1950's and early 60's; Virginia Tech's **Mike Johnson (Landover, Md.)**, a standout defensive performer for the Bill-Doooley-coached Hokies of the early 1980's; and Wake Forest's **Larry Russell (Newburyport, Mass.)**, a two-time All-ACC performer who led the Deacons to the 1970 ACC championship.

Completing this year's Legends Class are a trio of consensus first-team All-Americans in NC State placekicker **Marc Primanti (Coatesville, Pa.)**, who set an ACC record for consecutive

field goals without a miss in 1996 that still stands today; Florida State's Andre Wadsworth (St. Croix, Virgin Islands), the 1997 ACC Player of the Year, who played on four consecutive ACC championship teams for the Seminoles' legendary Bobby Bowden; and Virginia's Chris Slade (Newport News, Va.), the ACC's all-time leader in quarterback sacks for the George Welsh-coached Cavalier squads of the early 1990's.

Boyd (1991-94) was twice named All-Big East and All-ECAC at linebacker for the Eagles in 1993 and 1994. He played his first three seasons under Tom Coughlan, and his final campaign with Coach Dan Henning. Boyd helped the Eagles compile a four-year record of 28-17-2 (.617) and play in three straight bowl games: the 1993 Hall of Fame Bowl; the 1994 Carquest Bowl and the 1994 Jeep-Eagle Aloha Bowl. Drafted in the 5th round by the Detroit Lions in the 1995 NFL Draft, he played seven seasons in the National Football League, all of them with the Lions. He started a total of 66 games during the 1995-2001 seasons. A two-time Pro Bowl selection for the Lions, he made 536 tackles from 1997-99. He was named an Associated Press 2nd-team All-Pro in 2000 and an All-NFC player for both 1999 and 2000 by the Football News. He currently is the head football coach at Chaminade High School in Minneola, N.Y. A native of Valley Stream, N.Y., he currently resides in Long Beach, N.Y.

Tuttle (1978-81) was one of the main offensive threats on Clemson teams which posted a sparkling 37-10 (.787) four-year record. He played one season under Charley Pell and three years for the Tigers' legendary head coach, Danny Ford. Tuttle was an integral part of the 1981 Clemson team which posted a perfect, 12-0 record and captured the ACC's second national football championship. He caught the game-winning touchdown pass in a 22-15 win over 4th-ranked Nebraska in the 1982 Orange Bowl Game, clinching the Tigers' first national gridiron title. A two-time first-team All-ACC wide receiver (1980-81), Tuttle had 150 career receptions for 2,534 yards and 17 touchdowns. He still ranks 5th on Clemson's career receiving lists in pass receptions and 3rd in reception yards and TD catches. A first round pick by the

Buffalo Bills in the 1982 NFL Draft, he played four seasons in the NFL and six years (1986-91) in the Canadian Football League with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers. During his time in the CFL, he had 321 career receptions for 5,817 yards and 41 TDs and helped lead Winnipeg to the 1990 CFL Grey Cup Championship. A native of Lexington, N.C., he currently lives in Charlotte, N.C.

Sanford (1974-77) was the defensive leader and four-year starter on the Pepper Rodgers-coached Georgia Tech teams of the mid to late 1970's. A fierce competitor and hard hitter on the field, he was the consummate linebacker, leading Tech in tackles in three of his four seasons and making 433 total stops—at the time a school record—during his collegiate career. He still ranks 4th on the Georgia Tech career tackle list. A three-time All-Southeastern Independent team selection at linebacker (1975-77), Sanford was named a first team All-America in 1977 by both the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) and The Sporting News. Selected in the 4th round of the 1978 NFL Draft by the Buffalo Bills, he played nine seasons with the Bills and his final campaign for the 1987 Cleveland Browns. In all, he played in 129 games in the NFL and recorded over 100 tackles in each of his first four pro seasons. A former Dean's List student at Georgia Tech, he currently serves as Executive Director of the Georgia Tech Letterwinner's Club and an Associate Director of Development for Athletics. Originally from Milledgeville, Ga., he now lives in Atlanta, Ga.

Novak (1959-61), one of the highest-regarded prep quarterbacks in the nation prior to entering Maryland, played under the innovative eye of Maryland head coach Tom Nugent, who is generally considered as the creator of the I-formation offense. A threat to run or pass, Novak completed 109 of 217 passes during his Terrapin career for 1,262 yards and 10 TDs. He also had 550 career rushing yards and led the Terrapins in 1959 in total offense. Novak, who shared playing time in Nugent's system with Dale Betty and Dick Shiner at quarterback, still earned honorable mention All-ACC honors by United Press International in

1960. He helped lead the Terrapins to an 18-12 (.600), three-year record. Known as Rich Novak now, he had good success against West Virginia, three times leading the Terrapins to wins over the Mountaineers. After his collegiate days, he eschewed professional football to begin a very successful business career. Formerly of Uniontown, Pa., Novak now resides in Greenwich, Conn.

Johnson (1980-83) was Virginia Tech's second most prominent defensive player of the 1980s behind only Outland Trophy winner Bruce Smith. He helped lead Tech to a four-year, 31-14 (.689) record which included a 9-2 mark in 1983, his senior season. He totaled 429 tackles for his career, leading the Hokies in tackling in 1982 and 1983 with 148 and 135 hits, respectively. An excellent student as well, Johnson, who majored in the demanding field of architecture, earned 2nd-team Academic All-America honors in 1982. Out of college he signed with the Philadelphia and later Baltimore Stars of the USFL, playing two seasons (1984-85) in the USFL. He helped the Stars win the USFL Championship in 1984. Drafted by the Cleveland Browns in the first round of the 1984 NFL Supplemental Draft (18th pick), he went on to a 10-year career in the National Football League, the first eight with the Browns, the final two with the Detroit Lions. He started 125 games and was twice named to the NFL Pro Bowl (1989, 1990). In 1989 he was named first-team All-AFC by both UPI and Pro Football Weekly. He had 13 career interceptions, returning two for touchdowns and added one fumble recovery for a score. He recorded a total of 1,146 career tackles, 26 forced fumbles and 13 fumble recoveries. Born in Southport, N.C., he was a native of Landover, Md., and currently resides in Forestville, Md.

Russell (1969-71), who was named All-ACC twice in 1970 and 1971, was the master of the triple-option Veer offense featured by Coach Cal Stoll's Wake Forest teams. Russell led the Deacons to the 1970 ACC Football title, the school's first, and then guided a Wake offense that set

the ACC's single-season rushing record for rushing yards per game (304.5) in 1971. The Deacons became the first ACC team to average over 300 yards rushing a game for a season; that record lasted 39 years until Georgia Tech broke it in 2010. Russell's total of 803 career rushing yards was an ACC record for quarterbacks at the time, at the time. He also set ACC single-season and career marks for rushing yards and touchdowns by a quarterback. In his senior season, he led the ACC in scoring and finished 9th nationally with 94 points (8.5 per game). A native of Newburyport, Mass., Russell lives now in Portsmouth, N.H.

Primanti (1995-96), who missed only four kicks of any kind in his two-year Wolfpack career, is one of the most accurate placekickers in ACC history. For his career, he made 51 of 52 PATs and 31 of 33 field goal attempts. In his senior season, he did not miss a kick at all, making all 24 PATs and 20 field goal attempts, and was named winner of the prestigious Lou Groza Golden Toe Award, presented annually to the nation's best placekicker. He set an ACC record over the 1995 and 1996 seasons, making 27 consecutive field goal attempts. A consensus first-team All-America in 1996, he was named a first-team All-America by the Associated Press, the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA), The Sporting News and Football News. He was also named first-team All-ACC in 1996. He still holds ACC records for

best field goal percentage for a season (1.000) and career (.912). Originally from Coatesville, Pa., he now resides in Raleigh, N.C.

Wadsworth (1994-97), who earned a scholarship at Florida State as a non-recruited 215-pound walk-on, developed into one of the most feared pass rushers in the ACC. A member of four ACC championship teams in 1994, 1995, 1996 and 1997, he helped FSU, coached by the legendary Bobby Bowden, to a four-year, 42-5-1 (.885) record including an 11-1 mark and a No. 3 final national ranking in his senior season. That year, he was named ACC Player of the Year after leading the league with 16 quarterback sacks and earning consensus first-team All-America honors. At no time in his collegiate career did Florida State fail to earn a national ranking of lower than 4th in the final AP poll. Wadsworth was named 2nd-team All-ACC in 1995 and 1996, earning first-team honors in 1997. He finished his career with 23 sacks. In the 1998 NFL Draft he was the third player chosen in the first round by the Arizona Cardinals, the highest-ever for a Seminole player. Hampered by nagging injuries and multiple knee surgeries, his pro career lasted but three seasons. Originally a native of St. Croix, the Virgin Islands who grew up in Miami, Fla., he currently resides in Scottsdale, Ariz.

Slade (1989-92) is the ACC's re-

cord-holder for quarterback sacks in a career, having recorded 40.0 during his four-year career with the Cavaliers. One of the defensive leaders for the Cavalier squads of the late 1980s and early 1990s coached by George Welsh, he became the first player in UVa history to earn back-to-back first-team All-America honors. He was named a first-team All-America in 1991 by College and Pro Football Weekly and earned consensus All-America honors in 1992, honored as a first-team All-America by AP, UPI, Football Writers of America (FWAA), the Walter Camp Foundation, The Sporting News and Football News. He was named Defensive Player of the Year by the Football News in 1992 and he led the ACC in sacks that year with 14. During his four years as a starter he helped lead Virginia to a 33-14-1 (.698) record and three consecutive bowl trips. Selected in the 2nd round of the 1993 NFL Draft by the New England Patriots, he played nine seasons in the NFL, the first eight with the Patriots. He was named to the NFL's Pro Bowl in 1997 and made 98 starts in his career with 53.5 career sacks. He finished his pro career with over 600 tackles and was a member of the New England team which played in Super Bowl XXXI. A native of Newport News, Va., he now resides in Atlanta, Ga., and serves as the football sideline reporter for the UVa radio network.

ACC Overtime Games

The ACC & Overtime

When Virginia defeated Idaho in overtime on Oct. 1, it marked the 56th time an ACC team has had to go to extra sessions. Of the 56 overtime contests, a large portion of them--24--have been played in the month of September. Games have gone into overtime for ACC teams a total of 13 times in November, while 12 have been played in October, three in August, three in December and one in January (2006 FedEx Orange Bowl). Of the 56 overtime contests, 28 have been ACC games while 28 non-conference games have gone into overtime. The home team has a 31-20 advantage in the 50 games played on campus. The team which wins the toss has a 27-29 record. 41 of the games were decided in the first overtime with 11 games in double overtime and four in triple overtime.
