ECW National Board Fall Meeting

Triennial Theme Selected; Social Justice <u>Committee Mission Statement Adopted</u>

This past October ECW National President, The Rev. Deacon Nancy R. Crawford, conducted the first full board meeting of the 2012-2015 ECW National Board at the Toddhal Retreat Center in Columbia, II. One of the first orders of business was to select the theme for the new triennium. The board unanimously accepted the theme—*Stir Up The Spirit: ¡Celebremos!* —for the 48th ECW Triennial Meeting to be held in Salt Lake City, July 2015. The initial inspiration for the chosen theme was 2 Timothy 1:6—*Hence I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you, though the laying on of hands; for God did not give us a spirit of timidity but a spirit of power and love and self control.*

During the four day meeting of the ECW Board in Columbia, II, the Social Justice Committee –at its first meeting wrote and adopted a mission statement: *Globally, we embody the call of Christ and His redemptive love, bearing witness to Him, carrying on His work of reconciliation in the world, striving for justice and peace among all people, and respecting the dignity of every human being.* Deborah Gardiner, Diocese of West Texas, the ECW National Board Member-at-Large Social Justice, serves as the chair of the Social Justice Committee.

The Spring UTO Ingathering on Saturday, May 19 was hosted at Andrew's Church, Bronx by The Rev. Charles W. Simmons, Priest-in Charge, and the St. Andrew's Episcopal Church Women. Bishop Andrew D. Smith was the preacher at the Eucharist Service. Following the Service, our luncheon speaker, The Rev. Martha Overall, Bishop's Vicar, St. Ann's Church, Bronx, spoke about the outreach work of St. Ann's feeding and other outreach programs.

The Fall UTO Ingathering was held at the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine in St. James Chapel on Wednesday, November 14 –the feast day for the Consecration of Samuel Seabury, *First American bishop*, *1874*. In his homily The Rev. Canon Tom P. Miller described Bishop Seabury's part in laying down the Episcopal Church's foundation and how today through the UTO we carry on the early missionary spirit. Our luncheon speaker, The Rev Nathanael Saint-Pierre, gave a power-point presentation which portrayed the devastation of the 2010 Haiti earthquake in Port-au-Prince including the heavily damaged Holy Trinity Cathedral. In particular he spoke about the violence against women which has ensued in the tent cities set-up in the aftermath of the earthquake.

Our thanks and appreciation to all who took part in last year's Ingatherings, as well as, all the donors. In 2012 a total of \$18,643.00 was sent to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society for the UTO grants which will be awarded this year.

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102nd Annual Clement Clarke Moore Candle Light Carol Service

It was the Sunday before Christmas, December 23, 2012, at The Church of the Intercession, 155th Street and Broadway, and all through the church carols were sung. And in keeping with a 102 year-old New York Christmas tradition, a poem by Clement Clarke Moore was read.

By 4 p.m. The Church of Intercession was filled with people. As the congregation stood the procession began singing "O come, O come Emmanuel." The bidding prayers by The Rev. José R. Gándara-Perea, Priest-in-Charge, were offered: "People of God. In this Christmas Season quickly approaching, let it be our duty and delight to hear once more the music of the angels." Then the Great Procession started singing "Hark! the herald angels sing" and "Angels we have heard on high" both in English and Spanish.

During the service there were also music selections by the New York Institute of Special Education and bass baritone Harvey Burney—one of The Church of the Intercession's very own.

Clement Clarke Moore was a man of many accomplishments. He was a professor of oriental and Greek literature at Cambridge College, a talented organist and known for his generosity. He died in 1863. On November 29, 1899 his remains were moved to the Trinity Church Cemetery. Dr. Moore is said to have composed "A Visit from St. Nicholas" on Christmas Eve, 1822 to amuse his children Clement, Charity and Emily. The poem became a beloved holiday classic.

Toward the end of the candlelight service children were invited to come to the chancel steps and hear the poem. The children sat on a rug for the reading by Pat Booth who formerly served as co-anchor for NBC 4 News.

Once the poem was finished there was the arrival of St. Nicholas who is famed as the traditional patron Saint of Seafarers and Sailors and more especially of children. He is better known to us as Santa Claus.

St. Nicholas led the Candlelight Procession to Trinity Church Cemetery and Mausoleum across the street from the church. Glo-sticks were distributed to everyone. A wreath was laid at Clement Clarke Moore's grave. A reception followed at the cemetery's Chapel of Resurrection. Fun was had by all—a Merry Christmas for all—and for all a good night.

The service collection went towards the maintenance and ministry of The Church of the Intercession.


M arie McCullough, an ardent member of St. Paul's, Bronx gives back to her community as she has been taught. May 19, 2013 will mark Marie's 22nd *Aids Walk NY*. Marie proudly states that she, accompanied by her mother, completed her first walk in 1990. As a registered nurse, Marie had taken care of many patients with AIDS, and had worked amidst the brutality of AIDS in its early stages. She saw the fear, pain and despair which this disease left in its aftermath. It wasn't until the deaths of three personal acquaintances that she was prompted to join the effort of walking to raise funds for the cause.

Similar efforts of helping those in need have spurred her on throughout the years. She has completed fund raising walks for Juvenile Diabetes with JDRF, for breast and ovarian cancer through SHARE (self help for women with breast or ovarian cancer) and for mental health with NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness). In addition, for the last five years she has participated in the Avon Walk for breast cancer which extends to two days while walking thirty nine miles. The death of Marie's childhood friend from breast cancer increased her desire to "do something." Marie enjoys the camaraderie she receives from the people she meets on these walks. Being there and witnessing a survivor make the finish line and overcome yet another challenge is quite momentous. "I will never forget the women who were in active treatment [as] manifested by the sparse growth of hair on their heads, being helped across the finish line by friends and fellow walkers crying because they had faced another challenge successfully."

Marie stresses that she has been blessed with health and as a senior, in spite of some aches and pains she is willing to do what she can; "it's just that simple for me."

CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB 2012 REPORT



By the time this Episcopal Church Women's newsletter reaches you, we have begun the observance of Lent. I pray that this forty days journey of discipline and sacrifice will bring us all closer to God.

Spring brings renewal; renewal of choice to support our Episcopal institutions and ministries. One such ministry is the Church Periodical Club which supplies books, magazines, tapes, videos and computer programs free to those who cannot otherwise obtain them and to raise the money to do this. In 2012, Church Periodical Club gratefully received donations from eleven parishes within the Diocese of New York. For the past two years, our receipts were enough to support our first year seminarians and to assist the National Book Fund which grants annually and responds to requests for books and related materials around the world. Unfortunately, this year we were unable to provide assistance to both of these groups. The 2012 National Book Fund committee approved six domestic grants for the amount of \$14,857.40 and thirty eight overseas grants for the amount of \$9,960 30. It is my fervent prayer that Church Periodical Club through donations from the parishes within the Diocese will be able to assist with fulfilling these grants in 2013.

In 1988, the Miles of Pennies (MOP) fund was established; its purpose was to award grants for the purchase of books for school aged children through the age of twelve. The maximum grant allowed is \$844.80 which represents one mile of pennies. In 2012, a collection of pennies totaling \$94.25 from St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, Bronx and the Church of Ascension, Mount Vernon was forwarded to CPC Office Administrator, Pam Stewart, 815 Second Avenue, New York. In 2012, there were eighteen miles of pennies grants distributed which totaled \$11,806.60. I urge each of you to save and send me your pennies in jars, cans or even socks. I will roll them, exchange them for a bank check, acknowledge the amount to your parish and forward to CPC NY on your parish's behalf. Some handy points to remember are:

- 1. Miles of Pennies grants are distributed year round upon request and as funds permit,
- 2. The deadline for grant applications each year is April 15.
- 3. Seminarians' checks are generally fulfilled after enrollment in September.

Thanks to all who consistently support Church Periodical Club's National Book Fund and Miles of Pennies fund within the Diocese of New York.
