


FINDING SOMETHING TO AFFIRM: REDISCOVERING JOY

We find joy as we journey through life and, if we are very fortunate, rediscover it when at last we stop a while to reflect. Here, too, is poetry at its best. Journey through the simple affirmations of joy that poetry provides. Discussion begins and ends with the conundrum of the Buddha: did he receive enlightenment because he sought it, or because at last he sat under a tree. and it came to him? Walt Whitman, Emily Dickinson, Carl Sandburg, E. E. Cummings, Gerard Manley Hopkins and Robert Browning help to define the controlling premise; classic poets in the canon like William Wordsworth are part of the discussion. There is perspective in the art of Corita Kent, the music of Beethoven, and plays and novels by Thornton Wilder, Alice Walker, C. S. Lewis, and Amy Tan.

ICONIC ACTRESSES: DESPERATE DAMES OF THE 50S

Audiences of the 1950s were still feeling the effects of WWII when they were suddenly thrust into a new conflict in Korea. As with most wartime cinema, theatergoers yearned for films that would allow them to escape reality - musicals, comedies, and soldier stories in which the hero always won. Women had begun to fade into the woodwork, after dominating the cinema of the 1940s, and were slowly being shoved into supportive wife and girlfriend roles or cast as childish ditzy blondes and sizzling, sexy eye candy. A select few actresses, however, eschewed the niceties and delicateness required of 50s females and took on psychologically complex characters who battled against overpowering forces to keep their identities intact. Sometimes they won, sometimes they lost, but they were always riveting. Take look at some of the stellar performances which, with honesty and passion, brought to light important social issues never before explored onscreen.

BEYOND THE LOOM: A HISTORY OF NAVAJO WEAVING

Once the weaver's task is complete and the finished product is taken from the loom, what happens to it? Beyond the loom, woven textiles become many things: garments, blankets, floor coverings, trade items, art objects, and study examples in museum collections. Study the research of anthropologist Joe Ben Wheat of the University of Colorado Museum in Boulder. Dr. Lange was a colleague of Joe Ben Wheat's from 1985-1998 at the University of Colorado Museum and succeeded him as Curator of Anthropology. The lectures highlight the archival research, the testing of dyes, and the description of design styles. Images of over 100 important Pueblo, Navajo, and Hispanic textiles from the University of Colorado permanent collection form the core of the course. A field trip will be made to the Autry Museum in Los Angeles to see their textile collection.

AN ARCHITECTURAL HISTORY OF WESTERN CIVILIZATION

Search the origins of man's need for shelter, as well as, man's artistic expression in architecture. Begin at the dawn of civilization in the fertile Crescent of Mesopotamia, and work westward through Egypt, Greece and Rome. Learn why the Parthenon is considered the greatest architectural wonder of the world, and explore the fall of Rome and the consequences of the Dark Ages to the rebirth of the Renaissance in Central Italy. Study the rise of the national architectural identities of France and England during the Age of Enlightenment, and learn about the many modern architectural features and patterns established during this period. Finally, cross the Atlantic and study the phenomenon of architecture in America during the Golden Age.

THE SEARCH FOR THE HISTORICAL JESUS: WHAT THE HISTORIANS ARE SAYING

Believers say that Jesus was the Son of God. Historians say he may never even have existed. Biblical scholars point out that even the New Testament authors and scholars can't agree on who Jesus was. Examine the historical evidence for Jesus's existence, and evaluate the main claims Christianity has made about him. By Course end, we will arrive at a new and very different understanding of who the historical Jesus was. Using major works such as The Quest for the Historical Jesus, by Albert Schweitzer, the findings of Hermann Samuel Reimarus, D. F. Strauss, Ernest Renan and William Wrede (the socalled First Quest), to Gunther Bornkamm, Ernst Kasemann and James Robinson of The Second Quest.

MINERALS IN HUMAN LIFE

Minerals have intrigued humans throughout history due to their durability, environmental and technological applications, beauty and rarity. Some minerals and gemstones, many believe, possess magical powers, which make them be a symbol of wealth, power, healing, and love. Many known terrestrial minerals are main compounds of our buildings, cars, bicycles, electronic devices, and cosmetic applications. Discuss geological concepts and mineral deposits formation; their utilization from ancient time to present; principles of identification of minerals; synthetic gemstones versus natural, precious metals; sources of gemstones; and their grading, appraising and marketing. Learn how to determine whether or not a gem is artificial, treated, or natural. Perfect for jewelry collectors, enthusiastmineralogists, amateur-geologists, school teachers, and anyone else who wishes to better understand the intriguing world of minerals and gemstones.

The legacy of exceptionalism in America has historically been in tension with the liberal freedoms granted in the U.S. Constitution. Stemming from John Winthrop's reference to a "shining city on the hill" American Exceptionalism has been a source of ongoing interpretation and debate within American culture and politics. Yet at the start of the 21st century, America is undergoing global shifts in power, position, and influence. Does this mean that American Exceptionalism has run out?


