

MERIT BADGE COUNSELORS

Gateway Area Council has resurrected and revised the merit badge counselor list. Scouts in need of merit badge counselors may call the Scout Office to obtain names and contact information. Leaders in search of assistance in teaching various subjects may also find this list a valuable resource.

According to BSA policy, merit badge counselors must be registered with the council. Anyone who submitted a merit badge counselor form more than 2 years ago is most likely no longer on the list. If you think you might fall into this category, please contact the Scout Office to check. The form only takes a few minutes to resubmit. It can be downloaded at *gatewayareacouncil.org*. (click on "resources" and then "forms") and mailed to or dropped at the office. In order to keep the list current, the Council requests that registration forms be renewed every two to three years

There is no registration fee for those who sign on just for that purpose.

If your background could make you a good counselor for any of the merit badges listed below, please consider signing up!

If you know someone - even a non-scouter - who might be knowledgeable and willing, please encourage them to become involved.

The need for counselors is council-wide. If your troop has counselors registered only to work with your troop, please ask them if they would be willing to work with scouts from neighboring troops as well. The preference indicated on their registration form can be updated with a guick phone call.

OUTDOOR ETHICS



As the Outdoor Ethics Advocate for the Council, I will continue writing a short tidbits about ethical and proper behavior in the outdoors. The topic for this issue is a continuation from the last issue:

Plan ahead and BE PREPARED

Benefits of Good Meal Planning:

- Reduced trash.
- Reduced pack weight, resulting in faster hiking times and less fatigue.

Reduced dependence upon campfires for cooking.

One-Pot Meals and Food Repackaging

Planning for one-pot meals and light weight snacks requires a minimum of packing and preparation time, lightens loads and decreases garbage. One-pot meals require minimal cooking utensils and eliminate the need for a campfire. Two backpack stoves can be used to cook all meals for large groups if you have two large pots (one large pot can be balanced on two stoves when quick heating is desired). Remember, a stove Leaves No Trace.

Most food should be removed from its commercial packing and placed in sealable bags before packing your backpacks. Sealable bags secure food and reduce bulk and garbage. Empty bags can be placed inside each other and packed out for reuse at home. This method can reduce the amount of garbage your group must pack out at the end of the trip and eliminate the undesirable need of stashing or burying unwanted trash.

What are Some Examples of the Results of Poor Trip Planning?

A group that is inexperienced or unfamiliar with the geography of an area may put people at risk by traveling through areas susceptible to flash floods or along ridge tops vulnerable to lightning activity. Groups traveling arid lands often fail to carry adequate water or a way of purifying water from natural sources. Checking with local land managers and studying maps and weather conditions can contribute to a low-risk existence.

A poorly prepared group may plan to cook meals over a campfire only to discover upon arrival at their destination that a fire ban is in effect or that firewood is in scarce supply. Such groups often build a fire anyway breaking the law or impacting the land simply because they have not planned for alternatives. Fire bans and scarce wood supplies are signs that an area is experiencing the cumulative effects of heavy recreation use.

A group that has failed to develop good travel plans may be unable to travel as fast as expected. The terrain may be too steep or the trails too rugged. These groups often resort to setting up camp late at night, sometimes in an unsafe location. Poor campsite selection usually leads to unnecessary resource damage. In addition, the group may never even reach their planned destination.



<u>WHO:</u> Cub Scout Camporee is open to all tiger, wolf and Bear Scouts. There must be a scout to adult ratio of 1 to 1 for overnight camping. Tigers must be with a parent the entire weekend.

<u>WHAT:</u> Cub Scout Camporee is an overnight event that is packed with adventure! Campers can stay indoors (space is limited) or outside in tents. (you must provide your own tent). Packs are encouraged to reserve a camp site if their entire pack will be attending.

WHEN: May 14-15th 2010. All registration forms must be into the office by May 5th

WHERE: Camp Decorah Forest off ye old Hwy 53 on Council Bay Road

<u>PROGRAM:</u> Activities include sling shots, archery, crafts and a few mid-evil guests. Scouts will earn their Archery belt loop. Most events will take place outdoors with all meals served in the dining hall.

Lunch:

Lunches will not be provided. Each participant must bring their own lunch. Also please be aware to have your scouts bring enough water and fluids for the day.

Don't forget to bring sunscreen and bug spray!

Action Items:

- Please select a Day Camp Coordinator to oversee the youth during the program <u>and</u> a volunteer to help in running the stations and activities. There should be a ratio of 2 adult volunteers to 10 Cub Scout participants, and 1 to 1 with Tiger Cub participants.
- Collect sign ups, registration/health forms and a Pack check to cover fees. <u>All registration items must be turned in as a pack!</u>

Medication and Health History:

Each youth and adult must have a health history form filled out and on file with the Day Camp medical person. This is not a physical, merely a health history. Completed forms should be sent in with your Pack Reservation. The health history form can be found on the back of this flyer for your convenience.

Medication can only be given with permission of a parent or guardian. Cub Scouts that require medication given to them during camp must complete the "Orders for Medication" for that can be found on the Gateway Area Council and Camp Decorah Websites as well as the Scout Service Center.



Scout Builds Gazebo

Brian Quinn's Eagle Scout project was finished last week and — thanks to the generous contributions of

numerous organizations and individuals — the results will benefit the West Salem community for years to come.

Quinn began looking last year for a project to complete the requirements for Eagle Scout. "It started last

August," Quinn said, 'I went to the Recreation Department looking for ideas on things I could do."

"He wanted to know if we had any projects that might be suitable for an Eagle Scout and we told him about the plan for putting a gazebo up at Lake Neshonoc," said Michelle Czerwan, West Salem parks and recreation director. "He was intrigued by the idea, took it home and talked about and applied with the scouts to do it."

The bulk of the money for the project came from a Lions Club donation, but there were also contributions from the Friends of Lake Neshonoc, the Lake Neshonoc Lake District and the West Salem Area Community Foundation.

Quinn got help from about 20 scouts in Troop 77, but was deeply involved from start to finish. "To my understanding," said Czerwan, "this was a much bigger undertaking than most Eagle Scout projects. Brian took it and ran with it — he did a great job!"

For his part, Quinn said it wouldn't have been possible without a lot of help. "Brickl Brothers did all the design work and Bill Craig from Craig Custom Builders really helped me a lot, too," he said.

The steel for the project had to be made by Wehrs Machine, the foundation was poured by River City Ready Mix and Culpitt Roofing did the roofing.

Other businesses that contributed time, supplies, money or labor included Amerhart, Fastenal, Fairway Painting and Brush Talk Signs.

"It looks really nice," Czerwan said of the finished product.

Quinn said he's learned a lot about the construction process — knowledge that could come in handy next next year in college. He plans to study construction at the University of Wisconsin-Stout. .
