

MESSAGE FROM THE DEAN



It has been an exciting time in the College of Health Sciences since the last edition of The Pulse. This edition gives you a good sense of what has been happening. Here are a couple of examples of what is contained in these pages.

The annual Integrative Health Conference will be held on March 28 and 29, 2008. The keynote address will be given by one of our

own, Dr. Jeff Harris, a professor in our nutrition/dietetics program. Our theme is "Integrative Nutrition." Please attend if you can.

Included are brief bios on our newest faculty, updates from our departments, updates from some of our faculty, descriptions of upcoming ACEER activities, and more.

The Sturzebecker Hall of Fame Awards luncheon was held once again in the fall. Photos are included inside this edition.

Congratulations to Ray Zetts who was appointed by me as interim associate dean of our college. Ray has been chair and associate professor in the Department of Kinesiology. He came to the University as a faculty person in the college in 1996. Among other things, Ray will focus on enhancing our student assessment practices, growing our graduate program, and examining internal operating matters of the college. I look forward to working with Ray even more closely than I have in the past. We are conducting a national search for a permanent associate dean.

New Nursing Program

Advance 2 BSN is a program that was developed to be responsive to the present and projected nursing shortage. The program is for those who already have a bachelor degree in another major, desire to learn the art and science of nursing, and earn a bachelor of science degree in nursing (BSN). Graduates of this program are then eligible to take the NCLEX (National Council on Licensure Examination) upon successful completion of the program.

The course work is identical to the traditional four year nursing program, with one exception: students complete the program in 17 consecutive months. Applicants must have completed a number of prerequisites before applying to the program, and admission is very competitive.

A new and creative format was designed to facilitate completion of the program requirements in 17 months, which makes this program ideally suited for the adult learner. Students attend classes throughout the summer. During the fall and spring semesters, students attend class during the week and fulfill their clinical requirements on Saturdays and Sundays.

The first cohort of 20 students began in May 2006 and will complete their degree in December 2008. Students in this cohort come from various backgrounds including physical therapy, nutrition, respiratory therapy, psychology, business, and public health to mention a few. Interest in the program continues to be high. The department has received over 180 application requests for the cohort to begin in May 2008.

BREATHE: A New School-Based Stress Reduction Program

From January to March of 2007, 123 seniors at Villa Maria Academy High School in Malvern, Pa., participated in a new mindfulness-based, stress-reduction program, called BREATHE, as part of their health curriculum. The program was created by Dr. Trish Broderick, professor of health, to teach stress-reduction and emotion-regulation skills by fostering mindfulness. Each of the six sessions in the program included mindfulness-based techniques in a format that was interactive and developmentally appropriate. Specifically, class sessions included discussion, activities related to the core message of the lesson, and some form of mindfulness meditation practice.

Stress is a common concern of adolescents, particularly for seniors facing the transition from high school to college or to the world of work. This program provided them the opportunity to learn about mindfulness and practice cultivation of present-moment attention as a new way to reduce stress, enhance motion regulation and emotional balance, foster health and wellness, and facilitate academic success.

Because it is designed to be used in classrooms, BREATHE complements traditional academic goals by supporting the development of social and motional learning (SEL) competencies. Recent research has demonstrated the effectiveness of SEL curricula for a wide variety of academic and social outcomes. Currently, many schools have implemented SEL requirements for their academic programs because of the increased recognition of the interconnectedness of academic, emotional, and social learning.

Students enjoyed the program, and outcome assessments clearly showed that they were receptive to the usefulness and importance of mindfulness-based, stress-reduction techniques.

New Faculty Joining the Ranks for 2007-08



NICOLE ARMSTRONG is an instructor in the Department of Sports Medicine. She is working on her Ph.D. in kinesiology at Temple University, received her M.P.H. from West Chester University, where she had served as a temporary instructor since 2004, and her B.S. in exercise and sport science from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. Nicole's chief research interest is in evidence-based medicine. She has also been a substitute high-school teacher in Myrtle Beach, S.C.; an athletic trainer for Broomall Total Health, in Broomall, Pa.; and a transition program athletic trainer for the Crozer Chester Medical Center, Springfield, Pa. Nicole is a certified athletic trainer and a member of the National Athletic Trainer's Association.

TRISH BRODERICK has been reassigned as a professor to the Department of Health. She comes to us from the Department of Counseling and Educational Psychology where she had been a professor since 1995. She earned her B.A. at Alvernia College, M.A. at Villanova University, and Ph.D. at Temple University. In the College of Education, she taught courses in human development across the lifespan, issues and trends in counseling, educational psychology, counseling techniques, and practicum. In the Department of Health, she will teach courses related to mental health, stress management, and mind/body medicine. She has published a textbook, co-authored with Pamela Blewitt of Villanova University, titled "The Life Span: Human Development for Helping Professionals" (Merrill-Prentice



Hall, 2003). Trish is a licensed psychologist in Pennsylvania, a nationally certified counselor, certified school psychologist (K-12), and certified school counselor (K-12). In addition, she also has a certificate in cognitive therapy and professional training in Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction (MBSR). Trish is working on developing a Center for Stress Reduction in the CHS.



MARY BETH GILBOY joins the Department of Health as assistant professor. After earning her B.S. in nutrition and dietetics from Marywood College and completing the R.D. credential, Mary Beth received her M.P.H. in nutrition from University of North Carolina. She worked with the National Health Service Corps as a public health nutritionist prior to beginning her career in higher education. Mary Beth received her Ph.D. in health education from Temple University. Before joining the WCU faculty, Mary Beth was a curriculum coordinator and assistant professor at the Community College of Philadelphia and assistant professor at Immaculata University. She is active in many community nutrition professional groups and has worked as a consultant in school nutrition. Mary Beth's interests

include the role of teachers in school nutrition, community nutrition and dietetics education.

ROBIN CALDWELL LEONARD is an associate professor in the Department of Health. After earning a B.S. in biology from the College of Charleston, she earned a Ph.D. in human genetics from the Medical College of Virginia and held NIH postdoctoral fellowships in epidemiology at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill and the Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health. Her doctoral dissertation is a study of cystinuria in an inbred Native American community. Robin's experiences span government, academia, and the corporate world. She is currently the principal research epidemiologist for the DuPont Company, where she most recently designed and managed a company-wide epidemiology program. She also served as ARCO Chemical Company manager for epidemiology and principal anidomiologist and was a scientist with the Brankhayan National Laboratory. A frequent lecturer in her



epidemiologist and was a scientist with the Brookhaven National Laboratory. A frequent lecturer in her field and the author of numerous publications, she is the co-author of the newly published book Applied Epidemiology for the Industrial Hygienist. Robin began her tenure track position in January.



SIMMAN and SIMBABY It laughs, it cries, it wets...

At first glance it might seem like a dream gift for a little girl, but the newest addition to the Nursing Laboratory is actually an advanced patient-care simulator called SimBaby. Thanks to a generous \$31,000 grant from The McLean Contributionship of Bryn Mawr, Pa., West Chester nursing students will be able to hone their clinical skills in realistic role-playing using this state-of-the-art technological marvel.

SimBaby joins SimMan, which was recently acquired with funds from a \$65,000 state Technology Fee grant for shared use by the Nursing, Kinesiology, and Sports Medicine departments. Both "Sims" will reside in the Nursing Lab.

SimBaby, like SimMan, is an alternative solution to patient-care training that can be used to teach individuals or groups. Featuring realistic anatomy and clinical function, SimBaby and SimMan provide simulation-based education to challenge and test students' clinical and decision-making skills during realistic patient-care scenarios. Both "Sims" are programmable, interactive, and technologically advanced mannequins allowing students to practice the emergency treatment of patients.

According to Ann Stowe, Department of Nursing Chair, the "Sims" can be programmed in numerous challenging scenarios to help students learn to deal with life-or-death situations without ever putting a patient at risk. Usually the image of a "patient dummy," is a passive mannequin that just lies there while a student practices such things as needle sticks. SimMan can do that, but he also can be programmed to complain that the student

is hurting him; SimBaby can actually cry. Either way, the two patient-care simulators can do much more while providing students with the opportunity not only to practice and improve their techniques but also to test their skills and decision making with more complex or rarer situations they otherwise might not see.

In addition to being used for enhancing nursing skills, this exciting new simulator technology is also intended for use in such courses as Athletic Injury Management in the Department of Sports Medicine as well as Clinical Exercise Testing and Prescription in the Department of Kinesiology, among others.



The ACEER is partnering with the Amazon Herb Company to bring ACEER's ¡AMIGOS! Environmental Education programs to rural villages along the Rio Pisqui and near Pulcallpa in Peru's central rainforest. This expansion is made possible by a generous grant of \$50,000 to ACEER by the Amazon Herb Company. Aura Murrieta, ACEER's Director of Peru Programs is meeting with members of the native communities to assess their needs. Implementation of teacher training and provision of learning materials to all village schools is expected in time for the start of the new Peruvian school year later this spring.

John Easterling, Amazon Herb Company's founder and CEO, has spent nearly 30 years in Amazonia. Through his vision and leadership, Amazon Herb Company has assisted the indigenous peoples of this region by:

- Sponsoring the formation of the Rio Pisqui Federation. This federation represents all of the natives along the isolated Pisqui River. As a united Federation these communities will be better able to protect and defend their land, way of life and traditional knowledge. They will also be able to better provide education for their children, safeguard their culture and right for self-determination. Together and collectively empowered, they will advocate for laws that favor native communities, as it pertains to social, economic and political issues.
- Assisting the 200 Shipibo inhabitants of the small village of Porvenir to secure legal ownership to 13,000 acres of land that sustains their way of life.
- Creating an ecological reserve near Yarinacocha, Peru, to protect it from logging and other development. The reserve
 contains a small camu-camu grove that is harvested twice a year. Ecologically harvesting herbs has produced a valuable new
 income source for the region.
