The women opened the playoffs last weekend as the 11th seed, but upset LA City College, the 6th seed, by a 69-65 margin. The Chargers continue their post-season play with a visit to Antelope Valley, where they play the 3rd seed Marauders at 7 p.m. on Saturday.

The winner secures a berth in the state championship tournament.

His responsibilities at the District included significant interaction with the campuses.

#### Classified Employee Nominations Due March 11

Cypress College is proud to announce its 10th Annual Classified Employee of the Year award. This award will be given to a permanent classified employee who represents the dedication and commitment to making Cypress College an outstanding learning environment for our students.

This award offers the opportunity for administrators, faculty, classified staff, and students, to honor outstanding classified employees. Nominations are due March 11.

#### CHARGERS

The men's basketball coaches of the Orange Empire Conference selected freshman guard **Tim Austin** to the first team. Austin led the Chargers in conference scoring (17.3 points per game) and rebounds (6.8 rebounds per game). He scored well consistently throughout conference, highlighted by a 25 point game against Santa Ana.

Sophomore forward John Staats was named to the second team. Staats led Cypress in three-point field goals in conference (32) while averaging 11.8 points per game.



#### Quortlyn O'Neal,

a freshman guard on the women's basketball team, was named conference most-valuable player (see related story on page 1). O'Neal led the conference in both scoring and rebounding (18.6 points per game, 10.5 rebounds per game).

Sophomore guard

Sequana Norris was named to the first team for the second year in a row. Norris led the conference in steals and averaged 15.8 points per game.

Norris and O'Neal were the top vote getters in the selection process.

Michelle Salemi was voted to the second team all-conference.

## BUDGET NEW\$

A report on Cypress College's Budget Situation

#### The following information was provided by Karen Cant, Vice President of Administrative Services following approval of a revised state budget:

I'm sure the news has already reached you that an 18-month state budget has been approved. While this concludes one phase of the budget challenge facing California this is by no means the end of the discussion.

To quote Erik Skinner the system Vice-Chancellor of Fiscal Policy, "While today's vote brings some temporary resolution to the budget process, I urge you to stay actively involved. The weeks and months ahead will present new challenges as the economy continues to sputter and, as a result, the state will face new fiscal challenges. As this occurs, we will need to be vigilant and active in order to continue to protect the capacity of the community colleges to serve Californians. For the moment, we will pause to take a breath and analyze the fine print in the budget package. But tomorrow we must begin preparing for the next round."

The community colleges have been treated very well in this budget ... yet this is still a budget that relies on significant tax increases, borrowing, a May 19 ballot, and deferral of payments to balance. We fully expect to have a revision of this budget proposed in the Governor's May Revise.

For this reason we will move forward with caution continuing to monitor purchase requisitions being submitted for both the 08/09 and 09/10 year and to analyze proposed budget reductions. Please continue to include detailed justifications in the document text of each requisitions for now. Since 09/10 requisitions are not released to vendors until July 1 — there is still the potential to pull back on purchases up until that point should budget news over the next few months turn south on us.

#### Details of the budget were provided by Scott Lay, president and CEO of the Community College League of California (additional information is in the February 20 edition of @Cypress):

Here are the highlights for community colleges:

- 2008-09: Eliminates the approved 0.68% cost-of-living adjustment (-\$39.8 million)
- 2008-09: Reduces state funding for mandates (-\$4 million)
- 2008-09: Defers \$340 million in state payments to the 2009-10 fiscal year (replacing \$245 million deferral approved in existing 2008-09 budget; minimizes state borrowing and reduces Prop. 98 guarantee)
- 2009-10: Funds 3% enrollment growth (\$185.4 million), enough funds for 36,000 new full-time equivalent students
- 2009-10: Maintains funding for the Competitive Cal Grants program, which provides 22,500 grants annually to needy non-traditional students
- Generally: Since there were no categorical or general apportionment cuts, language to allow categorical flexibility was not included
- Future: Places a measure on the next statewide ballot (now scheduled to be May 19) to repay K-12 and community colleges \$9.3 billion over seven years beginning in 2011-12.

#### Impact on Cypress College and the District

It will still be another 3-4 weeks before sufficient detail and analysis are available to determine the exact impact to the college and District, according to Cant. Initial estimates indicate a \$3.6 million District-wide reduction in the current budget year and the upcoming 2009-2010 budget. However, as noted above, that still could change dramatically in the May Revise Budget.

- 5. The winner of the award will be announced at the Classified Appreciation Luncheon on Friday, April 24.



Albert, 11 years clean and sober, has had a very rocky road to success. He shares with us that being diagnosed with ADHD and oppositional defiant disorder had set the path for a life of destruction. By the time he was 12 years old, he had indulged in just about every illegal narcotic on the street. He was initiated into a street gang at age thirteen and by age 24, he had spent about seven years of his life in jail. This lifestyle continued until he was 37. Albert has now successfully turned his life around and has become a role model for his children, especially his daughter, Mia, who was his reason and motivation for becoming clean and sober.

Albert shares that he is thankful to the many people who work in the EOPS, CARE & CalWORKs program. Kelly Grimes, Lili Perez-Stroud, Michele Dugan and Arnette Edwards were just a few of the names he mentioned. He said that what helped him the most was the relationships he developed and the motivational support that these programs provided. He also shared that while attending Cypress College, he didn't feel alone and that our program was able to convince him that he had what it took to succeed.

These days, he spends his time helping others who are struggling with drug addiction so they too can turn their life around.

We hope you all applied for your FAFSA during the priority filing period. Missing the March 2 deadline may jeopardize the types of grants a student receives. For example, the cost of attendance for a typical dependent living with their parents is about \$9,196 for the academic year. The expected family contribution would depend on the parent's income from the previous year and would provide an unmet need amount. The following shows the difference in the amount of money a student may be eligible to receive if the dependent student described above applied for FAFSA before the March 2 deadline:

If you missed the deadline, please note that you may still apply for the FAFSA and be eligible for financial aid.

The grant amount a student is awarded cannot exceed the amount of the student's unmet need.

Actual student financial aid packages will vary according to individual circumstance and will depend on many factors.

Be sure to apply early to have the best chance of getting the best funds! If you have not filed yet, do so ASAP! You can go online (www.fafsa.ed.gov) and apply. If you received financial aid for the 08-09 academic year, you must go online and renew your FAFSA. You will need a PIN to do this. If you do not have a PIN, you may obtain one at the FAFSA website.



#### Stress-Free Ways to Start Your Day

Follow these four simple guidelines to rise and shine By John Riddle

Do you barely lift your head off the pillow before daily pressures get on your case? Do your muscles reflexively tense up when the alarm clock goes off? Do 20 things from your to-do list start dancing around your head from the moment you open your eyes? Do you look at the coming day and see a string of impossible tasks that you know will leave you frazzled?

Don't feel as if you're doing something wrong if this sounds all too familiar -- we all have to contend with stress in our lives. What differs is the way we deal with it.

- Step 1: Get enough sleep. Do you fall asleep on the sofa while waiting for the late news and weather? Maybe that's a sign to turn off the TV earlier and go to bed. Getting enough sleep is the key to waking up refreshed and equipped to handle stress. Most adults need seven to eight hours of sleep to feel their best.
- Step 2: Eat Breakfast. A stress-free day starts by making time for a good breakfast. Set your alarm clock to go off 15 minutes earlier (this will be easier to accept if you start going to bed earlier) and use that time for a nutritious first meal. Whole-grain cereal is an excellent choice and there's nothing to prepare. If you leave yourself enough time, indulge in a healthy treat like pancakes.
- Step 3: Get some exercise. Whenever you feel stressed, take a moment and do a few jumping jacks or arm and leg stretches. Don't be surprised if within a few minutes you start feeling more energized and less stressed. Make a point to fit some regular exercise into your day (but get your doctor's OK before you start any new fitness regimen).
- Step 4: Think positive. Your attitude is your most prized possession. It is something you and only you control. Try to begin the day on the right foot by thinking positive thoughts and visualizing a great day ahead. Set a positive tone for your day and everything you face will be easier to handle.
