Louisiana's Nominations Are Open! 19th Annual Commissioner's Awards

This year's Conference theme is *Making Meaningful Connections*. As we gather together to strengthen the connections that help energize us and build new knowledge, skills and abilities, we will also celebrate the 40th Anniversary of the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA). We know we must learn from our shared past, including the rich history of 40 years of CAPTA, in order to build our shared future. The National Conferences on Child Abuse and Neglect are sponsored by the Children's Bureau's Office on Child Abuse and Neglect, Administration on Children, Youth and Families, Administration for Children and Families, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

You are invited to nominate a colleague, friend or co-worker for this award to represent the state of Louisiana. The nominee should be someone who has gone above and beyond for children and families.

Our Louisiana nominees should reflect the complexity of the field and the spirit of interdisciplinary cooperation. We want to recognize them on their achievements and encourage them to continue to make major contributions to the cause of protecting our nation's children from abuse and neglect. Our nominees are a special group of people: advocates and leaders in their field. They may have worked to change laws governing child maltreatment. They may be innovators who have started new programs and changed the service delivery systems in their communities. Or they may have excelled in the direct service and support they provide to children and families in need.

Our nominees are truly outstanding in their field: dedicated, honorable, committed, skilled, compassionate, forward-thinking, creative, brilliant, and genuine are words that could be used to describe nominees. Some very basic criteria for a nominee include:

- Notable efforts to prevent or respond to child abuse and neglect
- Significant voluntary efforts in the community to address the problems of child maltreatment
- Outstanding contributions to improving the lives of abused or neglected children

Over the years, recipients of the Commissioner's Award have represented both the public and private sectors and have included social workers, attorneys, health care professionals, community advocates, law enforcement professionals, educators and others.

The selected candidate's information will then be sent to Governor Jindal to sign the official nomination papers.
