American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) Programs

Title: Regional Longleaf Pine Restoration Initiative and Fuel Reduction -- Alabama

Abstract: Longleaf pine forests once covered a vast range from Texas to Virginia. Since that time, this longleaf forest has been reduced to three percent of historical acreage due to conversion to other land uses and forest types. Longleaf pine forests are highly valued for their resistance to damage by insects, diseases, wildfire, and storms, and for their yield of high quality wood products, biological diversity, and beauty. Under this program, state forestry agencies in Alabama, Georgia, Florida, South Carolina, and North Carolina are putting Americans to work restoring these valuable forests. Activities include restoring longleaf pine on state-owned and private lands; increasing production capacity of longleaf pine seed, seedlings, and native understory plants; coordinating efforts across broad partnerships; and providing educational materials and training to the public and staff. This work is helping to restore a great American ecosystem while creating jobs for contractors and laborers involved in tree planting and forest improvement work, nursery workers, conservation planners and coordinators, media specialists, and educators.

<u>Justification</u>: Longleaf pine forests once covered a vast range from Texas to Virginia. Since that time, this longleaf forest has been reduced to three percent of historical acreage due to conversion to other land uses and forest types. Longleaf pine forests are highly valued for their resistance to damage by insects, diseases, wildfire, and storms, and for their yield of high quality wood products, biological diversity, and scenic beauty. In addition, research suggests that longleaf pine forests may be highly adaptive to anticipated effects of climate change, as well as being capable of sequestering higher amounts of carbon than alternative forest types.

Because of the diverse values of longleaf pine forest, its restoration has become an important point of focus for the forest conservation community. Vision, goals, and strategies for longleaf pine restoration have been articulated in the *Range-wide Conservation Plan for Longleaf Pine*, prepared by the Regional Working Group for *America's Longleaf*. This group involves a wide coalition of federal, state, and private partners, including USDA Forest Service and the Alabama Forestry Commission through the Southern Group of State Foresters.

This grant is part of a regional project involving the states of Alabama, Georgia, Florida, South Carolina, and North Carolina. Representatives of these states and USDA Forest Service met to develop work priorities within the context of the Range-wide Conservation Plan; activities were linked to Range-wide Conservation Plan strategies and approaches. Development of work priorities under this grant also included consideration of job creation and retention. Weight was given to numbers and immediacy of jobs created and retained. The mix of activities included under this grant incorporates these considerations, as well as the relative opportunity among activity categories across the five states involved. Because needs in each state far exceeded available funding, total funding was divided equally among the five states after regional needs were funded off the top.

It is generally recognized that seed and seedlings are and will remain a bottleneck to the overall effort to restore the longleaf ecosystem. The Alabama Forestry Commission has the opportunity to increase significantly areas which native longleaf cones can be commercially collected. Longleaf is a sporadic cone producer and therefore when there is an economic crop to harvest, it is imperative that natural sites are clean of understory vegetation to facilitate cone collection either through shaking or the use of other heavy equipment. By utilizing a significant amount of the grant on State Forests managed by the Alabama Forestry Commission, the long-term cone supply is made more secure as these properties. Additional benefits include enhancing esthetics, access, wildlife habitat, T&E habitat and public recreation of these State Forest lands.

In addition to the focus on cone production, the AFC will regenerate significant acreage to longleaf on public lands also being managed for multiple use including timber management, recreation, wildlife habitat and forest health.

Scope of Work: The vision of job creation and economic stimulus was of paramount concern as the overall program was developed. In Alabama, we estimate that 104 seasonal and temporary positions (\pm 10 FTE) will be created by programs described below. However, it noted that forest silvicultural practices are capital intensive with most work being most efficiently done by heavy machinery utilizing advanced technology for guidance and output control. Therefore, very few of the activities planned in this grant are labor intensive with the exception of hand planting (with labor for that activity largely dependent on Seasonal and Migrant workers). Most of the positions created are focused at achieving only parts of the overall goal with some jobs lasting only a few days to complete.

Work under this grant will occur within activity categories established for guiding the regional program. These categories are:

1. Public Lands Management—the goal of this set of activities is to increase the acreage and improve the condition of longleaf pine forests on state- or locally-owned public lands; federal public lands are excluded from the scope. Activities may include longleaf pine establishment on lands not currently supporting longleaf pine, to include site preparation and tree planting; native understory establishment and enhancement; prescribed burning; mid-story reduction and intermediate stand improvement treatments; and invasive species control. Emphasis will be on activities not funded by other ARRA programs.

Within this activity category, the Alabama Forestry Commission will focus use of grant funds on regenerating sites that were loblolly or mixed pine/hardwood cutover acreage on State Forest lands to longleaf. AFC will also make a sub grant to the Dept of Conservation – Wildlife and Fisheries Division for longleaf restoration on the Barbour County WMA. Finally, in the effort of creating a demonstration forest of Longleaf ecosystem, invasive species that are inhibiting the project will be treated at the Baldwin State Forest. The Demonstration project is discussed more under Education Section.

2. Private Lands Management—This activity involves longleaf pine restoration and management on privately-owned forest lands. Activities may include those described for Public Lands Management. Funds provided under this grant will not be used to require a cost-share from private landowners, but may be used to lower their costs for restoration activities by enhancing existing cost-share programs, covering costs of some activity

components, or providing other incentives. Emphasis will be on activities not funded by other ARRA programs.

Within this activity category, the Alabama Forestry Commission will focus use of grant funds on working with NRCS, AFC will provide longleaf seedlings for landowners who sign up and complete EQUIP longleaf regeneration projects.

3. Plant Materials Capacity— This activity involves increasing the availability of longleaf pine seed, seedlings, and associated understory plant materials for use in restoration work. These resources are currently limiting potential for this work. Activities may include establishing seed orchards; enhancing areas for cone and understory seed collection; collecting, processing, and storing seeds; expanding nursery capacity; planting, tending, and processing seedlings; and providing seed and seedlings to restoration efforts.

Within this activity category, the Alabama Forestry Commission will focus use of grant funds on increasing the area available to collect native Longleaf cones, thereby increasing the amount of longleaf pine seed available to nurseries for growing longleaf pine seedlings. This effort will be focused at Geneva State Forest and Little River State Forest both owned by the AFC.

4. Planning— this activity involves ensuring program activities are implemented strategically and are integrated with efforts of other longleaf restoration partners. Activities may involve inventories and assessments to determine restoration needs, managing related data in databases and GIS, coordinating and prioritizing implementation of activities, and coordinating and supporting start-up of local planning teams.

Within this activity category, the Alabama Forestry Commission will focus use of grant funds on managing and supervision of multiple projects to ensure on time and quality execution of grant objectives.

No quantitative performance measures are established for this set of activities. Accomplishments will be reported in narrative form.

<u>5. Education and Outreach</u>— this activity involves educating the public and program staff about values, opportunities, and methods of longleaf pine restoration. Activities may include producing and supporting training sessions for staff, forestry consultants, and landowners; and production and distribution of educational materials, and outreach through mass media to raise public awareness.

Within this activity category, the Alabama Forestry Commission will focus use of grant funds on increasing participation by consultants and landowners at the Longleaf Alliance's "Longleaf Academies" which are scheduled in 2009 and 2010. Funding will be provided for scholarships for interested consultants and landowners. Further, AFC will also re-establish Baldwin State Forest to a fully productive longleaf forest thus creating a geographically strategic demonstration area that is focused on the longleaf ecosystem. This particular AFC owned property has suffered from lack of management funding which has allowed invasive species to dominate most of the site. By documenting with appropriate signage of both pre and post treatments, improving tract access, and completing necessary burning, AFC will create the opportunity for landowners to observe a working forest and understand the specific management practices to tackle all issues in the restoration of the longleaf ecosystem.

On behalf of all State participants, AFC will also engage the Longleaf Alliance to produce a brochure for landowners that will present the economic case for planting and managing for longleaf pine.

<u>Methodology:</u> Methodology for accomplishing activities within the scope of this grant, by activity category, is:

1. The following planned actions will be utilized to complete the longleaf reforestation activities on public lands. The reader should be aware that all units and cost/units are best estimates at the time of the planned project. However, until contracts are actually entered into and the work begins, variables such as fuels, lubricants, work force availability and ground conditions will likely cause variances to the estimated project cost. (Note: The location of State Forests are shown on the map presented under Geographical location section):

The Longleaf Coordinator, utilizing qualified Alabama vendors selected in a competitive manner, will schedule, supervise and document all work involved to complete the planting acreage objective (1,522 acres). It should be noted that some treatments will not necessarily be utilized on all acres, and that herbaceous weed control will be used when and where needed to ensure that the planted trees are free to grow.

It is noted that the work necessary to complete these projects is seasonal, weather sensitive, and occurs sporadically during the year. For instance, it is likely that a contract vendor with a 3-man crew will be utilized for doing chemical site prep on a tract that may take 3 to 4 days to complete. After spraying, the tract must lay

out several weeks (months) before another crew (3 to 6 jobs) would burn the site. It is likely still another crew, probably employing 10 or more hand-planters will actually plant the site some months after the burn. As mentioned, reforestation is seasonal in nature with available ground moisture often dictating when work can be accomplished, and as this funding is provided late into 2009, at this time it remains problematic as to how much acreage will in fact be planted in 2010.

- 2. Private Lands Management will be facilitated by working with NRCS. Landowners that qualify for practice payments for longleaf reforestation work through the EQUIP program, will be paid 100% for actual cost of seedlings (not to exceed \$87.20/planted acre) utilized to meet the planting stocking recommendations as mandated by the EQUIP guidelines. Close coordination with NRCS will be made to ensure that landowners will not receive duplicate funding.
- 3. Plant Materials Capacity will focus on site improvements to increase acreage available for cone collection. This will focus on understory control and will be achieved using mechanical mulching, chemical spraying utilizing EPA approved herbicides and prescribe burning. The following activities are planned (location of State Forests are shown on the map presented under Geographical location section):

Mulching and spraying are normally completed utilizing tractor mounted equipment. Total number of jobs will be dependent on number of machines utilized but normally each machine requires a 2 to 3 man crew. However, spraying is often completed by the use of hand crews that normally engage 5 to 10 people per crew. The mulching is targeted for completion by October of 2009 so that this year's cones can be harvested although the late start date threatens meeting this expectation.

- 4. Planning—The AFC will employ a third party Longleaf Coordinator to manage the majority of projects. The Coordinator will be responsible to plan, competitively seek and engage vendors, supervise operations and periodically report activities and accomplishments per the ARRA grant requirements. AFC PI and/or designated employee will remain actively involved to ensure all performance measures are achieved. AFC will provide due diligence supervision of all work and report issues to the Longleaf Coordinator. The cost of the third party coordinator has been allocated over the projects that they will have contractual obligations for obtaining desired outcomes.
- 4. Education and Outreach— The Longleaf Alliance has already scheduled four funded longleaf academies planned for 2009 and 2010. While previous academies have successfully trained numerous Agency personnel, it is desirable to reach more professional consultants and landowners. As those individuals sacrifice income from attending theses academies as well incur tuition and travel expense, the Alabama Forestry Commission will offer 50 \$800 scholarships for those consultants and landowners who successfully complete the 4-day course.



At this time, spraying will probably have to be done by machine due to the heavy infestation of cogongrass. This will probably engage a 2-man crew several days to complete. Follow up sprays will probably be accomplished utilizing 5- 10 man hand spray crews to better detect escapes and re-sprouting. Fire-lane construction and burning are usually done in the winter and should engage at least 4 to 6 people. The access work will occur over the life of the grant and should engage 2 to 4 people. Finally, portable signage will be developed such that it can be utilized during landowner tours and then removed from the site to protect the investment.

Acting on behalf of the 5 States participating in the Regional Grant, AFC will contract with Longleaf Alliance to produce a brochure presenting the economic case for planting and managing longleaf. This product should be made available in 2010.

Geographical Location: All work will occur within the approximate historical range of longleaf pine within Alabama. Forest restoration on state and private lands will emphasize work within significant geographic areas or landscapes as identified in the Range-wide Conservation Plan for Longleaf Pine. In Alabama, the targeted State Forest Lands contain ecologically significant longleaf communities including potential habitat for T&E species such as the gopher tortoise and RCW. Further, there is considerable linkage of State Forest lands with previously identified areas of importance including the USFS Talladega National Forest and the Florida, Alabama, Georgia (FLAG) longleaf corridor of special interest to the US military. Alabama Congressional districts affected by this work are the 1st, 2nd and 3rd. The locations for most work documented in this narrative are more fully shown on the following map:
