The President's Piece

THE ANNUAL MEETING

NOTE: Most of the time when I say "Alford"—quotes or not—I really mean Alford, Alvord, Halford, and all the other spellings.

The same day we received the Spring issue of *AAFA ACTION*, we also received an e-mail from one of you indicating that you'd read at least the first two pages of my piece in that issue. I hope all of you read it—not only my piece, but much more of the quarterly. I'm still waiting to see—as a result of your effort—a big increase in membership, a significant increase in donations, and a lot of registrations for the meeting in California.

It's the latter I wish to talk about in this piece—actually, it's meetings in general. By the way, for those of you planning to attend the Pleasanton meeting, do be advised that there is also a big antique fair in town that weekend and there will be some competition for hotel space. Don't wait any longer to make your room reservations—call (510) 847-6000.

We usually have about 25% of the membership at any one meeting—a respectable turnout for a national organization like AAFA—but we'd like to increase that percentage. At each meeting about half the attendees have been to one or more previous meetings, and the other half are first-timers. About 30% of those at any one meeting are not likely to ever attend again.

We think the meetings are great and we're not looking for any significant change in them—other than maybe greater participation. Max and Earline Alford have taken on the job as co-chairs of our Meetings Committee. Since Max is already AAFA Secretary, don't be surprised if you see Earline leading this effort! They are responsible for recommending to the board and the membership the state in which we will meet. In our meeting this year they will recommend a state for 2001. Over the next several years they'll lead in the selection of the city, then the hotel and finally getting a contract with the hotel. Finally they will be in charge of the meeting from the minute it starts—or even before—until the last thing is done at the end.

My real purpose in writing this though is (1) to encourage you to attend as many meetings as you can and (2) to discuss briefly what happens at each session. Many, many—and I do mean a lot—of members have told me just how much our annual meeting has meant to them. None of us can get over the warm atmosphere of camaraderie of the meetings. Although many of us are unrelated (yet!) and are seeing each other face to face for the first time ever, we quickly feel a special and close affinity. I've heard a number of times comments like, "I could actually feel love permeating the area." If you haven't joined us, you must do so at your earliest opportunity.

What really goes on at a meeting? You've all received a registration form, but I know some that don't plan to go don't waste time looking at it. This is not your regular "family reunion." You don't get a box lunch and it's not "all day singing and dinner on the ground." Some call it a conference and others a convention. It really starts on Thursday when many of us begin to arrive. There is continuous handshaking and hugging going on in the lobby or even in the front door of the hotel. Frequently changing groups of us are together from then until bedtime, first for dinner and then gab sessions wherever we can find room to sit.

Friday morning Max and Doris Vetri, AAFA Treasurer, are up early with a registration table set up so folks can pick up their name tags, meal tickets, etc. Somewhere not far away you'll likely find the AAFA Store which is run by Sally Stoewer and her Merchandise Committee. They will have all kinds of neat things with Alford and/or AAFA on them. Her store hours may "come and go" with other things on the program because it's not fair to ask her and her folks to miss all the events just to keep the store open. By the way, Sally and her storekeepers don't get any of the take from the store. And like all other AAFA workers they don't get paid. All the proceeds go into the purchase of more merchandise, and if there is extra it just stays in the treasury.

Somewhere in the area you'll see a display of "old" Alford photographs that are nominees for the photo awards given each year. Throughout the session, but especially Saturday evening when you're all prettied up for dinner, you'll see John and/or Janice Smith taking photographs. They co-chair the AAFA Photo Committee, which now includes the AAFA photo archive established by Jack Kinabrew, and they are getting photos for Pam to use in subsequent issues of this quarterly. Smile big when you see them coming.

About nine on Friday morning we begin to talk about genealogy—more or less in general, with Lynn Shelley, AAFA VP and the chair of our Research Committee, in charge. She'll have several folks lined up to make good presentations on subjects selected, to some extent, by the participants. I've had members tell me that they had attended similar professional sessions or genealogy classes and they did not learn near as much as they did in our workshop. This workshop will go on all day. We do take time each morning and afternoon for a little nourishment. Alford's do like to eat.

On Friday evening we have a reception that is designed for those present to meet new cousins and to renew old acquaintances. We want you to move around and meet as many folks as possible and to talk to nearly everyone present. It is the only session in which AAFA officials are not harping on one thing or another. At this one you do all the talking. To the extent possible and to encourage your moving around, we try to disperse the food so you have to walk several places to get a hand full. We also do our best to hide places to sit, except for the old and infirm. We don't want you to get a plate full and run off in a corner and spend the rest of the night telling war stories to just one person with whom you are already well acquainted.

Saturday morning is the time for business, which will vary from meeting to meeting, but you can depend on an election of members of the board of directors at each meeting and a vote on the state for the meeting about four years hence. Of course most of the officers, committee chairs, and project officers will make a report. There is some recognition of several folks present and there are some prizes given away, so it's something that most folks want to attend. It's not all boring business.

New Member Lineages

Prepared by Gil Alford with the help of most of the members listed.

Each of the lineages below was sent to the member for review and comment. Appropriate changes and corrections were made on those that were returned. Those for which there was no response are being published as is but are correct to the best of our knowledge.

The footnote numbers that appear for some records in the far right column refer to comments at the end of the lineages or in previous issues. (Due to space limitations, we do not repeat comments. Contact the AAFA treasurer for back issues.) Those with "14" have comments in this issue, while other footnote numbers are in previous quarterlies. See the references at the beginning of this set of endnotes.

It is important to note that the lineages begin with the first "Alford" ancestor—not always a parent. Dates are shown as year, month, day. A "ca" following a date means "circa" or "about." A "?" means we are not sure or don't know. "<" means before the date and ">" means after the date.

"E" or "Est" means estimated. Locations are usually expressed as a state and county abbreviation.

There is a delay between the time new members join AAFA and the time their lineages are published. At the time of publication, we had actually signed up 20+ more members, but those lineages will not be published for an issue or two. (We could be a lot more timely if members submitted their input more quickly!)

Remember that AAFA is not presenting this as proven factual data. It represents the best we have and is only as good as the data reported by members. In a few rare cases there may be some conclusion reached by the compiler. This data does not come from the same computer file used in the compilation of the branch genealogies. Members are requested to bring differences, errors and omissions to our attention.

Some readers may notice a subtle format change with this issue. We have added the surname when it's Alford. In the past, we've only included the surname when it was a spelling variation. All other data is the same.

(See also “Landy Alford, California Pioneer,” this issue, p. 42.) His full name may have been STEPHEN LANDERS ALFORD but he was known as Landy or Landa. Little of our vital statistical information about him can be proven. All dates are “circa” and the places or probable.

AAFA # 622 Ruth Moran's research of Virginia Tax Records prompted her in November 1984 to write: "Everyone seems to have missed Landy Alford. It is possible that his name was Stephen Landers Alford. My reason for thinking this as a possibility is that on the 1825 tax rolls he is listed as Landy; 1826 as Stephen; 1827 as Landy again.... Landy, Charles, and William Alford moved to Giles County, Virginia. The 1825 tax rolls show that Landy was in Wythe County in 1825 on Feb 10 when the Commissioner levies the taxes, but was in Giles County in March 1825, together with his brother Charles. Charles was there in 1826, 1827, and 1828, both he and Landy were there in 1829 and all three brothers were there in 1830. All three, William, Charles and Landy are on the 1830 Census for Giles County.... Landy Alford leaves Giles County in 1832/3 and I find him in Buchanan County, Missouri in 1840...."

The family supposedly was in Indiana since daughters were born there in 1836 and 1837. We need some corroboration on that.

Lynn Shelley, AAFA #484, cites a source for his presence in Andrew County, MO in the 1840's when he sold land there. She goes on: "Supposed to have left on the Overland Trail the day after his daughter Nancy's marriage to Nathan Barbour, on May 9, 1846, in Holt County, MO. Supposedly was originally heading for Oregon but decided on CA somewhere en route. Arrived in CA about October, 1846. In CA PIONEER REGISTER AND INDEX, he is listed as an 1846 immigrant who worked as a carpenter at Monterey and Benecia in 1847-1848, afterwards settling in the Suisun Valley. In 1870 census, he was living with cousin/nephew (??) Russell Alford in Contra Costa County, while wife Sarah was still in Solano. Both are listed as owning land. Son Charles who was married by then was also living in Contra Costa County."

[Panola County was established, mostly from Harrison County, in 1846. Is it possible that land originally granted in what was Harrison County was in Panola after 1846?]

In the 1850 Arkansas census Madison was enumerated in Pike Co. as ME. in the next family or house to D.W. Alford. His first seven children were listed in this census, born in Alabama, Arkansas, Texas and Arkansas in that order.

In the 1860 AR census he was still living in Pike Co. near D.W. and his children were J.M., J.H., A.J., M.L., M.J., S.A., A.A., J.W., and F.E.

In the 1870 AR census Madison and Nancy were listed in Pike Co. with Martha L., Mary J., Sarah A., Abner A., Joseph N., Franklin E., Marg. L., and John M. with his new bride Lorinda L. ❖

Six Members of the Alford Family Are Serving In Army

The Alford family of 321 Sayre Street are very well represented in the U.S. armed forces. Mr. and Mrs. B.A. [Bollen A.] Alford have three sons, a son-in-law, and a grandson serving in the Army. Their son-in-law also has a brother in overseas service.

Pvt. Bollen A. Alford, Jr., one of their sons, is now somewhere in India. He writes home that he would like to get more letters from his friends. His address may be obtained from his parents.

Bollen enlisted in the Army on Sept. 12, 1942, and began his training in Salt Lake City, Utah. He completed a course in the Medical Corps School

in Clovis, N.M. and sailed for overseas duty in August, 1943.

The second son, Sergt. Henry D. Alford, is also stationed overseas and is in the South Pacific with the Military Police. His wife, the former Miss Louise Turner, holds a government position in Atlanta, Ga.

He was inducted into the Army on April 18, 1941, at Fort McClellan, Anniston, where he stayed until Dec. 14, 1941. He was then transferred to California, and after being stationed at different camps there, was sent overseas in April, 1943.

Pvt. Eldredge Alford, the third son was inducted on Nov. 16, 1943, and is now in training at Flora, Miss. He came home recently to visit his wife who lives at 100 Park Avenue.

The Alfords' grandson, Corp. Alvin Turner, has completed his training at Camp Crowder, Mo., and is now awaiting orders there for shipment overseas. He is the son of Mrs. K.T. Speigner, of 23 Verona Avenue.

Corp. Turner was inducted into the Army on March 4, 1943, at Fort McClellan, Anniston. He was sent to the reception center at Fort McPherson, Ga., and transferred to Camp Crowder for his basic training.

Pvt. David R. Hamilton, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Alford, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. D.L. Hamilton, of 4 Park Avenue. Pvt. Hamilton was inducted into the Army on Oct. 22, 1943, and left for Fort McPherson on Nov 12. He is now stationed at Fort Bragg, N.C., in the Field Artillery.

Pvt. Hamilton writes that Army life is all right, but he says that he misses his wife and two sons. His wife and sons are making their home with her parents while he is in service.

His brother, Pfc. Raymond W. Hamilton has been stationed in England since October, 1943. He says England is a "pretty place" and likes it fine. Although he finds that it is a lot like home, still he will be very glad to

get back to "the good old U.S.A."

AAFA NOTE: Bollen Alford was the son of Henry Dortch Alford, Jr., from another of our well established branches. The family was in Crenshaw County in 1920. AAFA would like to obtain copies of the military records of these and other veterans.

Jeremy Alphord is on his own diversity campaign.

He marked his spot in Alabama State University's history just a few weeks after he arrived.

He is the first white student to run for and win a student office at the predominantly black university.

When Mr. Alphord stepped on campus, he saw that the freshman class needed leadership, student unity and respect. Those needs sparked his campaign—ASU: Achieving Student Unity.

"Since I've graduated from high school I've matured a lot and now anything I set my mind to, I will accomplish in the end," he said.

He's not kidding.

A determined student, Mr. Alphord penned posters for his campaign for freshman class president and bought candy to spread the word about unity.

He needed that determination when his election application was lost by the Office of Student Activities. He threatened to file an appeal and it was found. When a student tapped him on the shoulder and snatched his campaign materials valued at more than \$100, he didn't lose faith. The student stole his candy, but not his spirit. Even when someone burned his campaign

I'm earning mine at the Hornet Tribune, the yearbook and as freshman class president," he said.

Mr. Alford said he is receiving an education in life and he has learned more in six weeks at ASU than he could learn at a predominantly white college in four years.

"I feel in life you should not just stand behind your culture. I feel you should get out and experience other cultures and other ways of life and beliefs."

Mr. Alford's unity campaign will continue for the next four years as he already plans for the presidency of the Student Government Association.

"I feel that right now with the outstanding council I have in the freshman class, we can work together to keep change going," he said.

posters and tore the others to shreds, he remained focused.

"They just saw me as being white. They didn't see my qualifications or my determination," he said. "Nothing is going to stand in my way."

Mr. Alford considers himself a special exception to the minority rule and knows he won the race with black and white votes.

He stands by a motto if someone questions whether he will fairly represent his black peers.

"We (student council) will not stand in front of you and wait for you to follow. We will not stand behind you in hopes that you will lead. We're going to stand beside you and work together," said the 18-year-old Dothan native.

Mr. Alford's campaign works well with the university that is urged by courts to diversify its campus. A remedial decree granted by U.S. District Judge Harold L Murphy awarded ASU \$1 million a year for the

next 10 years to attract white students to the university.

Mr. Alford is one of nearly 350 white students out of more than 5,400 students this year, an increase of more than 194 percent compared to last year.

The biology major has an academic scholarship, which covers tuition, room and board, books and supplies. His only expense is the \$70 parking fee.

Mr. Alford said black students criticized white students for taking advantage of scholarships, calling them free rides, but Mr. Alford doesn't see it that way.

"Unlike a lot of people on scholarship,

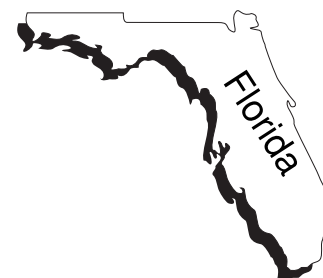

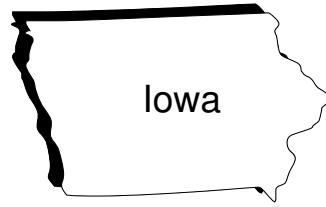

DES MOINES (AP) - Gov. Terry Branstad has gotten an idea of how much more it is going to cost to get tough on criminals—a request for an extra \$23 million to run the prison system.

Department of Corrections officials presented their proposed budget Thursday, and that's how much more they say is needed to run a prison system that's been dramatically expanded over the past three years.

They also asked for almost 450 more staffers - an expense that will grow as new prisons open. They did not ask for another new prison but said they were getting a grip on managing the rapidly expanding network of prisons.

"We think we are getting a handle on a lot of these things," **Sally Chandler Halford**, head of the department, said.

Halford sought \$139.2 million to run the state's prisons, up from the \$116.3 million being spent this year. Staffing would grow from this year's 2,114 to 2,553 next year, under the proposal....

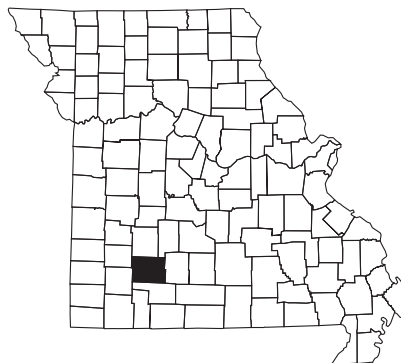

Supplementary information from Betty Dietz says that Lilma was born May 23, 1904. In the 1900 census Hattie and Essie were listed and in the 1910

Essie and Lilma were listed. Apparently those were nicknames, partial names, or corruptions of the correct names. Which one was Mary who married Mr. Ellis and which one married Robert Culver? What was the first name of Ellis? No current AAFA Alabama marriage data provides information on these two marriages. The obituary shows he had grandchildren and great grandchildren, yet AAFA has no information on any of these or later descendants.

AAFA NOTES: We are very interested in the family of Lucious Alford because there is a possibility that they are part of the family of JoLynn Alford Long, AAFA #718. In 1880, Beaver Meadow, Mobile County, AL we have the family of an S.E. Alford (male) born about 1828 in South Carolina. Included in the family as the oldest child was a Lizzie Alford born about 1860 in Alabama. Lizzie had a sister Francis 16, and brothers John 15, George 10, Walter 9, and Julius 7. S.E. Alford's family included a 9 month old granddaughter, Lilly Alford. Was Lizzie really a daughter-in-law? Was Lilly her daughter? Who was her husband? If she was not a daughter-in-law then she must have married soon after the 1880 census and began having the children listed earlier. The children were all named Alford. Did Lizzie Alford marry an Alford?

The only family in 1870 Mobile County that would stand a chance of being this family is a John Alford born about 1822 with wife Fannie. The other females in the family were Puss 14, Mary 12, Nancy 10, Sarah 1 and Julia 4 months. Males were Ephraim 8, John 4, and Alfred 3. Is this the same family? We have not found this family in the older (non-soundex) portion of the 1880 census, and they were not in the soundex. JoLynn Long is a descendant of an Ephraim Alford, but this one was not born early enough to be hers.

The only Alford family in Mobile County in 1860 is that of "Peachman Alfred" who is the ancestor of Lucille Mehrkam, AAFA #32. If John and Fannie's family were in the 1860 Alabama census, we have been unable to find them.

In the 1900 census of Citronelle, Mobile County, Alabama we find 45 year old Lizzie Alford born Oct 1854

in Virginia. Included in the family were three sons and two daughters: Lucius Jan 1883, Cleveland Feb 1885, Marsina Jan 1888; Annie M. Mar 1891 and Mattie E. May 1895. In 1910 they were listed in Citronelle as Lizzie 50 VA, Lucscius 24 AL, May 18 AL (who apparently married a Lawson from the obit), and Mattie 13 AL (who must have married a Mayles.) Annie M. of 1900 appears to be the May of 1910. In 1920 Lizzie 50 born AL this time, and son Lucius 37 lived at 163 Monroe in Mobile.

The obit says there were three sisters, and the only way the census supports this (including the names of the sisters) is if the 9-month-old Lilly in 1880 is his eldest sister and she was married by 1900 (to an Oswald). Is the S.E. Alford in 1880 identical to Ephraim Alford, who is JoLynn's ancestor and fought in the Mexican War? His first wife was named Fanny and died in 1878. Is she the Fannie who was married to "John" in 1870? Was "John" really S.E. or Ephraim??

AAFA NOTE: Mary Elizabeth Rheams was born September 20, 1870 in Louisiana. She and William were married February 22, 1894 in Tangipahoa Parish, Louisiana.

William was born December 13. His obituary is printed later in this article. The son, Charles "B." Alford, was actually Charles Dalma Alford. He was the father of AAFA member #072 Dr. C.D. "Bo" Alford of Hammond, LA who is the father of member #033 Anne Alford Flippin of Brandon, MS.

We have no marriage data from Wilcox County and we cannot find the family in the 1900 census. In 1910 he has 26 year old daughter Ida Lyles with them and in 1920 had 29 year old Maggie Cook. Those don't fit the names in the obituary. In both 1910 and 1920 there was a 49/59 year old Dora Primm who was a sister-in-law in 1910 and sister in 1920. There were some females' names (sisters) in some of the earlier censuses that were not legible.

AAFA NOTE: This one goes back to the ole war horse, Julius C. Alford. He was the son of Lodwick Herin Alford and married Claudia Bartle. He was

born October 3, 1889. His sister, Mrs. Jack Cook, was Cora Connell Alford. Brother L.H. was Lodwick Herin Alford and J.A. was probably Albert Augustus Alford.

WILLIAM J. ALFORD

[unknown Montgomery newspaper, date written on frame is 23 Feb 1928]

News of the death of William J. Alford, Spanish-American war Veteran in Arkansas was received yesterday by Chief of Police Taylor. Inquiries revealed he was formerly of Company "D" Second Regiment, Alabama Volunteers which formed and demobilized in Montgomery. He was buried by the American Legion Post at Smackover, Ark. Records show that he enlisted in Mobile on May 6, 1898 and also discharged Oct. 21, in the same year. During his career he served under Col. Vincent E. Elmore, of this city.

AAFA NOTE: AAFA has considerable information on several William J. Alfords of Alabama whose age would fit service in the army in 1898; however, the place and/or dates of death of all those known do not fit 1928 and Arkansas. A request has been sent to the National Archives for his military record. Maybe one of the Arkansas members can see what they can learn from the authorities or the American Legion in Smackover (Union County) Arkansas. He may have been there for the big oil boom that was in swing at that time.

AAFA NOTES: Looking for a "Laura W." who married E.A. Alford we find the marriage record of "Earkeil" A. Alford and Laura W. Willis in Montgomery County, Book 12, page 18, for December 12 1907. Following that back to census data we find "Earkul" Alford, born Dec, 1885, son of James W. (Wesley or Wiley) Alford and Florence in 1900 Montgomery County Census. Information from Lillian Alford Duffell, probably now deceased, shows that James Wiley Alford married Florence E. Windham and their first son was Earkiel A. Alford who married Laura W. Willis. A very poor quality 1910 census extract of Montgomery County shows "Enkerd" Alford, 24 with wife Laura W. and 1 year old son Willie L. Alford. The 1920 census of Crenshaw County shows "Earkull" A. Alford and Laura W. with sons Leroy W. 11, Clenie C. 9, and Aubrey 9. It is assumed that Leroy was really Willie Leroy, and that Clenie and Aubrey were the sons

An example of how one's research may help another is this story that Milton Folds, AAFA #49, wrote to Gil Alford on July 21, 1996.

I made one of my rare visits of 1996 to the Georgia Archives yesterday and while searching some of my family lines in South Carolina publications, I ran across Barbara R. Langdon's series: SOUTH CAROLINA MARRIAGES, VOLUME 3, 1671-1791, and found the following Alford tidbit that may not have come to your attention: "... Alford, Mary to Capt. John Garney, SP4, pages 391-392, 1702, (widow of Joseph Alford of Barbados, her first husband)..” SP4 refers to Records of The Secretary of The Province, 1704-1709, Vol. D.

Little did Milton know that member Michael B. Alford AAFA #495 of Morehead, NC has long had a theory that his South Carolina Alford's came from the West Indies! ❖

Also in Crenshaw county for census that year were Boland Alford and his wife, Maggie. Note that Mrs. Alford had a sister named Mrs. B.A. Alford and brothers named S.T. Troy and C.J. Ivey—but she was named "Willis." AAFA marriage data shows that B.A. (Bolling A.) Alford married Maggie Ivey December 19, 1906 in Montgomery County, Book 12, page 382. B.A. was previously married to Birdie Tobias on December 18, 1901—Book 11, page 252. Bolling A. Alford and Earkeil (or whatever) Alford were first cousins. What is the key to the explanation that Maggie Ivey and Laura W. Willis were sisters? Was Laura an Ivey who first married a Willis, or did they have different fathers??” ❖

James was 65 or 66 and his wife Matilda was a year or so older.

Michael's third great-grandfather, the second child of James Stephen, is Isaac Anderson Alford, third from the left in the photo. Standing next to him is his wife, Mary Ruth Vaughan.

Standing in front of them is their daughter, Elizabeth McPherson Alford, Michael's great-great-grandmother, who is 3 or 4 years old in this picture.

British Columbia Marriages and Deaths

The British Columbia Archives Web site (<http://www.bcarchives.gov.bc.ca>) contains a searchable index to marriages and deaths, with births in process. The vital statistics page was developed in cooperation with the British Columbia Vital Statistics Agency and the assistance of several genealogical societies.

Actual registration records are available on microfilm. The format of these records varied over the years, but generally contain information not found in the on-line indexes, such as the birth date and place of birth of the bride and the groom or decedent.

The British Columbia Vital Statistics Agency is responsible for the registration of births, marriages, and deaths in British Columbia. These registrations began in 1872 after British Columbia became a province of Canada.

The indexes to marriage registrations for 1872 to 1921 (events over 75 years old) and death registrations for 1872 to 1976 (events over 20 years old) are now available as on-line databases. Conversion of the births index for

1872 to 1896 (events over 100 years old) is in progress. Copies of the registration documents can be viewed on microfilm through local Family History Centers of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and at many libraries in British Columbia.

The information in these automated indexes is provided only for the purpose of locating registrations and should not be taken as authoritative. The final authority for all information is the registration document itself. As the indexes are utilized and users inform the Vital Statistics Agency of discrepancies, the indexes will be updated periodically to improve the data quality. If you encounter incomplete records in the index, please email your concerns to the Vital Statistics Agency at genealog@bcsc02.gov.bc.ca.

Registration records listed in the indexes that do not include microfilm numbers are late registrations that have yet to be filmed. They will be released at some point in the future. In such cases, request a copy from the British Columbia Vital Statistics Agency by completing and mailing a form.

Requests for Certified Copies of Registrations

The British Columbia Vital Statistics Agency provides a genealogical service which can search for records, and under certain conditions, can provide information from registrations which cannot yet be released to the general public. The agency can produce a genealogical certificate or a certified photocopy of the original registration. The fees for these services are outlined in the Vital Statistics Agency Fee List.

All requests for certified copies of registrations or genealogical certificates must be sent to the British Columbia Vital Statistics Agency. Requests to the Vital Statistics Agency can be made by completing and mailing a form, or by telephone. Specify all of the information from the index for the registration requested. The address is:

Jeptha Alford of Georgia, c1797 – after 1861

Jeptha Alford was born about 1797 in NC (on 1850 Census he is age 53, born NC). The names of his parents are not known at this time. He was married to Jane Scoggins on July 30, 1820, in Jones Co., GA. He married (2) Nancy Williams on December 28, 1855 in Carroll Co., GA.

In 1830, he was listed in the Jackson Co., GA Census with four sons and two daughters. By 1840, he was found in Troup Co., GA with five sons and three daughters. On the 1850 Census the family is in Carroll Co., GA [see also *AAFA ACTION*, Fall 1996, p. 21].

Question: Who are these Lyles? If Mary is Nancy's daughter, where was she in previous censuses, and who is the Mary Williams in the 1860 Census?

Children:

1. Julius C. Alford was born about 1820 in GA. He married Elaphar Hickey on January 13, 1847, in Troup Co., GA. AAFA records indicate that they only had one child.
2. James Richard Alford was born about 1821 in GA. He was married (1) to Jane Piper who was born about 1820 in GA. He married (2) Martha Williams (possibly his step-sister).
3. Elizabeth Alford was born about 1822 in GA. She was married to James W. Richardson on October

24, 1844, in Troup Co., GA.

4. William Gabriel Alford was born about 1824. He married Mary F. Driver on May 20, 1858, in Carroll Co., GA. According to AAFA records, they had three children.

5. Mary Ann Alford was born about 1825. She married William Wright Driver in Pike Co., GA. He was born September 11, 1813, and died about 1895. Mary Ann died about 1900, in Carroll Co., GA. They had four children, according to AAFA files.

Note that there is a large gap in years between the births of Mary Ann in 1825 and Thomas in 1836. Several explanations are possible, but more research needs to be done.

6. Thomas Jefferson Alford was born about 1836.

7. Jane Alford was born about 1838. She married Jacob S. Phillips on January 22, 1854, in Carroll Co., GA.

8. Susan A. Alford was born on August 24, 1840. She married William Thomas Jones on September 20, 1855, in Carroll Co., GA. She died November 7, 1907, in Carroll Co.

9. Guthridge Alford—birth order and birthdate not certain. He is named in his father’s will.

There are three members of AAFA from the line of Jephtha Alford. They are Virginia Alford Bray, #437, her daughter Nancy Bray Elkin, #618, and new member Joel Max Alford, #876. The following information pertains only to their direct line. They are descended from Jephtha Alford through his son James Richard Alford.

James Richard Alford and his wife Jane Piper had eight children. The second of those children was named

George Washington Alford.

George was born February 22, 1840, in GA. On March 22, 1860, he married Sarah Frances Irwin who was born June 23, 1846. George served in Co. F., 19th Georgia Infantry, CSA. He was wounded and captured during the Civil War. In 1870, the family was found in the Census of Marion Co., AL with four children, two girls and two boys. In 1879, George moved with his family from Alabama to Chickasaw Co., MS. According to AAFA files, they had eight children.

The second child of George and Sarah was named Oscar S. “Bud” Alford and was born January 29, 1867, in AL. He married Sarah Frances Griffin who was born August 9, 1875, in GA. They had eleven children. Oscar died August 3, 1947. Sarah died November 12, 1953.

The oldest child of Oscar and Sarah Alford was named Watty Washington Alford. He was born November 28, 1891, in Chickasaw Co., MS and died there on April 5, 1981. He married Elmer Olive Berry on November 27, 1910, in Chickasaw Co., MA. Elmer Olive was born on June 10, 1895, in Chickasaw Co. and died there on July 20, 1968. They had six children:

3. Virginia Alford was born January 1, 1918, in Chickasaw County, Mississippi. She was married to Jack Augustus Bray on May 30, 1936. Jack Augustus Bray was born September 5, 1915, and died May 4, 1984. Virginia is AAFA Charter Member #437.

5. Olline Alford
6. Geraldine Alford

Virginia Alford and Jack Augustus Bray had at least one child. Her name is Nancy Bray Elkin. Her AAFA Charter Member number is #618.

Item 1st It is my will that my body be interred in a decent and Christian manner and that all my debts be paid by my Executors, immediately as there is no cause for delay.

2nd Item It is my will and desire that my beloved wife have all of my estate both real and personal after paying my debts. So long as she lives unmarried and at her death or marriage, I order and direct that all my property both real and personal be equally divided between my two daughters Mary Ann Driver wife of Right Driver and Jane Phillips wife of Jacob Phillips and the heirs of their Bodies.

3rd Item It is my will that my Daughter Elizabeth Richerson wife of James Richerson receive at the death of my beloved Wife Nancy Alford the Sum of five dollars in full of her distributive share of my estate both real and personal.

4th Item The reason why I have not given Richard Alford, Guthridge Alford, Thomas Alford and Julius Alford and Susan Jones wife of Thomas Jones any portion of my property is that I have heretofore given them a full share of my estate.

4th (5th) Item I hereby appoint my beloved wife Nancy Alford Executrix and Jacob Phillips Executor to Execute this my Last will and Testament in testimony where of I have hereunto set

Landy Alford, California Pioneer

A California Pioneer is defined as someone who went to California BEFORE the discovery of gold at Sutter's Mill, January 24, 1848. Landy Alford fits that description. Several of his sons-in-law who were also in that category include Nathan Barbour, Benjamin McDonald, and Henry Russell. They were married to Landy's daughters Nancy, Lucinda and Adeline, respectively. Several other sons-in-law were perhaps fortune seekers who came to CA to get rich quick but soon decided to go back home and find another means of earning a living.

Who was Landy Alford? We do not really know for sure who his parents were, but we do know that he was a descendant of the Wythe County, Virginia, Alford's. His parents may have been John and Eleanor Hogue Alford whose son, Charles and nephew? William, were in Giles County, Virginia, in the 1830 census and in tax lists prior to that. It is also possible that his father was William, the missing son of Thomas who was born about 1775/1776 but seems to have died about the same time or just before his father. He (this William) did appear on tax lists but disappeared just before his father Thomas's death in 1805. It may also be possible that Landy was a son of this William but lived for a time in the household of John and Eleanor and later in the home of John and Peggy Crawford Alford (John's second wife), Eleanor having died in 1814. In the 1820 Wythe County census, there are extra children who may be kin of John or who could be stepchildren if this was a second marriage for Peggy.

Landy first appeared on Wythe County tax lists in 1825, which puts his birth

date at about 1803–1804. Later census records also place his birth during that time. He then went to Giles County, VA, where he seems to have stayed until about 1833. There is no real basis for the possible name of Stephen Landers Alford (which has been suggested as his whole name) except for the following two items: 1) There was a Stephen Landers on one early tax list of Montgomery County, VA, and 2) no Landy/Landa is listed on the 1826 tax list of Wythe County but there is a Stephen Alford listed (only time such a name appeared) with the same listings as Landy had in 1825—poll only, no horse or cattle.

His marriage occurred about 1828 based on the age of his first known child, Nancy, who was born May 17, 1829. He married Sarah Duke who was born in NC. It is assumed her family came to VA before the marriage and that the marriage occurred in VA. No marriage record has been found at this time. In the 1830 census, Landy and Sarah had only daughter Nancy. The next two daughters are also supposed to have been born in VA—Lucinda in 1831 and Adeline in 1833. At this time, the family may have joined relatives in Daviess County, IN, as daughters Mary and Margaret were supposedly born there. The actual IN county of residence is not known and no known record of their presence in IN has yet been found there.

According to the birth of daughter Jane and son Charles, as well as the 1840 MO Census, the family was in Buchanan County, MO, by 1840. Few records in MO have been found but there was a land sale in Andrew County, MO, in the early 1840s (Book 1, page 391). From CA records and family legend, the family supposedly left MO on the Overland Trail on May 10, 1846, the day after daughter Nancy Alford's marriage to Nathan Barbour

in Holt County, MO. Nathan, Nancy, and Nathan's brother Roswell Barbour also accompanied the family to CA.

They arrived in CA in October and soon after, son-in-law Nathan Barbour enlisted with Fremont in the Mexican War. By the next spring they were working as carpenters in the Benecia area. Amelia Barbour (first child of Nathan and Nancy Alford Barbour) was the first birth in this new area. By the fall of 1848, Landy's family and Nathan Barbour's family moved to the Suisun Valley. They farmed and engaged in the lumber business. Landy and Sarah had at least three more children after arriving in California—Louisa (1847), Delilah (1848) and Sarah (1854). Sarah is buried in the Rockville Cemetery which is on land donated by Landy for the building of the Rockville Methodist Episcopal Church. This cemetery has a memorial marker to Landy and Sarah Duke Alford, pioneer settlers of the area. Some think they are buried there but no markers to that effect have been found, and the cemetery records do not reflect such.

Children of Landy and Sarah Duke Alford

- i. NANCY, born May 17, 1829, Giles? County, VA, died Oct. 15, 1869, Suisun, Solano County, California; married May 9, 1846, Nathan Barbour, Holt County, Missouri.
- ii. LUCINDA, born about 1831, Giles County, VA, died probably in Oregon, date unknown; married (1) Benjamin McDonald, about 1847, Benecia?, CA and supposedly (2) Robert M. Moore, Aug 14, 1856, in Lane County, Oregon, but no evidence of this marriage has yet surfaced.
- iii. ADELINE, born Feb 16, 1833, Giles County, VA, died Oct. 1,

- 1907; married (1) Henry Russell, May 15, 1851, Solano County, CA, and (2) Garrett Henry Pangburn, Nov. 18, 1864.
- iv. MARY ARCHER, born 1836, Indiana, died Jan. 28, 1865, Brooklyn, Kings Co., NY; married Charles Forbes, Sep. 25, 1851, Solano County, CA.
- v. MARGARET, born 1837 in Indiana or Missouri, died Oct. 30, 1870, in Elkhart Co., IN; married Hiram Abshire, Jan. 1, 1854, Solano County, CA.
- vi. JANE, born 1840, died before 1852?? Only appearance in 1850 census which was very inaccurate as to names and birthplaces for this family.
- vii. CHARLES ALVAH, born Nov. 27, 1844, Buchanan? Co., MO, died Dec. 31, 1920, Esparta, Yolo County, CA; married Feb. 3, 1866, Louriana McBee.
- viii. LOUISA, born 1847 in CA, died March 9, 1879, San Joaquin Co. CA; married 1) Charles J. Hill, Dec. 27, 1862, Solano County, CA, and 2) Willis Leonard Grey about 1865.
- ix. DELILA, born 1848 in CA, died at the birth of her first child but date is not known; married Daniel Landers, Apr. 7, 1866, Solano County, CA. No Daniel Landers found in 1870 CA census.
- x. SARAH, born Nov. 1854, Solano County, CA, and died Dec. 1856, Suisun, Solano County, CA, buried Rockville Cemetery, Solano County, CA.

Landy Alford's Pioneer Card which was filled out by a great-grandson in 1957 also lists a William and a Maria as being children. They never appeared on a census record and we have found no other evidence of their existence. Perhaps there is a Bible which we have yet to discover. The absence of the names John and Eleanor or Nellie make one question whether those two (John and Eleanor Hogue Alford) were Landy's parents. The Pioneer Card also states that Landy and family were

actually on their way to Oregon and not California when they left Missouri on the Overland Trail. They changed their plans when they learned that wagons had reached California by the Truckee River route.

In the 1850 and 1860 census of Solano County, California, Landy and Sarah are living in Suisan Township of Solano County near several of their married daughters. In 1870, Sarah is still living in Suisan Township of Solano County and is listed as having \$4,000 worth of real estate. Her grandson William Hill is living with her and she is living next to the Garrett Pangburn family (daughter Adeline). Landy is listed in Contra Costa County in the household of cousin?/nephew? Russell Alford and has property valued at \$6200. In both 1860 and 1870, Landy is listed as a farmer. Russell and his parents, William and Margaret Alford (also Wythe Co. VA Alford descendants) had come to Plumas County, CA, about 1854 from Fremont County, Iowa. What was the exact relationship between Landy and William—brothers or first cousins?

Landy died Oct. 4, 1871, in Contra Costa County, CA, according to information on his Pioneer Card. There must be a source of this information but his burial place is not known at this time. Sarah died about 1896. She was probably living with or near the Pangburn family. Her burial site is also unknown. She lived to be about 80 while all of her daughters but Adeline (1833-1907) died before age 40. More land records and probate records need to be found to help determine more details about the later lives of these Alfords.

Amasa Alford's Gold Rush Letter

Thanks to Roderick Bush, AAFA #116, for using the Internet to learn about the existence and location of this letter, to Frieda Shepherd, AAFA #763, for going to the Bancroft Library at the University of California, Berkeley, to obtain a copy of the letter, to the Bancroft Library for giving us permission to reprint it, and again to Rod for transcribing it. For ease of reading, some paragraphs have been entered where there were none in the original, and some capitalization and punctuation changes were made. Spelling was left as in the original. Underlined words were difficult to read and are questionable.

Old Town, Maine

*Rogers Bar, Towalumnes [*sic*—
Tuolumne] River
May 1, 1850

Dear Farther,

I received your kind letter by the hand of Mr. Lord in Apr. and right glad was I to receive it. It was worth more than a lb of gold. It is the only one that I have received from home for something like a year. I arrived on this River the first of Oct last. The party which I left home with were all taken sick with the deaseses of the country. The first of Nov the rainy season sat in so that it was impossable to mine, for it rained

every day. Up to the first of December, I did not make one cent. About the middle of December I went to boating provishions into the mines. I worked in the rain and slept in the mud till the first of Jany, when [Mr.] Gordon, [Mr.] Moore and others wished me to join them which I did and still remain with them. We are doing quite a buisness but whether we shall make anything, I don't know.

We have two trading tents and a train of mules packing goods from Stockton and **Cressent City. Cressent City is a tract of land one mile square granted by the State Government to form parties or form interests. One quarter of an interest belongs to or one sixteenth belongs to John Gordon Co. which is the flag that I sail under for the present. At this bar there is a party of fifty men at work for the purpose of draining the river. After the ditch is dug and dam completed, they will have seven hundred yards of the bed of the river to make their fortunes from. John Gordon Co. own eight shares and then about four miles below this place we intend to build a dam and drain the river on our own hours. Besides we have some half dozen shares in another dams. Whether we shall get our pay for the amount of labor expended in these dams is more than I can say. All is I hope so. Our expenses are now something over one thousand dollars per head. If we do not make anything, we shall make a good deal less than

nothing. Men that work steady and hard make about eight dollars per day throughout the Southern mines as a general thing.

Law, Religion, Politicks and Gambling all flourish together, and especially the latter. The miners as a general thing are vary quiet. Now and then a duel is fought and acashionly a man missing. Throughout the mines in this section of the country the health of the miners has been good for the past Winter. I antisipate however a considerable sickness this Summer owing to the exposures of the last Winter, the extreem heat of the country and living [conditions] of the miners.

I have just returned from a prospecting expedition on the River Mercades [*sic*—Merced]. We followed it up two hundred miles from its mouth. After we had assended about one hundred and sixty miles, we got out of the gold reagon all together and came at a pine timber country. The largest pines that I ever saw, with a smouth bark and strait as an arrow. Some of the men said they were two hundred ft high, but I thought about one hundred & fifty would answer, for a distance of fifty miles long and twenty wide. We found gold in every stream, reavine, on ground that Sun[day], but not enough to pay for working.

I think a man could make from three to six dollars per day, sometimes more and sometimes less. I found two peaces that weigh twenty Dollars [worth] each, and several from \$10 to \$16. The most of the gold was large, that is from 12 cts to two Dollars [worth]. While on this River it is vary fine nothing but a mere dust, but I lern that it is worth \$22 per oz at the mint. It is worth \$18 in San Francisco.

In regard to my own health, nothing could be better. I left home weighing 110 lbs. Now I think I could pull down 140 lbs. If I make anything this Summer, I shall return home in the fall.

If I do not, and my health remains good, I shall stay till I do make something.

I am vary mutch obliged to you for your inquires in regard the health of Brewer.

Amasa Alford was born in Maine on Dec 2 1825. He moved to California in 1848 according to *Annals of Warren*. There is no evidence of his presence there in 1850 or 1860 censuses, but his letter home attests to the fact that he was indeed in California during the Gold Rush years.

Benedictus died Apr 23 1683, Windsor, Hartford County, Connecticut. His name, and that of some of his descendants, has been spelled a variety of ways—including Alvord and Allford. Most research indicates that the majority of this branch of the family used the "Alford" spelling. That will be used throughout this genealogy to minimize confusion and to prevent conflict with the brothers descendants, the majority of which used the "Alvord" spelling.

Benedict, along with brother Alexander (whose branch uses Alvord) and Joanna Alford, came to America, probably as minors and perhaps as orphans, about the years 1636-40. Sister Joanna was baptized December 8, 1622 in Whitestaunton Parish but no record of Benedict's birth or baptism has been discovered. Brother Alexander was baptized, probably at Bridport, England, October 15, 1627.

Benedict was in Windsor, Connecticut, as early as 1637. He went back to England in 1639 but was back in Massachusetts in 1640. He probably returned for "his espoused Joan Nurton, or Newton, who was of the parish of Broadway" about four miles from Whitestaunton. While in England a purchase of cattle was made, and Benedict's signature also appears as a witness on a deed executed in 1639 by Nicholas Nurton.

He was a sergeant in the Pequot War in 1637, the war having begun in 1633. He was present at the "Pequot Massacre."

He had a grant of land in Windsor, Connecticut. He became a member of Windsor Church October 17, 1641. He was a juror in April 1643 and a constable in 1666.

His will, written March 30, 1683, was signed with his mark "x" and it showed he was survived by his wife. The will also supports his military service suggesting a pension. He left to his son Josian "the Farme that was given me by the Country."

Benedict's wife, Jane or Joan Newton born 1622, Windsor, Hartford County, Connecticut, died after 1683. She was of the Nurton family of Broadway Parish, England. She became a member of Windsor Church January 13, 1647.

David Price's Alford Genealogy

David Price, Jr., AAFA #168, was featured in an article in the Summer 1996 issue of *AAFA ACTION*, pp. 39–40: “David Price, Jr., AAFA Hall of Famer.” Dave was inducted into the Alford Hall of Fame at the 1995 Annual Meeting in Decatur, AL, in part due to a large body of research he has compiled. Beginning in this issue, we will share some of that research with AAFA members.

ALFORD GENEALOGY

By David Price, Jr.—January 1994

I am sure that my Alford line originated in England although I have been unable to so connect it. Reference Schedule 1 of this genealogy. I have used many sources for compiling this genealogy: the Boddie books, correspondence with many closely related to my mother Bertha Mae Alford; Gil Alford's “About Alford,” a newsletter type of publication which led to the organization of The Alford American Family Association in 1987; Ron Head, whose research in Montgomery AL has discombobulated descendents of William Alford Jr and/or Wilkins Alford who are not sure which is their ancestor at the same time adding much solid data on the Alford's in Alabama and who discovered the unmistakable evidence that Jacob Alford is the link between my William SR and my Artemus Salathiel Alford; *AAFA ACTION*, a quarterly publication that more or less grew out of Gil Alford's publication; and census records, wills, and every other source that I could find.

There has been a doubt cast as to the relationship between my William Sr. and Lodwick Alford. The New Kent VA birth records indicate that William was born in 1734 which would make him 91 when he died instead of 84 as

shown by the newspaper obituary. I don't consider a seven year difference a hindrance since the accuracy of records between 1734 and 1825 is such that many consider such minor difference as the equivalent of documentation.

It will be noted that the long list of Lodwick's children includes more than one case of children having the same name. The custom of naming a child after a recently deceased child is well established although that cannot account for all of Lodwick's children. DAR records long showed Lodwick as dying in Georgia in 1789 whereas a reputed will puts his death in North Carolina in 1794. For several years, some researchers have considered the DAR records unreliable in this regard; however, Lodwick H. Alford, a descendent of James Lodwick (Lotwic), schedules 4 and 24, has recently discovered information which seems to place Lodwick Sr. back in Georgia. It should be noted that Lodwick H. Alford [AAFA #11] contends that James Lodwick is actually a son of James Jr. (schedule 3 b 1713). I do not claim that my placement of James Lodwick is the final answer to this problem.

With various descendents claiming differences as the one noted above, it would be arrogant to claim that this genealogy is correct in each and every case; however, I believe that it can reasonably be stated that this Alford genealogy is substantially correct. There are no genealogies that are not subject to correction upon disclosure of new evidence.

Reference is often made to the attitude of Southerners regarding the Civil War and their ancestors taking part in that war. My mother was an exception in not knowing that any of her ancestors were in the Civil War until I discovered that her grandfather Artemus S.

Alford enlisted in the Confederate Army on November 3 1864, at Sparta, Alabama. It may be noted that my Price grandfather was a soldier in the opposing army.

The size of this genealogy attests to the prolificacy of the line which has grown exponentially beginning with John who patented land in New Kent Co VA in 1682. In addition to those enumerated herein, I have compiled dozens of Alford's who appear to be descended from John but with respect to whom I cannot determine the exact connection.

Although the above might represent a fairly accurate account of the settlement of Alford's in New England, the effort to link the Massachusetts Alford's with the Virginia Alford's appears to be lacking in concrete evidence. Although not proved, the theory that the Virginia Alford's came directly from England is believed to be a more realistic approach. James William Zion Alford is included above because some descendants claim several generations of James William Zion Alford's. It is not believed that there is enough evidence to accept such a theory. There was a Lt. Col. William Alford who lived in Warwick Co VA or Elizabeth Co VA. He was murdered in 1674. His wife remarried in 1675 to John Hurst. Robert Gilbert was tried for William's murder but was acquitted in 1675. Boddie says that the murdered William Alford was probably the father of my John Alford who patented land in New Kent Co VA; however, it is not believed that proper documentation can be made for extending the New Kent Co VA Alford line back of this point. Boddie indicates that the William Alford who died in 1709-10 never married; however, Hugh Edwin Alford (HEA) cites both John and William as patenting land in New Kent Co VA in 1682 and both dying in the same year as an indication that John and William were brothers. Although HEA makes a case for William being the father of James, it is believed that the following more clearly reflects the facts as revealed by subsequent researchers.

PLEASE NOTE: It has not been proven that this William Alford was the son of Lodwick Alford. It is only a possibility at this time. Some would say it is a probability. Seems likely that Owens and Wilkens will prove to be the same person.

4th Great-Grandparents

96. Lodwick Alford born about 1710, New Kent County, VA, married (1) Elizabeth Cade, married (2) Susanna Cade, married (3) Unknown. Lodwick died 1800, Franklin County, NC. There has long been a family tradition—reinforced by some DAR records—that Lodwick married a Rebecca Ferrell. Nothing has been found to support this idea. A North Carolina court record lists his wife as Sarah and some believe he married Sarah, the widow of his brother Goodrich. It appears that the daughters of Goodrich were mentioned in Lodwick's will. There is nothing to indicate the mother of any of the children other than William, Elizabeth and Jacob whose births are recorded in St. Peter's Parish, New Kent County, VA.

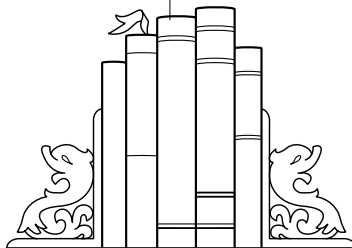
97. Elizabeth Cade born Apr 29 1717, New Kent County, VA, died May 29 1735, New Kent County. There are some in the family who believe Elizabeth was a Cade. The records do prove that such a person was available for the marriage and from all indications the Alfords and Cades were very close. See also the record on Sussana Cade, the younger sister of Elizabeth, and the next supposed wife of Lodwick.

192. James Alford (John¹) born about 1687, probably New Kent County, VA, married Unknown. James died about 1730, New Kent County, VA. Birth and death dates are estimates based on other recorded events in New Kent County in the St. Peter's Parish Register. PLEASE NOTE: It is not proven that he was the son of John Alford, but there is strong circumstantial evidence indicating that he is. ❖

Booklist Additions

The Booklist is a compilation of references to Alford and spelling variations contained in books and some periodicals. Not every library has every book that contains information about Alford. If we all work together to extract Alford data from books located across the country and centralize this information, more data is available to more Alford researchers.



Entries are organized by state and county. Each entry lists the book name and publication data followed by the name in bold print of every Alford listed on the pages that AAFA has. The page number where the name is found is listed next followed by a brief description (and sometimes the complete listing) of what information about the person is contained on the page.

Census indexes and cemetery lists are generally not included on this list. These will be handled by their respective AAFA committees. You may send copies from such books and we will pass them on to the committees.

These frontier sheriffs were also compelled to deputize men with shadowy backgrounds or persons known to be associates of badmen. To fight fire with fire was a not uncommon tactic of other law enforcement agencies....

Elsewhere, in Cochise County, Arizona, Sheriff John Slaughter deputized Burt Alvord, whom many citizens regarded as a saloon bum. Slaughter may have desired an entre into the underworld that thrived in the local bars.

Chapter 9, pp. 193-194

The prospect of having to kill a person during an arrest always loomed large. John Slaughter, sheriff of Cochise County, Arizona, cautioned

his deputies about arresting a "bad sort."

"I'd advise you to fire first and then yell, 'throw up your hands,'" said the noted manhunter....

"One historian asserts that Western lawmen did not worry about public censure when they killed a suspect. Frontier juries "almost invariably" ruled in favor of them or accepted the lawman's plea of justifiable homicide.

A Cochise County coroner's jury accorded Sheriff John Slaughter a clean bill in the death of two train robbers. Slaughter, Deputy Burt Alvord, and two possemen caught them asleep in the Whetstone Mountains on the morning of 7 June 1888. In frank, if colorful, language, Slaughter related this engagement to the jury:

"This morning, after daylight, I crawled up to within 50 yards of [the band] ... and asked them if they would surrender. They answered with their guns.... Just at this time, one of the men fired a shot, and knocked the bark off the tree close to my ear. Just about that time, I shot him. About a second afterwards, [a second man] jumped with a six-shooter in his hand and I said, 'Burt [Deputy Alvord], there is another Son-of-a-bitch,' and I shot him. Just after that this man Manuel [Robles who evidently escaped] ran down the Canyon, ... and I said, 'Burt, there is another Son-of-a-bitch. Shoot him!' and I shot him...."

Slaughter's biographer notes that the sheriff "seldom waited for the other party to make the first move."

Chapter 14, p. 293: "The Shrievalty Enters the Twentieth Century"

Advancement in communications promoted the efficiency of the sheriffs and other law enforcers. The telephone possessed much potential. The United States Army introduced the first Bell

devices into Arizona in 1878.... By the turn of the century, conversations were possible between the larger towns of Arizona....

Only a year later [1901], telephones in the border towns of Douglas and Naco were employed to coordinate with Mexican police in the pursuit of the Burt Alvord band of train robbers.

In the section titled "Arizona," p. 4, with towns or locations as subdivisions

Fairbank [Cochise County] is not much to look at today, but at the turn of the century it was an important stop on the railroad to Mexico and a stage terminal for mail and express....

The most exciting day Fairbank ever experienced was February 15, 1900, the day of the attempt to rob a Wells Fargo express car. Most western train robberies occurred on a lonely stretch of track, usually far enough outside the nearest town to give the robbers plenty of time to raid the express car or the passenger coaches and disappear over the nearest ridge. The robbery attempt at Fairbank was unique in that it took place at the depot in the midst of a crowd.

The holdup was planned by the notorious Burt Alvord and his gunhappy henchman, Bill Stiles. At the time both were peace officers at Wilcox, Arizona.

To carry out the affair, Alvord called on local hard cases "Three fingered Jack" Dunlap, George and Louis Owens, Bravo Juan Yoas, and a man named Bob Brown. The plan was to hit the Wells Fargo car just as it was unloading at the station, using innocent

bystanders as shields. In arranging the details, Alvord and Stiles took great pains to select a night on which Wells Fargo express messenger Jeff Milton, a former lawman and Texas Ranger, was not on the run. Milton was an experienced gunfighter, and the outlaws did not want to have to contend with him. But as luck would have it, Milton substituted for another messenger that night, and when the train pulled in around dark, there he was at the door of the car, ready to hand out packages.

When a voice from the station platform shouted "Hands up!" Milton thought it was a joke and continued with his work. But the next command was "Throw up your hands and come out of there," and a shot knocked off Milton's hat. Jeff had left his pistol on his desk inside the car. His sawed-off shotgun was within reach beside the door, but he could not use it for fear of hitting bystanders. The bandits' next shots struck Jeff in the left arm,

knocking him to the floor of the car. His attackers, thinking he was finished, rushed the door. But Milton now had his shotgun, and he put eleven pellets into the belly of the first robber, Jack Dunlap. A twelfth pellet hit Bravo Juan Yoas, taking the fight out of him and sending him on his way to find his horse.

The three remaining attackers riddled the interior of the car with their Winchesters. Inside, Milton, although weak from loss of blood, pulled the keys to the safe from his pocket and threw them into a corner behind some packages. Then he passed out. The bandits, unable to find the keys and not prepared to force the safe, put their wounded comrade on his horse and galloped off.

Sometime during the three days the board of directors will slip in a meeting. Usually the main one is on Friday evening after the reception and then another short one during the break on Saturday morning, after the new board is elected, for them to vote on officers.

Saturday afternoon we have the Alford family forum and talk about "Alford" history and concentrate on the "Alford" ancestry of those present, with slides showing how the attendees relate to each other. Some folks say that this is the real "heart" of the meeting. Don't worry if you're bashful because you won't be called on to make a presentation—unless you want to. There are enough of us who are "gabby" to more than fill the time.

The dinner on Saturday night is really a banquet—if you can have a buffet at a banquet—with lots of good food and a little talking after it's over. The food is always better and more plentiful than most banquets I've been to, and the talking is more fun and shorter.

Sunday morning there is a very informal session with no presentations. I will bring all of the "dead Alford books" I have in the basement that will fit into our van. It really is a mini-library. They will be available in a "research room" throughout the meeting but there will be "helpers" present

on Sunday morning. We are going to dispense with the refreshment break on this informal Sunday morning—those who want coffee can break whenever they like.

At noon on Sunday the official part is over. We sometimes have folks who have arranged for tours following the meeting, or some just get together on their own and see things.

We do have to charge a fee for each of the sessions to defray the cost of the refreshments and to cover a small administrative expense. It has always been the policy that the general membership would not have to pay for part of a meeting that was enjoyed by only a fraction of the membership. Those who participate pay all the costs. The fees for each meeting are set to try to break even. We have come very close every year but last year had a slight overage and offered refunds to those who desired one. If you can possibly make it to the California meeting—or the one next year in Paducah, KY—I promise you will enjoy it. You'll want to come back again and again. ❖

Robert Newton Alford

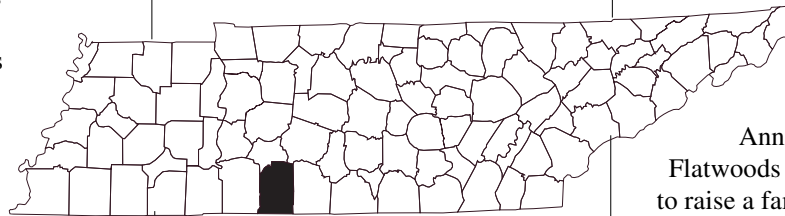
Robert Newton Alford was born in Lawrence County, Tennessee in 1839. He was the son of Isaac W. and Mary P. Edmiston Alford and was born on their farm in the Flatwoods community. Robert had nine brothers and sisters. His father was a respected county official and businessman and Robert Newton Alford received a good education at the Jackson Academy in Lawrenceburg.

We can assume that Robert Newton Alford's childhood was very similar to that of other pioneer youngsters in early Lawrence County. As he grew to manhood the great Civil War loomed on the horizon and would change his life.

In May of 1861, Robert Newton Alford and his first cousins, William and Jasper Edmiston, joined other Lawrence County men and went to Lynnville in Giles County in order to volunteer for service in the Confeder-

ate Army. The men from Lawrence County made up Company I of Colonel John Calvin Brown's 3rd Tennessee Infantry Regiment. They took part in the Battle of Fort Donelson on February 16, 1862, with the result that almost all of the company was captured and sent to prison camp. The night before the surrender, however, Robert Newton Alford was one of the infantry who was able to escape with Nathan Bedford Forrest. He and the rest of the stragglers who escaped returned home.

It was the spring of the year when young Robert Newton Alford arrived home and he helped his mother and brothers and sisters put the farm in order. His father had died in 1859 and the farm was one of the largest in the county. There was plenty of work to be done. While he was home, Robert



Newton Alford decided to marry his first cousin, Martha Ann Edmiston.

The wedding took place at his mother's home on July 24, 1862. When the big day arrived everything was ready. All kinds of good food had been prepared for the wedding feast, the preacher had arrived and the ceremony was about to begin. Suddenly, Yankee soldiers were spotted coming down the lane toward the Alford house.

The kitchen and pantry to the rear of the house had 18 inch wide boards on the floor. As the Yankee soldiers marched up to the Alford house, Dorcas, the house slave, ripped up two boards and hid Robert Newton and the

preacher under the house. The soldiers came into the house, searched it, helped themselves to the food and left. When it was safe, they brought Robert Newton and the preacher out from their hiding place and went on with the wedding and the celebration.

The young couple had very little time to set up housekeeping, however, because the war was still going on and volunteers for the Confederacy were very much in need. In the fall of 1862, Robert Newton Alford and his brothers; James Madden and Joseph Harrison Alford; went to Columbia, Tennessee and joined Jacob Biffle's Cavalry Regiment which was a part of General Nathan Bedford Forrest's cavalry.

After the war was over, the Alford brothers returned home and picked up the pieces of their prewar life. Robert Newton and Martha Ann settled down in the Flatwoods community and began to raise a family of their own.

His mother-in-law and aunt, Margaret Dickson Edmiston, and her daughter, Lizzie, lived in his home after the death of his father-in-law, William A. Edmiston. Robert Newton Alford failed to share in the Alford estate after the death of his mother in 1876. He was presumed to be dead and his share of the estate went to his brother and sister, Joseph Harrison and Mary Etta "Molly", both of whom were unmarried at the time.

Robert Newton and his family lived on the farm of their cousin, Lue T. Williams Hannah, after the death of her husband, James M. Hannah in 1881. She was a first cousin to both Robert Newton and Martha Ann Alford on the Edmiston side. Her

mother, Margaret Edmiston Williams, was a sister to Mary P. Edmiston Alford and to William A. Edmiston.

In addition to operating the Hannah farm, Robert Newton Alford earned a living by serving as Deputy Tax Collector and by doing carpenter work. They were very religious and took an active interest in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church at Mt. Ararat. Robert Newton Alford served as an elder in the church and on the Bereavement Committee. He helped to write many resolutions of condolence to the loved ones of members of the congregation who passed away. He was a Democrat, just as his father had been before him.

Robert Newton and Martha Ann Edmiston Alford had seven children; six of whom lived long, useful lives. A set of twins; Maggie E. and William James, were born in 1866 but little Maggie died soon thereafter. William James was followed by Gillie Isaac (1870), John (1876), Bobby Joe (1877), Lizzie Belle (1880), and Mattie (1882). As time passed, all except John married and moved out on their own. John was subject to seizures and was unable to do much work, because he would have a seizure when he became hot. He was never able to go anywhere unless accompanied by Robert Newton or another adult. John could write beautifully and spent most of his time reading.

By 1905, the Alford household consisted of Robert Newton, Martha Ann, Cousin Lue Hannah, John and Lizzie Belle, who was still unmarried. That year the Alford household had an unexpected, but welcome, addition to their family.

Down the lane from the Alford home lived David Thomas Quarles and his family. Quarles had been sheriff of Lawrence County in the 1880's and

he and his second wife, Elizabeth, had been blessed with the birth of a daughter, whom they named Annie Mae. Tragically the mother died with phlebitis when the child was three weeks old, leaving the infant without proper care.

Martha Ann Alford, always the thoughtful neighbor, was deeply concerned about the welfare of the child. She told her husband that she was going down to the Quarles home, and if no one was taking care of the baby she was going to bring the child into the Alford home. When she returned the baby was with her, much to the delight of her five year old granddaughter, Bonnie Lou Alford, who was visiting her grandparents at the time.

In 1904, Robert Newton Alford had built a cradle for his son and daughter-in-law, Bobby Joe Alford and Hattie Estella Moore Alford's expected addition. The twin boys had been born dead, and the cradle had not been used. He took the cradle and used it for the child. David Thomas Quarles died in 1907 and Annie Mae Quarles became a permanent member of the Alford home.

In 1911, Robert Newton Alford applied for a pension for service in the Confederate Army, but sadly the old soldier was turned down because he could not prove how he got out of the service. He died in 1915 after a long, useful life.

He was 75 years old at the time of his death. Robert Newton's wife and first cousin, Martha Ann Edmiston Alford, joined him in death in 1920. Both of them are buried in the Mt. Ararat Cemetery.

The obituary of Martha Ann Edmiston Alford appeared in the "Democrat Union" and is reprinted below:

Mrs. Martha Ann Alford died on

October 8th She was 75 years old at her last birthday, August 19th. Her general health had not been good for several years, as she had suffered from asthma for some time, but was up and about, and had gone to the home of a neighbor to visit a sick child, when from feebleness she fell, breaking one of her hips, from which she quickly passed away.

She was a lovable character with a bright intellect, of a cheerful disposition, that made her many friends and which makes her presence so much missed. She was hopeful until she lost consciousness only a few hours before her demise. She made her home with Mr. and Mrs. Lee Davidson, her son-in-law and daughter, her husband having preceded her to the grave. Services were held at the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and her body was buried at Mt. Ararat on Saturday, October 9th with funeral services in the church conducted by Rev. S.H. Eshman and A.P. Moore.

A huge crowd from Lawrenceburg followed the body to its last resting place and a large concourse of old friends from the Flatwoods helped to fill the little church which had been her church home since she united with that institution early in life. She leaves five children; Gillie Alford of Sheffield and Jim and Bob Alford, Mrs. Lee Davidson and Mrs. Algie Chaffin, all of this city, to whom mother is only a sweet memory now, but a memory that is a blessing that still lives on through life.

In February of 1977, Tommie Jean Alford Alexander and Jackie Alford Cooke, great, great, great, great granddaughters of Hickman Williams, officially became members of the Daughters of the American Revolution. This opened the door to the DAR for all female descendents of Robert Newton Alford. Tommie Jean is #614899 and Jackie is #714900.

Robert Newton Alford's Civil War Service

.... The Third Tennessee Infantry Regiment, Confederate States of America, was organized in Middle Tennessee on May 16, 1861. The regiment was under the command of Colonel John Calvin Brown of Giles County and was known throughout the war as "Brown's Regiment."

Company K was put together at Lynnville in Giles County and was commanded by Captain Benjamin Franklin Matthews. Most of the men in this company were from Lawrence County. Robert Newton Alford was a member of this company.

.... Later in the summer they marched to Camp Trousdale and on August 7, 1861 they were mustered in the Confederate service.

Ten days later the regiment marched to Bowling Green, Kentucky and joined a division commanded by Brigadier General Simon Bolivar Buckner. At that time both North and South were striving to sway Kentucky to their side and both the Confederates and Federals were marching mighty armies into that border state.

.... The 150 mile Confederate line of defense from Bowling Green to Columbus, Kentucky that included the river forts [Fort Henry on the Tennessee River and Fort Donelson on the Cumberland River] was under the direct command of General Albert Sidney Johnston.

Johnston's army, including General Buckner's Division at Bowling Green, began to prepare to meet the Federal charge. On January 20, 1862 Johnston gave Buckner the order to move his 8,000 men, including Brown's Regiment, from Bowling Green to Russellville, Kentucky, about thirty miles to the southwest. At Russellville,

they were to be employed as a strategic reserve for the protection of the two forts.

Fort Henry fell on February 6th and the next day the order came for Buckner's Division to move directly to Fort Donelson. The Battle of Fort Donelson began on February 10th. The Rebel Army began the defense of the fort by pushing the enemy back. In fact, the fighting on the first day was a standoff. During the night, however, both General John Floyd, in command of the fort, and General Simeon Pillow, the second in command, began to think about what Grant would do to them if he won the battle. It seems that both Floyd and Pillow had mistreated Grant while at West Point.

They solved their personal problem by passing command to Buckner and escaping into the night. Nathan Bedford Forrest, then only a lieutenant colonel, was furious when he heard about the plan. He took his cavalry and any of the infantry who wanted to and escaped across swollen Lick Creek during the night....

Among the more than 300 infantry who escaped with Forrest was Robert Newton Alford. The simple notation, "Escaped from Fort Donelson," is written on the army record of Private Alford. This is the last time he is mentioned as a member of Brown's Regiment....

After the escape, Robert Newton Alford returned to Lawrence County and became a civilian. While at home, Robert Newton Alford and his first cousin, Martha Ann Edmiston, decided to get married and were married at the Alford home on July 24, 1862.

In the meanwhile, Forrest had fought at Shiloh in April and had captured the Federal garrison at Murfreesboro in July. He had become so well

known and popular that he had little difficulty in gathering a very formidable body of mounted men by the late summer of 1862. Most of these men enlisting with Forrest were from Middle Tennessee. Several regiments who became famous were organized during this period. These included; the Fourth Tennessee led by Colonel James W. Starnes. The Eighth Tennessee under Colonel George Dibrell and the Ninth Tennessee under Wayne County's Jacob B. Biffle. These three regiments along with Forrest's original regiment, the Fourth Alabama, were organized into a brigade with Forrest, now a brigadier general, as the commanding officer.

Company D of Biffle's Regiment was organized at Columbia, Tennessee on August 31, 1862 and was made up of Lawrence County men.

Captain Lewis Kirk, a fine cavalry officer but a man of questionable character, was the commanding officer of this company. Robert Newton Alford and two of his brothers, James Madden and Joseph Harrison, were members of this company from August 31, 1862 until December 20, 1864. Biffle's Regiment made a very important contribution to the war effort of the Confederate States of America during the next three years.

.... Biffle's Regiment fought with Forrest from August 31, 1862 until November, 1863 when Forrest was sent home by Bragg to form a new brigade. They rejoined Forrest on April 23, 1864 and fought with him until the end of the war. [Bobby Alford's book elaborates in interesting detail on the battles that Biffle's Regiment fought in with Forrest.]

.... Forrest's cavalry helped the Confederate Army retreat by guarding their rear and continually skirmishing with the enemy. They

retreated through Lawrenceburg on December 20th and recrossed the Tennessee River to safety on December 23, 1864. This unsuccessful invasion by General Hood and the Army of Tennessee doomed the Confederate States of America to defeat even though the war was not officially over until May of 1865.

On December 20, 1864, while Hood's Army was retreating through Lawrenceburg, the Alford brothers left the army and returned home. There are conflicting reports as to the reason they left at this point. The army record of all three brothers simply states; "Deserted on December 20, 1864."

In 1911, when Robert Newton Alford applied for a Confederate Pension, he and several men who were members of Company D, stated under oath that they remained in Lawrenceburg under orders from Captain Lewis Kirk. At that time, Hood's Army reported over 14,000 men either dead, wounded, captured or missing. His army could not actually be considered an effective fighting force, but an unorganized mob fleeing for its life. The Confederate cause was lost and for all practical purposes the war was over.

The fact that several of the men in the company gave testimony that; "Captain Lewis Kirk ordered them to remain in Lawrenceburg," indicates it was important for some of the members of the regiment to remain in Lawrenceburg. Captain Kirk was not around at the end of the war to tell the reason for the order and apparently he did not make any explanation to the men for ordering them to stay in Lawrenceburg.

In 1891, the State of Tennessee enacted legislation which established a Board of Pension Examiners, who had the authority to decide if a Confederate veteran applying for a pension was incapable of making a living for himself. The burden of proof rested

with the veteran, who was obligated to prove disability and an honorable discharge from the Confederate Army.

In 1911, Robert Newton Alford, then 71, and suffering from a bad heart and other afflictions that go with advanced age, filed an application for a Confederate Pension. The pension was refused because he could not prove when, where or how he got out of the army. As previously mentioned, he and several members of his company made statements under oath that they had been ordered home by their captain, Lewis Kirk.

Robert Newton Alford had been a member of two different Confederate Army units, the Third Tennessee Infantry Regiment and the Ninth Tennessee Cavalry Regiment, but he could not prove how he got out of either regiment. The only man who could actually prove how Alford got out of the regiment was Lewis Kirk, and he was dead and unavailable to give testimony.

Robert Newton Alford's Civil War record simply says; "Escaped from Fort Donelson." and, "Deserted on December 20, 1864."...

CHILDREN OF ROBERT NEWTON ALFORD

Robert Newton Alford and his wife, Martha Ann Edmiston Alford, had seven children. Of these children, six of them grew to be adults.

The first births were twins: William James and Maggie E. Alford in 1866. William James lived to be 86 years old, but Maggie E. died the same year as her birth.

Gillie Isaac was born in January 1870, Johnnie W. was born in November 1876, Bobby Joe in October 1877, Lizzie Bell in February 1880 and Mattie E. in September 1884.

William James Alford 1866–1951

William James Alford married Ella Hampton on December 21, 1892 and they lived in the Ethridge (Wayne Station) Community for many years. Ella was born on August 3, 1880. She was one of those who became a victim of the great influenza epidemic of 1918/19. Her obituary from the "Lawrence Democrat" is reprinted here:

Mrs. Ella Hampton Alford, wife of William J. Alford, died at their home in this city on Wednesday morning at 1:00 O'clock. Mrs. Alford, who was Miss Ella Hampton of Ethridge before her marriage, was a good true Christian woman, a devoted wife and a loyal member of the Southern Methodist Church. The funeral and burial will be held at the Methodist Church in Ethridge with services conducted by Rev. M.P. Woods of this city. Mr. and Mrs. Alford have been living here for about a year, he being an employee of the firm of Moore & Alford. The Democrat joins the many expressions of sorrow and sympathy or the bereaved husband, relatives and friends and prays that they may find comfort in the Christian hope of reunion in a better land.

William James Alford continued to live in Lawrenceburg and later remarried to Mary Scott. Their wedding announcement is copied below as it appeared in the "Lawrence Democrat" on December 18, 1924:

Miss Mary Scott of Waynesboro and Mr. James Alford of Lawrenceburg were united in marriage Saturday at Waynesboro with Reverend Ramsey of that city officiating. The bride and groom drove to Lawrenceburg where a delicious six o'clock dinner was tendered them at the home of the groom's sister, Mrs. L.V. Davidson, where the new married

couple have rooms.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bud Scott of Waynesboro, one of Wayne County's prominent families, petit and charming. The groom has been connected with R.J. Moore for some time and has many friends here who wish him and his wife abundant success and happiness.

He died in 1951 at the age of 85. His obituary appeared in the "Democrat Union" on September 27, 1951 as follows:

William James Alford, widely known Lawrenceburg man, died early Tuesday morning at the Lawrence County Hospital following a long illness. Funeral services were held September 26, at 2:00 o'clock at the Coleman Memorial Methodist Church by the pastor, Rev. Russell Boaz, assisted by the Rev. Bernard Scates, of the First Baptist Church. Internment was in the Ethridge Cemetery.

Mr. Alford, a native of Lawrence County, was 86 years of age. He was a son of the late Robert Newton and Martha Ann Edmiston Alford and was a member of the Methodist Church.

In addition to his wife, the former Miss Mary Baugus [?], he is survived by one brother, B.J. Alford, and one sister, Mrs. Mattie Chaffin, all of this city.

Gillie Isaac Alford 1870-1940

Gillie Isaac Alford was born in Lawrence County, Tennessee on January 10, 1870. He was the son of Robert Newton and Martha Ann Edmiston Alford.

Gillie Isaac Alford was married to Elma Verna Foutz who was born on August 3, 1880 in Randolph County, Indiana. She died in 1919 during the great influenza epidemic. At the time of her death, they were living in Sheffield, Alabama where Gillie was employed helping to build Wilson Dam.

Her obituary appeared in the "Lawrence Democrat" on February 5, 1919:

At their home in Sheffield, Alabama, Mrs. Gillie I. Alford, lately of this city, died after an illness of influenza followed by pneumonia on Thursday of last week. She is survived by her husband, who is a member of an old and prominent Lawrence County family and seven children.

The body of this good woman was brought back to the old home in this county for burial, and was laid to rest in the Kidd Cemetery on Monday with touching and appropriate services. The family had been living here for a number of years, where Mr. Alford held official position, but had moved to Sheffield last year. In common with a large circle of friends, we extend to the bereaved husband and children assurance of deepest sympathy. No greater earthly loss can be sustained than that of a good mother and wife.

Gillie Isaac Alford later moved to Memphis where he died on January 26, 1940. His obituary appeared in the "Democrat Union" on February 5, 1940 as follows:

"Gel" Alford, a well known Lawrence County man died in a Memphis Hospital January 26, 1940 after a long illness caused by a fall. Later he had pneumonia which caused his immediate death.

Mr. Alford was the son of Mr. and Mrs. R.N. Alford, who preceded him to the grave some time ago. They were residents of this city at the time of their death.

Mr. Alford was 70 years and a few day old at the time of his passing. He had lived most of his life in this county.

Mr. Alford's wife passed away 21 years ago. He leaves to mourn his passing seven children; four boys and three girls, four grandchildren, two brothers and two sisters.

His body was brought here on January 28 and taken to the home of his brother; Bob Alford on Mahr

Avenue where funeral services were held. He was laid to rest in the Kidd Cemetery in the Flatwoods community by the side of his wife.

Sweet songs were sung by Charles W. Vaughan, Mrs. Roy Alford, Mr. Yeager and Roy Collins. Pallbearers were Joe Davidson, Asa Giles, Roy Alford, John W. Springer, James T. Moore and Tom Locke.

- (1) Mary Martha Bonnie Lucretia Alford was born on March 9, 1900. Bonnie Alford was only 19 years old when her mother died and she spent much of her life being a mother to her brothers and sisters. Bonnie never married and she died on March 30, 1993 at the age of 93. Her obituary appeared in the "Democrat Union" and is reprinted here:

Miss Bonnie Lucretia Alford, age 93 of Pine Bluff, Arkansas passed away Tuesday, March 30, 1993 in Pine Bluff.

She was the daughter of the late Gillie I. and Elma Foutz Alford. She was retired from AT & T after 46 years, having been Chief Operator for 40 years and the last six years, she was head of Centralized Ticket Investigative Bureau. She was a member of the Telephone Pioneers and served as a gray lady volunteer at the VA Hospital in Memphis. She was a member of the Ridgeway Baptist Church and taught the five year old Sunday School Class for many years.

The funeral services were held Friday, April 2, 1993 at the Oakes and Nickols Funeral Home with Rev. Joseph Alford and Rev. Frank Smith officiating. Burial followed in the Kidd Cemetery.

She is survived by one sister, Mrs. J.R. (Elma) Stewart, Pine Bluff, Arkansas; one sister-in-law, Mrs. Arlene Alford, Summerville, TN,

several nieces and nephews, including Mrs. Ken (India) Hay and Mrs. Chris (Dawn) Gray of Columbia.

- (2) Arlene Elizabeth Mailene Alford was born in Lawrence County, Tennessee on June 10, 1902. She was married to Chisolm Strong. She died on November 11, 1986.
- (3) Gillie Lee Alford was born in Mt. Pleasant, Tennessee on August 25, 1905. He married Jacquelyn Smith, on July 4, 1926. He died on March 12, 1978. [Bobby Alford's book extends this family.]

Correction: "Indiana Alford Brothers in the Civil War"

Deena Cross, AAFA #126, sent additional information and corrections to "Indiana Alford Brothers in the Civil War," *AAFA ACTION*, Summer 1996, pp. 41–44, 57 (not 59, printed in error on p. 44). The discrepancies occur on p. 44 beginning with Hannah Baker, who m. James Alford, b. 1791 in VA. Deena's research shows that Hannah was b. in Crocketts Cove, VA [county uncertain]. The article also says that Hannah moved to Chautauqua Co., KS in 1869, but Deena has found Hannah on the 1870 Daviess Co., Indiana Census, when Hannah Baker was living with Orleana Harris, her granddaughter, with whom she later moved to KS.

Hannah's parents are listed as Joseph Joel Baker and Nannie R. Smith, with no further data. Deena has undocumented information that Joseph Baker was b. between Dec. 1753 and Feb. 1754 in VA and d. between 26 Oct. and Nov. 19, 1832, also in VA, and that he m. Hannah _____. 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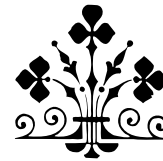
