Healthy Child Care Alabama has expanded statewide and a new nurse consultant began serving Jackson, Madison, Marshall, and Morgan Counties in October 2014. The nurse consultant is Crystal Page, RN, and she may be reached at her office in the Madison County Health Department by telephone at (256) 533-8711 or by email at crystal.page@adph.state.al.us.

Healthy Child Care Alabama is a program that supports people who take care of other people's children—whether it is in a child care center or day care home, or through family, friend, or neighbor care. The program's purpose is to improve the health and safety of children in child care through partnership with health professionals, child care providers, and families.

Healthy Child Care Alabama can provide health and safety programs for the staff of both licensed and legally exempt child care programs. All services are provided free of charge, including CPR and First Aid classes. These educational sessions may be conducted on site at the child care center or home and may include programs for the children in the program, as well as their parents. Examples of topics include sanitation and infection control, disaster preparedness, fire safety, gun safety, dental health, nutrition, and physical activity. As well, Ms. Page can provide telephone consultation on health and safety concerns.





### Training Sessions offered this quarter:

#### January 2015

#### **Everyday Math Play in Preschool**

As adults, we can tend to over-think how to go about teaching math to young children, but promoting mathematical thinking and basic math concepts can come through all kinds of simple hand-on activities. This training session will look at fun math activities to incorporate throughout the day in your early learning environment.

#### February 2015

#### Recognizing Common Illnesses in Early **Childhood Settings**

Can you recognize a common childhood illness when you see one? Childhood illnesses present themselves in many ways. #### March 2015

#### What Do You Do With the Mad That You Feel?

Controlling angry feelings is a developmental skill children learn from the people who care for them. Self-control grows in stages as the children develops and there are activities child care providers can promote to support that process. We will discover helpful ways to think about anger and self-control, not only in children, but also in ourselves, as adults.

#### Focus to Be Happy

"It's a paradox that although we are never so happy or productive as when we are intensely focused on a given activity, we also avoid and resist entering into such focused states," observes Edward Hallowell in his **Harvard Business Review** article (November 18, 2010; hbr.com), "Will Focus Make You Happy?". He argues that we often resist focusing, because it requires energy—it's hard work. He offers these solutions to "fractured focus":

Recreate boundaries that technology has broken down...
Turn it off. Close the door... Don't allow intrusions into
the precious process of creative thought.

Spend as much time as you can at the intersection of three spheres: What you're good at, what you like to do, and what adds value to the world.... At that intersection lies a land of joy and productivity that can successfully compete with the forces of entropy, of disorder, that tilt us all toward lassitude.

#### 7 Insights to Unchain Your Brain

In her **Psychology Today** article, "<u>7 Ways to Unchain Your Brain and Do More, Better</u>", Susan Perry shares these insights for unchaining your brain from Theo Compernolle's book *BrainChains*:

- Your brain is a network of networks of networks, containing 160 billion cells and eight quadrillion connections, plus your brain is connected to every cell in your body.
- Our reflecting brain involves thinking deep, thinking ahead, thinking back, and thinking critically about what our reflex brain concludes quickly.
- You cannot think two thoughts at the same time. Both simultaneous multitasking and serial multitasking require switching back and forth between two tasks.
- Task-switching slows you down and messes with the quality of what your brain produces.
- Restarting a task takes more time than sticking with it, so that every minor distraction delays you more than you realize.
- Emails, tweets, and texts are far less deep and effective than actual conversations where we use our senses to gather important information.
- Stressed minds need recovery time. In a boring meeting? Far better to let your mind wander than to connect and guzzle more data.

As a status, accreditation provides public notification that an institution or program meets standards of quality set forth by an accrediting agency. NAFCC sponsors the only nationally recognized accreditation system designed specifically for family child care providers. This system was designed by hundreds of providers, parents, and early care and education experts in an effort to create a quality indicator for family child care programs across the country.

NAFCC Accreditation is recognized as the highest indicator that a family child care program is a quality environment. In states where Quality Rating Systems have been implemented, NAFCC Accreditation is often the "top" level in the rating system.

NAFCC Accreditation is awarded to family child care providers who meet the eligibility requirements and the Quality Standards for NAFCC Accreditation. Accreditation reflects a high level of quality through a process that examines all aspects of the family child care program, i.e. relationships, the environment, developmental learning activities, safety and health, and professional and business practices. Once family child care providers become accredited, they agree to abide by the standards set forth and to be measured against those standards, with periodic integrity and compliance reviews. There are over 2100 NAFCC Accredited providers throughout the United States and in other locations worldwide where military family child care professionals operate.

Significant research has provided evidence that warm, loving and home-like settings are natural environments for children during early childhood. 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## Training Track for ALL Ages

## **Advanced Training**

Advanced training is training for professionals who have at least three (3) years of experience and 30 credit hours in child development.

Advanced level training focuses on a more through knowledge of developmentally appropriate practice and high effective application and demonstration skills.

#### January 2015

#### **Dandelion and Orchid Children**

Most of us have genes that make us as hardy as dandelions: able to take root and survive almost anywhere. A few of us, however, are more like the orchid: fragile and fickle, but capable of blooming spectacularly if given greenhouse care. This session will explore both types of children and ways that we can encourage growth in all types of children, regardless of their environment or genes.

#### February 2015

#### **Technology in Early Childhood Education**

Recent national emphasis has been placed on the importance of early education for young children to ensure, when beginning kindergarten, they are ready to learn. School districts throughout the State of Alabama have begun to adopt 1:1 initiatives, meaning every child has a laptop or tablet. This session will focus and prepare the child care provider/teacher/trainer on how to utilize software/apps/computers to help children develop age-appropriate skills.. Active participation and discussion will be incorporated in the facilitation of this session. If you have a laptop or tablet, please bring it with you.

#### March 2015

#### The Three Little Pigs Challenge

As preschooler educators, we can expand kid's science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) skills by encouraging natural curiosity. The teacher's role is to be on the sidelines offering support when needed to help children develop new skills and facilitating interplay between children and the environment. A well-planned environment will provide children with an array of learning experiences. When such an environment is combined with intentional, brain-building learning activities, children have the best of all possible worlds. We will study the explosion of research in neuroscience and other developmental sciences on how to intentionally design brain building experiences for our children.

### **Basics in Child Care**

This training session covers topics required in the DHR Minimum Standards for new providers.

Through interactive activities and discussions, participants will explore the six developmental areas, including Child Development, Language Development, Positive Discipline and Guidance, Quality Child Care and Licensing, Child Care Professional and the Family, and Health, Safety and Universal Precautions.

This course is designed for NEW providers just entering the workforce.


