TURQUOISE (DECEMBER) BIRTHSTONE CONTINUED

Science of Turquoise

Turquoise is composed of hydrated copper and aluminum phosphate. It forms when circulating water alters other aluminum-rich rocks in desert environments. Turquoise has a slightly waxy appearance and can range in color from blue to shades of green and yellowish gray. The most valued color of turquoise, though, is the beautiful greenish-

blue that contrasts so nicely with precious metals such as silver.

Alternate birthstones for December are **Zircon** and **Blue Topaz**.

As cool and inviting as a blue lake on a blistering summer day, the alternate birthstone for December is derived from the Sanskrit word "tapas," meaning fire. This

meaning fire. This is because Blue Topaz was considered by ancient civilizations to have cooling properties. Not only was it believed to cool boiling water when thrown into the pot,

but to calm hot tempers as well! This gemstone was credited with many other healing powers, among them the ability to cure insanity, asthma, weak vision and insomnia. The Blue Topaz was even thought to have magical properties in its ability to make its wearer invisible in a threatening situation.

Blue Topaz is the hardest of the silicate minerals.

While pure Topaz is colorless, minor changes of elements within the stone result in a variety of other colors, such as blue, pale green, red, yellow and pink.

The blue hue is created when Topaz is heated,

whether the heat source is natural or engineered by man. The three shades of Blue Topaz are Sky, Swiss and London Blue. The latter is the deepest blue and is often used as a less expensive substitute for Sapphire.

Topaz is found primarily in Brazil, Nigeria, Sri Lanka, Mexico, Pakistan, China, and the United States.

A gift of Blue Topaz is symbolic of love and fidelity. Luckily, this cool blue gemstone has no legendary power to put out the burning flame of love!

Lapidary shop Rules

- The lapidary shop equipment may not be used by anyone who has not signed a liability waiver.
- 2. Shop equipment use flat fee is \$2.00 per hour. Sign in on arrival. Pay Supervisor and sign out before leaving the shop.
- "Open shop" hours are to be used only by those who have taken the cabochon class or have shown proficiency on the equipment.
- 4. All children under the age of 17 must be accompanied by an adult trained on the use of the equipment.
- Supervisor must inspect rock "set-up" prior to anyone starting slab saw.
- 6. Long hair should be tied back, loose sleeve should be secured, and safety procedures followed.
- Safety glasses are recommended and are the responsibility of the individual. Some are furnished by the GCGMS, or you may bring your own.
- 8. The last person to use a piece of equipment before the shop closes is responsible for cleaning that piece of equipment and the work area. This may include tabletop, sponges, aprons, catch trays, etc.
- 9. Shop Supervisor is the final authority on shop rules and usage.

The Geminid Meteor Shower

The Geminid meteor shower will peak on the nights of December 13 and 14, 2011.

As the year 2011 draws to a close, meteor-watchers are looking forward to the last big shower of the year on the nights of December 13 and 14. Wouldn't you know it? The moon will be only a few days past full. Its light will interfere with the shower.

Still, you will probably see some of these bright, medium-speed meteors, if you look.

Look for the Geminid meteor shower on the nights of December 13 and 14, 2011. For us in the northern

hemisphere, it's cold on these December nights. That's probably the only reason the Geminid meteor shower isn't as well-known or popular as the Perseid meteor shower in August. The Geminids often fall at rates even greater than the Perseids. But, in 2011, moonlight will interfere with the shower.

How are fossils formed?

*Some animals were quickly buried after their death (by sinking in mud, being buried in a sandstorm, etc). Over

time more and more sediment covered the remains. The parts of the animals that didn't rot (usually the harder parts like bones and teeth) were encased in the newly formed sediment. In the right circumstances (when there is no scavengers, quick burial, not much weathering) parts of the animal turned into fossils over time.

- * After a long time the chemicals in the buried animals bodies underwent a series of changes. As the bone slowly decayed, water infused with minerals seeped into the bone and replaced the chemicals in the bone with rock-like minerals. The process of fossilization involves the dissolving and replacement of the original minerals in the object with other minerals (and or per-mineralization - the filling up of spaces in fossils with minerals, and /or recrystallization in which a mineral changes its form).
- * In the end we get a heavy, rock-like copy of the original object - a fossil. The fossil has the same shape as the original object, but is chemically more like a rock!
