Child Welfare Training Committee – Commissioner Needed

The Child Welfare Training Committee advises the Colorado Department of Human Services on improvements that can be made to Child Welfare Training. Steps are being taken to identify new modes of training delivery and ways to administer training contracts more efficiently. State funds have been appropriated for enhanced training and resources for Colorado's first responders, mandatory reporters and county child welfare workers. Curriculum development and converting the appropriate curricula into a web-based format is in an early draft stage. CDHS is partnering with the Kempe Center, county departments, mandatory reporters, first responders and the child welfare community to develop the curriculum. Community Living Advisory Group - Commissioner Needed!

The Community Living Advisory Group (Advisory Group) was created by Governor Hickenlooper through an <u>Executive Order</u> in July 2012. It began its work in August 2012 and has been developing recommendations for changes to the Long-Term Services and Supports (LTSS) delivery system.

The Advisory Group is near the end of its work to develop its recommendations, which are on track for delivery to the Governor's Office in September 2014. The Advisory Group meets monthly for three hours. After September 2014, it is very likely that the Advisory Group will continue to meet, though less often, to advise on the implementation of recommendations for the LTSS system. The Audit will examine whether or not awarded grants comply with statute and address the documented impacts of gaming as well as the criteria used to determine gaming impacts on communities. Public Listening Sessions on BLM Planning 2.0 Initiative Slated for Denver and Sacramento

Ongoing effort works to improve the way we plan together

As part of its ongoing effort to improve the management of the nation's public lands by working more efficiently with the public and partners, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) will hold two public listening sessions on its Planning 2.0 initiative in Denver and Sacramento during October. Both meetings will provide an overview of the effort as well as a group discussion on methods to improve the BLM's planning process.

The Planning 2.0 effort is aimed at creating a more dynamic and efficient way of developing the <u>Resource Management Plans</u> (RMPs) that provide the framework for the management of public lands. Congress has directed the BLM to develop RMPs under the principles of multiple use and sustained yield and in consultation with the public and with its partners from tribal, state, and local governments and other federal agencies. RMPs provide the basis for every action the BLM takes and serve as its primary tool for providing the public a voice in the management of public lands.

The initiative addresses the goals set forth in the <u>Roadmap for Success</u> and incorporates elements of the <u>landscape approach</u> into the BLM land use planning process to create a framework to allow more effective and efficient planning across landscapes.

Specifically, the Planning 2.0 effort seeks improvements in the agency's ability to:

• Respond to environmental and social change in a timely manner.

- Provide for a more cooperative and collaborative planning process.
- Plan across landscapes and at multiple scales.

The Denver meeting will convene October 1, 2014, 1pm to 5pm, MDT, at the Denver Marriott West, 1717 Denver West Boulevard, Golden, CO 80401. The Denver meeting will have a livestream option for people to participate remotely. The meeting can be accessed at <u>www.blm.gov/live/</u>.

The Sacramento meeting will take place October 7, 2014, 1pm to 5pm, at the Double Tree by Hilton Sacramento, 2001 Point West Way, Sacramento, CA 95815.

Re: Evaluation of a request for a performance audit of the Limited Gaming Impact Fund

This memorandum is in response to a June 23, 2014, request our office received from Senator Jeanne Nicholson, Representative Dianne Primavera, and Representative KC Becker for an audit of Colorado's Limited Gaming Impact Fund (Fund), including the Department of Local Affairs' Local Government Limited Gaming Impact Program and the Department of Human Services' Gambling Addiction Program. On July 15, 2014, the Legislative Audit Committee considered the audit request, which is attached here, and authorized our office to conduct preliminary research on the feasibility of an audit.

We have completed our preliminary research and Senator Jeanne Nicholson reviewed and approved this memo. We conclude that, should the Legislative Audit Committee decide to move forward with an audit of the Fund, we could conduct a performance audit that would address the following questions:

- 1. To what extent do the Department of Local Affairs and the Limited Gaming Impact Advisory Committee ensure that Local Government Limited Gaming Impact Program grants comply with statute and address the documented impacts of gaming, including but not limited to gambling addiction? What criteria are used to determine the gaming impact on communities and to award grants? Is there a correlation between gaming's impact on communities and the grant funds that communities receive?
- 2. Does the Department of Human Services administer the Gambling Addiction Program and Gambling Addiction Account in accordance with statute? What outcomes has the Gambling Addiction Program achieved and have outcomes met legislative intent, such as reducing problem gambling and providing Colorado residents counseling when needed?



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By focusing on these issues, we would expect to provide members of the General Assembly and the public with valuable information on the use of Fund moneys and effectiveness of the Fund in addressing gaming impacts around the State.

We provide background information about the Fund in the following section.

Background Information

The Department of Revenue receives all revenues generated from taxes, fines, and fees on limited gaming activities in Colorado, such as the gaming tax, gaming application and licensing fees, and fines levied for casino noncompliance with regulations. The Department of Revenue distributes 50 percent of the revenue from these taxes, fines, and fees to the State General Fund, and distributes the remaining revenue to the State Historical Society, the gaming counties of Gilpin and Teller, and the gaming cities of Cripple Creek, Black Hawk, and Central City [Section 12-47.1-701(1)(d), C.R.S.]. By statute, [Section 12-47.1-701(2)(a)(III), C.R.S.] \$5 million of the revenues that the General Fund receives is then disbursed annually to the Limited Gaming Impact Fund (Fund).

According to statute, the purpose of the Fund is to provide financial assistance to designated local governments to address documented gaming impacts stemming from limited stakes gaming, and award grants for the provision of gambling addiction counseling to Colorado residents [Sections 12-47.1-1601(1)(a) and 1602, C.R.S.]. Statute [Section 12-47.1-1601(1)(a), C.R.S.] requires the State Treasurer to allocate the Fund monies to two areas: (1) 98 percent is allocated to the Limited Gaming Impact Account which funds the Local Government Limited Gaming Impact Program, and (2) 2 percent is allocated to the Gambling Addiction Account which funds the Gambling Addiction Program. These programs are described below.

The Local Government Limited Gaming Impact Program

The Local Government Limited Gaming Impact Program is a grant program administered by the Department of Local Affairs (Department) that provides local governments financial assistance to address documented gaming impacts stemming from limited stakes gaming. Statute [Section 12-47.1-1601(1)(a), C.R.S.] states that "documented gaming impacts" are the documented expenses, costs, and other impacts incurred directly as a result of limited gaming. Statute states that grant recipients must meet the following criteria:

• Grantees must be located in an eligible county. The only entities eligible for grants are: (1) the counties of Archuleta, Boulder, Clear Creek, Douglas, El Paso, Fremont, Gilpin, Grand, Jefferson, La Plata, Montezuma, Park, and Teller; (2) the municipalities within these counties; and (3) special districts providing emergency services within these counties [Section 12-47.1-1601(4)(b), C.R.S.]. The gaming cities of Cripple Creek, Black Hawk, and Central City receive a portion of Fund revenues, as described above, and by statute [Section 12-47.1-1601(4)(b)(II), C.R.S.], are not eligible for grants.

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• Grantees must demonstrate need. Each grantee must demonstrate that it has been impacted by limited gaming [Sections 12-47.1-1601(1)(a) and 12-47.1-1602(3)(c), C.R.S.].

According to statute [Section 12-47.1-1602(3), C.R.S.], the Limited Gaming Impact Advisory Committee (Committee) is responsible for establishing a standard methodology and criteria for measuring gaming impacts, reviewing gaming impacts and grant applications, and making grant award recommendations to the Executive Director of the Department. The Committee is made up of the Department's Executive Director, staff of county and municipal governments and special districts, members of the General Assembly, staff from the Departments of Revenue and Public Safety, and two members appointed by the Governor. Statute states that, once the Committee has made its recommendations, the Executive Director has the authority to make final grant award funding decisions [Section 12-47.1-1601(4)(a)(I), C.R.S.].

According to the Department, during the Fiscal Year 2014 grant cycle, the Department received applications from 43 local governments requesting approximately \$7.1 million in grants from the Local Government Limited Gaming Impact Program. The Department approved 40 of the 43 applicants' projects (93 percent), in part or whole, and awarded a total of about \$4.9 million in grants. The approved projects included grants for law enforcement personnel, fire and rescue equipment, costs related to detaining individuals in jail, victim services programs, and community health centers.

Gambling Addiction Program

The Department of Human Services administers the Gambling Addiction Account which is required by statute to be used to award grants to state and local public and private entities that provide gambling addiction counseling services and to individuals actively pursuing national accreditation as gambling addiction counselors [Section 12-47.1-1601(4)(a.5)(I), C.R.S.]. According to the Department, the funds in the Gambling Addiction Account are used administer the Gambling Addiction Program. During Fiscal Years 2011 through 2013, the Department hired the University of Denver to administer the Program. In October 2013, the Department of Human Services awarded a contract to the Colorado Center for Governmental Training (Center) to administer the Program.

House Bill 08-1314 requires the Department of Human Services to submit an annual report on the Gambling Addiction Program to the legislature. The Department's most recent report stated that, during Fiscal Year 2013, about \$64,000 had been allocated to the Gambling Addiction Account, and with these funds 15 counselors received online training (up from 10 in the previous year), five of these counselors were certified as gambling addiction counselors, and 39 clients received counseling services (up from 29 the previous year). The Department's report did not include Program outcomes. Department staff stated that the report for Fiscal Year 2014 is in progress. Office of the State Auditor Page 4

The Department of Human Services reported to us that during Fiscal Year 2014, it paid the Center about \$55,000 to operate this program, of which, about \$45,000 was for 12 grants to counselors participating in the program and program advertising, and the remaining \$10,000 was for the Center's administrative expenses. Department rules state that the counselors who receive grants are required to give 10 hours of pro bono counseling for gambling addiction. Department staff stated that they did not have information on Program outcomes at the time of our request.


