More, More and More

More housing provides more independence for more students

As the University of Mount Union welcomed the Class of 2015 to campus in August, it also witnessed the return of an eager group of juniors and seniors who were ready and excited to move into the newly-constructed apartment housing village on Union Avenue.

Over the years, there has been a high demand from today's students for more independent living options on campus, and Mount Union answered the call by building its third apartment-style housing village. Construction began this past fall on a trio of three-story complexes located in the 1400 block of South Union Avenue at the southwest corner of Overlook Drive.

These new residences are certainly making an impact on our students' experiences, and they are part of a comprehensive five-year plan to address undergraduate and graduate housing needs. The ultimate objective of this plan is to have 80% of our undergraduates living in university-owned housing by 2015. In fact, Mount Union accomplished this goal three years early as the number of students living in on-campus housing increased from 75% last year to 80% this year.

"We are no longer an institution where our seniors move off campus in mass, but rather stay and provide leadership to our on-campus community," said Dr. Richard F. Giese, president of Mount Union.

The apartment complex speaks to Mount Union's commitment to sustainability as it has been designed in accordance with silver LEED standards. The complex includes high efficiency HVAC systems; fluorescent lighting fixtures; low-flow showers and toilets; carpeting made from recycled materials; low volatile organic compound (VOC) adhesives; paint with low VOC content; locally manufactured building products including brick, wood and stone materials; triple pane windows; and bike racks.

Highlights of the apartment-style complex include:

- Three 30,000-square-foot buildings containing 16 townhouses each
- Capacity to house a total of 188 students and one resident director
- Three-story units, with the exception of a handful of two-story units that are handicap accessible
- Parking for 214 vehicles
- A large, open green space for student recreation including patio seating and grills
- Extensive landscaping

Each three-story townhouse contains:

- A living room
- A full kitchen
- Two and a half baths
- Four bedrooms
- A laundry facility

Handicap-accessible units include a living room, full kitchen, one full bedroom, a full bath and a laundry facility on the first floor and three bedrooms and a full bath on the second floor.

PA Program is on the Move

Program takes off in its first two years







The University of Mount Union's Physician Assistant Studies Program is truly on the move. Students in the inaugural class have officially graduated and recently took the national tests required of professionals in the field. The students of the second cohort have received their white coats, and the third cohort just began its classroom studies

The inaugural class was also honored at a celebration at the InterContinental Cleveland in August. The 19 students and their families as well as physician assistant studies faculty members from Mount Union were in attendance to reflect on and commemorate their successful completion of 27 months of coursework and clinicals. These students have already experienced much success as virtually all of them have secured jobs.

"I'm very proud to stand here today and call each and every one of you my colleagues," said Sharon Luke, program director of Mount Union's Physician Assistant Studies Program, associate professor and chair of the Department of Physician Assistant Studies, during the graduation celebration.

According to Luke, students recently took the Physician Assistant National Certifying Exam, a computer-based, multiple-choice test comprising questions that assess basic medical and surgical knowledge. Students must pass the test in order to become certified physician assistants. This class also recently ranked 19th out of 106 schools on the National Physician Assistant Clinical Knowledge Rating and Assessment Tool exam, which measures students' knowledge and competency in the field.

The second cohort of students celebrated its own achievement in July when more than 200 people joined at the second annual White Coat Ceremony. This event commemorates the students' transition from classroom learning to the clinical phase of their graduate education.

In other PA-related news, the program's Student Society was recognized with the Outstanding Novice Student Society Award in June from the American Academy of Physician Assistants' Student Academy. Students also placed first in the Challenge Bowl during the Ohio Association of Physician Assistants' second annual conference in February.

Mount Union's Second Graduate Program

Master of Arts in Educational Leadership

The University of Mount Union's second graduate program – a master of arts in educational leadership (MAEL) – is off to a great start. More than 50 interested individuals attended an open house and preview in August featuring a seminar led by world-renowned educational expert, Dr. Lyn Sharratt. The program, which will begin in the fall of 2012, also has been officially approved by the Ohio Board of Regents and the Higher Learning Commission.

The MAEL program is a two-year, cohort-based initiative that will be offered primarily online. Students in the program will take two online courses during the fall and spring semesters for two consecutive years. This format will allow for educators to complete their graduate degrees in a more timely fashion because of a class schedule that works well around their teaching professions. This unique program of combined online and on-campus learning will offer the convenience necessary for today's young teaching professionals and the personal attention that has long been a hallmark of the Mount Union experience.

Course study will focus on the concept of turn-around leadership and utilize texts authored by leading experts in the field. A weeklong on-campus summer residency semester will also be held following each year of online coursework, resulting in two summer semesters per cohort. These semesters will be geared for students to discuss current issues and initiatives in education while engaging on a more personal level with renowned experts in the field. With guidance from the faculty, each student also will engage in a year-long internship experience designed to align with his or her current work setting.

Mount Union's M Club Hall of Fame will induct its 2011 class on Saturday, September 24. The inductees will be recognized in a ceremony at noon at the Fred J. Haupt President's House and during halftime of the Mount Union vs. Wilmington College game, which will kick off at 7 p.m.

Members of this year's induction class include Mike Sessor '86 (wrestling), John Topoly '93 (wrestling) and Heather (O'Shea '95) Wayt (track).

Sessor claimed three straight OAC wrestling titles from 1984-86 and was an All-American with an eighth place finish at the 1985 NCAA Division III Wrestling Championships.

Topoly is a two-time OAC wrestling champion. He was also a two-time All-American with fifth place finishes in the 1990 and 1991 NCAA Division III Wrestling Championships.

Wayt won 17 OAC track and field titles and was a two-time OAC Most Outstanding Indoor Athlete and an OAC Outstanding Outdoor Athlete. A six-time All-American, she was a two-time NCAA Champion in the 800 meters and part of the 1995 national champion 4x400 meter relay team. An Academic All-American, she was awarded the OAC's Clyde Lamb Award.

Purple Raider Fall Sports Preview

Football

An experienced roster returns for the Mount Union football team as 49 letterwinners and 18 starters look to continue a run of 19 consecutive Ohio Athletic Conference Championships (1992-2010) while contending for a record 11th NCAA Division III National Championship. In addition, head coach Larry Kehres returns for his 26th year on the sidelines as one of only 11 coaches in college football history to win over 300 career games as his career record stands at 303-22-3.

Volleyball

Over the past few years, the Mount Union volleyball team has set a record for wins in a season and made the NCAA Volleyball Tournament. The team also has been in the Ohio Athletic Conference Tournament semifinals for seven straight years. They hope this year they can add OAC champions to that list. Leigh Ann Swartz enters her sixth season as head coach with another veteran group and hopes to build on past successes.

Women's Soccer

A new field in Mount Union Stadium and a new coach signal a new era for the Purple Raider women's soccer program. After spending the last two years as an assistant coach, Kelley Clark moves up to the head coach spot and will have five starters back to help her begin the process of moving the Raiders up the Ohio Athletic Conference standings.

Men's Soccer

The Mount Union men's soccer team looks to build off the momentum of making the Ohio Athletic Conference Tournament for the first time since 2003 as nine starters return in 2011. Head coach John Witkowski returns for his fifth year with the Purple Raiders with a more experienced team trying to better its 10-6-3 record from a year ago.

Men's and Women's Cross Country

For the first time in three decades, someone new will lead the men's cross country program as Kevin Lucas, the women's coach for the past two years, takes over for longtime coach John Homon. Lucas inherits a men's team that is coming off its Ohio Athletic Conference record 25th conference championship in 2010 but must replace its top three runners in 2011.
