

# How I Met Father Samuel Mazzuchelli

mong the hills of the Mississippi River Valley, near immigrant settlements in what are now Grant and Jo Daviess counties, I can imagine young Irish men in back-breaking labor as they mined iron ore with sledgehammers, picks, and shovels. It was brutal work, yet a better living than they had in Ireland, where people were starving.

These immigrant men worked hard, and, likely, they played and drank hard. Many were merely kids, raised by their parents as Catholics firm in the faith—but that faith and that Church were far away, a distant memory. They may have said of their new home, "It's not the end of the world, but you can see it from here."

I can imagine one chilly day when these Irish laborers looked up from their picks and shovels to see a short man approaching—dressed in the dark clothes worn by men of religion back then. The stranger watched until one broke the silence. and avenues. He assisted those who would govern and helped citizens vote. He took in orphans. He saw civil war and condemned it.

How is it then that so late in my life I came to know Father Samuel? How is it that I came so late to understand his holiness and his brilliance?

I was born in Monroe, WI, a bit too far east to have our Green County parish be founded by him. The nearest church founded by Father Samuel was St. Joseph in Gratiot. I heard of him from relatives in Lafayette and Grant counties; I heard of him from my seminary teacher, Father William Seipp, who had relatives in the Dominican Order. I did know also that there was something very

special and holy about the faith of the people in the parishes of the tri-state area.

An older priest once told me, when I was a young deacon in Platteville, that the faith of the people of southwestern Wisconsin was as deep as the topsoil, and "here that is very deep." He went on, "That is because of Father Samuel, our saint."

In 2007, I was diagnosed with rectal cancer. Later, it was determined by the Veterans Administration that this cancer was most

"Would you like a drink?"

"No, thank you," the man said. "But I would like to talk."

The work stopped. After the laborers heard his strange name, they settled on "Father Matthew Kelly."

To these men and their families, Father Samuel Mazzuchelli, OP, brought not only the Gospel, the Eucharist, and sacraments, but also culture and civilization. He built not only their churches but their public buildings. He opened schools for them. He laid out streets

### Treasured Memories from the Mound Archives

Sinsinawa Dominican Sister Ellen Shannon, OP, uncovered some treasured memories of Father Samuel Mazzuchelli which were recorded for the St. Clara Academy Alumnae Reunion of 1935. The recollections of Benton Academy days are those of Mrs. Mary Jane O'Brien Cavanaugh:

When I was about 9 years of age, my little brother was born and my father went to Mass at New Diggings and asked Father Samuel where he should take the baby to be baptized. Father answered that he would be at Benton the next week and that he would pass by our home [New Diggings] on his way to Shullsburg, and he would stop and baptize the baby. When he came, he was very kind and jolly, and we all loved him forever. He asked me if I would like to go to his school at Benton. I said I would, but seven miles is too far to walk every day. He laughed and said we must arrange for that.

When I was almost 10, I went to St. Clara to attend Father Samuel's school where I was very happy. My father took me with our horse and buggy, with my little, white, horsehair-covered trunk behind the seat. When we drove to Father Samuel's house near the church, he came out and, taking my hand, said: "We will go to the school," and we went across the street to meet the Sisters.... His kindness and tenderness captivated me at once and remains with me to this day.

Sister Ignatius, who was our cook, would worry if Father did not arrive on time for his meal, so she would ask some of the little girls to call him. She always asked two of us at a time as one was not supposed to cross the street alone. When we reached his door, he would take our hand, one on each side, and talk to us until we reached the front door of the Academy where we left him.

God gave you all, and he will also have all again, and with great strictions he the does require a veturn of thanks.

#### SIGHTINGS AND CITINGS—FATHER SAMUEL IN THE NEWS

rticles about Father Samuel Mazzuchelli have appeared in recent months in various publications. The Knights of Columbus magazine, *Columbia*, featured him as "Man of the Month" in its February issue. A long article about him, written by Chuck Roelant, appeared in the spring issue of *Lambs' Quarterly*, a publication of the Companions of Christ the Lamb (Paradise, MI).

In September, a full-page article in the *Catholic Weekly*, the newspaper of the Diocese of Gaylord, MI, entitled "Mackinac Island is rich in Catholic history," told of the early history of the Catholic presence at Mackinac. Part of the article described the arrival of Father Mazzuchelli in November of 1830; he was the first resident priest there at St. Anne's since 1765.

Closer to home, Father Don Lange, local area pastoremeritus and Academy Apartment resident, wrote an inspiring full-page article for a February issue of the Madison, WI, diocesan paper, the *Catholic Herald*.

likely caused—as was the case of many of the Marines I had served as chaplain in the U.S. Navy—by our exposure to the oil well fires and the burn pits during Desert Storm, the first Gulf War.

After chemotherapy and radiation treatments, I had major surgery to remove the cancerous area. Before that, my family, friends from the Beadle family, Father Frank Steffen; Father Seipp; Sister Christiane Althaus, OP; and others encouraged me to travel to Sinsinawa Mound to pray with Father Samuel's chain and seek his intercession on my behalf. I did, and also received the sacrament of the sick, and then I was off to the VA Hospital in Madison for my cancer surgery.

It did not go well. During the surgery, my blood pressure and heart rate became erratic. It appeared that I was in deep trouble. The surgery was stopped, and I immediately came out of the nosedive. A later surgery was successful. Even though my cancer has spread, it is very slow-growing and as controllable as a chronic disease. I have since retired from the pastorate of St. Clare of Assisi Parish in Monroe, but I am in good enough health to continue to assist my brother priests, especially my good friend and successor, Father Larry Bakke.

I believe I am here today because of Father Samuel's intercession. Because of that, I have come to know much better this man who called out to those Irish miners.

As a priest, he is a model for my priesthood and an inspiration for all priests and seminarians. He is a priest who loved this land and its people. He is a holy one who brought the presence of Christ to frontier country and planted the faith in this rich soil. We rejoice in the bounty of that harvest today.

I wonder what Father "Matthew Kelly" said to those Irish miners on that chilly day. Whatever it was, he challenged them and changed their hearts; their faith still lives on in us. Saints, I believe, come among ordinary people and change them—often with only a few kind words and faithful presence. Mazzuchelli was a priest who not only walked among the people of the Mississippi River Valley more than 150 years ago; he is a saint among us today.

### SAMUEL

- **S** is for the Sacred Priesthood bestowed by God's right hand. He was ever true and faithful to a calling O so grand!
- A is for the "Always" he served,a Dominican through and through.To that ancient joyful OrderSamuel was always true.
- M is for Mary, the Mother of us all, She was ever at Samuel's side; and in all his undertakings she was his faithful guide.
- U is the Unfailing Love that marked his labors here. His were Christ's hands to bless us, to comfort and to cheer.

- L is for his Love of God, his love for Scripture, too. His message of the Gospel was down-to-earth and true.

As I end this little verse, let me now sincerely say, "You were one of the greatest priests God ever sent our way!"

# Planning for Sesquicentennial Underway

Priests, Sisters, parishioners, and others from the many parishes and schools he founded have gathered to begin planning. One such meeting took place last summer and a follow-up meeting was held at the Mound this April. A meeting of representatives from the Congregation's sponsored institutions will occur in June. The sesquicentennial celebration will extend from February 23 to November 4, 2014.

# Another Favor Obtained through Mazzuchelli's Intercession

# The following is from Walter H. Maass' account of a healing in July 1994.

fter surgery for a detached retina .... and treatment for a subsequent massive choroidal detachment of the left eye, Dr. W. ... told me that there was nothing which might be done at that time to eliminate or correct the problem.... There was an almost complete loss of vision.

"During the period of extreme pain, I found comfort through the night by saying the rosary and offering up this pain for my wife and children. I became resigned to the fact that the loss of an eye would not hamper me; I would accept this burden.

"On July 1, we were driving to Wisconsin, and I was riding in the right front seat. En route, we said the rosary. I was saying some prayers to myself when for some reason, I recalled we were about directly north of Benton. (Previous to this, when first moving to Wisconsin, we had stopped outside of Benton to read the roadside state historical marker about Father Samuel. Also, when relocating to Prairie du Chien, we joined St. Gabriel parish which had been established by Father Samuel.)

"As I thought of Benton and Father Samuel, I said a prayer, asking Father to intercede on my behalf with our Lord and ask for healing of my left eye. Immediately after, I felt a warm sensation, an immediate warming about the left eye. When we arrived at home, my wife changed the dressing on the eye. Upon removal of the bandage, I noticed that there were no longer any black areas to either side of the eye. I said nothing. The following morning when the bandage was again changed, the dark areas of my vision were also gone.

"I returned to the doctor later in July, and there was evidence of continued improvement. On September 6, I was examined by Dr. C. . . ., who was delighted that my vision was almost perfect.

"I continue to enjoy good eye sight, and I feel that Father Samuel asked our Lord for this favor."
