NEWS FROM DR. JOSEPH MCNEEL, DIRECTOR, WVU DIVISION OF FORESTRY AND NATURAL RESOURCES



New Faculty: We have made good progress with the two open positions within the Division. Three candidates were interviewed in late

September for the Forest Hydrologist position in Forest Resources Management, and we hope to have the position filled before the snows fly! Interviews will begin for the Wood Science Management and Marketing position in the next week and we should have a candidate for the position before spring semester starts in January. Finally, we received notification from the Dean's office that the Division has been designated to receive a new "energy focused" faculty position in the Wood Science and Technology Program. This position represents one of six energy-related positions that have been created by the University to address energy-related research in the coming years. We anticipate the position will emphasize wood chemistry and pulp and paper technology, and we hope to have the position filled before summer. The Division was awarded this position due to the highly visible wood energy research and outreach programs developed by the Division's Wood Utilization Research Program and our Appalachian Hardwood Center. Only three Colleges in the University were awarded these positions, and we were proud to learn that a Division program was a recipient.

Enrollment: Enrollment for the fall of 2008 grew at both the undergraduate and graduate levels in the Division. We saw some growth

in our Recreation and Wildlife and Fisheries Programs, while our Forestry and Wood Science Programs maintained their numbers. Overall, undergraduate enrollment exceeded 400 undergraduates. Our graduate student enrollment, about 75 students in the fall of 2007, grew to more than 80 students for the fall of 2008. We hope for continued increases in our undergraduate enrollment in the spring, primarily through continued recruiting efforts with those Technical Schools that have articulation agreements with the Division.

USDA Forest Service Experimental Forest and Range Workshop:

The Division had the great pleasure to host and facilitate a workshop/ symposium for the USDA Forest Service as part of the ongoing centennial celebration of the formation of the USDA Experimental Forest and Range network. Over 70 invited participants from across the country and representing nearly all of the 81 Experimental Forests and Ranges in the USDA network attended the 3-day program. The Division was well represented at the event through our coordination responsibilities. Four graduate students, representing Forestry and Wildlife and Fisheries, were in attendance and made guite an impression with the various research scientists in attendance!

SAF/SWST Accreditation Visits: In the spring of 2009 (yes, that's this spring!), the Division will be honored with two accreditation visits from the Society of American Foresters (SAF) and the Society of Wood Science and Technology (SWST). These visits are very important events for the Division, in that our Wood Science and Forestry Programs are evaluated to determine whether they should continue to receive accreditation from these Professional Societies. Our Division has been accredited by the SAF since 1947 (!) and by the SWST since the 80s, and we are planning to continue our accreditation far into the future, God willing!

We are also working to accredit our Recreation Program through the SAF this time around. This would bring our forestry and recreation programs closer in terms of the basic requirements and provide more consistency in the undergraduate core requirements for our four programs of study. This is a major undertaking, but it will be a milestone for the Division and be particularly helpful for the Recreation, Tourism, and Parks Management Program in terms of recruiting and enrollment.

We anticipate that some of our alumni will be involved with this effort through meetings with the SAF and SWST Accreditation Visiting Committees. We will be contacting folks to arrange these meetings, scheduled for mid-April, later this winter. Your help is greatly appreciated as we prepare for these very important meetings with the SAF and SWST!

Division Well-Represented at the American Fisheries Society Meeting: The DFNR was represented by Drs. Kyle Hartman, Patricia Mazik, George Merovich, and Stuart Welsh at the annual meeting of the American Fisheries Society. This year's meeting was held in August in Ottawa, Ontario. The international meeting is the largest fisheriesrelated meeting in the world attended by over 1900 persons in 2008. The Division was also represented by four current PhD students: Andy Hafs, Ed McGinley, Jon Niles, and

Jered Studinski. Many former students from the Division were also in attendance. Among those were: Mike Kaller (Asst. Professor at LSU), Clif Tipton (Biologist with Bureau of Land Management), Eric Janney (Biologist with USGS), and Ryan Utz (now a PhD candidate at the University of Maryland).

Members of the DFNR presented six talks and several posters at the meeting. Ryan Utz won the Best Student Paper for a talk stemming from his thesis research with Dr. Hartman at WVU entitled, "Density dependent growth and energy acquisition dynamics of central Appalachian brook trout." Ryan received a cash award of \$500 from the Education Section of AFS for this honor.

THE DFNR is sure to be well-represented at the American Fisheries Society meetings in the near future. The 2009 meeting is within driving distance in Nashville, TN. In 2010 the meeting will be even closer at Pittsburgh. At the Pittsburgh meeting WVU Faculty (Mazik, Petty and Hartman) will serve as program chairs, and we expect a lot of student participation at that meeting. Another activity that Hannes spends time on is his "blogging". Hannes has several blogs in the internet and one specifically focused on his WVU experiences. WVU DIVISION OF FORESTRY ALUMNI ENDOWMENT FUND REPORT

The WVU Division of Forestry Alumni Endowment Fund was formed by the WVU Division of Forestry Alumni Association in 1969 for the purpose of providing scholarships for students enrolled in the programs of the Division of Forestry and Natural Resources. It operates totally with contributions from alumni, friends and other interested individuals and companies. Only the revenue earned from the invested donations can be expended for scholarships.

The overall fund is made up of the General Fund and two endowed funds established in memory of W. Clement Percival and George W. Myles. The General Fund also has several sub-funds within it. These are in memory of Asher W. Kelly, Jr., Orris D. McCauley, Herman G. Yeager, and Thomas G. Clark and one special fund in honor of Kenneth L. Carvell. The distribution of funds currently in the overall fund is as follows:

Sufficient earnings accrued by 1989 to enable the Trust Committee to start awarding scholarships. Since that time, 56 scholarships have been awarded. There are currently seven scholarships in effect, one freshman scholarship and six regular scholarships. The regular scholarships are \$2,000 per semester and are the best provided in the Division. The Freshman Scholarship is for \$500 per semester. The recipient is eligible to apply for the regular scholarship the next year. The regular scholarships, once awarded, are multi year and continue until the student graduates as long as the student maintains high moral and academic standards.

The fund is financed through donations from graduates, friends, employers, and families. The goal of the Trust Committee is to increase the value of the fund to \$1,000,000. You can be a part of this growth. Tax deductible contributions to the General Fund or a special fund within it may be made payable to the WVU Forestry Endowment Fund and mailed to 806 Daverton Road, Charleston, WV 25303. Establishing an endowed, memorial, or special fund can also be accomplished by writing the same address.

OBITUARIES

Joseph McKee Hutchison III, (RP '57), of Morgantown, died Saturday, July 26, 2008, at his home. He was born Dec. 4, 1931, in Cambridge, OH, and spent most of his early years in Charleston. He was a son of the late Joseph McKee and Gladys Oliver Hutchison. A graduate of Charleston High School, he earned his undergraduate degree from Muskingum College in Ohio in 1953. He received a master's degree from West Virginia University in 1957. He stayed at WVU to be a professor of recreation and parks administration for 40 years, first in the WVU School of Physical Education, and later in the Division of Forestry within the WVU School of Agriculture. During his 40-year teaching tenure at WVU, he twice served as president of the West Virginia Parks and Recreation Association.

He became assistant director, and later director, of the National Youth Science Camp, which he helped start as a part of West Virginia's Centennial Celebration in 1963. The camp is still operating today, in its 45th year. Joe later became chairman of the National Youth Science Foundation and held that post until recently. He helped start, and later became active in, the West Virginia Storytelling Festival held each year at Jackson's Mill.

Joe was also the treasurer of the West Virginia Botanic Garden and was active in that organization from the beginning. He loved West Virginia athletics and served as a statistician at WVU home basketball and football games. He was a member and past president of both Phi Kappa Phi and Gamma Sigma Delta agriculture honor societies. He served as a trustee and ruling elder for First Presbyterian Church of Morgantown, where he has been a member for 50 years. He is survived by his wife of 53 years, Ann R. Hutchison, whom he married in 1955 and loved to travel with; a daughter, Suzanne Skidmore, son-in-law Daniel Skidmore, and their three children, Logan Bailey, Laura Bailey and Wesley Skidmore, of Flatwoods; a son, Joseph "Jay" McKee Hutchison IV, daughter-in-law Dacy, and their son, Victor, of Jupiter, FL; a daughter, Mary Katherine "Kate" Fragale, son-in-law Michael Fragale, and their two children, Anthony Joseph and Emme Grace, of Morgantown; and his brother-in-law, Dr. Lewis B. Ringer and wife Deanna, of Poland, OH.

Colonel Edgar H. Willard, Jr., (FM '49) 90, died July 17, 2008, at Winter Haven Hospital of chronic lung disease. He was born June 8, 1918, in Mt. Airy, Maryland. He was a veteran of World War II, the Korean War, and Vietnam. He served as a pilot in all three conflicts. At the time of his retirement in 1970, he was a command pilot with thousands of hours of flying time in 25 different types of airplanes spanning an era from open cockpit bi-planes to the modern jet. Colonel Willard had flown to all parts of the free world and some "Iron Curtain" areas, and he had a perfect safety record. He also served 5 years as sanitarian for Morgan County.

He was the son of Dr. Edgar H. and Mary Lou Willard. He graduated from Berkley Springs High School where he was very active in sports. He graduated from West Virginia University with a degree in Forest Resource Management in 1949. He received a B.S. and a Masters from Jackson University, Hawaii. He graduated from the following military schools: Spence Army Air Field, Maxwell Field Instructors School, Command and Staff, Cold Weather Test Pilot and survival school, IBM Programmers School, Department of Defense Computer School, Department of Defense Computer Institute, and Air Force Computer Analyst School. He was a computer analyst for Headquarters Tactical Air Command.

He was a member of St. Marks Episcopal Church and had served on the Vestry as Senior Warden. He had been a member of the Morgan County Planning Commission and a member of District #6 Health Department. He belonged to the following organizations: Retired Officers Association, Past President Lions, W.V.U. Forestry Alumni Association, U.S. Golf Association, American Legion Post #60, Honorary Admiral of the LINE, and Cherry River Navy.

He is survived by his wife, Gertrude H. Willard; son, Dr. Edgar H. Willard, III (LeVerne) of Winter Haven, FL; daughter, Mary Josephine Riddle (William) of Cocoa, FL; brother, William J. Willard of Walterboro, SC; 4 grandchildren and 9 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held on Monday, July 21, 2008, at the Crisp-Coon Funeral Home Chapel. Interment followed at the Florida National Cemetery in Bushnell, FL.

Scholarship Report

The Division of Forestry and Natural Resources awarded or continued 33 scholarships for the 2008/2009 academic year. This number increased by one, due to the generosity of Dr. Jim Brown, who committed to funding the Dr. Earl "Gus" Tryon scholarship. This scholarship had not been awarded for several years due to insufficient funds. Dr. Brown has indicated that he will continue to fund the Tryon scholarship in future years. Thank you Dr. Brown! (Note: Jim Brown is a WVU Forestry grad, as well as former professor here. He is currently a retired professor and research scientist at the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center in Wooster, OH, which is affiliated with Ohio State University.)

In discussing the Augusta Scholarship with Bonnie Fisher, we now have \$11,850 towards the \$25,000 needed to get this scholarship on line. The money already in the fund came from combining the Bill Maxey and Bill Wylie donations. Neither of these funds had reached the necessary levels to stand as individual scholarships. We now have 5 years left to raise the additional money to reach the \$25,000 level. The fund number for making a contribution is 2S377.
