NEWS



GRADE



Students have begun their unit on nonfiction texts. We will be reading and discussing all sorts of informational texts. We will be discussing the ways to analyze and understand different forms of nonfiction. Students will practice cause and effect, use context clues, infer, work on drawing conclusions, find facts, and locate the main idea. We will also be studying the ways to analyze text either by using a Venn diagram, a time line, or other sources. Students will familiarize themselves with the dictionary and thesaurus and become comfortable looking up words and using guide words. As always, please encourage your child to read every night! The more you read, the more you know!

<u>History</u>

Students have continued their journey through American history by learning about the Great Depression. They compared and contrasted the decades of the early twentieth century and found that many events of the Roaring 20s contributed to the causes of the Great Depression. In March students will be learning about World War II, its causes, and the reasons for our involvement in the war. Next we will focus on the major events of the war including the Holocaust. We will also learn about life on the home front. The World War II unit is very extensive and covers many important people and events. Please make sure your student succeeds in this unit by daily review or questioning!

Science

During the month of February, students are learning about what happens to the sun's energy when it reaches the Earth. Students have learned about the electromagnetic spectrum and its parts. The Earth's energy budget and its role in keeping the Earth the right temperature for human beings to live have also been topics of conversation. Students are also learning about the types of heat transfer-convection, conduction, and radiation and the roles of all three in heating Earth, controlling our climate, and the affect on our oceans. We conducted experiments on how different surfaces heat and cool and on types of heat transfer including popping pop corn and roasting marshmallows.



Creative Writing

Ms. Parks' Creative Writing classes from the first semester completed portfolio projects that will allow them to reflect upon their writing experience. Second semester students will begin with an introduction to creative writing through the works of Dr. Seuss.





English and Creative Writing

On to poetry! English 7 students are beginning their study and comprehension of poetry. They will learn to identify, to analyze, and to use poetic devices such as figurative language. We will continue with our study of grammar as well as identifying and using parts of speech.

Advanced English 7 students have completed their study of the historical fiction genre and are ready to tackle poetry. They will be examining various poetic forms and devices as well as the lives of prominent poets. Along the way, they also will create some original poems. The grammar unit will focus on prepositions, conjunctions, and interjections. The *Vocabra* unit and prefix/suffix examination are ongoing.

Ms. Parks' Creative Writing classes from the first semester completed portfolio projects that will allow them to reflect upon their writing experience. Second semester students will begin with an introduction to creative writing through the works of Dr. Seuss.

Life Science

Students are currently studying a unit on taxonomy, the science of classification. Students are participating in lab exercises and constructing classification charts. In pursuit of their investigation of the kingdoms, students will study bacteria, protists, fungi, plants, and animals. They will learn that scientists have divided the former kingdom of monerans into two new kingdoms: archaebacteria (ancient bacteria) and eubacteria, which has a different chemical makeup and is the causative agent in many diseases. Students from both teams will conduct research on infectious diseases. The diseases must be bacterial, viral, or caused by a protist. They will be using materials placed on reserve through the library for their research as well as utilizing recommended internet sites. They are researching the etiology, symptoms, treatment, prevention, and other interesting facts concerning a specific infectious disease. The final product will be a "Wanted Poster" featuring the disease of their choice.

Math

Quarter 3 of the Math 7 Enriched curriculum is all about functions - equations, inequalities, graphing, slope, lines, tables, and variables. This is a big unit that will follow the students into Algebra and beyond. The material is covered in the textbooks that were sent home at the beginning of the year so they can be used for secondary help. Be sure to be checking the internet as well, because the new textbook series we adopted, *Big Ideas Math*, has a ton of free online help resources that are invaluable! On a personal note, many parents and guardians have asked about when Mrs. James will be heading out on maternity leave. The plan is to work until the baby comes! In preparation for her temporary departure, Mrs. James has already prepared every lesson, classwork assignment, homework assignment, weekly assignment, quiz, test review, and most of the tests. Any documents that are delivered in class will still be made available via her website and new *SkyDrive* location.

In Algebra I, we will be completing our statistics unit then beginning our unit on polynomials. Students will explore rules for simplifying exponent and polynomial expressions. Ms. Liskom will continue to post homework assignments, test dates, etc. on her blog: www.cityschools.com/eliskom

<u>Civics</u>

In Civics we have quite a bit happening. We have just completed our study of the Judicial Branch at both the national and state level. From here we will start learning about Political Parties and the election process! Students will gain insight into the political process and how it effects their lives at the national, state and local levels. We will discuss political parties and what our responsibilities are as citizens on the election process. This is so exciting to be doing now, with all the election coverage that is in the news these days. Please watch and discuss with the students at home!!









Students came back rested from the holidays to discover possible careers in STEM (science, technology, engineering and math). We built and programed robots to challenge ourselves to problem solve in groups. Real computer scientists and mathematicians visited our classes to tell us about what they do and to cheer us on when getting our "bot" to go in a perfect square proved frustrating. Students will dive into the Motion and Force unit in February. The next units include Work, Power, and Simple Machines; then States and Forms of Energy. With a cumulative (6th, 7th and 8th) Science SOL test approaching, we have a lot to learn and review. Only half a school year away from our 8th graders becoming high school students, YIKES!



In the next few weeks I will be screening 7th grade students to identify anyone with a curvature of the spine (scoliosis). According to available information, up to 10 out of every 100 children may develop this condition. If found and treated early, progression of this deformity can be prevented.

The procedure for screening is a simple one in which the screener looks at the child's back while he or she is standing and then bent forward (like touching one's toes). If your child has a possible curvature, you will be notified and asked to take him/her to their health care provider for follow up. If you have any questions about this screening or object to your child being checked please notify me at 540-372-1145.

In addition to screening for scoliosis, there will also be a BMI (Body Mass Index) screening conducted. BMI is a measure that is used to show a person's "weight for height for age." It is calculated using an individual's height and weight. Just like a blood pressure reading or a vision screening, the BMI can be a useful tool in identifying possible health risks. The purpose of this screening program is to give you information about your child's weight status and ideas for a healthy lifestyle.

The school nurse will supervise your child's screening and will make sure your child's privacy is respected at all times. The results of your child's BMI will be kept in their health folder and are strictly confidential. The results will be mailed home directly or communicated in writing to you.

BMI does not tell the whole story about your child's health status. BMI does not distinguish between fat and muscle. If a child is very athletic and has a lot of muscle, his or her BMI may be high even though the child is not overweight.

You are encouraged to share these results with your child's health care provider. Your child's doctor or nurse is in the best position to evaluate his or her overall health, he or she can explain the results of the BMI screening and talk to you about whether there are steps you can take to encourage a healthy diet and physical activity.

Please feel free to call me with any questions you may have about BMI screening. If you would not like your child's height, weight, and BMI measured in school, please send a written request to me.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING STUDENT PICK-UP

It is extremely important that the school has current contact information for parents (both custodial and noncustodial) and for anyone else who is authorized to pick your child up from school. Please provide us with a copy of any court order regarding custody/visitation, if applicable. *Written notice from the custodial parent does not supersede court documents.*

The excerpt below is from the Fredericksburg City Public Schools' Policy Manual:

PARENTAL RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

When parents of a student are estranged, separated, or divorced, building personnel will uphold the parental rights of both parents. Unless there is a court order to the contrary, both parents have the right to:


- 1. view the child's school records, in accordance with Policy JO;
- 2. receive school progress reports, the school calendar, and notices of major school events;
- 3. visit the school in accordance with Policy KK;
- 4. participate in parent-teacher conferences; in the case of the noncustodial parent, after a timely request is made; and
- 5. receive all notifications in accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.
- 6. receive notice of the student's extended absence, as defined in and pursuant to Policy JED, if both parents have joint physical custody.
- B. Parent Responsibilities
- The custodial parent has the responsibility to:
- 1. keep the school office informed as to the address of residence and how he or she may be contacted at all times.

2. on the Fredericksburg City Public Schools registration form, list the current address and phone number of the noncustodial parent, unless such address is unknown and the parent signs a statement to that effect, or unless a court order restricts the educational or contact rights of the parent; and

3. provide a copy of any legal document which restricts the educational and/or contact rights of the noncustodial parent.

The noncustodial parent has the responsibility to keep the school office apprised of changes in his or her current phone number and address. Further, the noncustodial parent may make timely requests to participate in parent-teacher conferences. At the request of a noncustodial parent, such parent will be included as an emergency contact for the student's activities unless a court order has been issued to the contrary.
