Where is the Class of 2014 Headed this Fall?

More than 85% of the 800 members of the Class of 2014 will continue their education at colleges, businesses and technical schools, and in the armed services.

This fall, 1 student will enroll at Cornell and three will to to the University of Pennsylvania. Enrollment at Penn State University's Main campus is 32 students, and 32 will attend a Penn State branch campus. Locally, college enrollment includes Cedar Crest College (3), DeSales University (7), Kutztown University (31), Lehigh University (6), Moravian College (6), Muhlenberg College (7), Lehigh Carbon Community College (167), and Northampton Community College (21). Some other popular choices include Bloomsburg University (19), Drexel University (9), East Stroudsburg University (7), Indiana University of PA (3), Millersville University (4), Temple University (30), University of Pittsburgh (24), Shippensburg University (9) and West Chester University (21). Twenty three (23) students will enter the military including one student going to West Point and one student going to the U.S. Naval Academy.

USDA Introduces New Food Guidelines for Schools for 2014-15 Year

The USDA introduced new Food Guidelines/Nutrition Standards for foods that are packaged or served and sold during the school day. This includes any foods sold as fundraisers on school grounds during the school day. The new regularions say that any food must: be a whole grain/rich grain product; or have as the first ingredient a fruit, vegetable, dairy product, or protein food; or be a combination food that contains at least ¼ cup fruit and/or vegetable; or contain 10% of the Daily Value (DV) of a nutrient of public health concern in the 2010 Dietary Guidelines for Americans (calcium, potassium, vitamin D, or dietary fiber).

Foods must also meet specific nutrient standards (with accompaniments). For example, calories in entrée items must not exceed 350 (200 calories is the limit for snack/side items). Sodium must not exceed 480 mg in entrees or 230 mg in snack/side items.

Total fat must be less than 35% of total calories and saturated fats.ust be less than 10% of total calories. Transfats are not allowed. Sugars are also limited and must not exceed 35% of weight from total sugars. Exemptions from meeting all nutrient standards include fresh, frozen, and canned fruits and vegetables with no added ingredients except water; or in the case of fruit, packed in 100% juice, extra light, or light syrup. Canned vegetables that contain a small amount of sugar for processing purposes are allowed as are part-skim cheeses, dried fruits and nut/seed butters. The Standards will not apply to sporting or evening events as the school day is defined broadly to include from midnight of the school day until thirty minutes after the end of the offical school day.

If a school does not comply, the state or federal government may withold funding for lunch or breakfast programs.


Superintendent's Message Dear Parkland Community,

Welcome back to the 2014-2015 school year. As this newsletter goes to print, we are preparing for another school year in Parkland and making plans to welcome approximately 9,200 students into our K-12 classrooms.

I am happy to share some important information regarding capital improvement initiatives that the Parkland School District has implemented. The administration recommended and the Board subsequently approved the second phase of our three year capital improvement plan that includes the borrowing of \$10M. This will allow Parkland to maintain high quality facilities that are safe and secure as well as mitigate financial challenges in the future that could surface if maintenance issues were ignored. Of immediate importance is the renovation of Kratzer Elementary School, which last received renovations in 1991. The first phase of construction at Kratzer is nearly complete as the main office has been relocated, the fifth grade wing has been renovated, and construction of the canopies outside the school is underway. Kratzer is receiving a total make-over which includes repairs to the school's roof, windows, acoustical tiles, driveways, kitchen, electrical system, HVAC system, cabling, classroom technology, building code upgrades, new furniture and cabinetry. Site improvement work at Kratzer will occur next summer during the last phase of the renovation.

Other capital improvement projects that have been completed include the installation of natural gas lines at Orefield Middle School and Kernville Elementary School which will yield the District an estimated \$260,000 in annual utility savings. Orefield Middle School also received a new boiler system, hot water system and new roof

sections that will allow the building to operate more efficiently. Finally, this summer, Cetronia, Ironton and Parkway Manor each had vestibules and secondary entrance doors added at their main entrances as an added security measure to align with the safety measures in our other school buildings.



Educating for Success, Inspiring Excellence

The Parkland School District holds a long-standing tradition of annual district themes. The themes serve as a framework to guide the efforts of the entire school community. This year's theme is a revitalization of our vision statement from the district strategic plan crafted in 2008. During the 2013-14 school term, the Parkland School District Comprehensive Planning Committee endorsed this vision statement once again for our school district to carry us into the future. Therefore, we thought it would be appropriate to rededicate our focus on "Educating for Success, Inspiring" Excellence" as our theme for 2014-2015. As we move into the school year ahead, I have asked our 1,300 person staff to think about the key words "success and excellence" and the action words "educating and inspiring" as they prepare to welcome youngsters onto our school buses and in our buildings throughout the District.

I encourage you to peruse this back-to-school edition of the Parkland School District newsletter. You will read about the recent agreement our district has made with our teacher's union as well as technology and curriculum initiatives that are moving our district into the future in many positive directions. There is literally something offered for everyone in our community, young and old. I hope that we will see you out an about at an upcoming event.

My goal is to continue to keep Parkland high on people's list as one of the most desirable places to live by keeping our district strong, competitive and replete with many academic, athletic and visual and performing arts opportunities. We will continue to maintain our focus on helping students thrive and grow into adult citizens who contribute to the betterment of the world around us.

1,800 New Google Chromebooks Help Kickstart the 2014-15 School Year

1,800 Google Chromebooks can now be found across Parkland School District. The \$250 terminals have an 8-second boot time, so they are quick for teachers to pass out and dive into a lesson that requires a computer. The terminals have no hard drive, so there is no way for viruses to infect the network. There is also virtually no degradation of performance over time as there is nothing getting saved to the machine that would slow down performance. Students access software that they need through an online Parkland School District portal that houses the apps they need to complete assignments. The District's network engineer can push out apps on the portal at the push of the button and open or close accessibility to a particular software package for groups of machines. The students like the Chromebook because of the large screen size, the keyboard, and ultra thin and lightweight design. The District likes the machines because there is no imaging to be done, so the computers are just about ready to use when they come out of their new box. Plus, there are no service warranties to buy. Teachers love the carts of Chromebooks which they can sign out in each building to turn their rooms into computer labls. Teachers can set up links to whatever their students may need on their class web sites and can freeze screens while they are teaching to ensure that students are locking in to the content that is being taught. Other features of the Chromebook include a camera, speakers, and USB ports where students can save work or attach other devices. Tracy Smith, the District's Assistant to the Superintendent for Operations stated, "The only thing the Chromebook is not great for is video editing and graphic design. For most students, this is a great low-cost all-in-one laptop that is easy to carry, contains a large enough screen that allows a student to be highly productive and includes a keyboard. The District has found the Chromebooks to be durable as well."

Did You Know?

This summer we added an additional Chromebook cart to each of the elementary schools, three to each of the middle schools, and six at the high school and now have a total of 1,800 Chromebooks. After undergoing an extensive safety audit last winter, the District installed visitor vestibules at Ironton, Parkway Manor and Cetronia this summer. Kratzer School is undergoing an extensive renovation. A picture of the school's new art room is shown below. 132 secondary students enjoyed a new STEMM-focused summer camp with the opportunity to take part in science, technology, engineering, math and medicine took place at Parkland. New T8 energy efficent lights in the Orefield Middle School Gym are expected to reap a savings of \$3,100 annually. New natural gas lines at Kernsville and Orefield Middle School are expected to save the District about \$260,000 in annual heating costs. The District will be working with South Whitehall Township and the Lehigh Contry Conservation District to install rain gardens at Springhouse and Orefield this fall. Parkland received about \$435,000 less in state funding than predicted once the state finally settled on their budget in July. has access to 150 online courses used to supplement instruction and in the Parkland Cyber online learning program.

New Elementary Report Cards Provide Feedback, Present Evidence of Success and Areas in Need of Improvement

Background and Purpose

A committee of teachers, administrators, parents and a school board member met throughout the past year to develop and give input on the new standards-based report card. The purpose of this report card is to communicate with parents and students about the achievement of grade level expectations. The results reflect how well students have met established learning goals, highlight successes, and guide improvements.

How does the new one differ from the old one?

Standards-based report cards differ from traditional report cards. Traditional report cards measure many different factors including how well students do in comparison to their classmates, how well behaved they are in class or the effort they put into their work. A standards-based report card measures how well an individual student is doing in relation to the grade level standards/skills, not the work of other students or non-academic tasks. Another difference is how a teacher arrives at the end of quarter grade. A traditional report card averages grades earned over a marking period. A standards-based report card looks at progress over the course of the marking period. For example, if a child did not grasp a concept in September, but can demonstrate proficiency in October, the September "grade" does not penalize the child's overall grade.

Will behavior still be addressed?

The committee felt strongly about the behaviors that make a respectful and responsible learner. These characteristics will be reported separately on the new standards-based report card but will not impact the way progress is reported out for core academic areas.


The 4-point scale change

Students will be marked using a 4 point scale indicating how well a student has mastered the grade-level standards. One of the adjustments for students and parents will be that the report card focuses on end of year standards/goals. This means that in the first, second or third marking period, a student may not be proficient in some skills. Although this is normal since most students will not meet all of the year's goals in the first quarter, it can be disconcerting to parents and students used to seeing all "A's."

Another change surrounds the concept of "Advanced (4)" and "Proficient (3)." Advanced on a standards-based report card is not necessarily the equivalent of an A on a traditional report card. For example, in a traditional reporting system, if a 4th grader received "A's" on every math test during the semester, he/she would probably receive an "A" on his/her report card. In a standards-based reporting system, if those assessments measured only the concepts fourth graders are expected to master, those "A's" would be the equivalent of "Proficient (3)." The student is doing what he or she should be doing, but not necessarily more. In order for a student to score "Advanced (4)," they must independently use and apply knowledge in ways that demonstrate higher level thinking skills. In other words, they must perform at a high level independently.

Standards-based report cards allow teachers and parents to focus on student learning goals from the beginning of the year. This gives students a chance to get help when needed.

Teachers/Board Sign Two-Year Agreement The Parkland School District Board of School Directors

The Parkland School District Board of School Directors and the Parkland Education Association (PEA) reached a two-year contract agreement when the Parkland School Board approved a new contract on August 26, 2014. The Districts' teachers ratified the agreement earlier in the day. The agreement will be in effect from August 31, 2014 until August 31, 2016. The PEA represents approximately 640 members, including teachers, nurses, guidance counselors and other professional staff.

The contract includes a 2.25% salary increase in year one for members, inclusive of step movements. In year two of the agreement, members will again receive an overall 2.25% salary increase inclusive of step movement. Stipend salaries for coaches, clubs and activities advisors will also increase 2.25% each year.

Members will be given the option to continue the Classic Blue Indemnity Plan for one more year. Under that plan, members pay \$744 per year for Single coverage or \$2,028 per year for Family coverage. In the 2013-14 school year, members who chose the PP06 plan instead of the Indemnity Plan described above, contributed

\$390 per year for Single coverage and \$780 per year for Family coverage. In 2014, members will increase their payroll contributions for the PPO6 plan to \$672 for Single coverage and \$1,344 for Family coverage. In 2015-16, member contributions for the PPO6 plan increase to \$840 per year for Single and \$1,680 per year for Family coverage. A new PPO option will allow members to pay \$0 per year for Single coverage and \$120 per year for Family coverage (up from \$500 in the PPO6 plan) and \$1,500 for Family coverage (up from \$1,000 in the PPO6 plan) as well as higher employee co-payments for services. Also new in the 2014-15 contract is the provision that allows employees to opt out of Parkland health insurance if they show proof of insurance from a spouse or parent. Employees who choose this option will be given a \$1,500 stipend per year for markland to opt out of receiving health insurance. In the event that any health benefit plan offered by the District exceeds the threshold requirements for any excise tax associated with the Affordable Care Act, the District and Union agreed to share the cost equitably.

Other changes include the following:

- It will become mandatory in 2014-15 that all employees affected by the new agreement be paid via direct deposit which will save administrative, paper and processing costs.
- Teachers who receive National Board Certification will receive a one-time \$3,500 stipend.
- A Worker's Compensation Panel of Physicians was agreed upon.

Programs for Children with Special Needs

In compliance with state and federal law, notice is hereby given by the Parkland School District that it conducts ongoing identification activities as a part of its school program for the purpose of identifying students who may be in need of special education and related services. If your child is identified by the district as possibly in need of such services, you will be notified of applicable procedures. Individualized services and programs are available for children who are determined to need specially designed instruction due to the following conditions:

Autism; Deaf-blindness; Deafness; Emotional disturbance; Hearing impairment; Intellectual Disability; Multiple disabilities; Orthopedic impairment; Other health impairment; Specific learning disability; Speech or language impairment; Traumatic brain injury; Visual impairment; Mentally gifted.

If you believe that your school age child may be in need of special education services and related programs, screening and evaluation processes designed to assess the needs of the child and his/her eligibility are available to you at no cost, upon written request. Early intervention services are available for young children (age 3 to school age.) You may request screening and evaluation at any time, whether or not your child is enrolled in the district's public school program. Requests for evaluation and screening should be made in writing to the Director of Student Services, 1210 Springhouse Road, Allentown, PA 18104.

In compliance with state and federal law, the Parkland School will provide to each protected handicapped student without discrimination or cost to the student or family, those related aids, services or accommodations which are needed to provide equal opportunity to participate in and obtain the benefits of the school program and extracurricular activities to the maximum extent appropriate to the student's abilities. In order to qualify as a protected handicapped student the child must be of school age with a physical or mental disability, which substantially limits or prohibits participation in or access to an aspect of the school program. These services and protections for "protected handicapped students" are distinct from those applicable to all eligible or exceptional students enrolled (or seeking enrollment) in special education programs.

All information gathered about your child is subject to the confidentiality provisions contained in federal and state law. The district has policies and procedures in effect governing the collection, maintenance, destruction and disclosure to third parties of this information. The records of each student with an exceptionality (special education) are reviewed at the end of each school year. Information the district no longer deems necessary to provide appropriate programming is discarded. Parents may claim discarded records by contacting the Director of Student Services (610-351-5555) prior to June 1 each school year. 


Announcing the Premise Alert System



Celebrate Innovation Grant Brings Good to PHS By Caitlin Carlson, PHS '15

Forty-nine applicants received Celebrate Innovation Grants from the Parkland Education Foundation for the 2014-2015 academic year. These grants are awarded annually to staff members who need supplemental funding to either initiate or continue a project that benefits Parkland students and the community. In the spring of 2014, 73 grant applications were submitted and, after a long review process, 49 grants were awarded district-wide. Those forty-nine grants reached a total of \$92,254, an increase from the program's initial total of \$70,000 granted in 2012.

Among this year's recipients is Mrs. Deborah Andreoli, the drivers' education teacher at the high school. The \$1,255 awarded to Andreoli's *Hang Up and Drive* program will allow Parkland to host a presentation directed by Ms. Jacy Good. Good is a public speaker who raises awareness about the dangers associated with using a phone while driving. In May of 2008, immediately following her graduation from Muhlenberg College, Good was the victim of a car accident, in which she lost both of her parents. The accident was caused by a distracted driver who ran an intersection because he was talking on the phone. Miraculously, after a long and grueling recovery period, Good suffers from only minor cognitive issues and is paralyzed in the left arm and lower leg. Since the accident, she has abandoned her aspirations to work for Habitat for Humanity and now travels all over the country, and even internationally, to promote her *Hang Up and Drive* campaign. and Drive campaign.

After attending one of Good's presentations, Andreoli was instantly drawn to this amazing young woman and was in awe of how close to home her story is for the Parkland community. Andreoli said that when she first introduced Good to Parkland High School in May of 2013, her intended goal was to make "student drivers realize that even if they don't drive with distractions, many others still do. The word needs to spread so that everyone encourages their friends and family to turn off their phones when they drive " drive.'

Good's 2013 presentation left a tremendous impact on students and faculty alike. When asked about Good's impact on her life, Abigail Hurd, who is now a senior, said that "Jacy Good taught me how severe the consequences of driving distracted can be and how much of an impact it can have on those on the road with me. I am constantly reminded of the severity of her accident whenever I feel tempted to use my phone while I am driving.

Andreoli applied for this grant to re-invite Good back to Parkland this year. "After Jacy's successful presentation, I knew I had to do anything I could to have her speak to our high school again... you could have heard a pin drop in the auditorium on that May day; we also had over 500 Parkland students take the safe driving pledge to not use their cell phones when they drive," says Andreoli. Good's presentation will enhance the activities that Andreoli runs to promote safe driving.

Parkland High School is very excited to welcome Good this spring and is grateful for the donors who made this grant possible. Andreoli hopes that this presentation will make the Parkland community a safer place to drive and that no one else will have to suffer because of the horribly negative impacts of cell phone distractions.

Some other Celebrate Innovation grants include new microscopes for fourth graders at Fogelsville, document cameras for several sixth grade language arts teachers, a new bullying prevention program for middle school students, and two additional Vex robotics kits for PHS engineering students.
