

OBJECTIVES

TO ENHANCE the understanding of cultural and social factors that influence relevant health behaviors and physical and mental health conditions in Arab populations

TO SHARE knowledge about the social and environmental determinants of disease and to leverage resources to address these determinants for the purpose of improving health in Arab populations

TO IDENTIFY barriers and solutions to effective health promotion; to prevent disease in Arab and other immigrant communities

TO ESTABLISH links between scientists and stakeholders in the Arab World and their counterparts in countries with Arab immigrants

TO CREATE collaborative initiatives aimed at improving the management of mental health and chronic disease conditions in Arab patient populations around the world

CONFERENCE THEMES

CAPACITY BUILDING: How can we raise awareness and support for research, literacy, higher education and innovation in health and science, and build lasting relationships between experts in the global Arab community?

SOCIAL DETERMINANTS OF HEALTH: What are the primary cultural, social and biological determinants of health inequities in Arab populations, and how can we develop and share culturally sensitive tools to reduce these health inequities?

INFECTIOUS DISEASES: What are the strategies to improve efforts in prevention, surveillance, monitoring and management of communicable diseases?

OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH, TRAUMA AND ENVIRONMENTAL HAZARDS: What is the particular role of trauma in Arab health, especially trauma related to motor vehicle crashes, construction site accidents, falls, and environmental / occupational health-related hazards? How can we share information about prevention and technological advances with the community, health care providers and policy makers?

MENTAL HEALTH AND CHRONIC DISEASE: What are the major mental health and chronic disease challenges in Arab communities and around the world?

ETHICS AND PALLIATIVE CARE: How do we develop effective palliative care models that are sensitive to the cultural contexts and ethical concerns of the Arab patient population, and how do we raise and manage the health care resources necessary to implement these palliative care models?

ORGAN TRANSPLANT: What are the challenges encountered to develop multi-organ transplant programs in MENA region? How can we improve the awareness about cadaveric donation? How can we implement the concept of being brain dead and subsequent organ utilization for donation?

NATIONAL CANCER INSTITUTE

1:15 PM "The National Cancer Institute (NCI) established the Center for Global Health (CGH) in 2011 to support NCI's goal of fully integrating research on cancer into U.S. global health initiatives. CGH develops initiatives and collaborates with other NCI divisions, NCI-designated cancer centers, and countries to support cancer control planning, build capacity, and support cancer research and cancer research networks in low- and middle-income countries. NCI CGH's specific objectives are to: (1) Create sustainable international partnerships; (2) Support programs that address global gaps in research and scientific training; and (3) Disseminate information and best practices that drive improvements in cancer research and cancer control. NCI CGH will host a workshop on capacity building in oncology to foster multidisciplinary and multisectoral collaboration on cancer research in the Middle East. The workshop will provide a forum to enable the open exchange of scientific knowledge and to strengthen collaboration in global health research, cancer research, and cancer control for a range of stakeholders including researchers, oncologists, clinicians and policy makers. The workshop session will provide content focused specifically on cancer prevention and control and scientific research within global partnerships."

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
Social & Cultural Program



TRAVEL TIPS

SOCIAL CUSTOMS AND NORMS IN OMAN

Oman is a country comprised with rich traditions, heritage and history, a country known to extend a warm welcome to foreign visitors. However, as when visiting any other country, tourists are expected to understand, respect, and follow the cultural norms. When introduced to another person, utilize a simple greeting of hello: "As-salaam alaykum." Physical modes of greeting are also important. Between male strangers the standard form of physical greeting is a handshake. Members of the opposite sex do not generally touch – the best practice is to avoid offering your hand to an Omani of the opposite sex, unless they offer you their hand first.

Dressing appropriately is one of the most important things to respect when visiting Oman. When leaving the hotel, women should wear loose clothing, with arms and shoulders covered. Skirts or dresses, if worn, are usually floor length, but at least beneath the knee. Dress codes for men include similar modesty standards and short male shorts are not acceptable. For both men and women, it helps to dress modestly, especially in rural areas. Another cultural norm revolves around consumption of alcohol. Alcoholic drinks are acceptable within the hotel; however, once outside, alcohol is not only very rare to find, but public consumption is unacceptable.





GETTING A VISA TO ENTER OMAN

Thanks to our partners in the Ministry of Health of Oman, we have a pre-approval process in place for acquiring visas. Once confirmed to attend the conference, conference participants must submit their name, contact information, travel dates, proof of payment of conference registration fee and a copy of their passport (valid for at least 6 months) to Lauren Hollier at Lhollier@accesscommunity.org by no later than January 15th, 2015. In additional to the pre-approval process, all visitors must be prepared to pay any travel related fees at the airport. To see if your nationality requires a visa to Oman, you may enter your country of citizenship and residence at: https://oman.visahq.com/

VACCINATIONS

Evidence of yellow fever immunization is required if the traveler enters from an infected area.

TRAVEL RESTRICTIONS

Oman prohibits pornographic materials and firearms. Local law limits each non-Muslim traveler to two bottles of alcohol, purchased from a duty-free shop. Muslim travelers cannot transport alcohol. Items subject to confiscation at the airport because of culturally inappropriate content include, but are not limited to, books, magazines, compact discs, digital video discs, and video and audio cassettes.

CURRENCY RESTRICTIONS

Travelers are required to declare cash amounts exceeding an equivalent of \$20,000 USD or \$7,700 OMR when entering or exiting Oman.

TRANSPORTATION

Taxis with metered rates are easily accessible throughout Muscat, Oman. Tips are acceptable for taxi drivers.
