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A message from President Ray Di Pasquale



We all know the state of the economy has changed greatly within the past year. There is no question that times are tough, but the Community College of Rhode Island and its graduates are doing their parts to help our economy. CCRI prides itself on preparing its students for success in the work force or continuing their education.

We offer more than 80 degree and certificate programs in nine major areas of study – the arts, business, computer studies, engineering, general studies, health sciences, human services, liberal arts and science. Each semester more than 16,800 students come to CCRI to change their lives and achieve their dreams. Some come with the intention of graduating; others with the intention of transferring; and still others come to CCRI to continue their journey of lifelong learning. CCRI's dedicated faculty and staff are here to help all students obtain their goals.

As of May 2007, more than 53,000 degrees and certificates have been awarded since the college's first graduation in 1966, and most graduates still live and work in Rhode Island. Each year more than 1,200 Rhode Islanders graduate from CCRI, so it is with a great sense of pride that I share with you the accomplishments of the graduates of the Class of 2007.

Of the 1,320 who graduated in 2007, 79.4 percent responded to the survey; 92.3 percent report being employed, continuing their education or a combination of both; 29.4 percent indicated they were attending school full time and another 6.5 percent were going to school part time. Additionally, many students transfer before completing a degree at CCRI. In 2007, 1,006 students transferred to the University of Rhode Island and Rhode Island College. Many others transferred to colleges and universities across the country.

Established in 1964 to give all Rhode Islanders an opportunity to achieve their educational goals, CCRI remains committed to helping every student succeed. The community college serves recent high school graduates, older adults looking for a new career and businesses providing additional training to their employees so they can stay competitive in a global economy. This report presents an overview of their successes and exemplifies the endless possibilities made possible by a CCRI education.

About this report...

Since the Career Placement and Graduate Transfer Report is based on a self-report survey, some caution in interpretation is suggested. In reviewing the information, please be advised that average salaries, based on a 40-hour week, are reported only for education-related employment and may show an unexpectedly broad range due to data collected from graduates in entry-level positions and professionally employed graduates who attended CCRI for further professional development.

The overall results from this year's survey again validate, as have all reports since 1985, CCRI's success in preparing graduates for further education as well as for jobs in the Rhode Island economy.

Cristian Potter

Cristian Potter of Providence has overcome several life struggles on his journey to accomplish his goals. He lost his mother to an aneurism and his sister to cancer when he was 21. To overcome depression and substance abuse, Potter drew strength from one of his last conversations with his sister.

"She told me she wanted me to try and live the best life I could live. ... She told me that she knew I could do great things and that was all she wanted me to do," said Potter.

Then he began caring for his father, who has a degenerative brain disorder, and his younger brother while working full time and attending classes. Despite these many obligations, he also scheduled frequent visits with his wife, who is doing her residency in North Carolina, and his children, who live in Washington, D.C. He finished his general studies program at CCRI with a 4.0 GPA and is attending Brown University, where he is studying mathematics on a full scholarship.

Chosen as student speaker at his CCRI commencement, Potter spoke about opportunity as the way to a better life. "It's easy to say it's too

hard or I don't have the time or I can't afford it," he said. "If you are willing to work hard, and you seek opportunity, good things will happen to you. A wise man told me recently that good luck is the residue of hard work." Potter continued, "CCRI, specifically, and community colleges, generally, are the most American of all places. This is where one can come and get professional and technical training to become or continue to be competitive in today's dynamic job market."



Renée Coletta

As a CCRI student, Renée Coletta of Cranston had to bring home her grades to four judges who had to approve of her work – her children, David Scott, Kathleen, Francis and John Paul.

"I had to answer to them when I had a test just as much as they have to answer to me about their grades," said the single mother who graduated with an associate degree in special education. A member of Phi Theta Kappa, the international honor society of two-year colleges, and Psi Beta, the psychology honor society, Coletta earned a 3.84 GPA.

"There were plenty of times I said, I can't do this. I just won't do this anymore," she said. "But going back to school has allowed me to set a good example for my children."

Coletta, 39, wanted to go back to school to support her family and she believed she needed a degree to launch a stable career. In addition to her CCRI studies, Coletta took psychology courses at Rhode Island College, where she is now two classes shy of completing her bachelor's degree. Coletta works in development at St. Patrick's School in Providence and also serves as a teacher's

assistant. Her ultimate goal is to earn a master's in teaching or psychology and to continue her career of working with children.

Outside of the classroom Coletta is just as busy as a volunteer for the Rhode Island Coalition of Domestic Violence and SOAR (Sisters Overcoming Abusive Relationships), working on events and advocacy projects. She also coaches basketball and volleyball teams for the Catholic Youth League.

Juggling a full-time job, her parental responsibilities, school and volunteer work was challenging for Coletta. But the support of her family and CCRI faculty and staff helped her reach her goals.

Jacqueline Foshey

Jacqueline Foshey of Johnston considered herself lucky to be a stay-at-home mother while she raised her three children. But when her marriage ended after 18 years, she knew she needed a plan to get back on her feet.

"After I got divorced, I realized I could not support myself," she said. "I needed a career."

She was always interested in health care and a distant cousin was involved in radiography and enjoyed it. Foshey wanted to learn more about it, but was nervous about returning to school. She met with CCRI advisers several times before she decided to go for it.

"I thought I was too old. I didn't think my brain would work," she said with a laugh. "I hemmed and hawed for about a year. I can't tell you how nervous I was."

She began taking classes in 2003, but there was a two-year wait for the radiography program. "I wasn't sure if I could wait," she said. "I made the decision that I really wanted to do the program. I was going to be 45 either way, whether I waited or not." Her patience paid off.

"It's a very hard, very intense program, but so worth it," she said. "The teachers are all very available. They gave us their home numbers to call if we had any problems: in class, in clinicals, at home, whatever."

She needn't have worried about her brain power. She graduated from CCRI with a 4.0 GPA.

"I can't believe it," she said of her grade point average. "When I took my first test, I thought I flunked and would have to drop out of the program, but then I got it back and I got a 94. I just kept telling myself that I got a 94 and I can get another 94."

Foshey was at the top of her class, elected president of the Radiography Club, led her patient care class in a service learning project and joined Phi Theta Kappa, CCRI's international honor society.

"I was cracking my kids up," she said of her new academic persona. She has one son in college and another who just completed his service in the U.S. Navy. She hopes that her 19-year old daughter, a certified nursing assistant, learned the importance of being independent by watching her. "It never had dawned on me that I should be able to take care of myself," she said. "I tell her that she needs to be able to be independent."

Foshey worked in a nail salon to support herself while in school. She got a job as a tech aide at Our Lady of Fatima Hospital to gain experience, and it helped her get her first post-graduation job at Rhode Island Medical Imaging. After starting her new job, she continued her education and earned her mammography certificate at Rhode Island Imaging, where she is now a mammographer. "I always knew I wanted to go into mammography so I could help even more people with this important screening," she said. It's a topic that hits close to home because her grandmother had breast cancer.

"I love to put a smile on people's faces who you would think would never smile in a million years. I like to alleviate their fears," she said. "I also like that I get to be part of the doctor's diagnosis and to know that I helped in that process."

Beyond professional development, her time at CCRI offered her something else.

"Before, I was kind of dependent. Now I'm a lot more confident. I know I can do it if I try. I'm amazed I did it," she said. "I highly recommend CCRI. It gave me a life."

Meeting expectations

CCRI's primary mission is to help students succeed in reaching their educational goals by preparing them to enter the work force or transfer to a four-year college or university. Each year the college attempts to measure its success in this regard by surveying the previous year's graduates.

This year the 1,320 members of the Class of 2007 were asked to provide information about place of employment, job title, salary* and status of continuing education. Of those, 1,048, or 79.4 percent, responded to the survey. The results indicate that, overwhelmingly, CCRI graduates succeeded in reaching their educational goals. In fact, when asked how they would rate the quality of their CCRI education, 98.2 percent indicated they felt the level of education they received was excellent, very good or good.

Additionally, more than 92 percent reported that they were employed, continuing their education or a combination of both. A total of 557 graduates reported that they are working full time, with another 347 employed on a part-time basis (245 of those working part time are also continuing their education. Eighty-three percent of graduates working either full- or part-time are employed in Rhode Island.)

Also, 308 graduates are attending school full time; 88 percent of those are continuing their education in Rhode Island (32.6 percent are attending Rhode Island College and 23.4 percent are studying at the University of Rhode Island.) Members of the Class of 2007 transferred to more than 44 colleges and universities.







The chemical industry is one of the fastest growing industries in the United States. Its need for trained technicians in quality control, analysis, and research and development laboratories is extensive. The Chemical Technology program prepares graduates to enter the chemical field in any one of a variety of capacities: chemical research technician, laboratory assistant, chemical production technician, junior chemist or analytical technician. The program is structured to develop a fundamental understanding of general, organic and analytical chemistry, with emphasis on laboratory applications and techniques. Graduates from the program find employment in areas ranging from aerospace and biochemistry to pollution control and zinc metallurgy.

Furthermore, the program provides its graduates with an open ended career in science by transferring to most colleges and universities equivalent to the first two years of a traditional chemistry program.

Clinical laboratory technicians (CLTs) perform general tests in all medical laboratory areas, searching for clues to the absence, presence, extent and causes of diseases. The CLT program is a two-year program that includes clinical training. Upon successful completion, students are eligible to take a national certification examination to become licensed by the state of Rhode Island. Graduates work in a variety of settings, including hospitals, for-profit laboratories, clinics, nursing homes, public health facilities, research, sales, business and industry, and commercial laboratories.

The Computer and Networking Technology program prepares students for entry-level technical positions in computer and networking systems administration, installation and maintenance. This program provides balanced coverage of technological fundamentals, computer hardware and software, and networking technology. Emphasis is placed on operating principles of hardware and software, networking models, operating systems, internetworking components, industry standards and hands-on laboratory activities for developing practical, problem-solving skills.

Students develop the ability to configure and troubleshoot basic PCs, local area networks (LANS) and internetworks using routers and switches. Integrated into the program are courses that prepare students for both the CISCO CCNA examination and CompTIA A+ cetification.

In response to the impact of computer technology on communications and industry, CCRI offers various degree and certificate programs through the Department of Computer Studies and Information Processing. Several Associate in Science (A.S.) degree programs are offered.

Computer Programming prepares students to enter a modern programming environment. This program stresses problem definition and solution design using different programming languages in the development of applications. Concentrations in this program include Computer Programming, Computer Science (RIC Track) and Computer Science (URI Track).

Degrees in General Microcomputing, IT Support Specialist, Networking, Web Programming and Web Site Development also are offered. They prepare students to enter a workplace that emphasizes the use of the personal computer as a standalone device or in a networked computer environment. Depending on the selection of courses, this program could prepare an individual to be employed in computer user support services.

The following certificate programs are offered at CCRI: Computer Programming, General Microcomputing, IT Support Specialist, Networking, Web Site Development, Web Programming and Office Automation. Certificate programs emphasize technical course work only and do not require students to take electives that are required in the associate degree options.



CCRI offers the Associate in Fine Arts degree in Art, Jazz Studies, Music and Theater. These programs serve both students transferring to a four-year college or professional school and students who wish to pursue a career. They provide hands-on experience in the first two years of higher education, a strong foundation in the humanities and exposure to interdisciplinary study. CCRI's Jazz Studies program, the first collegiate degree program of its kind in the state, has been offered since 1985 and the theater program is the only one of its kind to offer jazz, ballet and modern dance. Students in the theatre program develop skills and creativity in the areas of acting, musical theater, technical theater and communications. Visual arts offers studies in both new media and traditional, with a strong foundation in art history. Digital Art, Digital Photo and Graphic Design take place in cuttingedge Mac labs, while Ceramics, Drawing, Painting and 3D are held in fully-equipped studios. Music and jazz studies degree programs are designed to be the equivalent of the first half of a bachelor's degree in music performance or education at colleges and universities throughout the United States. The curriculum at CCRI corresponds to the freshman and sophomore years in many fouryear bachelor's degree programs in art or a foundation program at a design school.

The Fire Science program is designed for individuals who wish to enter the firefighting profession. It provides leadership skills, technical knowledge and Emergency Medical Technician (EMT-B) qualifications needed to be successful in fire service. The curriculum strengthens the knowledge base of the current professional firefighter and augments expertise practiced in the community. Graduates work for municipal fire departments or obtain positions in the fields of industrial fire safety and security, fire protection engineering technology, fire insurance inspection, or investigation underwriting and ambulance services.

The Emergency/Disaster Management program is based upon the Emergency Management Institute (EMI) for higher education. This field is growing, including opportunities for individuals employed in varied capacities. The program focuses on the needs of the general community, with a specific focus of providing an emergency disaster management knowledge base to individuals in many fields. Histotechnicians are integral members of the health care team. It is the histotechnician's job to prepare sections of human tissue from biopsy or autopsy for microscopic examination by processing and cutting tissues, mounting them on slides and staining them with special dyes for microscopic examination by a pathologist for the diagnosis of disease. Most histotechnicians work in hospital laboratories, medical research laboratories, veterinary pathology and forensic laboratories.

The CCRI Histotechnician program prepares students to enter this challenging and rewarding field and provides them with entry-level knowledge, application and problem-solving skills needed to function as active members of the health care team.

Graduates of the program are eligible for employment in a hospital, crime lab, veterinary lab and public health; transfer to a bachelor's degree program; licensure in the state of Rhode Island to practice; and sitting for the national certification examination for HT given by ASCP (American Society of Clinical Pathologists).



A radiographer uses x-radiation, knowledge of anatomy and imaging principles to aid physicians in the diagnosis of disease, in monitoring patient progress and in controlled screenings to help prevent disease. A radiographer works in hospitals, clinics, doctors' offices and private emergency rooms. The profession offers numerous opportunities for advancement, including computed tomography and special procedures. With additional education, there are opportunities in MRI, medical ultrasonography, nuclear medicine and radiation therapy. Graduates are eligible to take the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists examination.

Diagnostic medical sonography is used to locate, evaluate and record pertinent anatomical, pathological and functional data to aid a physician in the diagnosis and prevention of disease. Students may select a concentration in general ultrasound, vascular or echocardiography. Graduates are eligible to take the American Registry of Diagnostic Medical Sonographers examination and are prepared for entry-level employment as sonographers (ultrasonographers) in hospitals, clinics and private offices.

Magnetic resonance imaging is a dynamic technology used in the diagnosis and treatment of disease. The program prepares students to safely perform magnetic resonance procedures, display the personal qualities of integrity, responsibility and reliability and who function as active members of the health care team. Graduates are eligible to take the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists examination and to work in hospitals, clinics and doctors' offices.


