

Climate: Science + Humanities Graduate Perspectives from Australia, China, and the US

Information for C9 Applicants

From James Lovelock's Gaia thesis to Tim Flannery's historical work, global discussion on climate and climate change spans the humanities and the sciences. This symposium will bring together c35 graduate students to exchange global perspectives from three very different national bases: Australia, China, and the US. It aims to highlight and sharpen work which displays genuine disciplinary crossover, and to extend local perspectives on global concerns. 2 graduate students from each C9 University will be selected - one science and one humanities student.

Selection Criteria: Excellence and innovation in research Capacity to connect science and humanities on climate issues, broadly conceived Evidence of potential for research leadership Excellent English writing and speaking skills

Eligibility: Students must be enrolled in a research degree at a C9 University.

Funding:

C9 universities to fund all travel and accommodation of Chinese students, and their supervisors if they wish to accompany the students.
