SJB Gives Back-Alumni Helping in Haiti

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Imagine living without running water, sporadic electricity, no refrigeration, rare internet access, sparse medicine, few hospitals and no clean water. This was life in Haiti for many before the earthquake and where St. John the Baptist Catholic School alumni Kevin Osborne '97 is living now.

After graduating from the University of Maryland in 2005 with a degree in Political Science, Kevin held a management position at Maryland National Capital Parks and Planning Commission. Two week-long missions in 2007 and 2008, working alongside his father at the clinic of SJB sister parish, St. Pierre in Baraderes, Haiti, left him resolved to return for a more serious commitment to the country.

In August 2008 Kevin resigned from his job and signed on for a year of volunteer service in Gros Morne, Haiti with the Religious of Jesus and Mary. He arrived after the first of four devastating hurricanes occurred. The hurricanes left hundreds of thousands homeless due to flooding and decimated the country's meager harvest. Help was desperately needed for a country already suffering from vears of humanitarian crisis and natural disasters. The hurricanes left huge stagnant pools of fetid water and mud; perfect breeding grounds for disease. Through donations to Malaria Fini, University of Notre Dame and other non-governmental agencies, Kevin coordinated a community-led water sanitation program to combat mosquito and water borne illnesses.

Haiti is the poorest country in

the Americas and one of the poorest in the world. Eighty percent of its nine million people live in grinding poverty; 50% cannot read or write and 60% have no jobs. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), more than half the households exist on just \$1 a day. With no centralized sewage system and no water treatment facilities for the general public, half the population lacks access to clean water and more than three-quarters have no access to sanitation. It is estimated that 90% of Haiti's children suffer from waterborne diseases. Even before the earthquake, which claimed an estimated 150,000-200,000 lives, Haiti had the highest infant in the Western death rate Hemisphere.

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Alumni Invited to Join in Jubilee Celebration!

When charged by the Archdiocese to create a new parish in the then rural area of Colesville, Reverend E. Carl Lyon set out on June 1, 1960 to locate the 10 acres designated for St. John the Baptist and to serve the 175 Catholic families in the area. At the very first masses held in a basement chapel on Brantford Road, Sunday June 19, 1960, Fr. Lyon, later to become Monsignor, gave St. John the Baptist parishioners and nearby community members the sense that "there is always a place for you at St. John the Baptist." Along with the building of the church structures, there was a significant spiritual community building taking place recalls current Pastor Monsignor Francis Kazista who served as Monsignor Lyon's Associate Pastor from 1976 to 1981, and then returned in 1987 to become SJB's second and current Pastor.

Today, Saint John the Baptist Church, rectory and school sits behind many of the original trees Fr. Lyon discovered in 1960. Intentionally preserved, the trees are a buffer to the nonstop traffic on now four lane New Hampshire Avenue. SJB has grown to ministering to over 6,000 parishioners from 1800 households representing 50 nations of origin. SJB has become a spiritual hub with spokes that voluntarily

reach a wide circle - up and down New Hampshire Avenue, from Hillandale to Olney and includes many neighborhoods off Route 29 from White Oak to Fulton.

Some longtime parishioners noted that one can find a place at SJB because it has always welcomed diverse worship styles by providing Masses that meet many spiritual needs such as 7:30 a.m. quiet morning mass, the more traditional 9:00 and 10:30 a.m. choir masses in the main church, the 10:30 Hall Folk Mass, 6:00 p.m. Sunday Teen Band Mass, the 1:30 p.m. Bangladesh Mass and monthly Indonesian Mass. Another parishioner shared the perspective- "If you make an effort to get involved in ministry, outreach or project - you will find a place at SJB where individual communities begin to form into one." This is demonstrated by the variety of ways SJB serves others. Examples of thriving ministries include Liturgical Ministries, Religious Education, Adult Faith Formation, Social Concerns, the Parish School, Athletic Ministry, Knights of Columbus sponsored Community Sunday and Breakfasts, Leisure Club, Youth Ministry and Eco-Ministry, and Stephen Ministry. Many parishioners have commented that another theme is also a hallmark of the parish. Evident since the first Community Sunday of

coffee and donuts shared with their pastor in the Brantford rectory living room -has been recognition of lay leaderships' contribution in carrying out the mission of SJB.

Marianne Moore, principal of the parish school for 18 years, concurs, "It is the community of parishioners working with staff and clergy that have contributed to the lasting spirit of the parish and our school." Since the start of the parish school in 1962, parents and alumni have contributed considerable time, talent and treasure to help nurture student development and support faculty.

The Jubilee Celebration is Sunday, June 20, 2010 at 12:30 Mass, followed by festivities and recognition events in the afternoon. All parishioners, current and former, and alumni are encouraged to attend. Please call the parish office if you attended Mass at St. John's in the 1960s at 301-622-1122. 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New Technology Transforms SJB Classrooms

With (educational) video games in the classroom and internet on the (SMART) board, 2010 finds St. John the Baptist Catholic School zooming into the digital age. Technology titans and SJB teachers, Mr. Martin Lucey, Mrs. Anne Irwin and Mr. George Ellis have transformed the classrooms at St. John's into multi-media enclaves where children are excited to learn with the help of video and internet.

In addition to 35 new laptops, the school now has 4 SMART Boards, one each in grades 5-8, that are leaving old fashion chalkboards in the dust. What exactly is a SMART Board? It is an interactive white-board (think of a 64" flat screen) that operates as part of a system which includes the SMART Board, a computer, a projector and SMART Board software. Computer websites are projected onto the SMART Board and can be manipulated with the touch of a finger making the classroom an interactive and exciting experience.



"The projector and my personal computer are used for almost every class" says middle school social studies teacher Anne Irwin. "I use it to show videos from Discovery Education Streaming, PowerPoint presentations, and the SMART Board. The students love using the laptops and are energized when they see we are going to be working on them." But, as with all technology, it is how it is used that makes all the difference. "When projectors were permanently installed in my classroom, my use of technology exploded because it was so much easier" says Mrs. Irwin. In fact, SMART Technologies reports that when successfully integrated, interactive whiteboards have been shown to help teachers reduce planning and prep time, personalize learning and lower anxiety.

Math teacher and Webmaster Martin Lucey reports "When Anne Irwin and I started here in 2003, the school had one SMART Board that could be wheeled from classroom to classroom. We began to experiment with it more and more and saw a great reaction from the students". In December 2007, Anne Irwin went to a workshop to learn more about the SMART Board, and shortly after started using it almost daily in her classroom. Mrs. Irwin is currently working on her Masters Degree in Instructional Media through Wilkes University where she has learned about many great resources to use in the classroom. Along with Mr. Ellis and Mr. Lucey, she has been able to share more resources and a greater understanding of this useful technology with St. John the Baptist teachers.

So, do SMART Boards really make kids smarter? In June 2009, SMART Technologies, the creator of the SMART Board announced that educators are reporting a major increase in student participation following the installation of SMART products in their classrooms. They have discovered that their students are more engaged by the interactive delivery of lessons and enjoy the learning process more. Teachers have also noticed increased enthusiasm among their students. Anne Irwin agrees. "In sixth grade, we used a simulation program called Virtual History Ancient Egypt by Knowledge Matters. It allowed the students to create and manage their own settlements along the Nile River. The students were incredibly enthusiastic when working through the simulation and they learned a lot about Egypt. I liked using the program because it had a good mix of critical thinking skills and reading comprehension." A survey of SJB sixth graders shows this was one of the most enjoyable and memorable lesson plans of the year.

Asked whether there are any drawbacks to the use of new technology in the class-room, SJB computer teacher George Ellis reports "One of the drawbacks to new

technology relates to time. Teachers have busy schedules and sometimes do not have time to explore the various ways to use their new classroom technology". Fortunately, SJB has conducted teacher training sessions and provides time for the educators to learn new techniques to keep little eyes looking forward. Mr. Ellis states "My favorite programs are Pixie, Frames and WebBlender. Pixie is a painting program that allows students as young as kindergarten to create digital stories and second graders used it to create digital stories about the new Butterfly Garden outside the Lyon Center. Seventh grade students are using Frames to create comic videos about cyber safety and the sixth graders are using it to create biographical videos for their Arts and Academic projects." It is the wise use of this technology that is helping the teachers and students of SJB reach their fullest potential while enjoying the lessons along the way.

In addition to new computers, programs and SMART Boards, SJB has seen a huge leap in the development of the Parish and School websites. Martin Lucey (SJB '92) dedicates much of his time at St. John the Baptist to the design and implementation of these user-friendly sites. He taught himself web design in college at Penn State where he majored in electrical engineering. After graduating in 2001, Martin worked for a defense contractor that gave him the ability to do some web design. "Although, as quickly as technology changes, most of the current web site development I taught myself again from 2005 to 2007." Since Spring 2009, the school website has been constantly improved. Mr. Lucey also updated the Parish website which went live Feb 1, 2010.

SJB is currently suiting up three teams: a Senior girls team coached by Kevin Looney, an Intermediate boys team coached by Michael Hunt and a Senior boys team coached by Joe Rioux. All three teams, as of this writing, are having winning seasons. More importantly, all three coaches want to let everyone know the values the players learned at SJB—sportsmanship, respect for others and teamwork—have stayed with them in high school. This is something we as a community should be proud of.

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Superior Band, Superior Teacher

"She is a great teacher. She always made everything fun," are Nate Mostopalo's thoughts about SJB band teacher Jennifer Tifford. Ian Combs also remembers Mrs. Tifford as someone who was easy to talk to and fun. From the consistent "superior" ratings at the Archdiocesan band festivals to the large number of SJB students who participate in SJB band, it's clear their comments are true.

How did Mrs. Tifford become such a successful band teacher? Mrs. Tifford was once a former band student just like the SJB students she teaches. We have all seen Mrs. Tifford play her trumpet in some concerts, but her first instrument was the saxophone. "My dad was a saxophone player and he encouraged me to give it a try," says Mrs. Tifford. successful program.

For alumni like Nate, Ian, and Haley Crock, SJB band provides a strong foundation for high school and beyond. Nate played tenor saxophone in Georgetown Prep's Concert Band up until this year. He continues to play violin in the school's String Ensemble. lan plays bass clarinet in Gonzaga's Wind Ensemble, Liturgical Ensemble, and Clarinet Choir. He plays guitar in the school's Jazz Band. Haley was involved in music throughout her years at St. Johns College High School. She participated in Wind Ensemble, Woodwind Ensemble, ROTC Marching Band, A cappella Choir, and Chorus. This year, she participated in University of Maryland's marching band. Mrs. Tifford says that area Catholic and public high schools provide wonderful opportunities for SJB alumni to pursue their interest in band and in music.

When Mrs. Tifford isn't teaching band, she is very busy at home. Her husband, who she met at Catholic University, is a professional cellist. She has three children ages 11 months, 4, and 7. When Mrs. Tifford began conducting bands, her father would sometimes be in the audience for various band concerts to offer his support. Since her children have such musical parents, perhaps she will be watching one of her children play in band or conduct a band one day.

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SJB Gives Back-Helping in Haiti (cont'd)

After his yearlong undertaking, Kevin returned to Maryland in August, 2009 but his mind was still on Haiti. Just three days before the horrific earthquake of January 12, 2010, he flew into Port-au-Prince for a mission with Uplift Haiti, a charity he is a board member of, aimed at organizing volunteers who work directly with local communities to accomplish sustainable projects through education. He traveled to Beraud, Haiti to teach a class in food safety to Haitian women enrolled in the program at L'Ecole Cuisiniere de Beraud, a culinary school operated by the Sisters of St. Francis of Assisi. The mission was finished the day after the devastating earthquake.

Anxious to help, Kevin contacted Catholic Relief Services (CRS) and International Action. Within days, he was back in Port-au-Prince working with CRS on water treatment due to the destruction of many of the wells and few existing water sources. Soon after, he became Program Manager where he is in charge of coordinating the enormous deliveries of food and medical supplies being contributed to the ravaged country. He is still there now, overseeing all aspects of the supply chain, working 12 hour days from sunup to sundown.

When asked how SJB families may help, Kevin said donations to Catholic Relief Services or other qualified agencies such as International Action or Save the Children are needed. He stays positive that things are "progressing and getting done. I am committed to the people of Haiti, to reinforcing their human dignity and rebuilding their crumbled country." Surely, measures of giving back and other selfless acts such as Kevin's are helping diminish the sorrows of the world.


