CALCP Earth Day Tradition Continues

Earth Day at Riverside is truly about the earth, thanks to Colorado Association of Lawn Care Professionals (CALCP). In what has become a spring tradition, the CALCP Day of Service was a burst of activity with seeding, planting, pruning, and removing dead trees. Twenty-four companies participated, donating equipment, labor, seeds, supplies and plants.

CALCP is so committed to the Riverside Revival that after last summer's drought, they donated three water tanks: one 1000 gallon tank, on a trailer, to irrigate the areas that grasses have been planted in and two 1500 gallon stationary tanks, placed in areas that tree and shrub borders have been planted. After the plants are well established, 2-3 years, the stationary tanks will be moved to a different area in the cemetery, to establish new plantings.

The Colorado State University Plant Select Demonstration Gardens were cleaned and pruned by CSU Master Gardeners; additional plants were added thanks to the generosity of Al Gerace of Welby Gardens, also a Riverside family member.

Riverside family members, along with Colorado Preservation, Inc. staff, helped by dividing iris at gravesites throughout the cemetery and then the Master Gardeners added the extra rhizomes to the Heritage Iris Garden.

One week later, Riverside was again abuzz when the Mile High Youth Corp Saw Crew donated a Day of Service removing trees near the office and "old stone house."

The Riverside Revival is truly community collaboration at its best and we'd like to thank our many community partners: CALCP, Welby Gardens, Front Range Community College, Colorado Preservation, Inc., Colorado State University, Plant Select, Colorado Forest Service, Hardy Boy Bedding Plants, Mile High Youth Corp., Denver Master Gardeners; as well as the many Riverside family members and FHF volunteers.



Ladies of the Brown, A woman's history of Denver's Most Elegant Hotel

Debra Faulkner is a Colorado native who grew up in Loveland, and earned a Master's degree in Colorado history from the University of Colorado. She now teaches Colorado History at Metropolitan State College. As well, since 2008 she has served as the Historian and Archivist for the Brown Palace Hotel, conducting tours, presenting programs, and preserving the hotel's artifacts.

Unlike her previous book on Emily Griffith which was a straight biography, this book is a collection of anecdotes about some of the many women who have a connection to Denver's Brown Palace Hotel. She had originally wanted to write a book entitled "Ghosts of the Brown Palace", but the hotel management feared that would deter some potential paying guests, so she compromised with a book about the ladies.

The book is divided into five chapters, each one telling about six women who fall into a similar category. The first category is entitled "Legendary Ladies", which includes Mrs. Henry C. Brown, and Augusta Tabor; the second, entitled "Society Ladies" includes Edna Boettcher and Evalyn Walsh McLean; the next is "Famous Ladies" including Sarah Bernhardt and Zsa Zsa Gabor: the fourth is "Working Ladies", women who worked at the Brown in various capacities: and the last "Prominent Ladies" which mentions Mamie Eisenhower and Hillary Clinton.


Some ladies stayed at the Brown for extended periods, but the author mentions some who stayed for a short time in order to introduce interesting asides. Isabel "Sassy" Springer had an older husband and two younger boyfriends. While all three were staying at the Brown in 1911 she asked one of her beaux to tell the other that she was no longer interested in him! Later that evening the two men ran into each other in a hotel bar, an argument broke out, and one shot and killed the other. Marilyn Van Derbur in 1958 became the first Miss Colorado to be crowned Miss America. In 1956 she had been presented at The Brown as one of twelve debutantes, and for that evening the atrium was turned into a dance floor. Joan Baez stayed at The Brown in 1964 while on tour, and happened to be there while The Beatles were also guests. The author goes into details of the hotel's efforts at security to ensure the safety and privacy of "The Fab Four".

On the eerie side, Ms. Faulkner relates a tale of Mrs. Louise Sneed Hill, the arbiter of Denver society during the early part of the twentieth century who spent the last 15 years of her life in Suite 904 at the Brown Palace. Earlier in her life she had had an amorous affair with a polo-playing socialite named Bulkely Wells. When Mrs. Hill's husband died she expected Wells to marry her, but instead he eloped with a blond divorcee. Through her social contacts Mrs. Hill set out to break him, and within a few years, Wells, on the verge of bankruptcy, committed suicide. In 2000 an earlier historian at The Brown developed a tour emphasizing stories of romance, including Louise Hill. When the she mentioned Mrs. Hill and her affair the hotel switchboard would light up with calls from room 904. When the operators

picked up the line all they heard was static. At the time the entire ninth floor was under renovation, and suite 904 not only had no guests, but all the furniture and telephones had been removed! The guide felt Mrs. Hill's spirit resented her peccadilloes being aired, and when she stopped mentioning them, the mysterious calls ceased.

As someone with an interest in Fairmount, I noticed some small factual errors. Nathaniel Hill, Louise's father-in-law was not the first republican senator from Colorado. And Crawford Hill died in 1922, not 1923. Both are buried in Block A. nevertheless, Ms. Faulkner has written a very readable and interesting book, especially for anyone who has ever visited The Brown Palace, or has any interest in Colorado history. The book is illustrated with many pictures, both from the hotel archives, and from the western history department at the Denver library.

Tours of the Brown Palace take place on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Cost is \$10 per person. The book "Ladies of the Brown" can be purchased at The Tattered Cover and other local bookstores for \$19.99.

Riverside's Block 12 Residents

A project of love and respect for our kindred dead.

Cemeteries can hold a wealth of hidden treasures and information, yet, cemetery records seem to be the resource many people overlook, pass over, or just don't know to tap.

The Fairmount Heritage Foundation houses such a wealth of information. Their repository holds information for both the Fairmount and the Riverside Cemeteries. The information they hold will not only assist you in Family Research, but Historical Research as well.

So what is it the Fairmount Heritage Foundation can assist you with?

- 1) They have volunteers that will gladly assist you in your research many of these volunteers know the rich history of Fairmount, Riverside, and local Colorado histories.
- 2) The Fairmount Heritage Foundation has Archival Collections to assist in one's gathering of information.
- 3) Biographic Information, Photographs, and Historical Artifacts also make up the Fairmount Heritage Foundation's rich treasure trove of information.

Our Project: Block 12, a Potter's Field, came to our attention (Vickie Smejkal & Diane Nygaard) when we learned of the many babies buried there. We were under the impression that approximately 3885 babies were buried in the "Baby Lots" located there. Diane Nygaard and I felt the strong need to find out who these babies were. Many days and hours were spent as we fully uncovered stones, pulled weeds and other growth away from stones; taking pictures and documenting as we went along. With the help of the Block Book (each page indicating where a person is buried and if a marker existed), we have been able, for the most part, to identify who the headstones and remnants of headstones belong to.

While doing this work, it became my mission to identify all the residents of Block 12. Vital statistics were not

tracked until 1909 and most of these people were born before then, making information scant to nonexistent, so I began my research using the Riverside documents. After two years of sifting through the records, I was able to document over 7600 residents of Block 12.

My visits to Riverside not only led me through their various records (Burial Book, Block Book, and Index Cards), but also to the Denver Public Library to research Mortuary Records, Obituary Records, and to Genealogical and Historical Societies that also hold treasures of knowledge.

What have I learned during my past two years of research at Riverside?

- 1) Riverside is the final resting place of a variety of people; from poor to affluent and from the simple to the famous; some merely passing through time, some leaving their mark on history.
- 2) Riverside is a wonderful depiction of Denver's history and the people who were a part of it. The Chinese; the Japanese; the Koreans; the Germans; the Russian; the Irish; the Welsh; the Mexicans; the Italian; the Blacks; and the Indian; many with a story to tell.
- 3) Riverside is also a depiction of the many diseases and illnesses that plagued society. These diseases and illnesses took no pity on the poor or the rich; nor on the young or the old. Long before modern medicine came diseases, such as, the flu, small pox, yellow fever, diphtheria, typhoid, and tuberculosis.
- 4) Denver was fast growing, bringing to its city the miners, railroad workers, laborers, hotel workers, painters, carpenters, and yes, the cattle and railroad barons. Go west young man, go west. And west they did.
