





LANGUAGE OF THE MONTH



On Thursday 27th November 2009, members of our school's very own debating society received the chance to participate in a mock council of the European Union held at the Locarno Rooms of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office. At the event, Melita Gorewal, Eleanor Angwin and Jessica Ete of St Angela's School were chosen to represent Slovakia in EU-styled discussions and about three of the issues prioritised by the current French Presidency: GMO and Food Safety, Climate Change and Immigration and the Integration of Migrants.

The first of the talks was chaired by Lord Kinnock, a former leader of the Labour Party (as parents may remember). Whilst the outing revealed no specific 'winners; as one might come to expect from a debating-related trip, it was most definitely an interesting experience in which all students involved could learn more about the point of view of the individual countries they represented, as well as the workings of the European Union.



In a joint project between the TLC and CSC, 30 students spent a day with performance poet Neal Zetter as part of this year's National Poetry Day celebrations. As well as listening to him perform his poems, the girls were encouraged to join in during the performances. At the end of the day, students took part in a poetry slam; reading out the poems they had written during the day.

WHAT IS CHRISTMAS?



Boris declares City Hall as 200th City safe haven




