Federal Prison Camp Recognized as Supporter of the Year!

Tami, Ruzicka, the first Habitat Homeowner to pay her mortgage in full, shared a heartwarming message with the guests.

On October 4th, the Yankton County affiliate hosted the Statewide Fall Event at Bella's Restaurant located in Historic Downtown Yankton. The main purpose of this annual event is to recognize supporters of the year from each affiliate across the state of South Dakota and to highlight the accomplishments of the 13 affiliates that carry out the mission of Habitat for Humanity International.

Yankton County's 2014 Supporter of the Year was presented to the Federal Prison Camp, FCP. Since 1999, Habitat and the FCP have worked in partnership to make a difference in the lives of Habitat partner families, the community of Yankton and the lives of the inmates that assist the affiliate.

The partnership with FCP has been instrumental in the success stories shared by the Yankton County affiliate. Throughout the past 15 years, FCP has helped to make a difference in the lives of 40 of

the 46 families served through homeownership and home repair projects.

The evening started with great musical entertainment provided by "Two White Squares", Matt and Amy Morrison from Sioux Falls and daughter and son-in-law of Jim and Marilyn Lofflin.

Master of Ceremony, Bernie Hunhoff, a great supporter of affordable housing, entertained the guests with humor and the history of our great city. The guests were blessed by a video presentation created by the most recent Habitat homeowner, Nicole Myers.

Nicole's video was titled, "My Journey to Home Ownership." She states, "I would never in a million years give back this experience, it has shown me what hard work really is and how teamwork can be so productive."

Upon completion of the video, a heartwarming message was shared by Tami Ruzicka, also

a Habitat homeowner and the family mentor for the Nicole and her family.

Tami, the first Habitat homeowner to pay her mortgage in full, started her presentation by stating, "The dream of Habitat is to unite people, communities, churches and businesses in a spirit of a true partnership by building homes with families in need." Tami feels that by mentoring incoming partner families she is able to inspire and encourage the next generation of Habitat homeowners to become more involved with and continue to remain involved with Habitat's Christian housing ministry, even after they purchase their home.

God's grace is why volunteers work so hard for Habitat. These two amazing women are true examples of how decent, affordable housing can lay a foundation of hope for families in need.

Wells Fargo Bank and 903 Pearl Street Progress

The construction site was an active location on October 15 and 16, as Wells Fargo Bank employees from Yankton, Vermillion, and Beresford rolled up their sleeves to help hang siding. In addition to the many hours of labor, Wells Fargo presented Habitat with a check for \$15,000 to help pay for construction costs associated with building the home located at 903 Pearl Street.

The siding will be by the end of November. The affiliate took a break from new construction so that they could lend a hand to families in need of home repairs. The kick-off for the home repair projects was during Make a Difference Week in conjunction with United Way. All home repair projects will be completed by November 15.

Sewer and water were dug in during the last weekend in October. In addition, the heating

system has been installed.

The next big project will be in January as members of United Church of Christ come together to hang sheetrock. UCC contributes both financially and with volunteer labor annually.

The anticipated completion should be in the spring of 2015, weather and all unforeseen circumstances permitting.

Presidents Letter- Dan Gergen



Until last year, Habitat for Humanity of Yankton County (HFHYC) counted the number of families served by tallying up the number of families who moved into newly built or newly reconditioned homes. This was approximately two to three families per year. Families qualify for new and reconditioned homes based on income guidelines, their current housing conditions, and their ability to pay for a no interest loan. Sweat equity is also required. During 2014 three families have moved into new or reconditioned homes.

This year, with the introduction of A Brush With Kindness program (ABWK), HFH of Yankton County has been able to expand the number of families served to six. ABWK targets families who are unable to qualify for home improvement loans, but are able to repay a no interest loan. These improvements are mainly focused on the exterior of homes, including paint, siding, roofing, landscaping, etc. Homeowners participate, when physical abilities allow, with sweat equity in their project. HFH building personnel assess the project, order the necessary materials, and work with volunteers to complete the project. A no interest loan is set up to reimburse HFHYC for materials used in the project.

An outcome of the ABWK program is that it adds value to the owner's home. Repair of the exterior prevents deterioration to the structure, improves curb-appeal, contributes to neighborhood improvement and increases pride of ownership. Another outcome is the involvement of the friends, family, neighbors and church members, in a project to help a homeowner with what they cannot do by themselves. During 2014 three families will have been served by the ABWK program.

So a Habitat affiliate has ways of measuring goals and achievement of those goals. But the exciting and most rewarding measurements are the smiles, joy and tears of appreciation of the Habitat families.

All of this is possible only through the generous gifts of time, talent and treasure from our community. We truly believe that we are providing an excellent program for our targeted population and that we will be able with your help to continue this service into the future. May God bless you for your generous gifts.
