Spring Ahead to Public Presentations on April 20,2012

This year Public Presentations will take place on Friday, April 20, 2012 at the County College of Morris. The event will begin at 6:30 pm. Presenters should arrive early to sign in on time.

In anticipation of the event it is strongly encouraged that all prepare in advance. To help all to prepare there will be a Presentations 101 Workshop on Thursday, March 1st 7-8:30p.m.at the office. Please call the office to register. Snow date will be Thursday, March 8th.

For some public speaking comes naturally; for others it takes lots of practice.

You may choose to do a demonstration, give an illustrated talk, performance or formal speech. The topic can be of your choice. You can do a presentation on an animal, a country, your family traditions, or whatever floats your boat.

Cloverbud members should prepare to present for at least 1—5 minutes. First time presenters should plan for about a 5 minute presentation. Presenters in eighth grade and up should prepare for at least 8—15 minutes. Dogs and other animals are welcome to be a part of your presentation. Please be sure to have your dog on a leash. While we are waiting for the judges to tally up the score we will have refreshments. We ask all presenters to bring a snack to share. Award ribbons will be distributed at the conclusion of the evening. All Cloverbud members will receive a Participation Ribbon for their efforts.

There is also a need for volunteer judges. If you know someone who might be interested in being a judge, please let us know their name and contact information. Training will be provided.

Key advice for Public Presentations:

- 1) Choose a topic you are familiar with: By choosing something you know about, you already create a "comfort zone" and will have an easier time delivering your speech in three to five minutes.
- 2) Practice, Practice: Remember that practice makes perfect. When you practice at home in front of an audience (mom, dad, sibling, friend, your dog) you will quickly feel at ease and be prepared to handle your topic with ease on presentation day.
- 3) **Don't Stress**: Public Presentations are fun! Everyone there watching is rooting for you and truly interested in what you're going to say. So take a deep breath and relax! You'll do great!
- 4) Sign Up Early: There is a public presentations sign up sheet on Page 4 of this newsletter. Parents: please take the time to help your Cloverbud fill it out and hand it in no later than April 13. Public Presentation Day is scheduled for April 20, in Cohen Hall at Morris County College. Give yourself plenty of time to arrive and register. Plan to park in the upper Parking Lot closest to Dover Chester Road. It is Parking Lot # 8.



All those in 8th Grade and up who receive excellent on their Presentation on the county level are eligible for State Public Presentations. State Presentations will be held **Saturday**, **June 9th** at Hickman Hall, Cook/Douglass Campus.

NEW JERSEY BLUEBIRD SOCIETY ORGANIZES TO BENEFIT BLUEBIRDS

NOTE: Jim Newquist is the Morris County Coordinator/ facilitator for the NJBB. Sometimes we just need nature to get us motivated. In this case, concerns for the well-being of our native bluebird motivated a group of individuals to establish the New Jersey Bluebird Society (NJBBS), becoming an affiliate of the North American Bluebird Society (NABS) - the prominent organization dedicated to benefit bluebirds in North America. Until now, New Jersey has been one of the few states without an organized affiliate in the NABS.

Initially, a few individuals from throughout the State met in early February and agreed there was enough interest to organize a chapter. Followup meetings at Batsto Village have lead to affiliating with NABS, designing a logo, initiating construction of a web site, establishment of a Board of Directors and elections of officers. Frank Budney, Union, Union County was elected president; Allen Jackson, Millville, Cumberland County was elected vice president; and, Shelly Cucugliello, Pittsgrove, Salem County was elected secretary/treasurer.

The NJBBS's primary goal is to produce a healthy and productive bluebird population in New Jersey by promoting recommended management practices (proper housing, protection from predators and weekly monitoring). Bluebirds respond well to proper management. The logical approach to help achieve this goal is to establish bluebird trails monitored by volunteers. Bluebird trails can help educate the public about bluebirds while highlighting the work of the NJBBS. Efforts will also focus on bluebird management in back yards, complimenting the trail program.

There are already many individuals in NJ that monitor bluebird trails or provide boxes on their property for bluebirds. The NJBBS encourages the consolidation of all people in NJ with an interest in bluebirds to assist in maximizing efforts to benefit bluebirds.

The NJBBS is presently developing their web site (http:// www.njbbs.org) and establishing by-laws. As our membership grows so should the bluebird population in New Jersey as results from proper management reflect the efforts of its members.

Association sets new policy for Financial Support for 4-H Members and Volunteers

The Morris County 4-H Association's Board of Directors has been working for the past year to develop a policy so that 4-H members and volunteers who want to attend events that cost money will know in advance how much financial support the Association will provide. The policy is not yet finalized, but is close enough that we want to start getting the word out about it. We do not want 4-H members and volunteers to pass up educational opportunities due to cost, when financial help is available.

Major national trips for older 4-H'ers, like National 4-H Conference and National 4-H Congress, will be 100% paid for by the Morris County 4-H Association. North Jersey Teen Conference will be funded at 60%. Even Winter Camp will be funded at 50%.

Also, if you enter in a state 4-H competition that has an entry fee, like the Horse Bowl or the State Small Animal Show, the Association will pay the entry fees.

Money is available for volunteers, too. Volunteers who are required to complete specific training as a condition for volunteering, like Shooting Sports volunteers, will have that training completely paid for up to \$100. Leader Forum attendees will also receive substantial support.

The application process is still being worked on, so if you want to request financial support from the Association, please contact the Association president Bev Hahn (dances-with-hooves@juno.com) or the 4-H office.

4-H Association News

Message from President Beverly Hahn

As some of you know, I was elected president of the Morris County 4-H Association / Board of Directors this fall. I am very excited about this and am looking forward to two rewarding, work-filled years.



As you may know, the Morris County 4-H Association is made up of all Morris County's 4-H leaders, plus individuals who are not leaders who have been elected by the leaders to serve on the 13-member Board of Directors. The Board's primary responsibility is to handle the finances of the Association: paying for the Fair and scholarships and record books and other expenses, and raising money so that we will be able to pay for all that. (Did you know that Fair expenses are about \$40,000?)

The Board members also form the core of the Association members planning and doing the physical work for county-wide activities, such as the Fair, Holiday Caroling, 4-H promotional booths, etc. Board members don't do these things because they're Board members, but because they're active members of the Association and keep in contact with the 4-H office and each other. 

Best 4-H Stories



My 4-H Story Gena Blewett, Grades 4-8

BUSTED!

There is a myth that says if you eat pop rocks and drink soda at the same time your stomach will explode. Pop rocks are a fun candy, when you eat them they fizz and pop in your mouth. They also fizz in any type of liquid. Soda is carbonated and carbonation makes the soda fizz. If you shake the soda the soda will explode out of the bottle if the bottle is opened. The myth is that if you mix soda and the pop rocks the mixture will explode in your stomach. That seemed very interesting to me so I wanted to test it with my 4-H club.

This was one of my experiments that I was going to do with my Nature's Keepers club at the meeting I was going to run. Before I did this I had some research and prep work to do. I knew that I didn't want to try this experiment on myself because if it wasn't a myth I didn't want my

stomach to explode. I looked for experiments like this on YouTube, I found one. Instead of actually eating and drinking the pop rocks and soda, we could use bottles, and balloons. I tried this at home and what was supposed to happen, happened. I knew that this would be a success at my 4-H club so I decided to do this experiment with some other experiments I was going to do with my 4-H club.

I e-mailed all the members and I asked them to bring an empty water bottle to the meeting for a fun surprise. I got all of my supplies together and went to our meeting. Once I told them the myth about soda and pop rocks they got excited. I handed out the supplies and walked everyone through the process: put the pop rocks into the balloon using a funnel. Then pour soda into the water bottles using a different funnel. Everyone kept wanting to eat the pop rocks I had to tell everyone not to. It was a good thing that they got one pack to bring home and eat as well as the one to do the experiment

with. After we cleaned up a few spills of soda we were ready to see if this myth was true or not.

After the bottles and balloons were filled we put the balloon on to the top of the bottle. I had to make sure nobody dumped their pop rocks while they were putting on the balloon. We counted down from three and dumped the pop rocks into the bottle. The balloons started to inflate...only a little. None of the balloons flew off the bottle nor did they explode... Nature's Keepers has busted this myth! They were a little disappointed but happy that when we were done with the experiment most of them decided to drink the pop rock soda mixture! Gross!!! Even though our experiment was a failure we still had lots of fun. I look forward to leading future meetings. Maybe Nature's Keepers can find more myth's to bust.



My 4-H Story Chris Blewett, Grades 9-13

Ready, Aim, Fire

I was just standing there, waiting for the rush of stampeding fourth graders to enter my room; listening to the clock tic away the last seconds before becoming a teacher for Science Sational Day. I was nervous...how would I do? Would the kids like it? Would this be a success or a flop? My stomach churned as I heard the stampede of footsteps rushing towards me. Was I ready? Here goes nothing.

In the winter of 2010 I was approached to run a Science Sational Day workshop in April. This would be the second time I've been asked to be a leader in this program. I had run other things during my 4-H career but Science Sational Day was still new to me. When I accepted I had no idea what to do.

As I taught this to my 4-H group the previous year I knew I could do it, but I had to find my notes first. Several weeks before the big day, I sat down in front of my computer around ten o'clock at night, believing that I could find my notes within

fifteen minutes. After fifteen minutes passed, I was unable to find them. After another forty-five minutes of squinting under the intense light of my desk lamp, I finally found them. Whew!

I reviewed the instructions and made some changes that would simplify the process. I determined my needed supplies later purchasing them. I then practiced. As I perfected my run through I gained enough confidence to say that I was ready.

The day finally arrived. I gathered my supplies and headed down the road to County College of Morris. As I walked into my classroom the air suddenly turned cold. I walked over to the thermostat and it read a comfortable seventy degrees. I left it alone as I realized that it was just in my mind, my nerves were acting up. I emptied my bag of supplies; I laid out all of my supplies and waited.

My first session had ten kids. They were all wired to make trebuchets. While everyone had enough time to build their trebuchets, they did not have enough time to test fire their trebuchets as we had some technical difficulty. However they all had fun. During my lunch break I revised my

directions and prepped several difficult pieces so that the process would run smother.

The second session was easier. My modifications were a success. This group was also wired but I was calmer. They all were able to build and launch their trebuchets. We lined them all up and I said "Ready, Aim, Fire" and they launched their trebuchets. They all fired—some didn't go far while others went a few feet. Everyone was smiling when they took their trebuchets to tweak and launch again.

Leading this age group through such a technical process, while difficult and challenging it was also rewarding as it taught me to stay cool under pressure and to be flexible with my plans. So I think that both the kids and I learned something new at Science Sational Day.


