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## GLADES DAZE

### The Swallow-Tailed Kite

The word raptor evokes images of sharp talons, fiercely swooping to capture prey, soaring high over treetops keeping a powerful eye on the landscape below, and feasting on insects. Feasting on insects?! What kind of raptor feasts on insects? The Swallow-tailed kite, a medium-sized diurnal raptor, nests in Florida and is primarily an insectivore.

The Swallow-tailed kite flies just inches above the tree line feasting on dragonflies,

cicadas and plucking the occasional small lizard from the treetops. This striking bird has a 4 foot wingspan however rarely needs to flap due to its



forked tail. By rotating its tail almost constantly and at times nearly 90 degrees they can best maneuver sharp turns and varying wind patterns in a seemingly effortless fashion.

Swallow-tailed kites embark on a nearly 5,000 mile annual migration departing from as far south as Paraguay. About two-thirds of the kites that breed in North America complete a strenuous journey northward along the Andes, over the eastern edge of Central America into the Yucatan Peninsula, and finally across the Gulf of Mexico, the riskiest segment of the trip, to arrive in Florida. remaining third of the North American breeding population disperses among 7 southeastern states and take a different route, opting to go around the Gulf of Mexico. When the kites are ready to return to South America they will take the same route with one group crossing open water while the other sticks to land. Both groups will converge in Honduras to complete the journey together.

See if you can catch a glimpse of this graceful raptor between the months of March and August. It is quite a sight to see, munching on insects as it flies while gathering energy for its strenuous southbound passage to South America.



# Off the Shelf – New Books "Dream New Dreams, Reimagining My Life After Loss"

Several years ago I reviewed Randy Pausch's autobiography "The Last Lecture." Soon after finishing his book, Randy succumbed to pancreatic cancer. His book was the legacy he left to his three young children. It was beautifully written and a testament about Randy's joy of living.

Now, his widow Jai has written her own memoir of what she was experiencing as the primary caregiver during those two years after her husband was diagnosed in 2006 and how she "reimagined" her life after her loss. This is an inspiring beautiful story about a woman who suffered tragedy in her life and in time was able to create a new life of hope and happiness, as she puts it.

After taking care of my brother who has acute myeloid leukemia for just a week, I could relate to Jai Pausch's own experiences of the long waits for chemo and blood transfusions at M.D. Anderson Cancer Institute in Houston and what patience and love the caregiver must have. This book provides guidance to those caregivers and a journey back to a life of hope and meaning after the loss of a loved one.

## HOUSEHOLD TIPS

## Fishing Report

Fishing in July and August can be rewarding if you fish early and late. In the middle of the day Snook head for deep

water or at least some shade. Afternoon thunder storms and mosquitoes make it an extra challenge. Redfish, however, will feed all day and are great sport. Black Drum are also found in great numbers at this time of year and can get very large. Small Tarpon can be found in the creeks early in the morning. If all else fails, cast a chunk of Ladyfish out and wait for a big shark. Permit fishing on the Gulf wrecks can be great when the weather is calm. They will also move into the outside points. Cast a small blue crab to these and look out! Grouper and Cobia fishing is also good during these months. Not many anglers fish at this time of year so on many days you have the whole place to yourself.

#### **FWC News**

Florida's snook fishing season will remain closed on the west coast until 2013. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) officials made the decision in light of the 2010 cold kill which reduced the snook population on the state's coasts. Snook season was closed on both the Atlantic and Gulf coasts on Jan. 16, 2010, but it reopened last September on the Atlantic Coast where the freeze was not as severe. Recreational snook season is expected to reopen in the Gulf on Sept. 1, 2013. Until then, catch-and-release of snook will be allowed.

## Silver Oak (Grevillea robusta)

Also known as the silky or southern oak, this beautiful tree is a native of the eastern coastal area of Australia. It is not a true oak since it does not produce acorns. The Silver Oak is a very fast

growing evergreen tree with delicate dark green fern-like leaves that are greyish white on the undersides. The bright yellow and red flowers bloom in the spring and are used to produce honey. Its little seed pods are visible in late winter and early spring. The flowers and the fruit can be toxic and may cause skin irritation.



Because of its resistance to rotting, the timber was once used for fences, the exterior of windows and



of windows and to make cabinets and furniture. However, there are now restrictions on its harvesting in Australia.



## The Living Gulf Coast

Often seen in pairs, the mottled duck is readily observed in marshes, swamps, and wetlands in the early morning and evening. It tends to fly just above the treetops and can be heard making a distinctive *quack*, *quack*, *quack* as it travels. Both male and female mottled ducks bear a striking resemblance to a female mallard duck.

The mottled duck is a game bird in Florida and is heavily hunted in the St. Johns River marshes in north central Florida, as well as other wetlands across the state. More than 13,000 mottled ducks are harvested annually. In hunting-free urban areas the mottled duck is far tamer than the migratory blue-winged teal and if approached slowly, will not fly away. It feeds primarily on small crustaceans, insects, and mollusks but will also filter-feed on vegetation. In shallow water it can be observed tipping, with its head buried in the muck and only its tail feathers sticking out of the water.

It is monogamous, mating very early in life, and it keeps solitary nests in dense vegetation. On the mainland the mottled duck has even been known to nest in tomato fields. It is in danger of losing its identity as a result of hybridization with feral mallards across the state. The offspring of these cross-breed pairings are fertile, which will eventually create an entirely new species. The chicks and eggs are preyed upon by snakes, alligators, snapping turtles, and hawks.

#### No Fish

At age four in Ochopee, I watched my parents fish off of the bank of the canal. With this observation in mind I took a stroll.

I found a stick under a tree, a ball of string and a pair of scissors in the kitchen drawer. After taking some washers from my dad's tool box, I slipped five of them onto the string, attached a safety pin, and then tied the string to the end of the stick. From the refrigerator I selected bologna as bait.

The slope of the boat ramp at my grandfather's house made it easy for me to reach the water's edge. I cast the line out and watched it sink. I was surprised to see a strange, many legged creature snatch the bologna away and then disappear. I tried again, and again it left with the bait. On my next attempt, I yanked the pole to stop the thief, but it gripped the safety pin. The safety pin, bait, washers, and the creature flew out of the water and over my head and landed on the grass. The strange animal paused, and then scurried into the water. I re-baited. On the third time of flinging the odd fish onto the grass, I ran and grabbed it but suffered a harsh pinch. I let go and off it went into the water.

Determined, I fetched a bucket from the garage. When the many legged thing was in my hands this time, I tossed it into the bucket. I showed my parents and asked if I could keep it. They said no. They took it, cooked it, and let me have a taste of the *Blue Crab*'s claws.

After that experience I caught more of them, and sometimes pulled off their claws even when they were still alive. I had become a barbarian.

## Florida Tales "Wash Day"

Washing clothes was anything but easy back in the day. Wood was plentiful and that was our fuel to heat and cook with. A tree was cut and sawed into blocks and split for the cook stove, a dead tree was cut into fireplace lengths and split if they were too big. The dead tree burned faster, and made a quicker fire in the fireplace. Wash day was usually on Monday. Water was pumped



to fill the tubs and cast iron Cane Syrup Kettle. The white clothes were boiled in soapy water in the Kettle. Clorox had not been devised yet, and the clothes were scrubbed on Washboard with soap that Grandma had made from grease and lye. The dirtiest work clothes were soaped generously

pounded with a wooden paddle on the "Battling Block", a block cut from a good-sized tree and stood up endwise near the wash place. A little bluing was added to the last rinse water to keep the clothes white. When the clothes were ready to be ironed, a "Sad Iron" was used, a heavy cast-iron Iron with a handle attached. Later "Granny" got Irons with detachable handles. Irons were heated on the stove and it took three; one to use while the others were heating. As one cooled, it was exchanged for a hotter one.

## **Attention: Pet Owners Collier County Ordinance 2008-51**

"It shall be unlawful for the owner of any animal to allow or permit his or her animal to be confined in an unattended motor vehicle without sufficient ventilation or under other conditions for such periods of time as may endanger the health and/or physical well-being of the animal due to heat, lack of potable water, or such other circumstances as may reasonably cause suffering, disability or death to the animal."

Since it's summer, it's good to keep copies of this Ordinance in your car. If you see a pet left in a vehicle, put this under the windshield wiper or at the door handle. If the pet is really in distress, call the Sheriff. Please just leave your pet at home.




