
Meat Animal Reminder! Vernon County Fair Beef - Sheep & Swine Weigh-in 2013

## 4-H Summer Camp July 31-August 2, 2013 Camp Upham Woods Crawford, Richland & Vernon Counties

#### All activities are supervised by Upham Woods staff, adult chaperones and teen counselors.

4-H Summer Camp takes place at Upham Woods, north of Wisconsin Dells. The main lodge, nature center, craft building and swimming and fishing area are located at the base of a hill. The cabins are located at the top of a hill with a separate shower/bath area. All water activities take place on the Wisconsin River. Youth are assigned to cabins by gender and age (3rd & 4th graders bunk together and 5th & 6th graders bunk together). Seventh and eighth graders tent camp at Mirror Lake. #### VERNON COUNTY FAIR <u>JUNIOR DAIRY MANAGERIAL PROJECT AGREEMENT</u> Forms due at the Extension Office on or before June 1st Complete information is available on our website http://vernon.uwex.edu or at the Extension Office.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

- 1. To develop character, knowledge and a sense of responsibility in the dairy project.
- 2. To maintain or increase the number of youth carrying a dairy project.
- 3. To maintain or increase the number of dairy exhibited at Vernon County Fair.
- 4. To provide the opportunity to work with dairy animals for non-farm youth and farm youth.
- 5. To increase the credibility of The Junior Dairy Managerial project.

#### RULES

- 1. The managerial project pertains to the junior dairy show department. It is available for registered and grade classes.
- 2. The program is available to any member, hereafter referred to as the Lessee, in good standing in a Vernon County Fair approved youth organization.
- 3. The owner will jointly determine with the Lessee specific responsibilities to be carried out by the Lessee. The responsibilities will be recorded on the Junior Dairy Managerial Project Agreement and will list items such as:
  - a. When the animal stays on the owner's premises, that Lessee shall enter into an Agreement with the owner regarding Lessee's responsibilities as to the care of the animal or the group of animals it is a part of.
  - b. When the Lessee has possession of the animal, they shall enter into an Agreement with the owner regarding the allocation of responsibilities for feed, veterinarian care, breeding and insurance.

#### 4. Managerial vs Ownership Requirements:

**Ownership** of an animal by a junior exhibitor is established when the animal is registered in the name of the exhibitor. Co-ownership is allowed between immediate junior family members (i.e. brother, sister). Animals owned by parents, the family farm or others are considered managerial. Ownerships dates are: cows-January 1st of current fair year and calves and heifers June 1<sup>st</sup>.

**Managerial forms are not required** when the managerial animal is owned by the junior member's immediate family (brother, sister, parent or family farm). These family-owned animals should be entered as managerial at the Fair, but they do not require the filing of a form. For all other leased animals, a form must be completed.

**Managerial forms are required:** If the exhibitor is showing an animal which is co-owned or owned by someone other then immediate family (mother, father or legal guardian).

- 5. *The Vernon County Fair Junior Dairy Managerial Project Agreement must be signed and received in the Vernon County UW- Extension Office by June 1* of the project year for eligibility at the Vernon County Fair. Managerial identification forms need not accompany the animal to the Fair but MUST be kept at the County Extension Office until 30 days after the completion of the Fair.
- 6. The title of ownership as stated on the registration certificate of a registered managerial animal will remain in the possession of the owner.
- 7. The owner will make the animal available to the Lessee during the period of the Vernon County Fair Junior Dairy Managerial Project Agreement. The owner does NOT retain the ability to exhibit the identified managerial project animal during the period of the agreement in shows prior to and after the Vernon County Fair if it meets the guidelines of the said show(s).
- 8. The owner of the managerial animal agrees not to hold the Lessee liable for any financial loss from injury or death to the managerial animal.
- 9. The owner is not responsible for injuries to the Lessee and participation in this project will require Lessee and Lessee's parent/guardian to hereby release from liability the owner and all other persons and entities involved with this project, (see Release of Liability form).
- 10. The Lessee is responsible for all expenses incurred in exhibiting the animal, such as veterinary, transportation, grooming, feed and other miscellaneous expenditures. The Lessee may keep any premiums or awards while exhibit-ing the animal during the duration of the contract.
- 11. The Vernon County Fair Junior Dairy Managerial Project Agreement will remain in force until the end of the project year or until terminated by either party. This Agreement may be terminated prior to the end of the project year for reasons such as:
  - a. Failure of Lessee to carry out responsibilities as outlined in this agreement
  - b. Changes in the farming operation of the owner.
- 12. The owner, Lessee, a parent or legal guardian of the Lessee and dairy project leader or general leader, must sign the Vernon County Fair Junior Dairy Managerial Project Agreement.
- 13. The managerial project is limited to up to four animals per exhibitor. The animals' maybe calves, heifers or cows.

# Wisconsin Safe Operation of Tractor and Machinery Certification Program



An educational program to enhance the safety knowledge and skills for youth operating tractors and machinery on Wisconsin farms

#### The Federal Law ...

Since 1970, Part 570 of the Child Labor Regulations, Subpart E-1, has provided exemption related to hazardous tasks for youth age 14 and 15 for employment on farms other than those operated by their family through tractor and machinery certification programs.

#### The Wisconsin Law Act 455...

Effective July 1, 1997, no person may direct or permit a child under age 16 years to operate a farm tractor or self-propelled implement of husbandry on a public road unless the child has been certified as successfully completing a tractor and machinery certification course. This does not apply to operation of a farm tractor or self-propelled implement of husbandry on the road when crossing perpendicular to the direction of the road. **Youth must be 12 years of age to enroll in the training program.** 

#### What this means . . .

The law means that youth operating tractors or selfpropelled machinery for their own family on public roads will be required to have certification. Persons violating may receive a \$20 fine for the first offense and fines not to exceed \$50 for each subsequent offense. To provide youth with the necessary State and Federal certification, the WI Safe Operation of Tractor and Machinery Certification programs are being offered throughout the state.

Requests for reasonable accommodations for disabilities or limitations should be made prior to the date of the program or activity for which it is needed. Please do so as soon as possible prior to the program activity so that proper arrangements can be made. #### Wisconsin Safe Operation of Tractor and Machinery Certification Program This program will:

• provide youth 12 years of age with the necessary requirements to be certified for compliance under Wisconsin Act 455.

• meet the federal requirements for Part 570, Child Labor Regulations, Subpart E- 1 "Occupations in Agriculture Particularly Hazardous for Employment of Children under age 16". The 24 hour program includes:

#### The 24 hour program includes:

• hands on instruction for tractors and farm machinery operation;

- hazard recognition and correction;
- general farm safety knowledge and
- stresses the importance of a positive attitude towards safety.

## To successfully complete the course, youth must:

- attend 24 hours of instruction and
- pass written and driving exams.

Wisconsin Act 455 stipulates that the state program is to have the equivalent requirements to the federal tractor and machinery certification. Therefore, this course will be taught at a level for 14 to 15 year old youth.

#### Who should attend?

• Youth 14-15 years of age who need the federal certificate of training for employment on farm in accordance with Part 570, Child Labor Regulations, Subpart E-1.

• Youth 12 years of age who will be operating tractors or self-propelled farm machinery on public roads for their own family.

• Youth desiring tractor and machinery safety instructions.

Where and When are the programs offered? This varies by county. These programs can be offered through the county University of Wisconsin Cooperative Extension office or the local agricultural education instructor. In many counties a program is offered once a year as a cooperative effort between UWEX and the county agricultural education instructors.

Program dates vary throughout the state but most are conducted between January and June. To find out when the program will be held in your area, contact your local county UWEX office or local high school agricultural education department. All counties may not offer the certification program but could provide assistance in locating an available program.

#### Should your child attend this program?

It is your responsibility as parents/guardians to determine if your child is ready to attend a Wisconsin Safe Operation of Tractor and Machinery Certification program.

#### Some facts for you to consider:

• 82% of fatalities involving youth under age 16 result from agricultural equipment.

• Youth under age 14 are involved in nine times as many accidents per exposure hour of tractor driving than tractor operators 25-44 years.

• Youth under age 15 have higher accident rates for operating tractors on public roads. Common factors in these accidents were inexperience and lack of maturity to handle the situation. Being capable of reaching the pedals will not help if the child can't recognize a hazard or anticipate a danger. Generally, youth under age 14 do not have the ability to anticipate danger, realize the danger and react in order to prevent an accident. Ask yourself the question "Is my child ready to drive a semi-truck?"

## Assessing your child's ability to drive a tractor or operate machinery:

1. Age of child

#### 2. Physical Abilities

• Can the youth sit securely in the operator's seat and fully depress clutch and reach all controls?

• On seats with seatbelts, the child should be able to reach all controls.

• Does the child have the strength needed to shift, steer or hook equipment up to the tractor?

Is the child able to turn and check behind them for traffic and still keep the tractor in control?
3. Cognitive Abilities

• Is your child able to recognize dangerous situations like driving too fast or turning too sharp?

• Is he/she able to think through situations quickly to avoid hazards?

• When given directions does the child follow them?

If the child has difficulty paying attention for 15 minutes in a class, what could happen if his/her mind wanders while driving down the road?
 4. Emotional maturity

• Does peer pressure cause him/her to show off or attempt things beyond their ability?

• Does the child become easily upset when he/she is unable to do something that he/she want to do? Every child is different. Preventing injury to your child may mean saying no and waiting until the child's abilities develop.

## Animal Health Exhibition Update for 2013 Bernie O'Rourke—Extension Youth Livestock Specialist

#### <u>Swine:</u>

Find below **NEW** information regarding the 2013 swine exhibition year as it relates to Swine Influenza and PRRS (Porcine Respiratory and Reproductive Syndrome). This is important information as it relates to swine purchases, travel across state lines and health management. The H3N2 swine influenza strain was a concern at some county fairs and state fairs within Wisconsin and other states in 2012. Because of this concern for this year, the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) released recommendations for the 2013 exhibition season to reduce the risk of transmitting the influenza virus. (See DATCP Recommendation for 2013 exhibition season). http://datcp.wi.gov/uploads/Animals/pdf/2013%20Exhibition%20Rec% 20final%20v2.pdf. Swine exhibitors can utilize a swine influenza vaccine to assist in protecting swine during these coming summer exhibitions. This is not a mandatory request, however it is one of many recommendations from DATCP to reduce risk of transmitting the influenza virus. A webinar was held in February where swine influenza vaccination was discussed. Here are some items to think about when considering a swine influenza vaccine for your project animals: It takes 2 doses. The first dose is at roughly 5 weeks of age. Repeat with the second dose roughly 3 weeks later. The last dose should be a minimum 30 days before exhibition at the fair. If your purchasing project pigs, make sure you ask the producer if a 1<sup>st</sup> dose was given. After the 2<sup>nd</sup> dose it takes roughly 2 weeks before it is fully effective. 21 day withdrawal period for most vaccines. Read the label of the product you are using. The vaccine comes in 50 to 250 dose bottles. Your county might be coordinating a vaccination effort due to the size of bottles. Also contact your local veterinarian for the availability of single dose injections. After the  $2^{nd}$  dose the duration of immunity is roughly 6 months. Vaccines for H3N2 are roughly 60% effective. Read the vaccination label that you are using for information, cautions and warnings.

- **NEW** Importing swine into Wisconsin: Statement on Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and import permit disclosing the PRRS status of the herd (if known) is new starting March 1, 2013.
- If the status of the herd is unknown, write on the CVI and permit application "PRRS herd status unknown"

If the status of the herd is known, the status can be identified by the <u>categories</u> listed here or by "PRRS Positive" or "PRRS Negative". PRRS is not a condition that prevents an import, so animals from a PRRS-positive herd or a herd of unknown status are eligible to enter Wisconsin. For the rest of the swine rules go to: <u>http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal\_Movement/Swine/index.aspx</u> *Beef: All exhibition or event cattle (including steers) are required to have one form of official identification.* 

ID requirements for cattle entering Wisconsin as of March 11, 2013:

- All sexually-intact animals of any age, including calves at side, must have one form of official identification.
- All dairy breed feeder cattle of any age, including steers born after March 11, 2013, must have one form of official identification (see section below). The certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) must include the official individual ID for all intact animals. For steers, either the official individual ID or a statement on the CVI indicating the animals are officially identified is acceptable. All beef breed feeder cattle of any age, excluding steers, must have one form of official identification (the steer exemption does not apply to animals from TB Modified Accredited zones, Modified Accredited Advanced states or zones, or states Wisconsin treats as Modified Accredited Advanced because of current positive tuberculosis cases or investigations see each <u>state</u>'s specific requirements for details).
- <u>All steers moving for rodeos, recreational events, shows, or exhibitions must have one form of official identification.</u>
- The following are official ID:
- USDA metal ear tag number that are part of the National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) (starts with state 2-digit code, also known as "Brite" tag)
- USDA "840" button tag number (includes the visual number and/or RFID)
- 15-digit animal ID number with the first three digits/letters USA, 980, 982 or 985 (accepted as ID through March 11, 2015)
- A backtag will work as ID for animals going directly to slaughter

Effective March 11, 2013, the following forms of identification will no longer be valid for movement into the state of Wisconsin:

- breed association tattoo number
- breed association registration number

Some of the provisions in the USDA's traceability regulations do not apply in Wisconsin, such as brands as identification for interstate movement and age exemptions for certain classifications.

Raspberry Angel Cake

<u>Ingredients</u> 3 Cups Boiling Water 2 pkg (3 oz each) Raspberry Jello 1 pkg (12 oz) <u>Frozen</u> Red Raspberries (not thawed) 1 pkg (7.5 oz) Round Angel Food Cake Cut Into 21-24 Thin slices 1 Cup Thawed Cool Whip Topping

### Instructions

Add boiling water to jello in medium bowl. Stir 2 minutes until dissolved. Add raspberries and stir until thawed. Pour into 9" round pan sprayed with cooking spray. Arrange cake slices in concentric circle over gelatin with slices overlapping as necessary to completely cover gelatin. Refrigerate 3 hrs or until firm. Unmold On plate. Top with cool whip.
