<u>TUITION INFORMATION FOR 2015-16</u>—including invoices, payment options, and loan information from First Bank of Charleston will be mailed on April 15. **Tuition payment in full is due June 15** (late charge assessed at \$1.00 per day after June 15).

<u>DIOCESAN TUITION ASSISTANCE</u> – The Diocese of Wheeling- Charleston will continue its 24 year tradition of offering the Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) in efforts to keep Catholic school education affordable for Catholic families who desire it but may need some financial assistance to make

that dream a reality. Thanks to Bishop Bransfield's ongoing and genuine commitment to the Catholic schools in our Diocese, funds have once again been allocated for distribution to Catholic families in need of assistance. Awards are based upon a family's degree of need relative to all other applicants. Apply on-line at www.factstuitionaid.com and have your 2014 tax information available. Families with children currently enrolled or who are applying to enroll for the 2015-2016 school year should apply ASAP. **The deadline is April 30.** No assistance will be available from the Diocese or from any school unless an application is submitted and all required documentation is submitted. There is a \$25 application fee. The diocese will pay \$12.50, and families must pay \$12.50.

TUITION SCHOLARSHIP – Mr. Frank Jennings and his family established a student scholarship fund several years ago providing partial tuition for deserving CCHS students. The Mary M. Jennings Memorial Scholarship pays tribute to Mrs. Jennings and her strong belief in the beauty of CCHS. Eighth graders currently enrolled in CCHS may apply for this scholarship which provides \$1000 per year (renewable each year if student maintains school standards) toward CCHS tuition. Selection of the recipient is based on commitment to Catholic education, financial need, strength of character, and involvement in school activities. To apply, the student should: 1) write name at the top left-hand corner of a piece of paper; 2) list schools attended since kindergarten; 3) describe involvement in school activities; 4) explain how the scholarship will affect applicant's educational plans; 5) tell anything special the applicant would like the scholarship selection committee to know. SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS MUST BE RECEIVED IN THE SCHOOL OFFICE BY FRIDAY, MAY 1.

SECOND SEMESTER EXAM SCHEDULE – Second semester exams will be upon us before we know it. All classes have exams and exams must be taken at the scheduled times. Students who miss semester exams for reasons other than illness (who will be given the opportunity to make up the exams) will receive an F for those examinations. Just a reminder regarding the seniors- only exam exemption policy: Seniors may be exempt from second semester exams if: 1) the course is a two-semester course; 2) the teacher chooses to allow exam exemptions; 3) third and fourth quarter grades average to at least a 93; 4) fine arts requirements must have been completed by March 20 and community service requirements by May 8. Students enrolled in AP courses must take the AP exam AND teacher-developed final exams. Seniors who meet exam exemption requirements for their AP classes may be exempt from teacher-developed final exams. Seniors in non-AP classes who choose to take AP exams will also take teacher-developed final exams unless they meet the exemption standards. Non-seniors who choose to take an AP exam for an AP class in which they are not enrolled must take the final exam for their class.

TEXTBOOKS FOR 2015-16-- Charleston Catholic's online bookstore is operated by eCampus. In June 2015, eCampus representatives will be at CCHS, cash in hand, to buy back this year's books. Rented books may also be returned at that time. The bookstore will be open for the 2015-16 school year in early July to allow our parents more access to a greater supply of used books for required courses. To reach the CCHS customized bookstore, access the link by going to the Charleston Catholic website and clicking on the Links tab. Options offered for textbooks will be new, used, and rental. Please note that for next year, all English textbooks will be new, in keeping with our adoption cycle. eCampus offers an email tracking system and a proximate location, Kentucky, to ensure quick delivery of books. Many parents make informal arrangements with other families to purchase used textbooks. Before buying textbooks, from eCampus or other sources, be sure to check the booklist that will be posted on the eCampus website in early July.

E- DAYS: BE PREPARED FOR ANY ADDITIONAL SCHOOL CANCELLATIONS – While we plan in excess of 180 days for each school year, we have used our allotted extra days for this school year. That means that any school cancellations in the remainder of this school year, for any unforeseen reasons (i.e., water or power outages) will result in the activation of our e-day plan. While we hope not to use our "e-day plan," we want to alert our school community to the possibility now. The e-day plan will only be in effect for the remainder of the 2014-15 school year.

In the event that closing school for the day is necessary during the remainder of the school, the following plan will be activated:

- 1) By 9 a.m. on days that school is closed, teachers will post instructions for their classes in their moodle for the current week. Students can access this information through any internet connection, e.g., computer, iPhone, iPad, etc.
- 2) Assignments for each class will be about 30 minutes in length. Teachers will keep in mind what materials students would have available at home. Some assignments may be reading, watching videos, applying a concept, working problems, completing a worksheet, writing an essay, etc. Students without internet access may need to call a friend to get assignments. As is always the case, if students do not

have access to printers at home, they can send them to the CCHS printer on the school website.

- 3) In order for a student to count the e-day as a day of attendance in each class, assignments must be submitted within two days of school's reopening. Because there may be rare cases in which families do not have home internet access, either through a computer, iPhone, or other device, this two-day allowance is being made to allow all students the opportunity to complete assignments and count toward attendance. Students who do not submit assignments within two days of the school's reopening will be marked absent for each class for which an assignment was not completed.
- 4) <u>Completion of each class' assignments is required.</u> Namely, as is the case in a regular instructional day, each e-day assignment counts for a grade in teachers' gradebooks. Failure to complete an assignment will result in a zero for each assignment.

**HOMEWORK CLINIC**- The middle school homework clinic is offered by middle school health and PE teacher Josh Shindle in room 302. This structured, teacher-supervised time dedicated to distraction-free homework completion and study meets on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday afternoons from 3-4 p.m. The cost is \$10 per session.

<u>VIRTUS</u>— Be sure you're ready to help! All parents or other adults who volunteer, coach, drive students, chaperone, etc., are required by the Diocese to complete the diocesan sexual abuse awareness training before being allowed to work with our students. Complete the training online. On the CCHS website, go to the "Links" dropdown menu and choose VIRTUS registration. At the VIRTUS website, go to Options, scroll down and choose online. Allow 1- 1½ hours to complete the program. Print out the certificate of completion and submit it to Mr. Villers. It is still necessary to complete the background check and sexual abuse awareness statement which can be done by clicking on the link at the school website at <a href="https://www.charlestoncatholic-crw.org">www.charlestoncatholic-crw.org</a>.

HOPE 2015 – Preparations are well underway for our 11th summer of HOPE in Clay County, WV. Our group of 50 juniors, seniors, college age alumni, and adult work crew leaders will make significant repairs at the homes of 8-10 low income families and seniors in Clay County during the week of June 14-19, 2015. To date, we have raised \$29,000 of our \$35,000 goal needed to purchase building materials to make these homes warmer, safer, and drier. **GOING OUT OF TOWN?** – If parents are going to be out of town, please leave contact information with Mrs. Lovejoy in the office. In case of an emergency, we need to be able to let you know.

IMMUNIZATIONS -- The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources requires that all 7th and 12th grade students enrolled in WV public and private schools must have proof of immunizations or they will not be allowed to begin school in August. CCHS must have an updated copy of the immunization records, which include these vaccines, on file in the school office in order to allow your child to begin school in August 2015. Students entering 7th and 12th grades must have 1 dose of the Tdap vaccine and 1 dose of the meningitis vaccine. If the 12th grade student received a meningitis vaccine before his/her 16th birthday, he/she is required to have a second dose of the vaccine at this time.

## MRS. THOMAS' TIDBITS -

- 1) SAT and ACT testing and registration information and registration is available online at -- www.collegeboard.org and www.act.org (CCHS code: 490-205).
- 2) Class of **2015** (seniors) needed to complete their fine arts requirement by the end of the third quarter (March 20). Community service hours are due by May 8. Both are required in order to be considered for exam exemptions.
- 3) Mrs. Thomas handles college visit requests. Students should get the forms from her and return the completed forms to her at least 2 days before the trip. Seniors are allowed 2 college visit days; juniors are allowed 2 college visit days. College visits must be made before May 1.
- 4) To date, 214 college applications have been processed and sent to colleges. Students are receiving notification regarding their acceptance and scholarship offers!
- 5) The health department asks all schools to keep students' immunization records updated. If your child has had recent shots, please send CCHS a copy of new health records. All rising 7<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> graders are required to have updated Tdap and meningococcal vaccines before they enter

**school in August.** Once your child has these vaccines, an updated immunization record must be submitted to Mrs. Thomas.

- 6) Mrs. Vollmer is meeting with juniors individually to begin discussing their college plans. During these sessions, they review test results and student interests and discuss how to look for and choose colleges. Afterwards, students receive lists of colleges that fit their interests so they can begin their college search.
- 7) CCHS encourages students to take both the ACT <u>and</u> the SAT before the end of their junior year. Doing this allows students to get a baseline score and to prepare for future tests. Both tests are accepted by all colleges and universities for admission. We have found that students perform better on these tests if they are taken before the end of the school year. By the June testing dates, students tend to be tired and not as fresh. So, if possible, consider an earlier test date. Students may also take SAT II subject tests which are best taken at the end of the junior year or upon completion of courses being tested e.g., Biology, World History, U.S. History.
- 8) Students in 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th grades will take the TERRA NOVA during the week of April 20. Please make sure students are well- rested and eat a good breakfast on testing mornings.
- 9) Juniors should visit colleges during spring break pick up literature about schools, talk to admissions personnel, talk to students, look at dorms and classrooms, try the food, meet professors, ask "Does this atmosphere suit me?"
