INVICTUS, INVICTUS

A member gave me a copy of the poem **Invictus**, by John Henley, to include in our newsletter. I felt obliged to add a few lines to his submission. My response to the poem is arbitrary, foregoing the more traditional review of an author and his work.

> Out of the night that covers me, Black as the pit from pole to pole, I thank whatever gods may be For my unconquerable soul.

In the fell clutch of circumstance I have not winced nor cried aloud. Under the bludgeonings of chance My head is bloody, but unbowed.

Beyond this place of wrath and tears Looms but the Horror of the shade, And yet the menace of the years Finds and shall find me unafraid.

It matters not how strait the gate, How charged with punishments the scroll, I am the master of my fate: I am the captain of my soul.

The author confronts death with courage. Today, lines such as 'I am the captain of my soul' may overblown. sound The poem's surface uncomplicated - one does not have to delve into the form in order to gain an initial understanding of the poem. Its directness may also be the work's limitation, however. Invictus appears almost 'blackand-white' in its conviction. The poem lacks the subtlety of colours that abound in Yeats (admittedly one of my favourite poets!). Still, the greatest blackand-white photographs would be much diminished were they colourized by a well-intentioned dauber. Henley's poem is his final statement about mortality, a highly personal one. It may inspire or vex while it provokes us to think and feel.

The anti-government bomber, Timothy McVeigh, read **Invictus**, to a captive audience, moments before his execution. McVeigh is proof that, without heart and common sense, a rational analysis of private and public concerns can result in monstrous actions. A work of art does not always rise above the worst of man's obsessions, ideologies or delusions. At best, art reminds us of who we *are*, suggests who we may *become*, and permits us see *past* our cast-iron constructs of the world.


How one responds to any creative or intellectual work is highly personal. The dispute involving Martin Heidegger, the renown German philosopher, is a case-in point. Ostensibly, Heidegger was a Nazi sympathizer and some folk maintain this fascist viewpoint can be found throughout all his writings. Therefore said writ, it follows, should be tossed into history's dumpster. This argument reminded me of reading Tolstoy's War and Peace when I was a teenager. Some sections seemed inordinately long. but I was moved by the characters and impressed by the novel's scope. A year later, to my delight, I found one of Tolstoy's works on my parents' bookshelf. It was a slim volume about marriage. To my dismay, it turned out to be a dull and unsympathetic sermon on women. Would it have made a difference, I wonder, if I had read this howto on wedded bliss before War and Peace? By hindsight, I think very little...

I trust this wee ramble raises a few questions, evokes an idea or two or, as in my case, leads to further exploration of Henley's poetry.
