I'm sorry I didn't get to see you at District Conference, but those of you who attended know why I wasn't there. Of course, it had to do with the aforementioned "deer" and my car. Praise God, we weren't hurt!

I've been told by several persons that the conference went smoothly and that it was a good day. For those of you that didn't attend, the theme of "Go, Run Your Race" was highlighted throughout the day. Insight sessions included information about On Earth Peace and the Mission & Ministry Board (formerly General Board), a session on Congregational Ethics, and one with information about the Annual Conference to be held in Pittsburgh, PA, in 2010. Exhibitors included Brethren Press, On Earth Peace, Mutual Aid Association, Juniata College, the District Mission Program (Honduras and Puerto Rico), and many more.

Ruby F. Mader (Rummel) was installed as Moderator and the Rev. Dr. Wesley J. Berkebile (Center Hill) was named as Moderator Designate. Other persons affirmed on the slate included: Program & Arrangements Committee-Dottie Grew (Meyersdale) and Linda Stoner (Somerset); District/Camp Charitable Trust Board-Christopher Forry (Pike Run) and Gerald Baxter (Moxham); Brethren Home Trustees-Marie Camut (Walnut Grove) and Donna Ramer (Plumcreek); Camp Harmony Board-Erin Marker (Beachdale), Bill Miller (Maple Spring), Jack Harrison (Pleasant Hill), and Priscilla Haines (Geiger); Leadership Team Chair-Betsy Statler (Shade Creek/Ridge); Team members—CYOM-Erin Marker (Beachdale), O&S-Joel Wilcher (Pittsburgh) and Bill Frey (Indiana), SpF-Jane Wolfhope (Arbutus), St&F-Carole Walker; and Gifts Discernment Team-Frank Young (Tire Hill). The conference delegates also appointed Carole Horner as District Treasurer for another three-year term.

The Structure Review & Redesign Team presented revisions of the District Constitution for approval and implementation when the updated By-Laws are approved. Also presented and approved was a query entitled "Guidelines for Implementation of Congregational Ethics Paper" for passage to Annual Conference 2010.

A budget for 2010 of \$189,824.00 was passed. This total reflects a .0378% decrease. There were 218 attendees (187 delegates, 31 non-delegates), and 54 churches represented.

I truly missed seeing and greeting everyone at the conference. Thank you for your prayers and concern.

An Opportunity for You

A new deadline of Nov. 10 has been given to register for the annual Nigeria workcamp sponsored by the Church of the Brethren's Global Mission Partnerships. The workcamp is scheduled for Jan. 9-30, 2010. Workcampers will worship, learn, create relationships, and work with Christians from Ekklesiyar Yan'uwa a Nigeria (EYN--the Church of the Brethren in Nigeria) and Mission 21. The group will work in Kwarhi, tour Kulp Bible College, Hillcrest, and other schools, and visit a game reserve in Yankari. Cost is \$2,200 inclusive of a round-trip flight to Nigeria, meals, lodging, in-country transportation, and overseas travel insurance. Requirements include a passport (valid for at least six months after the workcamp) and appropriate vaccinations and medications. Participants must be 18 or older. Those 14-17 years of age may participate if accompanied by a parent or legal guardian who also is participating in the workcamp. Ah, the "holiday season." It is nearly upon us, and you all know that it's time to gear up for Thanksgiving and Christmas. For some, this is a wonderful time of faith, family and food – something to look forward to with great joy. For some, it is a painful time of dark memories or empty chairs. For some, it is a time of burden – shopping, cooking, traveling, decorating, and of course, financing. Some become simply numb to the wonders and miracles of God-blessing-us and God-in-skin. Turkey and football? Been there, done that. Carols and candles and Christ-child? Bo-ring. Tired.

So, what are you going to do about it?

If you fall into the first category, then you are blessed indeed. You get a twinge of excitement at the mere thought of singing festive praises to God around a glittery tree. The plan of salvation unfolding in a tiny Jewish baby sets your heart on fire. You go about your preparations with joy and love in your being. So pass it on. Cancel all the worthless gift ideas and use that money to host a few meals in your home. Invite some single parents and their kids, or maybe the youth in your church. Re-tell the timeless story of Bethlehem with vigor, and of course, do all the voices. Invite those who are going through the holidays without someone this year and be sensitive to their grief. Invite your co-workers and put on something Christmasy from the Annie Moses Band, or Big Daddy Weave, or whatever albums you want. Share the joy of the Lord and create lasting memories!

If you're facing the holidays with grief and sadness – take heart! God's Word tells us in Psalm 56 that each tear we shed is collected by our Father, and we can put our trust in Him. I've found that "in seasons of distress and grief, my soul has often found relief" – it is then that I walk with God, take comfort in His Word, listen for His voice and feel the love of His Church surrounding me – even more intensely than when everything's peachy. May I encourage you to not be alone in these times? Find a hospitable soul who will understand your heart, and meet together. Seek the Lord anew, and let Him begin your healing. For surely He has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows! Don't be ashamed to ask for help, and Church – don't hesitate to provide it! (Gal. 6:2-3)

Okay, my frazzled friend – we come to you. Stop mixing up your cookie dough, sit down, and pay attention. What is driving you? Are you flying into your annual frenzy out of love and genuine concern for others, or is it because you have a need to be viewed as the Holiday Wonder on your street? Maybe anything less than perfection is unacceptable. Maybe you just want your kids to have it better than you did. Regardless, calm down. Your house does not need to look like a magazine spread. Your kids would rather have you than your overtime. Your Jesus wants the focus to be on Him. Because even doing stuff at church – teaching Sunday School, perfecting that tricky cantata, stocking the food pantry, running the kids' musical, baking for shut-ins – even that is next-to-worthless if He doesn't have your heart. Take a moment, breathe, be silent, and give Christ your heart (+ your schedule) now.

Bored? Disillusioned? Fed up with the whole 9 yds? Dare to make this year different. One of the biggest misconceptions that we Christians have allowed to persist is the idea that God is stale. It's true that He is the same *being* yesterday, today and forever ... but He is always *doing* a new thing! So take a hint, and do a new thing. This year at Thanksgiving, pick a few folks and write them letters telling them why you're thankful for them. Go on a prayer walk through your community and lift up the people around you. Read Luke 2 with a British accent. Give a gift card to a random someone in the dollar store on Christmas Eve. Deliver a huge care package to that one house where all the Chinese restaurant employees live. Things get old fast when we're focused on ourselves. Talk with kids and teenagers. Little kids, man, it's ALL brand new to them.

Out of room ... be a blessing – take heart – slow down – innovate. *Celebrate!*

A reflection on arriving in Nigeria.

Jennifer and Nathan Hosler arrived in Nigeria in mid-August as Church of the Brethren mission staff serving with Ekklesiyar Yan'uwa a Nigeria (EYN--the Church of the Brethren in Nigeria). They are teaching at Kulp Bible College and working with EYN's Peace Program. The following reflects on their first month in Nigeria:

"September 29, 2009: On Monday, we learned that a funeral was to be held at EYN headquarters. A staff person at the dispensary was returning from a nearby village on motorcycle the night before and was fatally injured in an accident.

"Life is fragile everywhere, all of the time. However, the environment of Nigeria often places people into precarious circumstances. It seems as though the heightened awareness of life's fragility affects the speech of Christians in Nigeria. When speaking of plans, people do not assume that those plans will be met and verbally admit so. A common phrase added to plans is, 'By His grace.' For example, 'We will leave for Jos on Tuesday, by His grace.'

"This heightened awareness of life's fragility also produces an increased level of thankfulness to God for all types of circumstances such as rain for crops to grow or safety during travels. Even a cool breeze (welcome relief in a hot environment) elicits a 'Mugode Allah' or 'We thank God.'

"This perspective on life brings to mind the words of James: 'Now listen, you who say, "Today or tomorrow we will go to this or that city, spend a year there, carry on business and make money." Why, you do not even know what will happen tomorrow. What is your life? You are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes. Instead, you ought to say, "If it is the Lord's will, we will live and do this or that." As it is, you boast and brag. All such boasting is evil. Anyone, then, who knows the good he ought to do and doesn't do it, sins.'

"Privileged people in North America (which is most of us) typically assume that everything will work out. Only during extreme tragedy (a car accident, a terminal illness, the death of a child, etc.) do our thoughts ponder life's fragility. "The attitude of our Nigerian brothers and sisters provides a needed reflection for North Americans on the delicate balance of our lives and how easily that balance can be broken--in North America but especially so around the world. We should be challenged--as James wrote--not to assume anything about our lives, our health, our wealth, and act accordingly, and especially to exhibit thankfulness for both large and small things.

"When I feel the cool breeze tomorrow as I wake in Nigeria (by His grace), I will say, 'Mugode Allah.'"



WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THE EMANUEL CHILDREN'S HOME!


The Chicken Farm



The ninety-five hens in the chicken farm are producing approximately eight-eight eggs daily. We presently do not have roosters, because we didn't want to overload the children. We have arranged for another one hundred chicks to be sent to

the home in November, when the children begin their winter vacation. No egg-producing hens are butchered, we are treating them like queens!! They are vaccinated, given vitamins, and spoiled in every way we can! The egg production from Monday through Thursday is strictly for helping to feed our children. However, the eggs produced from Friday through Sunday goes for sale. We also make occasional egg donations to nursing homes and orphanages less fortunate that ours.

The Nursery Update

In San Pedro Sula (the city where Hogar Emanuel is located) approximately six pregnant women each month who show up at one of their hospitals. She is placed on a gurney (that possibly has no sheets) next to several others just like her and stays there only long



enough to give birth. She no doubt is very young (maybe only twelve or thirteen years old), very poor, has had no pre-natal care, and definitely never had intentions of becoming a

mother. She will deliver her child and then walk away abandoning her baby. The Nursery facility is ready to go! Now all we need are the caretakers and we'll be ready help — just a little! Although we have the space for ten cribs, we will start out by opening our arms to only three infants soon after the beginning of the new year.

We will be sharing more about the nursery and ways in which you can help in the coming months. In the meantime, please pray for Hogar Emanuel as we step out in faith to help even more children. We trust Him to lead the way for the Nursery Project and know that great things can be accomplished with God as our guide.
