

A Message to New Cubmasters


It's not uncommon for new Cubmasters to make a fatal mistake. You can't do everything yourself. If that's your approach, be prepared for long restless nights. Your role is simple.

A Cubmaster should work with the support of a unit committee and preside over the monthly Pack meeting at the Master of Ceremonies. He/She coaches and prepares the den leaders four to six weeks in advance to ensure that quality theme driven den meetings happen. The Cubmaster drives the program portion of the pack by working with the direct contact leaders. These leaders are defined as assistant cubmasters, den leaders and assistants. His/her role is not to preside over the Pack Committee meeting, function as treasurer or coordinate activities.

These are all functions of the Pack Committee and require the leadership of a Pack Committee Chairman. Our natural inclination is to "run the show" or "be in charge". Cub Scouting requires clear and defined roles in order to deliver an effective program.

Team Building

Success begins with leadership and a cohesive entity called The Team. Experience has proven that the most successful Packs. Troops, and Crews are those that are guided by qualified and respected members, plan collectively, perform to the best of their abilities, and equally share the responsibility for success as well as failure. Most importantly, the team needs to remain willing and teachable as it relates to it experiences. A good team carefully evaluates results and makes the necessary adjustments. Did it work well? Will it work again? Are we repeatedly doing the same thing with similar results? If the results are not favorable we may need to change something. This does sound like a radio sports talk show, however, the same princi-



ples do apply. Have you followed these steps with your team? Scouting on a unit or district level operates very much like a team. Sometimes we as a team have to accept reality that something is not working and change how we conduct business. It's difficult to walk through the fear, make a change and try something new. What are our alternatives? Do we risk the loss of boys and leaders by remaining stagnate or do we refresh our perspective by trying something different. The Cranberry Harbors District is undergoing its own evaluation and sighting what it needs to accomplish, how it will accomplish these task, and where it needs to change. We encourage units to use the same methodology. It is important that each member of the team views their role, takes the personal initiative to honestly evaluates and makes the effort to the best of their ability to make the change. When this occurs the team succeeds.

Training Building Confidence and Sharpening Skills

For the last year, through the dedicated efforts of Karen Single and a host of other volunteers the Seven Rivers District has set the tempo for quality training courses. This team has trained over 200 volunteers and have generated a heighten interests in advanced training such as Wood Badge. Their solid instruction has paved the way for leaders to pursue further training experiences. We do not have the luxury of their expertise to staff these courses. They repeatedly called out for help and were told, "I'm too busy" or "my son has moved on". These responds have truly affected the proud training tradition of Seven Rivers District.



The consequents are quite simple. Our limited staff obviously has affected the volume of training courses. We need more people to make training available for our new leaders. We all share some responsibility. The District is prepared to orient and train new presenters. member part of a unit committee's responsibility is to make leaders aware of training opportunities. The District's role is to provide resources and materials so this process may occur. Our council website has a link for Fast Start Training and each registered leader is mailed a Fast Start CD-Rom with the same information. 

2010 National Jamboree



"Be Prepared" is more than just a motto! With the next National Scout Jamboree less than two years away, now is the time to set your goal to attend and develop a plan to earn your way.

Right now you should visit the National Jamboree web site at http://www.bsajamboree.org/. You will need your individual registration number from your BSA membership card. Download a Jamboree application, fill it out and have your Scoutmaster sign it, and submit it to the Old Colony Council Office with a \$200.00 reservation fee. The total cost is anticipated to be \$1,600 per Scout participant and \$1,100 for unit leaders. A payment plan will be available. This cost includes the Jamboree fee, travel and tour costs, meals, lodging, unit and patrol equipment, accident and sickness insurance, and the cost of pre-jamboree training. Each participant will have to provide at least two full Jamboree uniforms and their own camping incidentals.

The 2010 National Scout Jamboree will take place at Fort A.P. Hill in Virginia. Our contingent will de-

part on July 24 and return on August 4, 2010. The Jamboree is being planned for over 50,000 participants, or more specifically, 43,000 Scouts and leaders in almost 800 troops, plus more than 5,000 staff members who will support the jamboree. As a key celebration of Scouting's 100 Anniversary in America, it will truly be a once in a lifetime experience!

All applying to attend the Jamboree must: 1) Sign a Code of Conduct; 2) Participate in a prejamboree experience (currently scheduled for Memorial Day Weekend, May 2010); 3) file a personal health and medical record prior to the pre-jamboree training; and 4) be approved by the local council.

In addition to the stipulations above, **Boy Scouts and Varsity Scouts** must have earned their First Class rank prior to the Jamboree. They must have completed the sixth grade or be at least 12 years of age by July 1, 2010, but not have reached their 18th birthday by August 4, 2010. Their Scoutmaster or Varsity Scout Coach, as well as the Old Colony Council Jamboree Committee must also approve Scouts who apply.

Contingent Adult Leaders are now being selected. The council will have 8 provisional Jamboree troops, each with a Scoutmaster and 4 Assistant Scoutmasters. There are many great leaders in our Council, but we only have places for 40 leaders. Leaders will be announced as they are selected.

To be selected as a **Scoutmaster or First Assistant Scoutmaster,** in addition to the stipulations above, you must have served as a Scoutmaster for at least one year during the three-year period prior to July 1, 2010 and have completed basic Scoutmaster training. Although not required, Wood Badge and/or Scoutmaster's Key are preferred qualifications. The Scoutmaster must be able to serve as a role model of physical fitness.

To be selected as a **Second** or **Third Assistant** Scoutmaster, in addition to the stipulations above, you must be 21 years of age by July 1, 2010, and have served actively in an adult troop leadership position for at least one year during the three-year period prior to July 1, 2010.

To be selected as a **Fourth Assistant Scoutmaster**, in addition to the stipulations above, you must be at least 18 years of age (but not have reached 21) by August 3, 2010 and have served actively in a Scout troop leadership position.

In addition, participants will enjoy the fellowship of learning alongside many other volunteers and professional Scouters, and along the way we will have a great deal of fun.





2008 Unit Membership Incentive Program
