Advancing the Mission

The beginning of November marks the chief feast day for Central Catholic - All Saints Day. We are reminded on this feast once again of the primary aim for everyone at Central Catholic and the Church in general - To Be Saints!

If we ever feel a serious threat, we will immediately go into Lock Down status, keeping students in classrooms until police determine a time for safe evacuation. Teachers have an overview of procedures to best keep everyone safe. One measure will be to have students turn off cell phones so as not to jam police communications. Students who are outside for Wellness classes or at other locations will not enter the building during a Lock Down. These students will go to McGraw Park Pavilion and then to St. Patrick Church of Merna. We will always follow the guidance and direction of the police and ask that parents wait for press releases from them. Hopefully, this will not happen, but I do want you to know that we continually assess our safety and review emergency procedures with staff as well as with our local police.

May the holiday season bring families together in love and peace and allow Christ to be present in all we do.

Homecoming Address - John Carter '91 CEO Jack Lewis Jewelry

I was a little nervous about coming back to my Alma Mater to give the homecoming address so, I did what anyone of you would do...I turned to Facebook for advice. I posted the following status on our Jack Lewis Jewelers page:

"CEO John Carter is speaking to his high school, Central Catholic, this week during the Homecoming assembly. What words of wisdom should Carter impart?"

I got some interesting answers:

Kelly wanted to know if I was "old enough and wise enough" to speak to you yet

Jerry: It's not a job if you do what you love, there's always time to listen, givers gain and the older you get the more you wish you had spent more time with the ones you love

Tasha: Maybe something about how it's great to have fun, but to remember that however they choose to act now is how others will perceive them. It's easier to look back at high school days and think of how you could have done something different. They have the choice now. Is who they are now in line with who they want to be?

Good luck John! You'll do great! Hope they listen...even if they're texting at the same time. :)

But probably the best advice I received this week came from a former schoolmate of yours, Kathleen Becker, who still works with us at Jack Lewis. When I told Kathleen that Mr. Fabrizio asked me to speak this morning she asked me...how long?

I said, "I don't know. He said about 5 or 10 minutes." Kathleen told me (and she is ALWAYS polite) "Probably should keep it to 5. Nobody cares what you have to say...they are all just excited about open lunch." SO 5 minutes it is (maybe 7)

So the topic today, as it ALWAYS is at homecoming from the speaker and graduate of this school from the not so distant past is: What has Central Catholic meant to me in my life?

Well for me, Central LITERALLY was the beginning of my career in an industry that I love. Jack Lewis Jewelers has had a long tradition of hiring students from Central Catholic . We ALWAYS have at least one or two of you poking around our store.

One day, the dean of students, Mary Jean Kraft came to me and said "Carter. Do you have a job?" I did, in fact, have a job as a bus boy. So I replied, "Yes I do. But I hate it." She said, "How would you like to work in a Jewelry store?" I said OK and was more or less hired because Mrs. Kraft vouched that I was a good kid.

You can imagine that TRUST is a big part of what I seek in a new employee. And we have always known (even back before I owned the store) that if a member of THIS faculty said one of their students was a good kid...then they were the right choice. I can tell you, and not just because I went here, that this school produces GOOD KIDS. And why do you think that is?

These teachers and faculty members are not here for the money. EV-ERY time I come back to this school, at least one of them comes out of the woodwork and greets me with a smile, a hug, and they want to know how my life is going. EVERY time.

It is my own personal homecoming each time I visit and I leave here feeling like a special part of the tradition of this school...even though I'm a VERY small part. I promise you one thing...this does not happen in a large public school. Fifty-two people in my graduating class and I can name all of them. How many other high school graduates in this town do you think can say that?

In college, my freshman year, I found myself in lecture halls of 300 students or more. Bigger than ALL of Central Catholic at the time I was there.

It can feel lonely and intimidating when you are used to the comfortable surroundings of a school where you know everyone and everyone knows you. Enjoy your time here because it is a unique experience that only happens once in your life.



The ironic part of me speaking to you here today is that I was told my senior year by a member of the faculty that I would return to make this address. This person pulled me aside after the homecoming assembly to ask me what I thought of the speaker.

Then he said he had no doubt that my life would take me in such a direction of success that I would return to share my story with the school that I love. Who was the faculty member? Chuck Shananberger.

And while he is not here for this talk, I know he had everything to do with me being here today because in those few words, he instilled in me the faith that I COULD succeed.

It is THIS kind of faith in their students that makes this place so special. OF COURSE, the TRADITION here is incredible. I am the third generation to attend Central Catholic in my family. And I was the LAST of six kids to do so. My 10 week old daughter, Lila will be the 4th to come here.

These halls are filled with old pictures and faded trophies but the accomplishments of our graduates tell tales that old relics never can. You stand in the shadows of great graduates. They left this school not just with an academic education but also a religious one as well.

And it is your faith that I want to challenge you on today. Your parents send you to Central Catholic for a reason. Think about it. I'm sure NONE of them need another bill to pay. Why not send you off every day for a "free" education? They sent you here to nourish your soul as much as your mind.

As Catholics, we are typically very hesitant to openly talk about our faith. But what you will find is that this leads to many Catholics being ignorant about the teachings of their own Church. Every year you take some sort of a faith-based class.

When I was here, Mr. Fabrizio taught one of my favorites: World Theology. He taught us not just the history of OUR Church but also the roots and teachings of Protestants, Hindus, Buddhists, Jews, and Muslims. In order to appreciate your own faith you must know where these others have come from. Right?
