This year's theme focuses around The Journey to Justice. You will not be disappointed. The moving blend of music, dance, and story centered around two great heroes of Justice: the Irish liberator Daniel O'Connell, and the former slave-turned-abolitionist hero Frederick Douglass. Prayer as a Gateway to Intimacy By Jim Whealan

Witnessing the Transfiguration of Jesus as described in today's Gospel of Mark was probably the most intimate personal experience Peter, James, and John would ever share with Him. For the first time, they caught a powerful glimpse into the Mystery of Jesus' humanity and divinity, and His oneness with God. They had access to the Mystery of God in their lives in perhaps the most direct way a follower of Jesus could

ever expect. Jesus shared this intimate knowledge of His nature with them so they might come to understand this Mystery was actually meant for them.

In this Lent season, our community has been invited to consider the ways each of us can access this Mystery of God in our own lives. God gave each of us the gift of prayer as a means of accessing His presence. The beauty and wonder of prayer for me is that it can be practiced at any time, in any place, and under any circumstances. Prayer can never be practiced too often without exception, I become more aware of my connection to God, others, and myself. Humans need air to sustain their physical life, but prayer to sustain their spiritual lives. One of the purest forms of prayer is to simply ask for God's will to be fulfilled in everything. Finally, prayer is practiced is both thought and in action.

I am blessed to be a member of such an inspiring group of faith practitioners in the Old St. Pat's community. Before arriving at Old St. Pat's, my faith was fragile and I yearned to find a place where I would be challenged and nurtured in my faith life, but I could find no purpose or meaning in any of my experiences. I had dealt with loss and hurt as all of us do in life. I committed to experimenting with my faith by participating in a host of prayerful opportunities, including the Beloved Retreat, Ministry of Prayer,

Eucharistic Ministry, and Spiritual Direction. Through the sharing and generosity of spirit freely given to me by this faith community, I came to know on a more intimate level a God of love and mercy. I began to access a mystery that had eluded me for most of my life.

My prayer and faith journey has not been traversed along a straight path. I've been tempted to sit idly with some newly found peace or grace experience as if I had reached a final destination. I've surrendered at times to the temptation to settle for what I believe is good enough for God as I define it. Invariably, God invites me back into this Mystery by stirring changes that I would prefer to resist. A friend who has recently experienced great loss in his life suggested to me God does not cause our losses, but He does expect us to endure our losses so we can become the person He knows we are capable of becoming. It is only through persistent prayer - and lots of patience - that I have been able to accept the changes that have occurred in my life. Prayer has become the gateway to discovering and accepting the Mystery of God in my life. When I choose to move toward this Mystery and not away from it, I learn the Mystery of God can be boundless and freeing.

IN THIS LENT SEASON, OUR COMMUNITY HAS BEEN INVITED TO CONSIDER THE WAYS IN WHICH EACH OF US CAN ACCESS THIS MYSTERY OF GOD IN OUR OWN LIVES.

My hope in praying this Lent is to build a greater capacity for intimacy – with God, with others, and with myself. It will perhaps give me the kind of glimpse that Peter, James, and John received on the mountain with Jesus. To each of you, and especially to those among you who have helped me discover the Mystery of God in my life (you know who you are!), may Lent lead you to know yourselves and God more intimately as we journey together towards Easter.

CROSSwalk will take place on Monday, April 2 at 5:30 p.m.

Old St. Patrick's Church is joining forces with churches and community organizations from the Chicago area.

What is CROSSwalk?

CROSSwalk is a four-mile Holy Week procession across the heart of the city to remember murdered youth and connect participants with opportunities to protect children, mitigate violence and support families struggling with these issues. CROSSwalk is not a protest march. It is a vigil, one tied directly to follow-up action.

It will travel through the Loop to a stop at Daley Plaza (Washington and Dearborn), proceed to Old St. Patrick's Church (Adams and Des Plaines) and end at the lawn outside Stroger Hospital. Participants are welcome to walk the entire route, walk part of it, or simply join us for short programs at any of the stops along the way. Buses will also be available to help transport people from place to place.

At each stop, we will lament the loss of our young people and — importantly — commit ourselves to efforts that protect children and mitigate violence in our communities.

Practice Almsgiving by...


- participating in the Outreach Group's many volunteer service and sharing opportunities,

THE LENTEN FAST

Catholics 14 years and older abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and on all the Fridays of Lent.

Catholics who are 18 but not yet 60 years of age, in addition to abstaining from meat, fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Those who are fasting may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals may be taken to maintain strength according to one's needs, but we refrain from eating solid foods between meals.

Michael was offered the role of lead singer in the U.S. National Tour that included performances at Radio City Music Hall and the MGM Grand in Las Vegas. In March 2000, he again was offered the position of lead singer in the new production of Riverdance on Broadway.

Michael's first album Celt was produced by acclaimed producer Steve Skinner. Steve has worked as an arranger/co-producer for Bette Midler and Celine Dion and has collaborated many times with Arif Mardin; producer of Norah Jones' acclaimed CD. The album was released in 15 countries.

I have been thinking a great deal about our North Lawndale Kinship Initiative. If I had to assign percentages to my thoughts I would have to go with 75 percent intrigue,

fascination, hope, passion, eagerness . . . and 25 percent lets get going already! Wasn't it last Pentecost that we boldly proclaimed our desire to enter into this relationship and foster this Kinship? Shouldn't we have accomplished more by now? Built Something? Fixed something? Done something for God Sake? In response to my 25 percent, two things come to mind and heart:

- 1) Gracefully, thanks to Gregory Boyle S.J., we linked the word Kinship to this dream early on and as Fr. Boyle reminds us over and over again in his poignant and provocative book Tattoos on the Heart — Kinship has more to do with relationship and companionship and intimacy than it does with accomplishing, building, fixing and doing!
- Bishop Ken Untener composed a beautiful 2) reflection on the relationship between kingdom and our effort. The reflection, (often and understandably attributed to Archbishop Oscar Romero) without fail gives me reason to pause when I find myself becoming impatient with respect to God and God's work and my relationship to the same. Certainly, with respect to our North Lawndale Kinship Initiative:

No statement says all that could be said; No prayer fully expresses our faith. No program accomplishes the church's mission. No set of goals and ojectives includes everything.

While on the one hand we are acutely aware that we have "miles to go before we sleep" with respect to the North Lawnade Kinship dream, we want to celebrate our humble beginnings and to INVITE you to consider an INVESTMENT in our North Lawndale Kinship Initiative as a component of your Lenten Practice, Prayer, and Adventure. <mark>Jesus Freaks Retreat 2011</mark> By Celeste Wellin

The theme of this year's Foundations Freshmen/Sophomore Retreat was Jesus Freaks. This theme to me means accepting your faith and living your life based on your belief in your religion and in Jesus. The retreat started off with an energetic skit created by the teen leaders, based on the movie, *The*

Breakfast Club. The moral behind the skit was that although people come from different places and have a variety of

interests, we can all bond together over our love for Jesus. Being a Christian leader is essential to living your life according to the Catholic Church; by doing this you inspire others to step forward and stand up for their faith.

The sixteen retreat leaders spent months preparing the skit and planning activities to get to know all the new freshmen and sophomores who participated. At the beginning of the retreat, many of the new members of Foundations were more reserved, but by the end of the weekend, it was astonishing how they all opened up and embraced the spirit of the retreat.

On each Foundations retreat, talks are given pertaining to the retreat's theme and are made by both the adult and teen leaders. This year, some particularly inspiring talks were given. It takes courage to stand in front of a room full of 50 people and tell your story.

One adult leader, Becky, spoke of her struggle of finding a college that was right for her. She shared her long and not always easy path to finding the perfect college and how she flourished once she did. Countless times in high school, we find ourselves feeling like we cannot change our minds; or stumble and feel the need to be perfect, to be in control, but this adult leader's college journey showed all the phases were OK, and they led to succeess.

Two teen leaders, Tommy and John, conjoined to make one balanced and informative speech. Tommy spoke of his determination and perseverance to get a spot on an advanced sports team. This lesson revealed to the teens that anything you put your mind to can be possible if you try your best and do not give up. John talked about how your first impression of someone may not be accurate. Coincidentally, a girl he knew from school ended up participating in the same Worktour as John. He had always known her as a shy girl, and they had not spoken much. By the end of the Worktour, John and Lucy were extremely close and his first impression of her changed completely. As teenagers go through high school, many judge others by their appearances or have others judge them based on appearances. This particular talk taught us to never judge someone before getting to know him or her.







The next adult leader, Bridget, told about her journey to finding the job she now loves and cherishes. She tried several other professions before discovering that teaching was the only way to make her happy. She now dedicates so much of her time to the kids in her high school. She was radiating compassion throughout her entire speech. That kind of passion being shown to us was pure inspiration.

The last brave teen to give a talk, McKenna, expressed her fear of showing off her amazing talents at a school full of people who share her passion for music and singing. Her story proves that if you have something special, you should be proud to show your talents and uniqueness to the world.

The speeches given during the retreat opened up the lines of communication for everyone participating in the retreat. The freshmen felt it was a safe environment to open up and be who they truly are after hearing stories of leaders and fellow teens struggling to find themselves and their purpose in life through being a leader. The retreat enhanced all of our ideas of what it means to be a Jesus Freak, and everyone had a blast in the process.





Horizons for Youth: Mentors Needed

The cornerstone of the Horizons for Youth Scholarship Mentoring Community



Sibling mentoring program. Every student is provided with an adult mentor to form a bond through shared experiences and develop a relationship through organized outings and individual interactions. The goal is to establish a long-term bond that will provide steady support, trust, friendship, and counsel for the child.

As a Big Sibling, you are asked to commit to a minimum of two years. Anything less than one year is more harmful than helpful to a young child and we would like to offer our students consistency in their lives. Mentors are expected to attend monthly outings every second Saturday of the month coordinated by Horizons for Youth. To ensure quality time is being spent together, Big Sibling also work with the parents to plan another individual meeting with the Little Sibling that month. The Big Sibling has the freedom to be creative with this individual interaction based on the interests of the Little Sibling.

If the commitment holds you back from volunteering your time, perhaps the role of a Tutor would be the perfect answer. Tutors meet with one student for an hour a week for the duration of the school year. Horizons for Youth



is still looking to get 100 percent of its students matched with a Tutor this school year. Tutors and students will be matched based on the tutor's comfort level and the student's needs. As a tutor, you still have an opportunity to develop a relationship because of the frequency of your time spent with the students.

Horizons for Youth is adding up to 20 new students in the month of April, and would like to guarantee all of the kids their Big Siblings and Tutors when the sessions begin. Both males and females are needed. If you are looking for a quality volunteer experience, your efforts and commitment to the program will not go unappreciated. While the hope is for Big Siblings to enrich the lives of the students, volunteers are pleasantly surprised with just how powerful the gratitude of a child can be. Women and Men of Faith

Marie Joseph Lagrange Dominican founder of the Ecole Biblique(1855-1938)

Marie Joseph Lagrange (widely known as "Pere Lagrange") was a

French Dominican priest and one of the most outstanding Scripture scholars in the Catholic church. In 1890 the Dominicans sent him to Jerusalem to found the Ecole Biblique, the first modern Catholic school of biblical and archeological research.

Lagrange was encouraged in his work by the publication in 1893 of Pope Leo XIII's encyclical Providentissimus Deus, the first modest encouragement to modern biblical scholarship. But the question remained-could genuine scholarship be used in the study of predetermined dogmatic conclusions. Lagrange prepared a study disputing that Moses was the sole author of the Pentateuch. The publication of this study set off a torrent of criticism.

In 1912, Lagrange was forced to leave the Ecole Biblique. He continued to endure the charges from conservative prelates that he was a traitor. But he carried on with his scholarly work, producing commentaries on the Gospels of Luke, Matthew, and John. His entire bibliography contains 1,786 items.

The guiet and faithful work of Lagrange maintained the honor of Catholic scholarship and helped to facilitate the reconciliation between Catholic faith and modern biblical criticism. Lagrange did not live to see his work vindicated by both the 1943 Pope Pius XII encyclical Divino Afflante Spiritus and later by the Second Vatican council. Pere Lagrange continues to be an heroic example of the Catholic scholar, equally committed to tradition, the community of faith, and the pursuit of truth. He died on March 10, 1938.
