ABSTRACT

The first statewide followup study of occupational/career education students in Illinois community colleges was developed through the efforts of the Illinois Community College Board (ICCB) Research Advisory Council and the special Occupational Followup Subcommittee. The Phase 1 data for the followup study consisted of reporting student characteristics. Participation in the followup study consisted of all 38 community college districts in Illinois and 46 community colleges involving 27,663 students. The preliminary data for Phase 1 of the study were reported by each of the Illinois public community colleges and based on the number of new fall 1974 students in the occupational/career program. The reports classified these students by their curriculum, type of attendance (45.3 percent full-time, 54.7 percent part-time), sex (49.7 percent male, 50.3 recent female), and original intent for enrolling at the college (56.2 percent preparation for employment in career areas, 21.2 percent skill improvement). The preliminary report shows that although there are slight differences between the original intent of male and female students, significant differences occur between full-time and part-time students. It is concluded that followup data will be needed and can be accomplished through proposed phases 2 (withdrawal analysis) and 3 (followup and employer surveys). Appended materials include sample report forms and a standardized survey instrument. (BP)

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PREFACE

The Illinois Community College Act specifies that the Illinois Community College Board shall conduct "... thorough, comprehensive and continuous study of the status of community college education, its problems, needs for improvement, and projected developments ...". The Act further stipulates that the Board shall have the power, and it shall be its duty "to cooperate with the community colleges in continuing studies of student characteristics, admission standards, grading policies, performance of transfer students, qualifications and certification of facilities and any other problem of community college education ...". The Illinois Community College Board has conducted a number of studies in response to the Illinois Community College Act. In 1970 a cooperative projected with the American College Testing Program was conducted to analyze the characteristics of persons who enrolled in public community colleges of Illinois. Each year since 1970, studies of community college student characteristics have been completed for those community college students taking the ACT Test. A study on student development, "Student Development Programs in the Illinois Community Colleges," conducted during 1971-72, analyzed what happens to students while they attend the community colleges by describing the programs designed to serve students and promote their development. The first statewide follow-up study of community college transfer students was conducted in 1967 through 1969. A report of this study entitled "Performance of Transfer Students Within Illinois Institutions of Higher Education" was published in November 1971. In 1973 a second statewide followup study of transfer students was initiated. This study was deemed essential because of the rapid growth in the number of community college districts and community college enrollment between 1967 and 1973. Phase I of the follow-up study of Fall 1973 transfer students from Illinois public community colleges was completed in November 1974. In this particular study only students transferring during the fall term 1973 from Illinois public community colleges to Illinois senior institutions were included. At periodic intervals in the future, the senior institutions will be providing achievement data and educational status on the Fall 1973 transfers. This particular group will be followed for approximately three to five years.

The present study is the first statewide follow-up study of occupational/career education students in Illinois community colleges. The need for an occupational follow-up study is very great at both the state and local levels. In response to this need, the Illinois Community College Board Research Advisory Council identified the Occupational Follow-Up Study as their top priority project. This Statewide Occupational Student Follow-Up Study was developed through the efforts of the ICCB Research Advisory Council and the special Occupational Follow-Up Subcommittee. Doth of these groups spent a considerable amount of time and effort in getting this study implemented. Considerable support was also given to this study by the Council of Presidents, who unanimously endorsed the study, and by the community college personnel, who realized the great need for this statewide effort despite the great deal of work that it meant at the local level.



The preliminary data for Phase I of the Statewide Occupational Student Follow-Up Study was reported by each of the Illinois public community colleges and was based on the number of new Fall 1974 scudents (with zero credit hours of previous college work) in the occupational/career programs. The reports in Phase I classified these students by their curriculum, full-time or part-time, sex, and original intent for enrolling at the college. These students make up the sample used in the follow-up study which will continue for the next three years. The students will be tracked term by term and changes in their status will be recorded. If the student terminates for any reason, the withdrawal survey will be sent to him to find out his reasons for termination. Similarly, after a student completes his work at the community college he is surveyed with a follow-up instrument which seeks to obtain feedback about his college experience and information about how the community college helped him achieve the objective that he had for going to college. This follow-up study does not assume the same objective for all occupational/career education students, but instead attempts to analyze the outcomes in terms of the students' original goals.

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INTRODUCTION


Participation in the Statewide Occupational Student Follow-Up Study consisted of all 38 public community college districts in Illinois (John Wood College was just founded in 1974 and had no students enrolled during 1974-75) and in all 46 community college campuses that had occupational/career students enrolled. Urban Skills Institute campus of Chicago City Colleges only had General Studies students; therefore, could not participate in the study. The students which were identified to be included in the study were all new students enrolled in occupational/career programs during the fall 1974 term.

The total number of students in the follow-up study at the community colleges was a substantial 27,663 students. The number of students at any campus varied from a high of 3,770 at Triton College to a low of 88 at State Community College. The average number of students at each campus was approximately 600.

The figures on the next pages show the distribution of students by type of attendance, sex, and student intent. Figure 1 shows that of the students participating in the study, 45.3 % were full-time, 54.7% were part-time, 49.7% were male, and 50.3% were female.

One of the most unique features of this follow-up study was the identification of the original intent of the student for enrolling in an occupational/career program at a community college. By identifying the objectives of the student, the follow-up surveys will attempt to determine whether or not the student was able to meet his or her objective.





COMPARISON OF STUDENTS IN THE OCCUPATIONAL FOLLOW-UP STUDY BY SEX AND TYPE OF ATTENDANCE

The intent of the student is also very important for analysis of withdrawal rates, completion rates, and employment rates. Traditional follow-up studies have attempted to equate degree completion with success. However, a student who did not originally intend to complete a program should not be expected to do so. Hence, this intent item becomes essential for community college students because the assumption that all students are seeking degrees and certificates is probably a false one for the majority of community college students.

Figure 2 shows the distribution by student intent. The intent
"Preparation for Employment in Occupational/Career Area" (56.2% of those reporting) was the most often sited by the occupational students for entering the college. "Improvement of Skills and Competencies in Present





Job or Business" (21.2%) was the second most often selected intent. The other intents for enrolling at college were selected by the students in the following order: "Preparation for Advanced or Specialized Training" (11%), "Exploration of Career Opportunities in Vocational/Technical Areas" (7.3%), and "Development and/or Review of Basic Vocational Skills" (4.3%).



INITIAL ENROLLMENT OF OCCUPATIONAL/CAREER STUDENTS IN THE STATEWIDE FOLLOW-UP STUDY

Table 1 below shows a summary of the initial enrollment of students in occupational/career programs distributed by sex and type of attendance. According to the table, 49.7% of those involved are male students and 50.3% are female students. There are over 2,600 more part-time students than full-time students in the sample.

Table 2 on opposite page shows the initial enrollment distributed by sex and type of attendance for each of the public community colleges of Illinois. This table enables each community college to compare its data not only to the statewide averages but also to other colleges of similar size and characteristics. This type of comparison can be very useful if the institutional differences are carefully analyzed and not overlooked. If used wisely, the availability and utilization of statewide comparative data about community college occupational/career students can be one of the significant contributions of this statewide study.

ORIGINAL INTENT OF STUDENTS FOR ENROLLMENT AT COLLEGE

Table 4 on opposite page shows the distribution by student intent for the occupational/career education students in the follow-up study at each of the community colleges. When analyzing the results at the various colleges one must consider the proportion of full-time to part-time students because the intents of these two types of students are considerably different.

These differences are analyzed in detail in tables 9 through 12 on pages 12 through 15.

ORIGINAL INTENT OF MALE STUDENTS IN OCCUPATIONAL FOLLOW-UP STUDY

Table 5 below presents a summary of original intent of male students in the follow-up study by intent category. Of the 7,678 students responding, 49.6% selected "Preparation for Employment in Occupational/Career Area" as their particular reason for entering an occupational/career program.

"Improvement of Skills and Competencies in Present Job or Business" was the second choice with 26.1% of the students selecting that intent.

Table 6 on the following page shows the distribution of male students by intent category for each of the public community colleges in Illinois. This table enables the community colleges to compare their institution with others of the same size and general characteristics.

ORIGINAL INTENT OF FEMALE STUDENTS IN OCCUPATIONAL FOLLOW-UP STUDY

Table 7 below indicates the summary of original intent of female students in the follow-up study. The total female enrollment in occupational/career programs totaled 13,897. The female students, like the male students, selected "Preparation for Employment in Occupational/Career Area" and "Improvement of Skills and Competencies in Present Job or Business" as their number one and number two choices with 62.4% and 16.6% of the students respectively. Of those participating in the study, 41.7% did not respond to the intent item or else their intent was unknown.

Table 8 on the opposite page shows a statewide distribution of female students by original intent categories.

ORIGINAL INTENT OF FULL-TIME STUDENTS IN OCCUPATIONAL FOLLOW-UP STUDY

Table 9 below shows the summary of original intent of full-time students in the occupational follow-up study. The total number of full-time students in the study was 12,512. The majority of the students, 5,939, indicated "Preparation for Employment in Occupational/Career Area" as their reason for entering college. We note that this item was selected by a much larger proportion of the full-time students (71.5%) than it was by part-time students (39.2%) as we would expect. "Preparation for Advanced or Specialized Training" was their second priority (11.5%). The selection of this item as their second choice would seem to indicate that a good proportion of full-time students in occupational program areas are planning to continue their education after completing their studies at the community college.

Table 10 on the following page shows the breakdown of full-time students in the follow-up study by original intent for each of the public community colleges in Illinois.

Table 11 below shows the summary of original intent of part-time students in the follow-up study. Of the total students reported, 15,151 were part-time. "Preparation for Employment in Occupational/Career Area" was selected as the number one reason (39.2% of the total responding) for entering the college. "Improvement of Skills and Competencies in Present Job or Business" with 35.1% of the total responding was second.

Table 12 on opposite page presents the distribution of part-time students in the occupational follow-up study by original intent for all public community colleges in Illinois.

SUMMARY

The results of Phase I of the Statewide Occupational Student Follow-Up Study revealed that this study is and will continue to be a very valuable source of statewide comparative data about occupational/career students in the public community colleges of Illinois. With all community colleges participating in this statewide effort, this provides an adequate number of students (27,663) enrolled in a very broad variety of career oriented programs to make the results significant not only for Illinois but nationwide.

This Phase I data for the follow-up study consisted of reporting the characteristics of the students in the study. One of the unique design features of this follow-up study was to obtain the original intent of the students for enrolling in an occupational/career program in the community college and to use this intent in analyzing how successful the student was in achieving his or her objective. The hypothesis proposed suggests that many community college students can successfully achieve their educational objectives in the community college without completing the degree or certificate program.

Table 13 shows a summary of the original intent of occupational follow-up study students by sex and type of attendance. Although there are some slight differences in the original intent between male and female students, the significant differences occur between the full-time and part-time students. For example, 71.5% of the full-time students original intent was "Preparation for Employment in Occupational Career Area" while this was the original intent of only 39.2% of the part-time students.

On the other hand, only 8.7% of the full-time students original intent was "Improvement of Skills and Competencies in Present Job or Business" while 35.1% of the part-time students indicated this as their objective for enrolling at the community college. This particular intent can certainly be achieved without the completion of a degree or certificate program in most cases. With the substantial numbers of students enrolled in the community colleges for other than traditional reasons the use of the intent item for analysis of the withdrawal survey and the follow-up survey promises to be very fruitful.

CONCLUSIONS

The Illinois public community colleges' Occupational Student Follow-Up Study is by far the most comprehensive statewide research effort ever undertaken by the community colleges in the state. The design of the study by the ICCB Research Advisory Council and their Occupational Follow-Up Study Sub-Committee is uniquely tailored for the occupational/career students in the community colleges. As such, the study includes the adult students, the part-time students, the night students and the off-campus students, not because these students are easy to survey or to follow-up, but because these students are the "typical" community college students and cannot be excluded. So far, the Occupational Student Follow-Up Study has received tremendous grass roots support from the occupational/career educators in the public community colleges. These educators realize that conducting a follow-up study of occupational students at their colleges is a tremendous task which requires much time and effort, but they also see the great need and potential benefits of follow-up data about occupational students which are based on the objectives of the community college students rather than on unrealistic assumptions.

The Occupational Student Follow-Up Study promises to be a most valuable source of new data for comparative norms and statewide analysis of former community college students enrolled in occupational/career program areas. Follow-up data of occupational students are desperately needed for accountability of the occupational/career programs in the community colleges of Illinois. The Statewide Occupational Follow-Up Study has the potential of providing a basic understanding of the community college students



enrolled in occupational programs in addition to providing the accountability needed for these programs. This preliminary report shows that the community colleges of Illinois are making a great effort in this statewide follow-up study. With all thirty-eight community colleges participating and 27,663 occupational/career students included in this study, we look forward with anticipation to see the results of the withdrawal analysis, follow-up survey and employer evaluation which will be forthcoming.

The future phases of the follow-up study include the following:

Phase II - Withdrawal Analysis

A statewide withdrawal analysis will be conducted based on withdrawals as of the Fall 1975 term "end of registration" enrollments. Hence, this report will be based upon an entire year for statewide analysis. Individual institutions must collect the withdrawal data term by term, however, to be able to track the students in the study sample. Statewide reports will be requested only once per year. (Additional detailed instructions will be included in the revised Occupational Follow-Up Study Manual and report forms will be provided in late summer.) Data from the withdrawal analysis will be due in the ICCB Office by November 20, 1975. The results of this analysis will be included in the next Occupational Follow-Up Study report which will be prepared in March 1976.

Phase III - Follow-Up and Employer Surveys

The first follow-up survey of former students will be conducted during November, 1975. (Follow-up of students who completed certificate programs or who have been withdrawn during the Spring 1975 and Fall 1975 terms.)

Employer surveys will be sent to employers of students who obtained a new job after attending the college (did not mark response #1 in Item H of the Follow-Up Survey) and who completed at least six semester hours (nine quarter hours) of course work at the college.



These analyses will be conducted yearly until 1977. The next progress report will be prepared during March 1976 and will contain results of the first years' follow-up survey and the employer questionnaire.


