## Fr. Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time. We come to the final days before Ash Wednesday and the start of the Lenten season. The color green gives way to violet and purple; decorations will be less; while the Gloria and alleluias will disappear from our prayers and singing. This Sunday's reading are a good prelude into Lent for they stress our need to follow God's will over our own and putting faith in God as our rock and Jesus as our source of hope. In the first reading from Deuteronomy, Moses urges the people to build their future on the law instead of their own designs. "Be careful to observe all the statues and decrees that I set before you today." Then in Romans, Paul shifts the emphasis from the law to the person of Jesus Christ. "Now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, though testified to by the law and the prophets, the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe."

In the gospel from Matthew, Jesus teaches that the will of God is the only sure foundation for our lives. "Everyone who listens to these words of mine and acts on them will be like the man who built his house on rock." We often speak of the integrity of one's "name" and how we strive to keep our "good name" when challenged and criticized. Our "good name" is important to us. Just look at some news cycles and you see how quickly people can move from celebrity to notoriety. That is probably why "blasphemy," using God's name in vain, is so devastating. You can see in today's reading and in many other biblical places how God acts to keep integrity with the Divine Name. This perfect integrity is transferred to Jesus who remains faithful despite our infidelity. He cannot deny himself.

Now contrast this with how you and I act. We say, "Lord, Lord" but don't behave like his followers. Oh yes, we call upon God in prayer, and call ourselves Christians, yet often there is a sizable gap between the name we bear and the testimony of our lives. We don't see this gap as blasphemy, but it's not far off, according to Jesus. To use the name Christian as a category instead of as a job description is to use it in vain like a noisy gong or clashing cymbal. If our lives aren't as Christian as the religious preference we check off on forms; then we mustn't be surprised when God could quite possibly declare in the final analysis of our lives, "I hardly know you." Yikes! We who hear and know are held to a stricter account; an indictment churchgoers rarely accept. To often we believe that mere attendance has got to be worth something, punching a clock on those rituals should earn us more than the no-shows. *And it is very tempting to believe this.* But it isn't what scripture says. Moses advised the people to bind themselves to God's will, take it heart and soul into their observance. And Jesus predicts complete ruin to those who listen to divine words without acting on them. *Believing in what you do and doing what you believe is the only way to place oneself squarely on the "rock."* I don't know about you, but Lent couldn't be coming soon enough.

This week begins the holy season of Lent on *Ash Wednesday, March 9th.* Please refer to the bulletin ad for the times that ashes will be distributed. Wednesday will also be the start of the 12:15 PM daily Mass and the Friday evening Stations of the Cross at 7:30 PM.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. There are many items of interest and information with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from "Parish Social Ministry," info from "Religious Education" and the "Principal's Corner" of St. Raymond School, the next Human Life Committee Meeting on Thursday, March 10th, ticket info for the "St. Patrick's Celebration" on the 19th, "Pot of Gold 50/50" chances, a notice on "Votive Candles," the latest 2011 Catholic Ministry Appeal update and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

Have a great week. Let's all prayerfully enter this Lenten season so that the graces of God will truly impact our faith and most of all our love in action. And remember: Of all the things you wear, your expression is the most important. God bless always.

## ASH WEDNESDAY MARCH 9, 2011

This Wednesday, March 9th is Ash Wednesday and the beginning of the 2011 Lenten Season. The distribution of "ashes" will be at the following times:

7:15 AM- Mass 8:45 AM- Mass 12:15 PM- Mass 3:30 PM- Prayer Service 7:30 PM- Mass

(Note that beginning on Ash Wednesday there will be an additional Mass celebrated at 12:15pm on Mondays through Fridays during Lent and *Stations of the Cross* will also be prayed each Friday evening during Lent at 7:30 PM in the church)

#### FAST AND ABSTINENCE

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen and fifty-nine inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day.

#### **Parish Social Ministry**



Have you ever questioned the amount you are expected to continue to give when the pleas for your donations, along with your expenses, have increased, yet, your income remains the same or, perhaps, even decreased? How do we measure our responsibility to help all of those requesting our aid against our ability to satisfy our own needs? It certainly is a matter of conscience and never easy to say yes or no, when we are presented with supplications for our

support. The solution may lay in the answer to another question, one we may have also asked ourselves from time to time. What is life all about?

St. Ignatius addresses this guestion with a clear statement that emphasizes the basic purpose of every human life: Human beings are created to praise, reverence, and serve God our Lord, and by means of doing this to save their souls' the other things of the earth are created for the human beings, to help them in the pursuit of the end for which they are created. Our guidelines, then, should be to use these things to the extent that they help us toward our end, and free ourselves from them to the extent that they hinder us from it. This calls for a detachment from created things---indifference, Ignatius calls it. We ought to desire and choose only that which is more conducive to the end for which we are created. The challenge is to recognize that created things attain their true value only to the extent that they lead to the fulfillment of God's plan. For this reason, we must accept or make use of them when they are useful for accomplishing God's will, but forego or flee them when they are not. As we follow this norm, we will contribute to a world in which everyone and everything work together for the praise of God's glory. (For the Greater Glory of God, Spiritual Exercises, 23 pp 19, 22)

If we can view our possessions with detachment and develop the practice of prayerful deliberation and reflection of what God wishes us to achieve with the gifts He has given us, then we can be more confident that our decision regarding the extent of our assistance will be attuned to God's will.



Dear Friends in Christ:

#### LENT 2011

Have mercy on me God in your goodness; In the greatness of your compassion wipe out my offense. Thoroughly wash me from my guilt And of my sin cleanse me! (Ps 50)

This perennial Lenten plea comes from the hearts of all of us who embrace this season of Lent for our spiritual good and the good of the whole Church. It is a plea that God in His merciful love will make us whole through our Lenten observances. It is a prayer of hope for we know that He is the One who "sent His Son" so that we might have life and life to the full. We who make this Lenten journey together not only seek our own forgiveness, not only desire to be reconciled with one another, but, even more, we want to be one with Him who died and rose for us. He wants us to be cleansed by the water flowing from His wounded side. He wants us to be redeemed by the blood He shed for us. He wants us to join Mary and the other women at the Easter tomb, an Easter tomb that is empty, an Easter tomb that bears silent witness to the greatest news we can ever hear, the greatest message we can ever receive, the greatest gift that is ours: "He is risen. He is not here. Jesus Christ is risen from the dead. Alleluia, Alleluia!"

The way to enter into these saving mysteries is the way of Lent, the journey to Good Friday and Easter Sunday. The more deeply we embrace this holy season of repentance and renewal, the more will we share in the redemptive acts of the Lord and become one with Him and the whole Church this coming Easter. Let us all make a commitment to ourselves and to one another, and especially to the Lord, to make this Lent the "acceptable time for now is the day of salvation".

We have many reasons to do this. Some are personal. We know them in the quiet of the day when we turn our hearts to God and see what He asks of us. Some of them we share as a Church that is always on a pilgrimage of faith, a journey of repentance and renewal to become ever more the Bride of Christ whom He loves and whom He wishes to cleanse from any and every sin.

This year we are in a process of getting ready to embrace the new Roman Missal. We will begin to use it the first Sunday of Advent. In the meantime we must prepare our hearts and minds to welcome this Missal and to let it work its grace in our hearts drawing us all to belong more deeply to Christ and to one another in His Church.

Part of that preparation should include prayers for forgiveness and reconciliation. To that end, I have composed a prayer for use in all our parishes and oratories and places of prayer and worship. I ask you to use it frequently during Lent. You may pray it privately or in groups. You may include it in prayer meetings and public recitation of the rosary, at Benediction or in study groups. I ask you to make it our *Lenten Prayer*, the prayer that will bring us through Lent to find us belonging more deeply to the Lord in His Church, forgiving one another, being reconciled to one another in a Church that watches over all her children and extends her loving arms to embrace us all.

Dear God and loving Father, we ask your forgiveness for our own sins And for sins committed in the name of the Church. In your loving mercy, forgive especially those sins That have harmed children and young people as well as sins against the unborn, the poor and the vulnerable. Help us to be reconciled to one another and make us holy in your sight, that united in the one Body of Christ, We may worship you with pure hearts, proclaim your name with faith and hope And witness your love to all humankind. We ask this through Christ, our Lord. Amen.
