

# **Commodore's Report**

I guess the really big news is that the dredging work is complete. I'm happy that its over and I'm happy that we partnered up with a good contractor, Great Lakes Dock & Material. The game's over but we have the box scores. We most likely removed about 6,000 yards and we paid about \$150,000 when all is said and done. The "most likely" part really relates to the fact that the number is derived with several different calculations: the hydro survey used differential GPS and ~180,000 depth readings to generate 360,000 little triangular volumetric columns. Then there's a before and after and you pays the bill.

The dock system is between 7-9' with a lot more "nines" than "sevens." For full details you can view the hydro survey on the bulletin board or poke around for it on our website. The resulting pile is also viewable along Riechert Court on the old Walker property. I think you will agree that it's a very big pile of dirt, indeed. Please, help yourself.

It would be just dandy if the problems of low water depth were confined to our slip system. However, it's the case that some of our neighboring clubs, South Shore and South Milwaukee also face real challenges. We hope they are able to execute plans, permitting, and contracting before the tulips bloom. I would also caution members to proceed with caution outside our own slip system. In preparation for my Thanksgiving sail, I found the bottom on the south side of the Root at the Main Street bridge. There is also a significant bar running East-West just north of the main channel at the old Coast Guard station. It's about 50 yards long (I hit it three times) and it was about 6' deep on a day a little below MLW. Just a word to the wise.

## Where's all this going?

I was invited to the Racine Harbor Commission to hear a presentation on the low lake levels from River Keepers. It was their opinion that much of the blame was to be laid upon the Army Corps of Engineers for the dredging of the channel in the St. Clair River. Subsequent increase outflow due to scouring has doubled and maybe even tripled the output from the 1964 estimates. Further, record summer average temperatures (10 of the last 11) have contributed to the spot we are in today.

# **RYC News in Brief**

From the November Board meeting minutes:

**Treasurer Frank Randall** began his report by stating we are under budget for the month, but only because we've paid \$1100 towards dredging expenses. The adjusted net income for the month is \$8,500. In response to the question of how to account for dredging expenses, Randall indicated the expense cannot be capitalized as it is defined as maintenance.

The line of credit with the Tri City National Bank has been executed with terms at prime rate (3% currently) and only a \$10 filing fee.

The water level of Lake Michigan is reported to be down 15"

**Commodore Charlie Manning** reported on the dredging project, which was delayed by the storms earlier this month. To date 1,800 yards of a total 5,700 yards have been removed. Now that the work on the south breakwall has been completed, the dredger will be able to concentrate on RYC and the work should progress quickly.

Manning has two items to investigate beginning in the new year:

1. Survey for stray current in the slip system in and around the member boats

2. Get the advice of a financial planner to determine if the Club could benefit from establishing a non-profit foundation and a Charitable Remainder Unitrust.

Vice Commodore Gregg Henning led a discussion on the wind fence options... long term and more expensive vs. short term and less expensive. Landwehr will continue to investigate.

Office Manager Kim Shortess indicated she has not had much response to the request for new pictures for the directory. The Board suggested we get member volunteers to go around on Friday nights and get the pictures taken.

**Membership Secretary Pam Jobson** reported there were no status changes. She expressed her appreciation for the Board during her tenure.

Jobson led a discussion of the accounts in arrears. Several Board members volunteered to contact these members personally. If that does not produce the desired effect, the office manager will send out the appropriate letters according to the By Laws. A discussion ensued regarding posting the names of members with delinquent accounts. Manning offered to contact several other clubs to determine how they handle this issue.

Jobson led a discussion regarding the Strictly Sail Show in Chicago, January 24-27th. She will assist the new Membership Secretary to get the plans in motion.

The 2013 Open House is scheduled for June 1st.

House Director Jared Shortess reported the plans for a flavored coffee machine are in progress with installation scheduled within the month. The equipment will be in the galley and serviced by the wait staff.

Shortess thanked the Board for their support during his tenure. He pointed out that the dining survey results are becoming more and more positive, indicating that efforts are producing good results.

Shortess led the Board to decide the shutdown schedule for the winter cleaning, February 4th thru February 13th.

# Yard Director Jack Landwehr supplemented his written report:

1. Sand is being cleared from the parking lot.

2. Haulout fees are being evaluated as the costs were not covered this fall. The shortfall will be covered in spring launch.

Written report:

We have found few suppliers for wind screen material. The cost ranges from \$800 to \$1800. The material is similar and all screens have grommets used to secure the screen to the fence.

I am waiting to hear back from a few business owners that I contacted that might want to sponsor the wind screen. The wind screen would have their company's logo at the beginning and near the end of the wind screen. I hope to make a decision within a few weeks. Until then I will just shovel sand from the lot.

We are in the process of removing sand form the parking lot. This project should be done in a week. Not many Club members are able to do this type of heavy manual labor so it is a slow process.

Water main to the yard is decommissioned. Thanks to Mark Lukow

Membership

Thanks Jack, Blaise, Mike Fox and Pat Sullivan for volunteering.

The wind block on the entrance to the Club is installed. We now have two designated smoking areas located outside. The blue smoking shack and a smoking lounge located within the gray fenced area next the Club house. Smokers are asked to use one of the outside smoking areas and not smoke on or near the entrance to the Club so that used smoking materials do not gather on the entrance ramp to the Club house and that lingering smoke does not flow directly into the Club house now that that the wind block is up. The Yard Director realizes this is not a popular request for all Club members. However, it is the responsibility of the Yard Director to provide outside smoking areas and to inform RYC members of the smoking policy. The Yard Director seeks cooperation from all RYC members to see that this policy is followed. Thank you for your understanding with this issue.

Handicap parking spaces are clearly identified with signs and painted concrete parking blocks. The handicap sign from the middle parking lot was removed and that decal on parking lot surface was covered over.

I talked to Randy concerning snow removal. He now has a salt spreader on his truck. Salt will be applied to the lot as needed.

Haulout had one mast take a hit, details not available. No one was injured. Due to the dredging options presented to RYC boat owners, some owners chose to store their boat at other locations. With the reduced number of boats stored at RYC, the entire cost of Haul Out was not completely covered by fees collected. The Club added around \$1000.00 to cover the cost of the crane. We need to adjust Launch fees to cover the loss. It comes to an \$80 increase for 2013 launch. We should also talk about storage fees in general. Many members move their trailers to a less expensive storage area for the winter. We should look at long range rates and the actual cost to the Club so we can have a competitive storage fee price.

Finally, I need to form a committee that will oversee the removal of the old electrical box south of the pavilion and the installation of the new electrical box. Any volunteers to head this committee? The old box needs to be removed by launch date so that the crane can be used to position the new electrical box. The new electrical box is very heavy; 1000 lbs I am guessing. Randy is allowing us to keep it on his trailer until we are done with the project. The trailer will be stored in the Richter Building over the winter. Thank you Randy!

**Entertainment Director Kurt Lasson** reminded Board members of upcoming events:

## **Reaching with Rick**



This is dedicated to the memory of Steve Case. Paul Stephen "Steve" Case at the age of 68 unexpectedly passed away as the result of a sailing accident after finishing a race as a crew member onboard the schooner *Cuchulain*. Steve was racing in the annual Great Chesapeake Bay Schooner Race off the Virginia coast on Friday, October 12, 2012. Surviving is his loving wife of 47 years Nancy, their beloved sons, Matt Case of Nashville, TN, Jason (Nicola) Case of Grayslake, Ill and three grandchildren, Marissa, Brayden and Brynley.

Steve and Nancy joined the RYC in 1997 after a friend asked Steve to help sail his homemade sailboat on Lake Michigan. Steve and Nancy joined the club to learn sailing skills and to be part of the sailing community. Steve's love for sailing moved him and Nancy to buy their own boat, an Islander 30, the *Sheer Heaven*. This gave Steve the ability to sail with just Nancy and him. This was the type of sailing he really enjoyed.

Steve also loved the classic yachts of the world and he would travel to the far reaches of the world to sign on as a crew member. In 2005 he went on a 10 week sail that took him to Turkey, Cyprus, Lebanon and Israel. Steve always looked for a sailing adventure.

The other side of Steve is that he was an educator, coach and humanitarian. Steve graduated from Anderson University in Anderson, Indiana. While earning his degree in foreign language and education he also was able to fulfill his dream of playing college football for Anderson University. It was there where he met the love of his life, Nancy. They were married and after graduation they both joined the Peace Corps to teach english in Tunisia in Africa. After returning to the USA in 1968, Steve began teaching French and German with Racine Unified at Park High, then Mitchell and Starbuck Jr. High, returning to Park High. During this time he established a camping/fishing club and an annual biking trail trip to New Glaurus.

He also organized and led numerous European student trips, wanting his students to experience adventure, travel and other cultures. Steve was also a dedicated football and wrestling coach at Park High and in 1995 he was the head wrestling coach at Horlick High School. He took his team to the state championship in only his second year. I talked to one of his past wrestlers, our own Bill Halliday. Bill told me that he was Steve's size so every time Steve wanted to show the team a new move he would "call me to the mat." Bill told me that Steve was a very strong man and just the demonstrations were a tough workout but he also learned respect and hard work from Steve. I also talked with one of Racine's best athletes of all time. Sam Azarian. He told me that he was a coach with Steve at the Kids Wrestling Club which Steve started with three kids and within a year it grew to more than 100 kids. Sam said he and Steve did the demonstrations for the kids. Sam said that Steve was a leader of kids and young men that taught respect, excellence and fair play. He motivated kids to be their best. Steve led by example. He was the kind of guy you would respect and want to be around. I must say I heard the same story about Steve from everyone I talked to.

In closing I would like to say that Steve lived a very fulfilling life and his heart and soul has touched thousands of people. The world is a better place because of Steve, and he made a difference. Steve will be missed by family and all who knew him.
