## Reflections on Pentecost

Fr. Joseph Howard shares his thoughts on Pentecost as Fr. Pike is still vacationing in France.

Pentecost has its roots in both the Old Testament and the New Testament. It is a designation for a particular religious observance — the Feast of Weeks. This refers to the feast of the harvest of the first fruits of your labor or of what you sow in the field. It was originally an agricultural festival by which the community was expected to show gratitude to God for their harvest. This reflects that even in the Old Testament there was a realization of God's involvement in the lives of His people from their labor resulting in harvesting. Indeed, God not only cared but expected His people to show their profound gratitude to Him for what He had done for them as their God. In the Old Testament one was not allowed to work on the day of Pentecost; further, various sacrifices were required to show proper gratitude to God for His concern for His People. Over time Pentecost began to loose its association with agriculture and became more involved with the religious history of the Hebrew people. Such an example would include the covenant between God and Noah.

In the New Testament Pentecost was certainly celebrated in the first century and took on a special significance for the Christian community. This can be traced back to the time of St. Paul. The Book of Acts also speaks of Pentecost in relation to the travels of St. Paul. It is here we are told that there was a sudden loud sound from heaven followed by tongues of fire descending upon those present. As a result, the apostles began to speak in tongues or languages that were understood universally. Many took this event to mean that the last days had arrived and that the end was at hand! As a result, we are told that 3,000 persons were added to the new group of believers. Jesus had said that they would receive the power of the Holy Spirit and that they would be His witnesses literally to the ends of the earth! Indeed the apostles were empowered to give witness to Jesus despite grave misunderstandings and persecutions.

We often consider Pentecost as the birthday of the Church. It occurs on the 7th Sunday after Easter and should have special meaning for all Christians. The outpouring of the Holy Spirit is an event that continues today and is meant for everyone who is willing to open their lives to the power of the Spirit!



One of the gifts of the Spirit is the virtue of courage or fortitude. The apostles showed this gift in their lives after the resurrection when they had been warned not to preach or teach about Jesus, did so anyway, and were locked up in jail! Such threats did not deter them. Why? Because they chose to cooperate

with the power of the Holy Spirit and gave their allegiance and loyalty not to other persons first but to God first and foremost. Yes they encountered difficulties but they refused to get off track and stayed centered and focused on the Spirit of the risen Lord!

That same Spirit of God is alive today and operative throughout the universe yet many times today people choose not to give a priority to the Holy Spirit and allow other persons or objects to take a priority that is reserved for God alone. This occurs, for example, when people are somewhat embarrassed of their faith in the presence of others or when pressure is put upon someone to dilute their faith under the guise of fitting in better and building unity. Truly the lack of fortitude or courage in the life of a persons reflects the lack of God's presence. Jesus says that whomever is ashamed of Him or disowns Him Jesus will not acknowledge before His Father in heaven.

The moral virtue of courage is the ability to act with excellence under adverse conditions or threat. It is the ability to remain empowered by the Spirit despite others who demand the contrary! It is the ability to recognize that while there will be consequences for remaining steadfast and being loyal to God, the ultimate gift of God's friendship and eternal life remain intact and preserved. The Scriptures tell us that we cannot serve both God and other persons simultaneously. We are often forced to choose between our loyalty being granted first to God or to another person or some type of object such as money or power.

The Good News is that the Holy Spirit is alive and operative to empower those who open their lives to His presence. Each of us on Pentecost should take time to reflect on our own lives and ask ourselves: in what specific areas am I truly open to being empowered by the Holy Spirit and giving witness to God when adverse conditions or threat is present. Receive the

## Saints Peter & Paul

Feast Day — June 29<sup>th</sup>

Like Jesus, Saint Peter was a native of Galilee. He was fishing when Jesus called him to be one of his apostles. Peter was poor and uneducated, but eager and loving. Lives of the Saints tells us of Jesus choosing Peter "to be the Rock on which he would build his church, his

Vicar on earth, the head and Prince of His Apostles, the center of the church's unity, the unique channel of all spiritual powers, and the guardian and unerring teacher of Jesus' truth." Peter said of Jesus "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the Living God." Ten years after the Ascension, Saint Peter transferred his apostolic capital to Rome, where his chair was placed. He spent the next twenty five years building up the Roman Catholic Church. He was crucified by order of Nero and buried on Vatican Hill, where Saint Peter's Basilica now stands.

Saint Paul was originally Saul of Tarsus, born of Jewish parents. Initially he was a strong persecutor of Christians; but became a believer of Jesus when traveling on the road to Damascus, he was struck blind, and Jesus spoke to him. He became the Apostle to the Gentiles whom he had been taught to hate. When during his second imprisonment he knew that his hour had come, he wrote Timothy that he had "fought the good fight, finished my course, and kept the faith." Thus he was martyred in Rome.

This Feast Day commemorates the martyrdom of these two great apostles. They were assigned this day in the year 67. Both had been imprisoned in the Mamertine Prison of Rome, and both had foreseen their approaching death. Saint Peter was crucified, and Saint Paul was slain by the sword.

Saint Peter lives on in his successors who maintain his holy doctrines. Saint Paul left the Church fourteen Epistles. His interior life lies open before us in these divine writings. It is the life of one who has died forever to himself and risen again in Jesus.

## "Life Happens On The Journey" ~ Mental Health Article 6

# "Respecting One of God's Creations: Our Relationships" – Part III

We are (as Willie Nelson sings) "on the road again" with our series on <u>Relationships</u>. In article four we began exploring some of the different personality types that we act out in an attempt to hide our true, <u>real</u> selves (as identified by Gray). We developed these types of behavior in childhood in an effort to obtain love and approval and have carried them into adulthood. As mentioned previously, some of us may fall into one or more of the personality types.

## The Boaster

We've all known someone who tends to brag all the time and/or exaggerate the truth. The reason they do this is to make up for their low self-esteem — not feeling good enough. While growing up, this person learned that dramatizing and exaggerating the truth brought them attention. This person doesn't plan to lie — it happens automatically because they have trained their mind to do this a long time ago. Even when the real truth is worthy of attention, this individual will still embellish it.

## **The Victim**

Because they were hurt so very deeply at a young age and received a lot of sympathy for it, the Victim has realized that this is how to get attention. This individual does not feel that they are good enough to receive love and attention unless they have experienced some tragedy or mishap (or possibly just talking about it). Whenever something bad happens to the Victim, you can bet the story gets a lot of mileage (Gray). We have all heard of "the Victim Role." This person constantly sets themselves up in the same type of situations that continue to produce negative results. A real good example of this is people who continue to involve themselves in abusive relationships. They are miserable in the relationship, but they constantly get sympathy from others who feel badly for them. This relationship also seems normal to them. Sometimes in mental health we say, stop "sitting on the pity pot." We try to empower the individual to take back their control (make a change in their situation – take responsibility) to stop them from feeling so powerless. When they do this, they need to honestly express their anger instead of "guilt tripping" to manipulate or control the situation.

## **The Nice Person**

This person is always good-tempered, cheerful, very agreeable, and makes a great friend. They have a lot of

This person learned early in life that friends too. compliance brings approval, love, a reward, etc. Growing up, love and approval were very conditional. Expressing true feelings that might be considered negative were not acceptable. This individual lives by "the shoulds" and always says YES to everyone. Although frequently feeling resentful and angry, the Nice Person never shows it. They demonstrate that they can accept anything and adapt to any situation. They never "rock the boat." This type of individual is frequently found in alcoholic families. This person needs to learn how to be honest about their feelings and These people typically feel very taken advantage of and not respected. What they don't realize is that they teach others that is okay to take advantage of them. By being nice and accepting all the time, they send the message to others that "the sky is the limit with them - no boundaries!"

## **The Self-Righteous Person**

If these individuals are wrong, people will not love them and consider them bad. In order to get love, they attempt to be right at all costs. These individuals can never admit that they are wrong because they are supposed to be right (perfect all the time) to receive love.

Admitting their faults and failures would mean the loss of love and that would be very painful to them. The <u>Self-Righteous</u> Person often tries to make others wrong and/or look bad in order to be right himself. This type of individual needs to learn how to say, "I'm sorry" and know that they are still lovable.

## **The Angry Person**

Walking around with a chip on their shoulder signifies the Angry Person. It is a "roar" to scare away adversity (Gray). Anger is used to protect this individual's inner inadequate feelings. To compensate for feelings of inadequacy, they refuse to be adequately satisfied by the outer world. Nothing can please them. They project their own inadequacy everywhere, subsequently feeling frustrated and bitter towards the world. Many of these people might also be classified as the "Type A" personality. This person often times has a lot of unresolved grief issues from the past and has chosen to deal with them by remaining stuck in their anger never moving on towards acceptance and forgiveness. This person often times is also operating as the Critic (mentioned in the earlier article) – **BULLYING AND**/

## **Memoirs**

Much has changed in my two years here at St. Jude. Personally, I have been married, had a child, and am now expecting another. Professionally, I've developed my skills and discerned that I am called above all not to be an administrator, but a teacher. It may come

as a surprise to you, but after I gave up the early childhood dream of one day becoming a superhero, my career desires switched frequently between architect, lawyer/politician, physicist, astronomer, philosopher, theologian, priest, and teacher. I'm pleased to say that I have lived out many of those professions in one way or another at St. Jude. I have designed a youth program and built it up the way an architect carefully crafts his plans, knowing the strengths and weaknesses of the "living stones" with which I had to build upon Christ, the cornerstone and foundation of our faith. I shaped policy and decided on important matters the way our civil leaders do. I tried to come to a better understanding of the modern, scientific world around us to answer the many questions of today's youth, who are so interested (more so than their parents would imagine) in bioethics, faith & reason, and the Church's stance on evolution. I examined and researched topics and answers to theological questions posed to me by the youth of our parish, who must be given credit as insightful thinkers, even though I do not think they realize the depth of their own awesome yearning for God. Together with the kingly and prophetic, I exercised the priestly ministry of the faithful in serving God and Church. Lastly, I fulfilled my desire to be a teacher as I went about catechizing our young people, but this taste of teaching whet my appetite for more, and so I find myself leaving behind this ministry to do what I believe is God's will for my future.

In my successor's capable hands, I leave not just a youth ministry program, but the hearts and lives of youth who have grown from a handful to a great many in only two years. I remember my first event here well; I gave the Narratio, a traditional retelling of salvation history prescribed by St. Augustine, one of the greatest of catechetical saints. Only 10 youth were in attendance. Last week, one of our youth came up to me and remembered a joke I had made in the story; I was touched that my words had been remembered for so long. As I think back, I realize that our numbers have grown from those first 10. The 11 who attended Steubenville in 2007 grew to 18. now to 35 (yes, 35 teens have chosen to go with St. Jude to Steubenville South this summer!). Just last night, 23 of our youth gave up an evening of primetime television after the GIFT year was over and joined us to plant flowers for the elderly at Heritage Village. This simply would never have happened two years ago! All of this thanks to our wonderful volunteers and parents who have worked together so dynamically! I am honored to be leaving behind a legacy that all the people of St. Jude should be proud of.

Now is the opportunity for St. Jude to grow once more and take another step in the right direction. As Blake Royall, my successor in our parish youth ministry program, steps into his position, he brings with him not only degrees in theology and catechetics, but a wealth of knowledge and specialized training in youth ministry and a powerful ministerial work ethic. I am fully confident that he will touch each youth of our parish on a deeply personal level as an image of Christ the Teacher and guide the faithful youth of our parish into greater communion with God. In his own words. Blake asked me to tell you that he hopes to incorporate the youth group in a greater way into the everyday life and ministry of the parish. I have a great hope that a new Pentecost is about to descend on St. Jude, that under his leadership, our youth will come to fulfill greater opportunities for growth in their faith, for worship, for liturgical ministry, for service, for fellowship, toward the glorification of God and the salvation of souls. May the parish youth group and all those it serves come of age and reach their full stature under the guidance and work of Blake Royall, the new Director of Youth Ministry of St. Jude Catholic Church.




