## 2013 Winter/Spring Courses

Wonderlust courses provide structured learning on a wide variety of topics and encourage participants to engage in active discussion and sharing of their knowledge and experience.

### Early Travel in Yellowstone Park

- Instructor: M. Mark Miller
- Wednesdays, January 30 to March 6
- 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.
- Hope Lutheran Church, 2152 West Graf Street

This course will describe what travelers experienced when they visited Yellowstone National Park beginning with the adventures of John Colter in 1807 and continuing through the 1910s when automobiles were first admitted. It will focus on first-person accounts, their historical context, accuracy and literary merit. We will examine innovations that changed the Yellowstone experience, such as changes in policies governing hunting and

feeding wildlife and the introduction of new infrastructure (road building, railroads and motorcars, and construction of campgrounds and hotels).

**Class Format:** Lecture and discussion

**Reading:** M. Mark Miller, "Adventures in Yellowstone: Early Travelers Tell Their Tales"

**M. Mark Miller** is a fifth-generation Montanan who recalls his grandmother's tales about her trip to Yellowstone Park in 1909 – and her grandfather's trip there in 1880. He has been researching Yellowstone travel since 2003 when he returned to Montana after a career as a newspaper reporter and journalism professor. *Globe Pequot* published Miller's book, *Adventures in Yellowstone*, in 2009. His articles have appeared in *Big Sky Journal* and the *Pioneer Museum Quarterly*. He belongs to the *Humanities Montana Speakers Bureau*.

In this six-week course, we will relive tales of Yellowstone National Park's history from the perspective of early visitors.

### The American Constitution: Its Origin, Evolution, and Our Present Difficulties

- Instructor: Jerry Calvert
- Tuesdays, February 5 to March 12
- 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.
- Hope Lutheran Church, 2152 West Graf Street

We will look at the historical, political and intellectual context in which the framers debated, fought over and adopted our foundation documents (The Declaration, Constitution and Bill of Rights). We will also examine subsequent corrective amendments to the Constitution.

Participants will be asked to read and discuss these foundation documents and the arguments made in support at the time of their adoption.

Finally, we will turn to contemporary issues involving constitutional interpretation and application of Congressional, Presidential and Supreme Court authority. We will also discuss individual rights issues such as free speech, the exercise of religion, the right to keep firearms, privacy, and equal protection.

Class Format: Lecture and discussion

Readings: Declaration of Independence, U.S. Constitution, Bill of Rights, excerpts from Tom Paine's "Common Sense," the Federalist Papers, and Robert Dahl's "How Democratic is the U.S. Constitution?"

**Jerry Calvert** is a retired Professor of Political Science at MSU. He has taught introduction to American Government, courses on campaigns and elections, the legislative process, and constitutional law as well as special courses such as election law and media and politics. He has published numerous articles on the electoral process as well as a book on the origins and politics of the labor movement in Butte, America.



We will study and discuss some of our country's most important founding documents, such as the U.S. Constitution, including their influence from the historical to the contemporary.

### For the Love of Money: In Pursuit of Financial Integrity

- Thursdays, February 28, March 7, 28, April 4, 11, 18 (no class on March 14 and 21)
- 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.
- Museum of the Rockies

Recent events in the world of finance prompt some of the following questions: What is the relationship between money and ethics? Can individuals and institutions sidestep ethics when seeking profit or perhaps when they are under financial duress? What ethics apply to finance? Should ethics even be considered in a free market economy? Through readings, discussion, case studies and other approaches, this course will consider the question of ethics and finance beginning with an overview of ethics, various philosophical traditions, and following through with analysis and synthesis of financial/ethical issues from global structures to personal finance.

Class Format: Lecture and discussion

Readings: Brief articles and case studies

**Bill Stoddart** has been directly involved in ethical finance for the past six years and runs his own consulting firm, Northfork Financial. Prior

to entering the financial services field, he taught several courses at Bozeman High School for nearly 10 years, including AP U.S. History and AP U.S. and Comparative Government. He earned his BA in History from Cornell University in 1989 and his MA in History from Montana State University in 2006.

### Choral Masterworks

- Instructor: Eric Funk
- Wednesdays, March 20 to April 24
- 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.
- Pilgrim Congregational Church

This is a listening/lecture course exploring the great choral masterpieces from the classical repertoire including J.S. Bach's *B-Minor Mass*, Mozart's *Requiem*, Beethoven's *9th Symphony*, Mahler's *2nd Symphony*, Stravinsky's *Symphony of Psalms*, Britten's *War Requiem*, Vaughn-Williams' *Dona Nobis Pacem*, Schnittke's *Concerto for Choir*, and

more. The objective of the course is to both familiarize folks with the repertoire and deepen their understanding of the music and of why the great choral masterworks are timeless, enduring, and great.

**Class Format:** The course will be lecture/demonstration and active listening

**Readings:** No text is required. A listening list will be provided. Those enrolled in the course should be able to access the Oxford OnLine digital recording library through the MSU Renne Library (instructions to be given at the first class).

**Eric Funk** is a professor in the School of Music and University Honors Program at MSU, a Governor's Award for the Arts recipient, and a composer of contemporary classical music. He has taught at MSU for many years and is also the artistic director and host for "11th and Grant with Eric Funk."

### Scotland Highlands: History, Culture and Landscape

More than a history class, this course will look at the interaction of the Scottish Highland culture with

its rich landscape and explore how that relationship has created the vibrant and active rural Highland communities of today. The course will cover the deep past and unique culture of the Highlands through history, literature and cultural ecology. We will discuss the connections between Highland people and their landscape over time, delve into the Celtic culture and explore the poetry and music that came from that region.

**Class Format:** Lecture and discussion

**Readings:** Handouts will be provided

**Robin Patten**, (PhD) has been travelling and studying in and about Scotland for many years. She will bring that experience plus her interdisciplinary background to this course. Robin's fields of study include environmental history, cultural geography, ecology and environmental writing. She is currently enrolled in professional development courses from the University of the



### Frank Lloyd Wright and Le Corbusier: Contrasting 20<sup>th</sup> Century Architectural Ideologies

- Instructor: Ralph Johnson
- Thursdays, April 25, May 2, 9, and 16 from 2:30 to 5 p.m. (no class May 23)
- Thursday, May 30 from 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.
- Museum of the Rockies

Frank Lloyd Wright and Le Corbusier are unquestionably the most influential architects of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Born into the 19<sup>th</sup> century, they experienced radical political, social, cultural and economic changes in their lifetimes, and their work constantly evolved to reflect both their personal beliefs and the times. Their radically different ideologies, concepts and built work have significantly influenced the culture of architecture, the planning of communities, the relationship between the landscape, the user and the building as well as the form of the building itself to such a degree that today Europeans and Americans live in contrasting environments primarily shaped by these two men.



We will compare and contrast the ideas and works of Le Corbusier and Frank Lloyd Wright, such as this home in Oak Park, Illinois.

**Class format:** Power point presentations and discussion

**Readings:** Selected short readings primarily by Wright and Le Corbusier will be provided

**Ralph Johnson** has taught architecture, urban and community design at MSU since 1986. His graduate work at Columbia University focused on 20<sup>th</sup> century architectural history and theory. He teaches a 20<sup>th</sup> century introduction to design course in which Wright and LeCorbusier play a prominent role. While leading field trips throughout the U.S. and Europe he has visited the majority of the buildings to be presented in the class. He strongly believes that teaching and learning should be fun and challenging.

### **Geology of Mount Everest:** *Insights from the 2012 Expedition*

This Side Trip will showcase the 2012 Everest Education Expedition (led by Conrad Anker) and will cover the geology of Mount Everest and the education/outreach aspects of the expedition that were sponsored and directed by Montana State University.

**Dave Lageson** is a Professor of Geology at Montana State University. He has taught at MSU for 32 years and is former head of the Department of Earth Sciences. His specialty is structural geology and tectonics and he conducts active research in these areas with a team of graduate students under his direction. He is a Fellow of The Geological Society of America and The Geological Society of London.

### **Bannack to Bakken: 150 Years of Boom and Bust in Montana**

This Side Trip will cover themes and examples of the recurring episodes of resource-based boom and bust, from gold and silver to cattle and wheat to coal and oil. Communities and landscapes in Montana experienced rapid changes and subsequent decades of unanticipated aftermath due to events and trends far beyond the territory and state, such as changes in technology, distant markets, and world wars.

**Dale Martin** is an instructor in history at MSU-Bozeman, teaching courses in the history of Montana, technology, and the First World War. Living in Butte in the 1980s, he witnessed the tumultuous hopes and disappointments of a mining town. Both he and Merle Haggard "wish a buck was still silver."

**Eric Hyyppa** is the Director and General Manager of KUSM Television, MontanaPBS, in Bozeman, Montana. He is a PBS veteran, with over 16 years in public broadcasting and over a decade of experience in television production, including work for every major network and many independent companies.

### **Ranching Holistically, Grassfed Beef, Creating a New Business, and New Way**

- Presenter: Zachary B. Jones

Twodot Land and Livestock Company is located on the grasslands of central Montana, 9 miles south of Harlowton. This family ranch, established in 1908 by Earnest Calvin Baxter, is in its fifth generation of family management with the sixth generation out of diapers. Encompassing near 24,000 acres, the ranch is made of gently rolling hills and mellow flat prairie. Several perennial springs and streams flow through the ranch and the American Fork creek, with its cottonwood and willowed bottom, is an ecological seed for diversity.

## Side Trips *for Wonderlust members*

Being managed holistically (www.savoryinstitute.com) for over 25 years, simultaneously embracing ecological, social, and financial resilience, short and long term, has taken the ranch beyond many horizons. But, despite 104 years of one family's management, the stewards of TDLL are continually learning, triumphing often, and struggling at times. Yellowstone Grassfed Beef was co-created by TDLL for the ranch to be a more direct participant beyond its fences, touching more families, helping us all work to a new horizon.

A field trip to TwoDot Ranch in Harlowton will be scheduled for May 2013. Date and time TBA.

**Zachary Jones** was born and raised on his family's ranch (Twodot Land and Livestock Co.) south of Harlowton, MT. He attended Montana State University in Bozeman, studying education and human physiology. After university, Zachary moved back to his family ranch where he is currently the general manager overseeing the family ranch's operation. Zachary is COO of Grasslands LLC (a ranch investment and management company) and co-founded Yellowstone Grassfed Beef LLC (producing and selling grassfed beef to over 600 people a day throughout MT). Zachary and Shannon, his wife, have two young daughters, Scotland and River, and live on their family's ranch.

### **Obesity in America: Costs and Consequences**

This lecture will cover the prevalence and multiple causes and consequences of obesity in America. Issues discussed will include how obesity is defined and its prevalence; prevalence based on race or ethnicity and the rapid growth of obesity in both children and adults. The lecture will explain the connection between the growing prevalence of obesity and rising health care costs. Finally, she will briefly discuss the complex topics of prevention and treatment, touching on several topics of special importance.

**Barbara J. Moore, PhD** is president of Shape Up America!, founded by C. Everett Koop in 1994 to raise awareness of obesity as a health issue through its website ([www.shapeup.org](http://www.shapeup.org)) and other channels. Dr. Moore has served on two Institute of Medicine committees, one that reported on obesity in the military and in 2005 on prevention of childhood obesity. She co-edited *Textbook of Obesity: Biological, Psychological and Cultural Influences*.

### **Igor Stravinsky and the Rite of Spring**

After the extraordinary success of *The Firebird* and *Petrushka* with the Ballet Russe in Paris, Stravinsky's third ballet was destined to be his finest masterpiece, however its premiere on May 29, 1913 caused a riot. On the eve of its 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary the Bozeman Symphony will present Stravinsky's masterpiece *The Rite of Spring*. Join Maestro Matthew Savery for an in-depth look at the most infamous piece of music ever written, what really happened on that famous night, and why like Beethoven's *Eroica*, *Le Sacre Du Printemps* redefined what music could achieve.

**Matthew Savery** is currently the Music Director and Conductor of the Bozeman Symphony Orchestra and Symphonic choir, as well as the Wyoming symphony. In addition, to his duties with his two orchestras, Maestro Savery regularly guest-conducts orchestras throughout the United States, Canada and Europe. Maestro Savery has garnered a national reputation as an





### **The Science of Slime: Biofilms in Medicine, Industry and the Environment**

We will meet at the Center for Biofilm Engineering at MSU (3rd floor of Engineering and Physical Sciences) for a presentation, followed by a tour of the CBE laboratory facilities. The Center for Biofilm Engineering is a National Science Foundation Center of Excellence founded 20 years ago to foster the study of microbially produced biofilm (aka slime) and its influence

on microbiological, microbial ecology, and industrial processes. This unique research center is internationally recognized for its expertise, and links scientists and engineers from across the MSU campus and throughout the world in its interdisciplinary work on slimy things! The CBE mission focuses on research, education and outreach – which is accomplished in part through its Industrial Associates program, which includes a diverse group of companies ranging from BP, Exxon, Sherwin Williams, Proctor and Gamble, and Bausch and Lomb to national laboratories and biotechnology firms. We look forward to our visit with you!

**Lisa Kirk** is microbial geochemist with 30 years of experience in environmental geochemistry, primarily related to mineral production and related environmental management issues. Lisa is a part-time Research Scientist at the Center for Biofilm Engineering, where she studies the influence of microbial ecology on water quality in mine waste management. She is also Principal Geochemist and President of Enviromin, Inc., an independent consulting practice focused on environmental geochemistry of mined materials.

Anderson brings more than 20 years' experience working in the public policy arena – as a Senior Director at the White House National Security Council and in senior leadership positions at the U.S. Department of Energy, in the U.S. Congress and in the nonprofit and private sector.

Anderson previously was Chief of Staff and Counselor to Ambassador Susan E. Rice. Prior to joining the United States Mission to the United Nations, Anderson served as Chief National Security Spokesperson and Policy Advisor for the Obama-Biden Transition. She was also member of the White House National Security Council Transition Team, advising on the National Security Council structure and policy agenda.

Anderson previously worked at the Nuclear Threat Initiative, a nonprofit organization working to reduce the global threats from nuclear, biological and chemical weapons and was co-director of the Nuclear Security Project, which is led by former Secretary of State George Shultz, former Secretary of Defense William Perry, former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and former Senator Sam Nunn. Anderson graduated from Sarah Lawrence College. She was an intern at the United Nations in 1986.




