Following this, Kay will use one of her students to demonstrate lungeing exercises which incorporate Tai Chi techniques to improve posture, balance and feel. ODS Presents Alf Athenstaedt

Classical Dressage Clinic November 14-15, 2009 Hidden Winds 4300 S. Butternut; Broken Arrow, OK 74011





Alf Athenstaedt, a native of Hamburg, Germany successfully trained and showed in International dressage competitions in Europe. He was a distinguished student of dressage mentor Willi Schultheis and also trained under Hans Irbinger, the late Chief Rider of the Spanish Riding School. Alf is the former Head Trainer, Riding Master and Director of Performance for Tempel Farms is Wadsworth, II. According to authors of The Imperial Horse: The Saga of the Lipizzaners "the soundest foundation of dressage was laid with the arrival of Alf Athenstaedt in 1965..." He was challenged by Tempel Smith to recreate the spirit and practice of the Spanish Riding School; training and riding his Lipizzans at the White House, Madison Square Gardens and other venues.

This clinic is limited to a maximum of five riders who are current ODS members. Upper level riders are preferred, but at minimum must be able to sit the trot and have an understanding of putting the horse on the bit. Lessons will be 45 minutes at a cost of \$100.00 per session. Riders must ride both days and, if selected, provide a brief riding history for Alf. This registration form may be mailed to Anne or brought to the summer meeting on July 25; a 50% deposit is required. If more than five forms are received, five names will be drawn by lottery at the summer meeting and a waiting list will be created with the remaining names in order of drawing. If needed, names may be placed in "batches" by levels to ensure a variety of levels will be demonstrated during the clinic. An equitable number of riders will be drawn from each batch. Riders need not be present at the time of the drawing. If a rider is not drawn, deposit will be returned. A liability waiver must be signed before mounting. Stalls with shavings are available at \$20 per night; riders must clean stalls before leaving. Riders desiring a stall must make their reservation with and pay Paul Dalton directly phone 918-269-7520 or email pauld@aberdeenfarm.com.

Auditors are welcome!

Lessons will be held in an indoor arena. Auditors will need to bring a chair. ODS will be providing refreshments and a light lunch for riders and auditors. Auditor registrations should be received by November 9th; please send full fee owed. Walk-ins will be admitted for the same price although refreshments may not be available for walk-ins.

Videoing is only permitted for the private use of the rider. A rider's video cannot be copied, shared, or published in any way.

Hidden Winds is located near the intersection of 111st St. S. and Garnett. *From Tulsa or from the north or east* take the 91st St. S. exit off of Hwy. 169. Turn left (east) on 91st S. to Garnett. Turn right (south) on Garnett to 111th St. S. Turn left onto 111th St. S. and make the 1st left onto Butternut and follow the road through the subdivision to the farm, go through the brick gateway, and then to the right of the house to go back to the barns. *From OKC or from the south or west* take the Creek Turnpike to the Mingo Street exit turn right (south) on Mingo. Go to 111th St. S. and turn left, go one mile to Garnett, continue straight to Butternut, the next left after Garnett; follow Butternut through the subdivision to the farm, go through the brick gateway, and then to the right of the house to go back to the barns.

Top Ten Exercises to Become a Better Horseman

- 9. Leap out of a moving vehicle and practice "relaxing into the fall." Roll lithely into a ball and spring to your feet.
- 8. Learn to grab your checkbook out of your purse and write out a \$200 check without even blinking an eye.
- 7. Jog long distances carrying a halter and a carrot. Go ahead and tell the neighbors what you are doing; they might as well know now.
- 6. Affix a pair of reins to a moving freight train and practice pulling to a halt. Smile as if you are having fun.
- 5. Hone your fibbing skills: "See, Hon? Moving hay bales is FUN!" and, "No, really, I'm glad your lucky performance and multi-million dollar horse won the blue ribbon. I am just thankful that my hard work and actual ability won me second place."
- 4. Practice dialing your chiropractor's number with both arms paralyzed and one foot anchoring the lead rope of a frisky horse.
- 3. Borrow the U.S. Army's slogan: Be All That You Can Be: bitten, thrown, kicked, slimed, trampled, frozen
- 2. Lie face down in a puddle of mud in your most expensive riding clothes and repeat to yourself, "This is a learning experience, this is a learning experience, this is a learning experience."
- 1. THE NUMBER ONE EXERCISE TO BECOME A BETTER EQUESTRIAN: Marry money!

Are you a stall-bound horse? Want to amuse yourself and your human? Well, here are some fun activities for you!

Poop in the Water Game

This will test your coordination and spatial abilities. Horses all over the world practice this, every day. You must try to poop in your water container (note: drink water first, so you won't go thirsty!). If your water container is too high to poop in, you can attempt to poop on the stall's door, or on the wall. This also gives your human something to do-- when they see what you've done, they will marvel at your special abilities, then happily provide you with fresh water.

Artistic Wood Carving

You can become a wood carver. Use your teeth to chisel the wood of your stall into a beautiful piece of art! At first, you can start with simple shapes -- such as the half-moon bite shape-- and as you become more advanced you can try different forms (big curve shape or multiple bite shapes). Your human will really appreciate this. Some humans will actually remove your artwork from the stall, and put up fresh, new, unchewed boards-- encouraging you to develop your artistic abilities with a fresh, new canvas!

Grain Spilling Game

Try to dump out all of your grain from your grain bucket/container, by turning it over with your nose. It is a fun game. You can even continue to flip the container to be sure that all the grain is dumped on the ground. Then, using your delicate muzzle to guide you, try to pick up all the grain, sorting throught the bedding and poop. Amusing, and it makes your grain last longer. Your human will appreciate it too-- he/she may even bring you a new bucket of grain, or challenge you to become better by using more difficult containers!

Who Can Be The Loudest Contest

If you're stalled with other horses, try a little friendly competition with this game. When it's feeding time, see who can neigh, bang, scream, and kick the loudest in their stalls. Humans will instinctively throw food to the noisiest, most demanding horse, so try to be it. The winner is the horse that the human feeds first.

Unique Pooping

This not only provides fun for you, but fun for the human as well, because it makes the regular boring task of mucking more interesting. Try pooping in unusual areas. Poop on top of your door latches, or poop on window ledges. Poop in any food containers, or on top of salt licks. Try to poop any place that is not the ground.
