Elbow Dysplasia

Elbow Dysplasia (from here forward ED) is a complex disease. There is known to be some hereditary component, yet also in many cases there is no known cause. Like hip dysplasia it can vary in its form and how it affects the dog. Some dogs will show no symptoms at all and some will be lame before the age of 2.

There are 3 different types of ED. One is very obvious, Ununited Anconeal Processes (UAP). This is easily seen on an x-ray, as it looks as though the growth plates have never closed. This is the most severe type. The 2 other types can start as very subtle and many general practice DVM's can miss it. Since ED is relatively new (it wasn't even being tracked before 1990) many GP DVMs are not schooled in reading x-rays for it. The other types of ED involve osteoarthritis (OA) of the elbow joint. One related to a fragmented coronoid process (FCP) and the other to osteochondrosis dissecans (OCD) of the humeral condyl. In layman's terms, this is simply degenerative joint disease (DJD or another term for arthritis) on either side of the elbow joint.

ED when found early can be treated with surgical intervention, but unfortunately if not found until later in life, 4-6 years old, there is still not much that can be done. Surgical and medical interventions do not show much improvement of the dog's quality of life. This is unfortunate, but hopefully advances in canine medicine will soon catch up.

The good news is that many dogs with what the OFA (Orthopedic Foundation for Animals) deem as grade 1 ED seem to be perfectly normal for life. The vet school at MSU is currently collecting data for a study about grade 1 ED. I took English Springer Spaniel, Bell, to take part in this study. MSU took both lateral and VD (up and down) x-rays of her elbow joints. They also did a CT scan of both elbows. Bell is 7 years old, and when she was 2, OFA graded her as grade 1 in one elbow and a normal other elbow. The dog has never limped one day in her life,

and was an excellent candidate for this study. Her elbows have never had x-rays taken since her OFA 5 ½ years ago. If she DID indeed have abnormal elbows in the form of ED, she should have arthritis in her joint by now. Her x-rays and ct scans showed no arthritis in either elbow, not one bit. So why didn't she pass her OFA?

One of her elbows has a small process (which is a "bump" or "protrusion") on the anconeal process. This is less than 3 mm. That is VERY small. She still has this now and it STILL measures less than 3 mm. This, according to OFA, is DJD. According to MSU's theory, if this is actually DJD, then it should have grown larger and invaded other areas of her joint. MSU's study is trying to determine if these small protrusions are actually DJD or if they may, in fact, be normal in some dogs. The only way to know with absolute certainty is to anesthetize the dog and take a bone biopsy. This is an invasive test and there is no call to do this to perfectly healthy dogs.

Many people also feel that ED is becoming more of a problem and that it needs to be addressed more than hips. If you look purely at the stats published by the OFA you may think that. Statistics through 2011 show English Setters as 84% normal. For hips, it shows English Setters as 84% normal as well. So why do I personally think this is a skewed statistic? I have worked for a vet for the past 10 years. I have been working as a technician for the last 7 years. I have done many, many OFA x-rays in those 10 years. Through these years I have noticed a few things. #1, many people are still refusing to OFA elbows. These "breeders" think that only a hip x-ray is necessary and that since that is all the stud dog owner requires, that is all they do. I can educate until my heart explodes, but SO many people don't care and don't listen. In the English Setter breed, over the same time period, there were 2602 elbow submissions and 10145 hip submissions. This is also a skewed statistic because elbows have only been being tracked by OFA since about 1990, and these stats are through 1974 (as published on the OFA website www.offa.org). That is a LOT more information on hips than elbows. Reason #2, many people do not send in hips to OFA that they know will not pass. Most GP DVMs can tell if a dog is

going to pass hips or not. Most people, knowing the dog is not going to pass, choose not to send them in. Now, I can go on and on about why it IS important to send it in, but most people do not want information out there that looks negatively on them or their dogs. We need to get past this stigma, but that will also come with time. Most GP DVMs do NOT have a good sense of a dysplastic elbow or not when you are looking in terms of grade 1. Heck, when I sent in Bell's x-rays they vet said they were fine. He couldn't see anything wrong with them, and we were all shocked (including the stud dog owner who is a vet) that they didn't pass. So more people are sending in elbows that they think are fine and come back bad. So, there are many more hips that are bad that are not sent in, so I believe the percentage of dysplastic dogs is actually HIGHER in hips. Reason #3, many breeders save themselves money and if the hips look bad, we don't even take the elbows.

So where does that leave us? Well, the results of the MSU study (who is working with the OFA) should be very interesting. There may be many dogs that have not been bred because of an OFA

I think the biggest thing that will help us conquer disease in our setters is honesty. Honesty in evaluating our breeding animals is needed as well as honesty with others about our dogs. Send in as many animals to OFA as you can. Convince your pet owners to have their dogs OFA'd. This will give us even more information. When I purchased Phoenix from Lin Sell, she required all of her puppy buyers to OFA hips, elbows and thyroid, and will even do it at her own expense if needed. This is what is needed- ALL dogs being tested, even pets.

Breeders perspective on preventing autoimmune diseases in English Setters

I must say I have a particular interest in this topic, with over the 30 years of breeding ES, we have run across just about every autoimmune issue out there that effect our ES breed. I also

must also say I am not an expert on this topic, but just have information that has been gained over the years through many sources. Take it or leave it, I was asked to write this and share it. Autoimmune diseases in ES come in many forms, allergies, thyroid issues, skin issues, seizures, paralysis, & reproductive issues. Many times we do not equate the problem we are having with our ES to an autoimmune issue. 20-30 years ago there was rarely an ES I knew, boarded, groomed, or bred that was not on thyroid or had some other autoimmune problem. These days it is a much different picture and we are doing a much better job of learning from our mistakes.

From what I have gathered as a breeder, we can only protect our ES if we learn from what works and from what mistakes we have made. The autoimmune system of the ES develops more slowly than most breeds, indicating that between birth and 18 months of age, what we introduce into that little body of our ES puppy will affect them for the rest of their lives. Treat their systems very gently and selectively. Any substance we put into their little bodies has an effect, compiled with an immature immune system can prove disastrous. This goes for food, vaccines, and other medicines. We choose to do nothing rather than too much.

Through years of trial and error and discussion with long time breeders with similar issues, and multiple vets, we have come to unofficially target the following issues as those that can harm the autoimmune system of the young ES;

- **Vaccines.** Our choice is to follow Jean Dodds, DVM vaccination schedule for all puppies, at minimum up to 2 years of age. You will find her vaccination recommendations at www.hemopet.org. **The premise is simple, do little or nothing at all.** The longer you can avoid introducing foreign substances into a pure immune system the better. Giving the immune system time to mature, **I have seen puppy's come out of autoimmune issues, successfully developing their systems to be healthy, once the toxins have been eliminated, allowing the immune system to continue to become stronger.**

SOME GENERAL RULES;

- NEVER give 2 vaccines together, this over loads the immune system.
 - Never give vaccines to puppies before 8 weeks of age. Waiting till 10 weeks is even better if you can. It is important to get your vets support with this. They can order the vaccines if you ask them to. We order and give our own vaccines to help with this process.
 - Wait as long as you can to give all vaccines. Unless you board or take puppies to shows before 6 months, there is no need to vaccinate other than the basic ones needed.
 - If you have to board and give bordatella, do so as old as you can and not unless you have to. Give seperately, not with any other vaccine. There can be added expense with 2 vet visits, but pay little now or pay big later, your choice. We have seen, as have others, paralysis from giving full slate of vaccines to puppies. That can be heartbreaking.
- **Dog food.** Inducing un-necessary ingredients & byproducts into an immature immune system is not necessary. Feeding a grain free, raw, or natural diet is best. The best quality food you can afford and the most natural you can afford will pay off long term. The dog food companies are now recognizing the benefits of avoiding by products and offer so many types of grain free & natural foods. **Avoid beef, chicken, & turkey products. Also avoid those treats,**

they come with many unnatural ingredientsl.

Remember, the more you spend for quality products, the less you will spend in the future with unnecessary vet bills treating those autoimmune problems.

- **Heartworm, worming and other medications.** Introduction of multiple substances into the young ES together can result in system overload. As with vaccines, going slow and treating each substance as a potential toxin till the immune system is more mature. Worming can be held if a stool specimen is checked, then worm if necessary. Avoid heartworm till at least 6 months of age.

We recommend to buyers that at 2 years of age you can mainstream the food you feed, and introduce more vaccines if indicated. The immune system is more mature and can handle the introduction of more toxins/substances. Some breeders choose to do titers on their dogs to see if the vaccines that have been received have adequately covered their animals rather than just vaccinate. We encourage them to go as long as possible keeping with the plan we have laid out for them.

Any time you see the following consider it may be due to the immune system:

- Lack of sperm
- Thyroid
- Seizures
- Paralysis
- Mange
- Skin allergies
- Stillborn puppies
- Red eyes (grain allergy)
- Ear allergies
- Lack of the ability of a female to reproduce

Think of an ES puppy as a blank canvas that will change and develop over the first two years according to what you put in their system. A hearty immune system, the ES does not have. Our handling of that immune system will decide what they develop in to. Long term effects will play out positively if you understand your role.

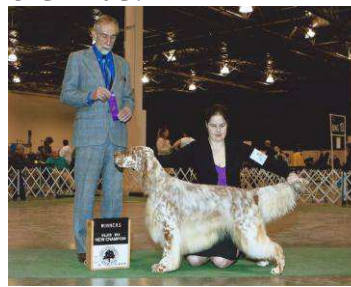
