Checking the Records

A couple of people have reported that their "Country of Service" is incorrectly recorded in our database. So, in order to correct and update the records, we have used a new label for this month's newsletter with all the database information we have for you on the label. In addition to your mailing address, the labels contain the following information: 1) CRPCA subscription due date, 2) NPCA member (yes or no), 3) Home phone, 4) Work phone, 5) email address, 6) Country of Service, 7) Peace Corps Assignment, and 8) current occupation. Phone numbers include only the four last digits for your privacy. If we do not have information from you for a particular field, it is marked xxxx (i.e. if you have not provided your work phone number, it would be marked "Wxxxx"). So, if any of your data have been recorded incorrectly, or if information needs to be updated, you can respond in the following three ways listed in order of preference:


Come savor a delicious Ethiopian dinner with the Peace Corps crowd! Rendezvous Cafe is located in the Albina community of North Portland, between Albina and Mississippi on North Russell St. There are two ways into the area, from the east on Russell or from the north or south on Interstate Ave (see the star on the map).

From NE MLK seven blocks north of Broadway, go west on Russell. Pass Emmanuel Hospital and go under I-5. The restaurant is a few blocks down on the left.

Or go north on Interstate Ave from the first light at the east end of the Broadway Bridge. Russell Street goes off to the right after the slight S-curve, and the restaurant is less than two blocks up on the right.

Tri-Met's #5 Interstate runs along Interstate Ave from downtown Portland and Rose Quarter every 15-20 minutes. There are also bike lanes along Interstate Ave north from Rose Quarter and the Broadway Bridge.

We've arranged to share five dishes with plenty of injera (bread) for \$7.00 a person; the suggested tip would bring it to \$8.50, and drinks are extra. 30 Years Later. . .

When I returned to Concepcion, Chile, 30 years after Peace Corps service there, I was amazed by the progress made in virtually every sector of the economy and society. Actually, I had returned once before – in 1970 when I followed the Presidential Election campaign as Marxist Salvadore Allende emerged victorious over two other candidates. This had been the summer of Chile's discontent, when conditions in the country were especially difficult.

From Oct, 1965 to Nov. 1967 I was a PCV at the politically volatile University of Concepcion during the riotous days when a Soviet line Communist was considered right of center. I lived in a Kafkaesque university area roominghouse full of students who had visited Cuba, China, and the USSR on various lengthy scholarships and two year programs. They were always at odds with each other and often relentlessly sought to persuade me as to the superiority of their revolutionary point of view over the others.

The entire region was staunchly leftwing. Marxist candidate Salvador Allende, victorious in the election of 1970, carried the metropolitan area in this zone of over 500,000 by a margin of more than 2 to 1. The only real weakness of his coalition in its ambitious attempt to build a Marxist state was its tendency toward internal divisiveness. Allende forces were also often oblivious to the fact they won at the national level with only a 37% plurality which did not give them sufficient mandate to completely redistribute the wealth of the society.

Concepcion in the 60's was grim and gray. Around the university area were slums full of barefoot, snot-nosed kids who coughed up blood at night. The temperature averaged 45 degrees during the four months of drizzly winter, and heating was virtually nonexistent except for a few small electric space heaters in the better houses and offices. Summer rarely warmed up much either. Southern Chile gets chilly!

When I arrived early this summer in Concepcion I immediately began to look up old colleagues and friends. The woman who was my counterpart professor in the psychology department of the education school at once invited me and my travelling companion (Rosalie Schmitz -PCV Tunisia 66-68a) to lunch at her apartment where she has recently retired. Later we visited my former department chairman, now retired in a ranch town a couple of hours north. When we visited the university, the chemistry department staff helped us look up the Chilean family of a Peace Corps friend for whom I was best man for when he got married in 1967. An engineer friend took us to dinner at the best restaurant in town. We found my old law student buddy, Hector, who is now an administrator at his former high school in a nearby town. It was really great to strike it up again with people as though I had only been gone for a weekend.

My humble old neighborhood near the university barrio had been almost completely urban-renewed. It now

looks like a pleasant residential area in western Europe in contrast to the gloomy group of apparently haunted, gritty houses and apartments that existed there before. The university has expanded and modernized. I was particularly impressed with the new library. There used to be a stark hillside slum area just behind the university. The once forested area stretched up a steep slope which appeared like scenic poetry but in reality was an ecological disaster in the making. As the slum dwellers cut down the trees, the muddy access roads up the hill became increasingly impassable. I recall how consternated Chilean huaso men would screech profanity and crack their whips in frustration over the scarred backs of their enormous oxen as they became hopelessly bogged down with their giant loads in the oozing much as they struggled in vain up the steep, denuded hillside. Needless to say, mudslides would often engulf the ramshackle callampa dwellings. Now the roads up this Aguita de la Peris (Water of Paradise) slum area are paved or at least graveled, and the housing, thought still poor, is much more sturdy.

Progress in the Concepcion area has come at quite a cost. I heard various horror stories of the aftermath of the 1973 coup when the military deposed the Allende government, dispensed with democracy for over a decade, and relentlessly persecuted real and alleged leftwing extremists. The military completely took over the University of Concepcion campus. Many students and professors were immediately incarcerated incommunicado. Some disappeared never to be seen again. The most famous Concepcion student leader was killed during the coup in Santiago. His successor blew himself up in an accident. Many others were executed while some managed to flee to the USA or Europe. Yet, in spite of this ignominious collapse of democracy, most everyone will admit that the resulting order was certainly preferable to the chaos of the last year of the Allende government.

Concepcion is now full of excellent restaurants, both old and fine. Consumer goods are in abundant supply. Local markets and grocery stores are well stocked. The highway northeast to Chile's productive central valley of agricultural abundance is much faster than the old road. The level of employment is much higher than in the past; and extreme poverty is no longer noticeable. The region no longer seems like a simmering backwater of discontent – and the local empanadas are still cheap and tastier than ever!

Follow up on the Ogoni tribe and a call to boycott Shell Oil (from a story in the newsletter earlier this year).

<u>Nigeria Frees 20 Detained Ogoni Activists</u> By Dulue Mbachu Tuesday September 8

LAGOS, Nigeria (Reuters) - A Nigerian court has freed 20 Ogoni minority activists detained since 1994 on charges of murdering four progovernment chiefs. They said the youths, who had been facing the same murder charge for which author Ken Saro-Wiwa and eight others were executed in 1995, had been freed by a court in the southeastern city of Port Harcourt Monday. international outcry followed the 1995 execution of Saro-Wiwa and his colleagues ordered by late Nigerian dictator Sani Abacha in defiance of worldwide pleas for clemency. Nigeria was subsequently suspended from the Commonwealth of Britain and its former colonies while Western countries imposed limited sanctions to force the pace of democratic reforms and respect for human rights under Abacha's iron rule.
