Shop News

- The instructors are in the process of drafting some safety and equipment guidelines pertaining to silversmithing. Once complete, we will put these on the website and as well as email them to all beginning silver smithing students.
- Effective immediately, we will be increasing shop fees to \$3 per hour for adults and \$2 per hour for students. This is in an attempt to meet our increasing shop costs.
- For our many varied courses, we strive to have all of the hand tools required by the students for the courses. Sometimes these get misplaced and can't be found, as recently noted with our bench pins. This is a gentle reminder that everyone is responsible to put back in the proper place all tools that you use. As well, tools can not be borrowed for home use, as this removes a tool from another student.
- To save costs, know that we have copper and brass for sale as well as silver
- We recently purchased some new tumbling medium which is for sale to the members. Priced at \$2 a bag, we have
 a fine grade glass bead and walnut shell. These can be used wet or dry. The walnut shell would be safe for
 tumbling silver jewellery that had stones, the glass would be great for burnishing silver or any metal. Check out the

- We are greening up the shop to some degree. The handi flux has been discontinued. Instead we will be using a borax/water paste. As well to clean the propane nozzles, we will be using a vinegar soak.
- In the near future, we will have some new storage methods for the hand saws (to prevent breakage) and hammers. Stay tuned.
- To assist silver smithing students, on Tuesday night, a silver smithing instructor will be available for guidance and or assistance. Please do come out and work on your projects. We are there to assist.

Call for expressions of Interest for artists studios

The Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning is accepting expressions of interest for the rental of individual artist studios in the renovated Tett Centre, 370 King Street West, scheduled for opening in July of 2013. The Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning will be a significant arts hub for the City of Kingston, promoting and supporting local artists, arts organizations and their activities.

A limited number of studio spaces will be available for rent by visual artists, writers, and craftspeople. The studios will be centered around a common area large enough to accommodate small groups, hold special equipment, or present workshops. Public display space will be available. Individual artists will share a central water/clean up area and kitchenette type space.

The Tett Centre is envisioned as a destination space where members of the public will be invited to attend during established open hours, as well as for programmed activities. Individual artists will be expected to embrace this philosophy and participate in the activities of the Tett Centre as much as their discipline allows. Individual artists will have 24 hour access to the studio, including 'private' hours which are closed to the public. Studios are intended for work purposes only

Successful applicants will be required to sign a one year lease, and must provide proof of liability insurance of \$2 million.

Prospective tenants will join eight not-for-profit arts organizations confirmed as anchor tenants. In addition, the facility is scheduled to include an event room, a rehearsal hall, a community exhibition space, a general purpose activity room, and a cafe. The Tett Centre is located adjacent to Queen's University's Isabel Bader Arts Centre, now under construction.
